

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


Forest Vernon Ream

Preface

Two major factors have prompted the Ream Family Historical Society to sponsor publication of a family history at this time. 1, the belief that the large body of newly found material should be permanently recorded in a book; 2, the desire to correct erroneous stories about the family which have been published in the past.

When several "old-timer" genealogists met recently at the Library of Congress they agreed, that "the more we research, the less we seem to know." Stories based on tradition, willful guess work, and just plain human error must be amended when more authentic records are discovered. For example, the story that Eberhard Ream and Jost Schwab came to America with William Penn, as reported by various writers, is not supported by facts. (Wm. Penn arrived in 1681, and our Eberhard was not born until 1687)

In an excellent history of his family by Charles Mason Remey (filed in the Library of Congress only, in 1957, not for public distribution) credit is given to Dr. B.W.Rhamy, (Fort Wayne, Ind.) for " correlating older attempts to record these individual families together with a vast amount of new material and corrections of gross errors <u>in these old records</u>."

Sometime we can learn from comedians. Will Rogers once said, "I don't believe anything I read in the papers and only half of what I see." Mrs. Cecile Ream DeBirny, of the DAR, New York State Consistory, more recently commented: "If you can get something printed in a book, you will soon find it accepted as fact, and then if it is reprinted several times, it passes as gospel."

After thirty years of research the compiler of this volume is convinced that there is truth in the above judgments of the validity of the printed word. And since everything included herein is based on the printed or spoken word, the reader should understand that what follows cannot be guaranteed as 100% correct. We have not, however, knowingly included any data that appears to be doubtful or incorrect without so indicating.

In Census records which are all made up in long hand by the Census Takers, the writing is sometimes poor, or the ink is faded, making it difficult sometimes to figure out what was intended. This is particularly true in the film copy of the 1880 census. Where there was doubt about a sentence or a word, or a part of it herein, the part in doubt is inclosed in parentheses, followed by a question mark and sometimes followed by a word or spelling that was considered most likely.

The source of the material that follows will be stated in general, but it is not practicable to mention the source for every item. Census, tombstone or Bible records, although generally dependable, cannot always be accepted as correct. In cases where there were a dozen or so members of the family with the same name, such as George, John or William in one County, a study of all available records of that area was sometimes necessary to make a decision as to which person belonged to a particular family line. Early in our research we found it easy to be critical of authors of Ream family histories who published errors and recorded obviously impossible stories about the family, but after years of experience in dealing with preposterous claims of particular lineages, our only conclusion is that we owe a great and unpaid debt of gratitude to those members of the family who devoted much time and effort to developing research and bringing forth histories of various branches of the American Ream family. 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
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PART 1. LOCAL HISTORY Section 1 Introduction

A good number of years ago when the late Norman W. Ream was endeavoring to hold a large family reunion in Harrisburg, Pa., each year, Forest V. Ream was appointed Family Historian.

At that time Norman was accumulating all the data he could get about the family for the purpose of having a history printed at some future date, although there was no immediate prospect of getting his material edited and published. I gave Norman any assistance reguested and on several occasions passed on to him some Census records which were not solicited.

A lady in New Philadelphia, Ohio, took Norman's records at one time to use as a basis for a Family History Book, but finally gave up the idea when she found there were many duplications in the records and the editing was practically impossible with inexperienced personnel, and the records were returned to Norman.

Later on, possibly about 1933, Norman gave his records to Elmer L. Denniston, D.O., Harrisburg, Pa., for inclusion in the Doctor's book, "Genealogy of the STUKEY, REAM, GROVE, CLEM, and DENNISTON Families." This book was reported ready for the printers in 1936, but actual publication did not take place until 1939. In regard to the REAM family history in the book, Norman always complained of the great number of mistakes that were printed. In our history book being prepared currently, we are trying to eliminate many of the reported errors, however, in a book of this nature the road to perfection is difficult on account of the many variables in the printed word and other sources.

Coat of Arms

On July 3, 1947 Norman gave me a photographic copy of the SEAL which was found by Prof. Fredrick Riehm in the official public documents and will records of Andrew Riem--Andreas Riehm (1749-1814) in Berlin, U.S.A. Zone of Germany. This with other substantial

evidence gives us the only authentic Coat of Arms known to be applicable to our Eberhard family line in America.

Any blood line relative of our Eberhard Ream, 1687-1779, can display it with much pride. Department store varieties not tied down to specific families are not worth a nickel. Further information about the Coat of Arms, paintings, plaques, or black and white reproductions can be obtained by writing to the Secretary-Treasurer, Ream Family Historical Society, Friendship, Maryland 20758.

Local History

The LOCAL HISTORY herein includes family organizational activities in the States of Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and miscl. as witnessed by the author from 1898 to April 13, 1974, when he issued No. 935, the last of the old membership cards for the Ream Family Association, which was incorporated under the laws of Penna. in 1952, and during the assembly of 358 genealogical files for members affiliated with the Ream Family Historical Society beginning January 1, 1962.

The author of Lancaster Co., Penna. ancestry now living and enjoying the rolling hills of Maryland, was born in a strange locale--Brown Township, Paulding County, Ohio. Strange because in that prairie land one can stand in the center of four, 4-sq.mi. tracts of beautiful farm land and have a clear view as far as the eye can see in any direction until the sky meets the terrain without any sign of a mountain anywhere.

Genealogy From the Ground Up

For any degree of success I have had or ever hope to have I give credit to a wonderful father and mother.

I saw my father and other men clear the trees from the back 40 acres, blast out the stumps with dynamite and pile them up for burning, using teams of horses for that purpose.

At an early age I had a mania for going places with my Dad. My pleas were so great that he didn't have the heart to deny me. As a result, when Dad, with his favorite team and a load of logs, was headed for the

hoop mill in Defiance, Ohio, nine miles north of our farm, he had with him a "little boy."

Father was a very intelligent man and capable of successful operations in numerous occupations as his life experience shows. He had his trunk packed, ready to leave for college when his father, <u>William Henry</u>, died from disabilities experienced from service in the Civil War. He had enlisted the second time to take the place of Uncle Tom, who was slightly crippled. He refused to file for a pension advising that the Government had paid him for his services, and he couldn't honestly ask for more. He was a Universalist. (See the <u>William Henry</u> historical marker reproduction herein.)

My parents really wanted to make a gentleman out of me, and although the discipline was rather harsh at times, I lived to see the value of it in later years. And, what a wonderful experience it was to always be at the front with Dad, who was good at explaining things as we went along.

Father's experience as an agriculturist was second to none, and he had various important assignments in that field. He was Field Superintendent for the Columbia Sugar Company (Ex-German American Sugar Company), Paulding, Ohio. One of the first cars furnished by the company for his use was a little red, chaindriven BRUSH automobile. Later he had early model Ford cars.

On one of Dad's trips south of Paulding to inspect beet fields and check with the experienced Hungarian beet-field workers, I was permitted to go along, and here--

My First Lesson in Genealogy

We passed a farm owned by a Mr. Roehm, and Dad explained that Mr. Roehm was of our same REAM (ROEHM, RIEHM, etc.) family line from overseas. If at that time I had had the interest in genealogy as at the present time, I might have asked certain questions and learned much more, but now I have lived to see the day when Prof. Roehm, Detroit, Mich., has established documentary evidence from overseas as recorded in our Historical Society files to support the claim of ROEHM being of the same REAM or RIEHM family.

In 1898 when Dad swayed from the Republican Party to support the silver-tongued orator, William Jennings Bryan, he began showing me off to relatives in our 5th generation in America. Aunt Kate, the daughter of John and Catherine (Redman) Ream, came up from Ross County, Ohio, to visit with Uncle Jake, the blacksmith and the Gray family near the home of William Henry Ream in Brown Twp. Aunt Kate was only about seven years of age when the John Ream family pulled stakes and left the environs of the Abraham Ream, 3g., family in Centre County, Pa.

For a period of 14 years thereafter, I had the pleasure of many trips with Dad, visiting relatives in Union, Champaign, Clark and Ross Counties, Ohio, and to Chillicothe, the County Seat of Ross County, and the first Capital of the State of Ohio.

The kind of family information that Father gave to me, based on his personal knowledge and that given to him by living members of the family, compared with records in various county-seat towns, has been in general found to be more reliable than vital statistics of the States, tombstone records, etc., which are freguently based on second-or third-hand information often given by a relative or friend of the deceased.

Our Family Line and Many Others in Ohio to Eberhard, Reamstown, Pa.

Father and I traveled together occasionally to many cemeteries, churches, residences, etc., along the western third of Ohio, north to south, and visited the place of his birth in Lisbon, Clark Co., Ohio, in 1869 and the farm owned by John Ream, 4g., near South Salem, Buckskin Twp., Ross County, Ohio. We established our family line through William Henry (Civil War Veteran), Daniel, John, and Abraham, 3g. (Rev. War soldier buried in the Tusseyville Cemetery, Centre Co., Pa.), Nicholas and Eberhard from the Lower Palatinate, Europe, to Philadelphia, Pa., in 1717.

Eberhard Rim, as the name was spelled in the Phila. Port record, died August 22, 1779, and is buried in the

REAM cemetery, Reamstown, Pa., with a tombstone lettering that reads in part:

"Here rests the bones of a very honest dear old grandfather, John Eberhard Rihm, born 1687 in Europe, married in the year 1712 with Elizabeth Schwab. . . . (See RFHS Comm. 4.)"

We have no way of knowing when and where the first Ream family reunion was held in the United States, but from information obtained from the Morg-Ream Co., 128 East Main St., Ft. Wayne, Indiana, some time after we moved there in 1922 to accept a position as Chief Accountant for the Nickel Plate Railroad local agency, I was informed that the Ream family had been holding family reunions there in Allen County for many years back. Prior to that we had heard of a Ream family reunion being held in Ada, Ohio; of the Smith-Ream family reunion in Plainfield, Ill.; and a Ream-Heberling family reunion in Wood County, Ohio--the home of the Mathias Reams family of the John Frederick Ream (Rev. soldier) line from Centre Co., Pa.

By courtesy of Vivian Gertrude (Ream)--Mrs. Wyatt E. May, President of Indiana Chapter 6 of the RFA, Inc. (Member HS 35-16)--we have a copy of the minutes of a Ream reunion held in Eastern Ohio in 1910. It reads:

"Reunion at Shanesville, Ohio, Aug. 25, 1910 "Tribune, New Philadelphia, Ohio

"It is 35 years since Grandfather Benjamin Ream, and his wife Mary Giesy Ream, a daughter of one of the pioneer ministers of the Reformed Church in Western Penn., moved to Shanesville, Ohio. He was a hatter, which occupation he followed for many years. He was a leading citizen of his community, as also a leading and faithful member of his church, the Reformed Church of his town. He and his wife are buried side by side in front of their church in Shanesville.

"William Cratz, Toledo, Ohio, read some biographical sketches of the ancestors and the ancestral home in Old Berlin, Penn.

"Henry Franklin Aegeter was baptized at the Reunion. He was a great grandchild of Benj. Ream. His Father was Frank Aegeter Grand Mother--Mrs. Louisa Ream Grand Aunt--Mrs. Druscilla Cratz

Also in attendance was Silas Augustus (Uncle Gus) Ream, son of John Michael Ream, and John Henry Ream, son of William Ream (4g.), both of Peru, Ind. (The record returned to HS 35-16. FVR.)

The Ream Clan

One of the finest gentlemen in family circles that the writer ever met was Norman W. Ream, 2128 No. 6th St., Harrisburg, Pa. We had much in common, both being employed by the Penna. Railroad at various times, and both having an earnest desire to learn more about our ancestors in America and overseas.

In 1937 I accepted an appointment as Adjudicator in the Claim Dept. of the Railroad Retirement Board and removed with my family from Fort Wayne, Indiana, to Washington, D. C. Some time thereafter, Norman decided to retire from railroad service and called on me for assistance in preparing his claim for an annuity under the Railroad Retirement Act of Aug. 29, 1935.

Norman was active in his church work and with the Veterans of the Spanish-American War, serving as their Chaplain, etc. Many of our members who had opportunity to accompany him on a tour of the Battle Field at Gettysburg, Pa., were thrilled by the experience and doubted that any other guide could have described, as well as he, the skirmishes and movements of the units of each army during the battle.

For many years family members looked upon Norman as the one and only family historian of consequence. Although there were several other individuals in the country dedicating a good part of their time to developing a REAM family history, it was apparent that Norman was a pioneer in the movement, and he was one of a group of three that instituted what was hailed as the "First Reunion of the Ream Clan," meetings to be held in River View Park, Harrissburg, Pa. The invitation for that meeting read as follows:

"People who take no pride in the achievements of remote ancestors will never achieve anything worthy to be remembered with pride by remote descendents.

"AN INVITATION

To the ancestors of the Reem Clan :--

In order that the present generation may know what obstacles their ancestors had to contend with, family reunions are being held in almost every community, by the various clans, and their acts, deeds, and contentions made known.

With no other object in view but to make the members of the (Ream, Reem, Rheam, Rheem, Riem, etc.) kin more familiar with the deeds, trials and hardships of their ancestors, a reunion will be held on Sept. 22nd, 1917, at Reservoir Park, Harrisburg, Pa., starting at 9 o'clock A.M., to effect a permanent organization, and it is very urgent that you be in attendance and endeavor to have all your relatives also present. It is practically impossible to send every one of the Reem clan a notice of this meeting, and we therefore ask your cooperation in endeavoring to have all your relatives duly notified.

My father, then living with my brother, Carroll Warren Ream, and family in Glasgow, Ky., received a letter under date of 23 June, 1936 which read in part as follows:

Dear Mr. Ream:

"Being a descendent of the Reams, I called on Mr. Norman Ream, 2128 N. 6th St., Harrisburg, Penn. I was happily surprised to learn that he was the genealogist and President of the Ream Family Reunion Association.

After seeing his mass of data on the Reams, I told him that by all means, he should have in every Ream home a genealogy, compiled from his thirty years collection, of rare documents, deeds, wills, war records and the tracing of the Reams, back to 1432, in Leimen, Germany. I also suggested to him that, it would be great, to write the genealogy of the Reams in the family tree that I am compiling.

"Mr. Ream agreed, and now we are very busy placing the ancestors in their proper place on the family tree, next will come the descendents, and we must have your aid to be able to follow the descendents down to the present time. This can be done very easily, just write me immediately and give me the names of your great grandparents, your grandparents, your parents, your self, children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren.

"It is quite an honor for a lady to become a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and the men a member of the Sons of the American Revolution, (both National Societies) any descendent of the Ream families may become a member, since twenty two of our ancestors fought in the Revolutionary War. Captain Andrew Ream (son of Everhard) and Andrew Ream, the Drummer Boy (son of Abraham) was loved by every one. If any of the Ream descendents wishing to become a member will write me, I will be glad to complete their membership without any charges.

"May I ask you to answer this letter promptly, and send in the names of your families, as it is a very slow and tedious task to weave every name into its proper place in the family tree, and I am trying very hard to send the manuscript to the press on October 1, 1936. Please write plainly so I will not make a mistake in copying your records.

We have learned of another name that should be added to the list above: Georgia (Cook) Sharp, Genealogist, 1407 E. Main St., Lancaster, Ohio. Our current file of her membership HS 876-232 tells of her good work for both the RFA, Inc. and the R.F.H.S.

It was in her home that the first organizational meeting of the Central Ohio Chapter 16 of the RFA, Inc. was held, and all were presently surprised when Mrs. Sharp turned to her excellent pipe organ and brought forth beautiful music in support of the family historical event that had just been completed in her home. See Denniston's "Genealogy of the Stukey and Ream families," No. 3289, page 153, for further information on Mrs. Sharp's individual family line. We also credit her with furnishing for the RFHS Publication project a picture of the Castle of the Counts of Flanders, who are supported by our Heraldic Experts as being a part of the authentic story of our family Coat of Arms as granted by King Henry IV of the Franks.

It can be noted that Dr. Denniston's letter of June 1936 refers to a publication date of Nov. 1936, but actual publication did not take place until Nov. 1939. No doubt, it is safe to assume that Mrs. Sharp's assist to Denniston came during the three years delay in proposed publication date 1936 to 1939.

Quotes continued from Dr. Denniston's four-page letter of June 23, 1936:

"Items to be included in the book --

"A complete description of the Indian Massacre: Where Marcus Grove's first wife's family were murdered by a band of Indians in 1764.

"The location of the graves of 30 of our oldest ancestors, will be given in the genealogy. I have visited the graves of 24 of them.

"The printers have advised me to have the genealogy on theplan of private subscriptions, or books sold and paid for in advance, on account of a book of this nature not being salable to any one but the relatives.

"Books on genealogy vary in price, and sell for \$7.50, \$10.00, \$15.00 to \$35.00 per volume. Our genealogy, of the Stukey, Ream, Grove, Clem, Nicholas, Denniston and a short history of the Switzer, Sewell, VanCourt and Grant families, will be published in two volumes, and the Genealogy being a Memorial to my beloved mother Susan Stukey Denniston, I have determined to make the price low enough, that every relative in the family tree can afford to own a copy. Therefore, the low price for two volumes will be \$5.00.

"The manuscript of our genealogy will be completed about Nov. 1, 1936 and will then be given to the printer. I will ask you to please send in your subscriptions before Nov. 1st, as there will be only a few more books printed than are subscribed for, therefor, if you do not subscribe promptly, you may not be able to purchase a copy.

"Below is your order blank, fill in, tear off and mail with your remittance of \$5.00, parcel post prepaid. Please address plainly."

Copy of a letter received by L. S. Ream, father of the author of this publication. received later, read:

Dear Mr. Ream:

"Your letter of Sept. 6th received. . . .

"To know just which branch of the Reams you are descended from it is necessary for you to trace for me each step back to Everhart Ream our first ancestor in America. Everhardt had 11 children and you are a descendent of one of them. . . .

"Will write to the names and addresses that you gave me, many thanks for your kindness.

My father was not convinced that Eberhard had 11 children, or that we were descendents from any one of them. My Great Grandfather was Daniel Ream. Later on Norman advised father that he thought our line was from the Abraham Ream, "the miller," line, Fairfield Co., O. Not until after 1960 when I began to put in more time on family research did I develop the facts of our own

family line back to Nicholas, 2g., Abraham, 3g., and John Ream, 4g., etc. Furthermore, at the present time we are compelled to state that Eberhard had 7 sons and 1 daughter. If there were more we have never discovered anything to prove that he had more. One of Dad's cousins did purchase one of Dr. Denniston's books, and on account of our early interest and many trips to Southern Ohio that book was willed to me and now is a source of very valuable use for the benefit of all in our preparation of this publication.

A letter which father received from Norman in 1937 read as follows:

My Dear Cousin.

Your letter of 8th inst. received and pleased to hear from you; the reason you did not receive invitations to any of our former reunions was, because I just recently received your name and address from some soarce or other.

You claim that your great grandfather hailed from a town in eastern Pennsylvania (Roehmstown). In 1722 one Eberhardt Rihm (Ream) settled on the stream known as Cocalico Creek; in what is now known as Reamstown, Lancaster County Pa. When he settled there he built a log cabin on east side of stream, while on other side of stream was an Indian village of one of the Delaware tribes. Mr. Ream had money to pay for his land

payments and also had the consent of the Indians to settle among them. (This is recorded in Colonial Archives.)

In 1759 Mr. Ream made a partial division of his seven or more hundred acres, the portion received by his son Tobias was by him laid out in lots in 1760 and sold off on the ground rent plan, and was named Reamstown, until this time the place had been named Zoar, the name Zoar was given to the place when the elder Ream settled there.

Eberhart Ream had nine (9) sons and two (2) daughters, when the Revolutionary War came on Mr. Ream sent at least 22 grandsons into the conflict, one of his sons Andrew Ream was a captain commanding a company in 1779-1780-1781-1782.

I am at present nearly 64 years old, and I have been employed by the Penna. R.R. for the last 36 years and hope in a very short while to be placed on retired list.

Let me know if possible what your Great Grandfather's christian name was. If I have same it may be possible I will be able to give you the several connecting links between him and Eberhardt; I have positive data of my ancestrial line back to 1612. However I have the name as far back as 1356 on one Jacob Reim who lived in Tubigen.

Trusting I may hear from you again, I am wishing you and yours happiness, prosperity and long life.

Dr. Elmer L. Denniston, A Great Benefactor

The Ream family in general owes a great debt of gratitude to Dr. Denniston for his untiring efforts in assembling and preserving for posterity over 100 pages of Ream (Riehm) genealogy in Section 2 of his publication, and a number of references to Ream family members that married into some of the other family lines set forth in the other ten sections of his book. The book printed on 6" \times 9" good grade of glazed paper consists

of 655 pages, made up as follows :-- Introduction 16, Eleven Sections 489, Index 102, photographs on unnumbered pages of the book at the end 48. It is black cloth with letters in gold on the spine reading: "Genealogy of the Stukey and Ream Families," and the title page reads: "Genealogy of the Stukey, Ream, Grove, Clem and Denniston Families, by Elmer Leonidas Denniston, D.O., Published by the author, 417 North Second Street, Harrisburg, Pa. 1939." The first two pages ahead of the title page include an excellent picture of Elmer L. Denniston, D.O. (b. in Millard, Adair Co., Missouri, 19 July 1876), and his wife, Sarah Elizabeth Backenstoe, m. 29 Sept. 1911, d. 8 Aug. 1937. Most of the 48 pages of pictures in the back of the book are of Stukey family members, but the first one is a picture of Gueisthaus (Hotel) in Leimen, Germany, operated by Zum Baron W. Riehm, a nephew of our Reamstown, Pa., Johann Eberhardt Riehm (1687-1779).

There is a lesson to be learned from Dr. Denniston's experience in financing his book, and also from the experience of the Reamstown Memorial Committee of the Ream Clan of America in raising funds for historical markers to be assembled in the Reamstown area. Facts pertaining thereto will be included herein as a matter of historical value and for the purpose of recording activities that may be helpful to our student genealogists of the future.

Your author, the writer of these lines, never heard of anyone making any money out of the publication of a family genealogy. However, twenty years ago a fellow member of the National Genealogical Society did advise of a Guthrie family history that finally paid back to the publisher the original cash investment. The Guthrie family holds their annual meetings in August each year in Brandywine, Pa., the same as we do in Reamstown, Pa.

It is with sorrow that I report the sad experience of Dr. Denniston in the production of his book with a loss of several thousand dollars as well as five or six years of hard work without financial reward. After the delivery of books to subscribers, he had a good supply left, which at one time was offered for sale at \$3.00 or less, each. What a shame he couldn't have lived to see the time when his "out-of-print" books were selling for as much as \$50 each. The last two sales of his book that I know of were \$35 each: one by the Genealogical Republishing Co., Baltimore, Md., and one by the RFHS.

If it really had made any difference to Dr. Denniston, he might have had a little warning from a printer's hint on sale of books of this nature as quoted in copy of his letter to my father under date of 23 June 1936 copied above.

It was suggested that we take a lesson from Dr. Denniston's experience. The advice may be worth considering. However, it should be noted that our situation is slightly different since the RFHS, a stable organization, is sponsoring publication of this work, as compared to the work of an individual without the support of an organized group.

We have a good number of paid-in-advance subscriptions, and although the paper shortage and inflation is threatening, we hope to get the book printed without having to borrow too much money to complete the work. Any net loss, of course, will be underwritten by the continuous successful operation of the Society (RFHS).

As we travel along this difficult path of trying to complete this work, we are constantly on the lookout for improvements that we might discover from the experience of others. And, in particular, we share with you here, a review of Dr. Denniston's book. It is published in a book review in the New York Genealogical and Biographic Record, 1940, Vol. 71, page 315, as follows:

"Genealogy of the Stukey, Ream, Grove, Clem, and Denniston Families," by Dr. Elmer L. Denniston, Harrisburg, Pa., 1939.

"The German & Swiss farming people of Western Pennsylvania often offer a difficult field for genealogists, and Dr. Denniston's book of nearly 600 pages with the names of almost 10,500 individuals is impressive.

"It obviously represents the results of many years of diligent searches, and, we suspect, a very heavy correspondence.

"In the majority of cases no information is given about an individual beyond dates, but perhaps the already large size of the book made such additions impracticable. . . .

"In addition to the families named in the title of this book and treated at length, Dr. Denniston has brief accounts of others: Leinbach, Hain (Hehn), Gacklin (Caquelin), Sewell, Viehman (Freeman) and Switzer. Most of the author's work is in a fresh field and the families studied should be properly grateful. They might have waited several generations more before another man came along with the interest and spirit to have undertaken this book.

"At the back of the book are assembled about fifty pages of family pictures not included in the pagination. L. E. deF."

Dr. Denniston on pages 432 thru 450 furnishes valuable information regarding the Leinback family including reference to the marriage of John Leinbach 19 Aug. 1735, to Anna Catherine daughter of our Reamstown, Pa. Eberhard and Elizabeth (Schwab) Ream, at Muddy Creek Church near Reamstown, Pa.

Anna Catherine was born in the Lower Palatinate, Europe, 15 Feb. 1716 and died at Bethania, No. Car. 5 Nov. 1803. The finding of her personal records was a source of great satisfaction, helping us to eliminate various conflicting traditional stories about the origin and arrival of the Ream family in America.

Again for the purpose of establishing facts pertaining to Local History of the family we must refer to Dr. Denniston's book, page 230, whereon he writes:

"Norman W. Ream, of Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, after being elected president of the <u>Ream Family Association</u> <u>of America</u>, annually for many years was in 1930 <u>chosen</u> <u>president of the association for life</u>." Note:

 "The Ream Family <u>Association</u>," as mentioned above, does not properly name Norman's <u>Organization</u>, which was known over the years as the "Ream Clan of America or the World," etc.

2. As the history develops it will be noted that

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Norman was elected for life again about 10 or 12 years later. The apparent reason for this will, no doubt, become apparent to you as procedures governing the incorporation of the RFA is reported.

"Montana pair and four children attend Event at Reservoir Park.

N. W. Ream, 2128 N. 6th St. was re-elected President of the Ream'family on Saturday at the 25th annual reunion at Reservoir Park.

The reunion association is composed of descendents of Eberhardt Rihm who was the first member of the German Reformed Church to settle in Lancaster County.

Other officers chosen at the meeting are Forest V. Ream, Washington, D. C., First Vice-President; Ira C. Ream, Windber, Second Vice-President; Mrs. C. W. Miller, Middletown, Secretary; Herbert Ream, Colonial Park, Treasurer; N. W. Ream, Historian.

Harvey M. Ream, 85, Lebanon was the oldest person present, and Sandra Longenecker, 1 year old, Highspire, was the youngest to attend. Mr. and Mrs. Marlin Ream, and their four children of Big Fork, Montana, came the longest distance.

Plans were made to hold the 26th reunion of the family at Reservoir Park August 15, 1942.

The article included a photo of the Marlin Ream family with officers, Herbert, Forest, Norman, and Mrs. Miller."

August 17, 1946

29th ANNUAL REUNION OF THE REAM CLAN OF AMERICA Reservoir Park, Harrisburg, Pa.

This will be the first gathering since World War II; therefore, let it be a banner year. Inform all who are connected with the Clan, thereby making this gathering one long to be remembered. Bring your lunch and spend the day.

What it Takes to Win

Another full-page newspaper Ream Family Success story appeared in the Miami Valley Farmer, 1946 by columnist Mary Fay Bryson. The subject was the Russell G. Ream family on the Springfield-North Hampton road in the Northwest part of Clark County, Ohio. A large type headline read:

REAM FAMILY CALLED HEALTHY, HAPPY, HUSTLERS.

"The Russell G. Ream family is made up of folks who are accustomed to smile and work at the same time. That may account for the fact that they work their 86 acres yet find time to be a part of their community, both in interest and service. . . .

"Mr. Ream has been for years a 4H Club leader, and he is affiliated with Farm Bureau and Farm Security. For 8 or 10 years he has helped to guide school matters on the German Township school board. . . . He was recently a delegate to the Methodist Conference. It is evident that he and his folks are interested in what

it takes to make a living, but also where they are going, and what they may be like when they arrive.

"Mrs. Ream has been President of the Women's Society of Christian Service in their church. For several years she was AAA Field Woman for Clark County, making every effort she could to induce farmers to produce more food to further War needs, etc. . . . Between these activities she finds time for that incessant job--three meals daily. She likes to cook, to sew, to read and maybe have a bit of radio along with these. She's an alert person that takes the daily tasks with a sunny disposition in control. Some of the other subject headlines read:

Son and family live nearby. Large dairy herd kept on the farm. A Modern Milk Room Labor saving devices employed. Both tractor and horses used. Covered Feed Yard planned. [A picture shows Russell G. & son, George M., at work building a

covered Feed Yard.]" We never discussed his political activity but be-

lieve he was a County Commissioner at one time.

In December 1948 I received from my father a newspaper clipping which he had received from his cousin, Elva Wilson, So. Charleston, Ohio, which reported the death of George M. Ream, Nov. 18, 1948. He was a very talented trumpet player in the Cadet Band and the Robins & Meyers, Inc. Band, Springfield, where he was employed for 25 years before retirement in 1940. A Springfield and Clark County resident his entire life. He was born near North Hampton Feb. 2, 1864, the son of Jacob & Catherine, the son of Benjamin Ream, the son of Andrew Ream, 3g., a revolutionary soldier.

Russell G. and George M. Ream as mentioned next above are both of our Reamstown, Pa., Eberhard Ream line.

George M's father was Benjamin.

Russell G's father was Nevin, Grandfather, Anthoney; and Gt. Grandfather <u>Samuel</u>.

Benjamin and Samuel were brothers, sons of our Revolutionary Soldier, Andrew Ream, 3g., son of Nicholas, 2g., and Eberhard Ream (1687-1779), Reamstown, Pa.

To my knowledge this lineage was never known in our day until Russell Grant Ream and I started extensive research on this line and finally located the Andrew Ream, 3g. tombstone in a difficult location on the Stewart farm near North Hampton, Ohio, in 1964.

Blood line relatives of both of the forementioned families are now eligible to establish membership in the DAR and SAR, etc., when considered desirable.

By advertising we were able to get valuable assistance in this research through Willard Francis, 326 East Willow St., Elizabethtown, Pa., and we have in our files now the original letter written August 28, 1883 by Jacob Ream, son of the above-named Benjamin. He lists the names of all members of the Andrew Ream, 3g., family and included the names of the children of Benjamin and Samuel.

The occasion for the research in this direction was due to the special interest of our good member, Russell Grant Ream, HS 195-111, present address RR#2, London, Ohio.

For the purpose of completing the Russell G. Ream Chapter No. 13 of the Ream Family Association, Inc., Russell was appointed President.

Family History of Recent Vintage

As I was typing the story of our excellent Russell G. Ream family above, fate brought us a communication from Miss Janet McCrosky, Genealogist, 480 Forest Dr., Springfield, Ohio, giving us current information re the Russell Ream chapter of the RFA, Inc.

Now, through the courtesy of Miss McCrosky we are favored with a newspaper clipping, reporting the last meeting of the Russell Ream chapter. It reads as follows:

20 October 1974 "REAM FAMILY REUNION HELD

"The Ream Family, Russell Ream Chapter, held its annual reunion recently at the Lawrenceville Community Club, with a basket dinner at noon.

"Roll call showed four branches of the Ream Family present. A short business meeting was held at which

a partial history of the Ream Family was given. The Ream Family history showed a revolutionary war veteran, one of the few reported buried in Clark County.

"Officers for the coming year are--Paul Ream, Washington Court House, Ohio, President; Garry Ream of Springfield, vice-president, and Mary Louise McBee of Enon, Secretary-Treasurer.

"Meetings are held the third Sunday of October each year at the Community Club, and all members of the family are welcome."

It is also worthy of note and recording here that JANET ELLEN McCROSKY is a Librarian at the Warder Public Library, Springfield, Ohio, and her eligibility for membership in the DAR and many other patriotic organizations is based on her lineage through the DRAKE, and Deaton families, George Deaton (1777-1814), m. Susanna Ream (1788-1867), daughter of our Revolutionary Soldier, Andrew Ream (1757-1833).

July 28, 1950

Postal Card, N. W. Ream to F. V. Ream "Just received the Census records, and am barely

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able to read same on account of my eyes going back on me. The Ream Reunion will be on the 19th of Aug. We will be looking for you, at which time we can talk better than write."

August 18, 1950

A letter, Charles F. Ream, Libertyville, Iowa, to Herbert L. Ream, 2229 Atlas St., Harrisburg, Pa., in which he calls attention to the wrong John Ream family being listed as No. 6780, p. 305, in Denniston's. He pointed out that John Ream, son of Andrew, "the Drummer Boy" and brother to Nancy that m. Abraham Kendig was really the Inn-keeper in Reamstown, Pa., various family connections proving this. (Also, from our research work over the years we have established the fact that the John Ream family under No. 6780, p. 305, was from the Tobias Ream, 2g. line and DAR lineages now being accepted from members on this corrected base. John Ream being the Grandson of the original Abraham Ream, the Inn-keeper. FVR)

August 19, 1950

33rd Annual REAM REUNION, Reservoir Park, Harrisburg, Pa., Herbert L. Ream, Pres.

November 18, 1950

A meeting in office of the Boose Aluminum Co., Reamstown, Pa. Those present, representing the REAM FAMILY MEMORIAL COMMITTEE, were Norman W. Ream, Fred H. Ream, Irene R. Weidman, Violet I. Walker, and Forest V. Ream. Others present were Herbert L. Ream, Harrisburg, Pa., Pres. of the REAM CLAN, and Ida C. Fredricks, Spring Mills, Pa., and Messrs. Boose and Reddig, representing the REAMSTOWN MEMORIAL PARK ASSOCIATION, INC.

Mrs. Weidman said that Eberhard's grave should be marked with a new granite stone with raised letters. (This work completed several years ago.) She made a motion that we sponsor a three-way program as follows:

 Erect a suitable marker in the Reamstown Memorial Park in honor of Eberhard and Tobias Ream. (The markers properly placed and appropriate dedication services held there June 4, 1960.)

2. Erect a steel arch over the entrance to the

Ream Cemetery.

3. Erect a new marker at the Eberhard Rihm grave.

November 19, 1950.

A meeting of the Reamstown Memorial Committee at the residence of Norman W. Ream, Harrisburg, Pa. Those present were: Norman W. Ream, Fred H. Ream, Ida C. Fredricks, Violet I. Walker, Forest V. Ream, Chairman, Herbert L. Ream, Ex-officio.

It was decided that we should incorporate as an association for purposes to be set forth in the Charter. Norman W. Ream was appointed to visit the Office of the Secretary of State to make arrangements.

There was a general discussion relative to methods to be used in raising funds for our Reamstown Memorial program. (All Reams and relatives in the U.S. to be solicited and a membership card to be furnished for a minimum of a \$1.00 contribution.)

It was decided that Fred H. Ream should serve as Publicity Director, and Treasurer in charge of raising funds. Violet I. Walker to serve as Secretary. F. V. Ream, Chairman, to get a vote of all members of the Committee as to name to be used in incorporating. All expenses for printing and paper to be paid by the corporation.

November 21, 1950

A letter to F. V. Ream from Fred H. Ream, suggesting form of letter to be sent to family members over the U.S. in soliciting funds for our Reamstown Memorial projects.

December 6, 1950

A letter, Fred H. Ream, Dayton, Ohio, to Forest V. Ream, Fair Haven, Md.

"Thanks very much for your wonderful letter of Nov. 27 which came while I was at the farm. [His farm in Missouri]

"I have read your minutes of the Committee meetings at Reamstown and Harrisburg. I think it very nice of you to register so much of the details of the affair. It will be interesting in the future to refer to. . . .

"To my mind the REAM FAMILY ASSOCIATION would be a

more desirable name for the association, than any other that has been presented. . . [A weather report, another snow storm]."

December 17, 1950

A letter, Office of Treasurer (Fred Ream), Reamstown Memorial Committee to F. V. Ream, Chairman and Violet I. Walker, Secretary. It included a page and a half of a "proposed solicitation letter to 'Dear Members of the Ream Family of America.'"

December 18, 1950

A sad story--The loss of our Hero, Robert D. Ream, Lt., in the Marine Corps in Korea, age 25, grandson of our Harvey E. Reem, Elizabethtown, Pa. For pictures and newspaper stories, see pages 143, 44 and 45 in the F. V. Ream, Ream Reamstown Scrap Book in Reamstown the second Sat. in Aug. each year.

December 22, 1950

A letter from Fred H. Ream, "the furrier," to F. V. Ream, showing:

"Operation, ECHO VALLEY FARM, RR 3, Cuba, Mo." It read:

"Your letter of the 17th came a few days ago. It found me very busy. . . .

"Inasmuch as I am going to have my hands full in obtaining the lists. . . .

"I am going to ask that you outline the letter head and the letter too. . . .

"I am now in process of obtaining lists of names for this purpose, and this is going to be quite a chore in itself I find.

"I have a letter from Norman calling attention to my error in naming Tobias the grandson instead of the son of Eberhart.

"I still like the name Ream Family Association, but will leave it entirely to the Committee to make the decision."

February 23, 1951

A letter from N. W. Ream to F. V. Ream: "They seem to think that the name should be Ream

Family Association.

"However, I will not ask for incorporation until I again hear from you. Let me hear from you at your earliest convenience."

March 2, 1951

A letter from F. V. Ream, Chairman of the Committee to all members of the Committee enclosing a copy of the 2-page proposed letter to be used in the solicitation of funds.

March 5, 1951

A letter from Norman Ream to F. V. Ream:

"Your letter of March 2 received. I have one correction to make--we cannot have the pavilion in Reservoir Park, Harrisburg. I called them on Jan. 2nd and they told me that the third Sat. in August was already taken by a group from the Lykens Valley. I immediately told them that the giving of our date looked very much like politics regardless of what they might say to the contrary. So we must take the Reunion to REAMSTOWN on the 3rd Saturday of August 1951. Herbert and I will go to Reamstown and make the arrangements for our 1951 meeting.

"The circular letter hits the spot in as far as I am concerned."

March 24, 1951

A letter from Fred H. Ream to F. V. Ream:

"Your letter of the 3rd and 21st and card of the 13th at hand. I have been very busy, having just returned from the farm a week ago, and am leaving again for Missouri...

"I was in hopes that you would have the whole letter prepared, letterhead and all. [An explanation of responsibility left on him.] . . .

"However, if you think I can do the job to everyone's satisfaction, I will be only too glad to make the attempt. [He advised that he would try to get a copy of the mailing list from the Ream Clan.]

"Will return to Dayton next Thursday and will be glad to have a line from you. Have no word from anyone except the letter from Norman under date of 3 Mar. 1951

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with which he sent the application for incorporation which I signed and returned to him. I had expected a line from each of the committee members giving their suggestions, but to date none have been received. [That was my experience also except the note of March 5 from Norman as guoted above. FVR]

April 25, 1951

A letter from Fred Ream to F. V. Ream:

"On the 10th of March I wrote you telling you that I would attempt to set up the letter if you thought I could do it to the satisfaction of all. This is a responsibility that I have no assurance of being able to fulfill to the satisfaction of all concerned, and I had hoped you would fix up the whole letter, etc. I would be glad to hear from you further when it is convenient."

May 1, 1951

A letter from F. V. Ream to Fred H. Ream:

I explained how busy I had been, with an uncertain future account of my father's illness in Ohio and a tentative traveling date of May 5 or 6.

"In the meantime do not hesitate about going ahead with plans to get the solicitation letter out. . . . Someone has to be the focal point, and as you know no two persons would agree 100% as to just what should go into a two-page letter of this nature. . . . If you do not hear from any of the others, I would say that silence gives consent. . . .

"As and if necessary in order to get exact names and addresses in order to be able to fill in the letterhead, the only source for that would be Harrisburg."

Looking back now at this writing I can see what apparently was bothering Fred about information to be placed on the letterhead for the solicitation letter and the booklet that accompanied it. They were working prior to the actual incorporation date of January 26, 1952, for the REAM FAMILY ASSOCIATION and since the REAMSTOWN MEMORIAL COMMITTEE was appointed by the Ream Clan of America, the proper designation as to name had to be predicated on a certain date in advance. In my absence, Norman and Fred had to make the decision and I believe they did a fairly good job of it.

Anyhow, here is the way the letterhead read:

REAM FAMILY ASSOCIATION, INC., OF AMERICA.

Office of Treas. Memorial Committee Dayton 2, Ohio"

Norman W. Ream, Harrisburg, Pa., Pres. 35 Stratford Ave. Harvey E. REEM, Elizabethtown, Pa., Sec. & Treas.

The same information was included in the booklet which they arranged to accompany the Solicitation Letter. This plan to include the 10-page booklet, "Historical Sketch of Reamstown, Pa., 1952," with Coat of Arms in black and white added much to the original cost. It was an item that I did not know about until it was in the hands of the printer in Dayton. Certainly it did not raise sufficient additional funds to make the project a success, and much of the historical data was in error. The story of the results of the activities of this Committee will come later.

May 9, 1951

A letter, Fred Ream to F. V. Ream:

"Norman and wife were here for a visit having just left for Harrisburg yesterday evening.

"Norman insists that we hold up on the sending out of the letters of solicitation until a later date. His reasons will be given to you in person, he not even wanting to write them. He is intending to come to Washington very soon and hopes to arrange to see you and go over the whole matter in detail.

"After you go over the matter with Norman what ever you folks deem the essential thing to do will meet with my approval as I am content to leave all matters entirely in Norman's and your hands. Kindly keep me advised.

May 9 and July 31, 1951

There was an exchange of several letters between Norman Ream and Forest V. Ream. We were unable to get together.

August 4, 1951

A letter, Norman Ream to Forest Ream:

". . . Impossible for me to meet you at Washington depot on the evening of the 11th.

"If convenient we would like for you to come to Harrisburg on Friday p.m. of the 12th. Fred will be here and then we could talk things over before the next day's meeting in Reamstown. . . ."

August 13, 1951

A letter to Herbert L. Ream from F. V. Ream:

"Dear HLR: Am wondering about the mailing list. My son's new address is Paul W. Ream, 235 Lee Circle, Bryn Mawr, Pa. Also suggest that you mail, at once, copies of the notice of the Ream National Reunion, if not already mailed to Hon. Frazier Reams, Rep. House Office Bldg., Washington 25, D. C. and to Elinor P. Reams, Chief (Fed. Govt. Dept.), 5537 No. Fairfax Dr., Arl., Va.

August 17, 1951

Loss of my father, Lem Smith Ream, Oakwood, Ohio, age 81 yrs., 9 months & 20 days, buried in Goshen, Ind. Comments of a local Ohio Newspaper:

"Sadness was cast over the News Office [a place where the writer worked as a "printer's devil" when aged 16] with the passing of Lem Ream. Lem was a frequest visitor in this office, especially when ye editor wrote an editorial of some kind. He was always ready to pass comments, and whether they were 'pro or con' they were expressed in a gentleman like manner. Perhaps few people realized or ever knew of the accomplishments of Mr. Ream, who gained quite a lot of fame when it came to raising plants or flowers. He wrote and had published many articles dealing with plant life.

"Among his collections were numerous prize ribbons. One, the first prize, blue ribbon issued for the display of plants and flowers at the 1921 Ohio State Fair. Another interesting letter showed correspondence with the famous Luther Burbank in regard to the raising of a

'fragrant' gladiolius. Lem was a good citizen, well read and versed in World affairs, and an ardent Cleveland Indian baseball fan. The community will miss this man who has been taken from their midst."

August 18, 1951

34th Annual meeting of THE REAM CLAN.

On account of the serious illness of my father and his death on August 17, 1951, the writer was unable to attend this meeting of the CLAN.

[Dear Reader: Please join with me in adding a little mystery to the story here. Not being one to "dig for trouble," I never found out why the wheels of our project in Dayton, Ohio, were brought to a halt by Norman and Fred. After you have read of the events that follow, maybe you will join me in the guess that a matter of kingship in the movement had something to do with it. FVR.]

September 14, 1951

A letter from F.V. Ream to Fred Ream:

"Our Secretary, Violet Walker is in the Dr. Black Community Hospital, Lewistown, Pa. She survived the operation but is very weak. . . .

"Regret not being able to be at Reamstown on Aug.18. My father passed away on August 17. However, I learn through Norman that he authorized you to go ahead with the mailing of the circular letter relative to our activity at Reamstown. That is certainly okay with me, and I hope we can get it going without too much difficulty on your part. Although I realize that it is a lot of work to ask of any one member of the Committee. . . .

"And now since I have transferred all rights to you with respect to final review, and there has been no further comment from others of the Committee you are given full rights to go ahead. GOOD LUCK.

". . . Copy to the three other Committee members: Violet I Walker, Irene Weidman and Norman W. Ream, with a special note to Irene about a couple magazine illustrations of lettering in stone or granite markers, and added was a:

"P.S. This completes the full committee of five as

it exists at the present time. Does the President have authority to add to this Committee at the present time? Maybe Herbert & Harvey should be added? Norm: Will you please answer this part. FVR."

[No reply received from Norman to this. FVR.]

October 11, 1951

A letter from Irene Weidman to F. V. Ream.

"I am sorry you were not able to attend the reunion. We all missed you. I had gotten a suggestion in the form of pictures from an Allentown firm and wish you would have seen them. . . .

"I hope they will have Herbert on the Committee, because he was with us and does not feel too kindly about not being President.

"I hope the Committee will be able to meet in the near future."

<u>A Comment</u>: It can be noted from the above that we both, Irene and I, wanted to see Herbert continued active in the new organizational set up as a member of the Reamstown Memorial Committee which, as President of the REAM Clan, he appointed in the first place. I did not see a copy of the minutes of the August 18th meeting, but Irene's letter, referenced above, indicates that Herbert was no longer President of the REAM CLAN; and that tends to confirm the verbal report I received that Norman was elected President for life for the second time. See the report under heading Dr. Elmer L. Denniston, above, where in 1930 Norman was elected President for life. FVR.

The Ream Clan Organization Free to Continue

It is important to note here that the developing REAM FAMILY ASSOCIATION which was to be incorporated in no way superceded the REAM CLAN OF AMERICA organization. The incorporators of RFA merely designated Norman Ream as the President as a matter of respect for his years of service to the Ream family in general, the incorporators and the Board of Directors of three as provided in the Charter being the supreme authority. Provisions of the Charter governed until a workable Constitution and By-laws were adopted by the incorporators. An

unorganized group such as usually attend a family reunion had no business considering a Constitution for the newly authorized corporation, as per the Court decree of January 26, 1952.

October 28, 1951

A letter Harvey E. Reem to F. V. Ream.

"Last Friday during my absence from home Norman left the supposed papers of the Treasurer and Secretary of our Clan with Mrs. Ream. I was annoyed at the findings. All that has been handed me are a few sheets of paper from the supposed Secretary, and a few sheets from the supposed Treasurer. A check accompanied the three sheets from the Treasurer, signed by some other person other than the Secretary, calling for some \$42.00. None of these papers were signed by either Secretary or Treasurer. Therefore, I am unable to answer your questions and also explain the delay in answering you. I enclosed the entire reports, check and all and returned them to N. W. in this same mail.

"While I was Secretary some years ago for I think it was 15 or 18 years, I had a minute book, which I purchased personally and when I relinquished the Secretaryship I handed same to my successor. What has become of same I am unable to say.

"In my letter to N.W., I told him to select some other member of the CLAN to act as Sec'y-Treas."

January 8, 1952

A letter, Fred Ream to F. V. REAM.

"Norman and Elizabeth were here over the weekend and we had a very nice visit with them. . . .

"We are preparing the letter for the solicitation of funds and will get it in the mail soon."

April 16, 1952

A letter from Norman and Elizabeth Ream, Harrisburg, Pa. to Mr. and Mrs. Forest V. Ream, 1311 30th St., N. W., Washington 7, D. C. (Georgetown):

"Dear Cousins: Your kind letter received this a.m. Many thanks for the kind invitation; however, on the 18th we will have open house in commemoration of our 10th wedding anniversary, to which you are cordially

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invited. And on Sunday the 20th our Central Vicinity Council convenes in Reading and they expect me to be there, for I am their Chaplain (Spanish-American War).

"If possible for you to be with us on the 18th we will have open house 6 to 10 p.m. Norman & Elizabeth"

"P.S. Some years ago I had written a letter of inquiry to the American Research Bureau, 527 9th St., N. W., Washington, D. C. They claimed to give you a Ream family history for \$1.00. They sent me an awful mixed up affair of the Reams of America. Some time when you are here I will show it to you."

Attached to this letter was a copy of the letterhead they worked up for Fred's solicitation letter. (See May 1, 1951 above.)

By this time in our local history it became apparent that the REAM CLAN organization had no interest in operating under provisions of the Charter applicable to the new organization which was authorized by decree of the Court January 26, 1952. And their continuing to operate as usual created much misunderstanding among the Harrisburg group as well as members of the Ream Family in various parts of the country.

Now let's take a look at the new organization which is national in scope:

Re In the Court of Common Incorporation of Pleas of Dauphin Cnty, Pa. Ream Family Association, Inc. No. 49 January Term 1952 To the Honorable, The Judges of the Court of Common Pleas, Dauphin County, Pa.

We the undersigned, the majority of whom are residents of the State of Penna, having associated themselves together for the purpose of perpetuating our family name, and maintaining an association for the purpose of erecting monumentsamrlmarkers at graves or birth places of the family founders in the vicinity of Harrisburg, Dauphin County, Pa., and throughout Penna. and being desirous of becoming incorporated, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the Assembly entitled "An ACT known as the non-profit Corporation Law approved May 5, 1933, and its amendments and supplements thereto, do hereby certify:

 The name of the proposed Corporation is REAM FAMILY ASSOCIATION, INC. . . .--as amended October 7, 1963:

2. That its name is Ream Family Association, Inc., and that origin office was located at Harrisburg, Dauphin Co., Pa., but that on September 28, 1961, the Corporation Bureau of the Commonwealth of Penna. approved the change of address to Reamstown, East Cocalico Township, Lancaster Co., Penna.

4. The said corporation is to exist perpetually.

5. The name, place of residence and Post Office address of each of the incorporators is as follows:

The said corporation shall have no capital stock.

8. The assets of the said corporation at the time of its incorporation shall not exceed the sum of Five Hundred (\$500) Dollars which has been, or will be raised by personal subscription of the incorporating members and from other members of the Ream family. (\$500 working capital was furnished by F. V. Ream. See quotes from Paul S. Lesher's speech 21 May 1962 to follow.)

9. The affairs of said corporation are to be governed by a Board of Directors consisting of three members and such other officers as shall be duly prescribed in the By-laws hereinafter to be passed, and the within Articles of Incorporation may only be amended in accordance with the provisions of Article 7 of the non profit law of 1933 and its amendments and supplements.

LOCAL HISTORY

Witness our hands and seals the 9th day of January 1952.

Fred H. Ream, John O. Ream, Jr., Irene R. Weidman (Copy certified by Forest V. Ream, Sec'y-Treas., 28 Dec. 1960.)

The need for a Constitution and/or By-laws as mentioned in item 9 above developed a very interesting situation. There was no development of a Constitution that was workable until the one approved 22 August 1959. It was signed by Fred H. Ream, Irene Weidman, Violet I. Walker, Forest V. Ream and John O. Ream, Jr.

AMERICAN CONSTITUTIONAL VS. EUROPEAN DICTATOR TYPE OF GOVERNMENT

Although the writer organized and wrote the Constitution for "The Coming Men of America" at age 15 in 1907 in Paulding, Ohio, and for a dozen or more other organizations in the years that followed without much difficulty, as Chairman of the Reamstown Memorial Committee, organizers of the Ream Family Association, Inc. in 1951 and 52, he found it difficult to write a Constitution for this Association that would meet the requirements of one influential member of the incorporators of the RFA, INC.

The difficulty arose from the basic philosophies of two different kinds of government and a disregard for a governing document that would respect provisions of the charter of the newly formed organization.

August 16, 1952

35th Annual REAM REUNION

A copy of the meeting notice not on file.

From the F. V. Ream Journal: "Floyd Ream gave an interesting report of the Ream family in England to 1049. His present whereabouts unknown. Norman wrote to his last address of record asking for disposition of a duffle bag that he left at his place locked, but could not get a reply. Forest Ream appointed Genealogist. Bills \$33.29 Bal. \$80.77."

Some time prior to date above Norman handed me a one-page proposed By-laws for study and revision. It

was indeed a very simple outline of by-laws appropriate for a simple family reunion, and it made no reference to a Board of Directors or anything required by our charter to operate as a non-profit organization under laws of the Commonwealth.

August 11, 1953

Subject: Requirements of item 9 in Charter for a Constitution.

The writer presented a 7-page proposed. Constitution and By-laws requiring a central governing body, which was a "far cry" from any offerings on the subject previously.

August 15, 1953

36th Annual Reunion meeting of the RFA, INC.

N. W. Ream, PRESIDENT, -- as billed.

Minutes by Forest V. Ream: (Please bear in mind that this is not a meeting for or by the RFA, INC.)

Norman W. Ream opened the meeting in the Reamstown Memorial Park pavilion at 2:30 p.m. Invocation by Rev. John Albright.

The Secretary elected last year resigned. The Chairman asked Karl Edwin Seyfarth of Chicago, Ill. to serve as temporary Secretary.

Other officers present: Fred Ream, Dayton, Ohio, and Irene R. Weidman, Ephrata, Pa., serving as First and Second Vice-Presidents.

Minutes for last year, well prepared and read by Mr. Seyfarth and approved.

Cash bal. last year \$77.29. Expenditures \$28.45 for getting out 1200 post card notices. Coffee and prizes for the children by Elizabeth Ream (Mrs. Norman) \$11.55, Total \$40.00. Bal. \$37.29. Hat collection about \$31.00 but not reported officially.

Officers elected:

Norman W. Ream, Pres., Harrisburg, Pa. Mrs.Irene R. Weidman, 1st Vice-Pres., Ephrata, Pa. Cloyd R. Rhodes, 2nd Vice-Pres., Reamstown, Pa. James Ream, Sec'y-Treas., Glenside, Phila., Pa.

On request of a son of Mr. & Mrs. Brandt, of Lancaster, Pa., Forest V. Ream explained the program and work of the REAM REAMSTOWN MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

Fred Ream explained that 1600 booklets had been mailed out, and \$450 had been subscribed and \$267 collected to date. The expenses, of course, far in excess of collections due in part, at least, because of extra expense for a 12-page booklet mailed out with the letter soliciting funds for the Memorial Committee's program. Although the writer was President of the Committee, this deal about the booklet was developed by Fred and Norman without my knowledge. Norman had made a couple trips to Dayton and arranged for this while I was absent on account of my father's illness and final death in Ohio. There was no report on this to the members in meeting, although Fred had talked of turning in the amount collected and standing all the expenses himself. I advised against this, and especially, that he not turn in any cash to the present set-up since there was no official organization there. [The Ream Family Association, Inc., of course, was official with the Board of Directors, Fred H. Ream, Irene Weidman and John O. Ream, Jr., although not in session as such. Fred, Sec'y-Treas. of our Special Reamstown Committee, did not seem to understand the situation and was eager to follow dictates of Norman. I doubt that there was anyone present that realized that this meeting billed as the 36th Annual Reunion of the Ream Family Association, Inc., was just a figment of a confused mind somewhere. It could have been properly billed as the 36th Annual Reunion of the Ream Clan of America.]

For the record, it is important to note the absence of Herbert L. Ream from this meeting. It was reported that he refused to come. Since I could not be present at the 1951 and 1952 meetings of the Clan there is no record here now of what happened then but it can be noted that Herbert was no longer Pres. of the Clan.

Fred advised that they expected to get completely out of the fur business in Dayton, Ohio within the near future and then he would have more time to get in collections for our Reamstown Memorial Fund as sought by the Ream-Reamstown Memorial Committee. [This Committee was appointed by Herbert L. Ream, Pres. of the Ream Clan of America, Aug. 19, 1950. It was made up as follows: Fred H. Ream, Harvey L. Reem, Violet I. Walker, Norman W. Ream, and Forest V. Ream, Chairman. It was this Committee that made the decision to form a non-profit organization and incorporate under the laws of the State of Penna. It decided to name it the Ream Family Association, and there is no connection with any other organization or group, past or present.]

August 21, 1954

37th Annual Reunion, Ream Clan of America

Reamstown Memorial Park, N. W. Ream, Pres.

Minutes were properly handled by James S. Ream, Phila.

Attention was directed to the fact that the Reamstown Memorial Park Ass'n was a recognized charity organization.

Officers elected were: Norman W. Ream, Pres., Forest V. Ream, 1st Vice-Pres., Cloyd Rhodes, 2nd Vice-Pres., James S. Ream, Sec'y Treas.

August 20, 1955

38th Annual Reunion, Ream Clan of America

James S. Ream, Sr., Phila., Pa., read minutes of the last meeting, but refused to serve in the future. Present were Charlie N. Ream, Knoxville, Iowa, Robert Holbert, Harrisburg, Pa., Dorothy Ream, Phila., Pa. A representative present announced that Norman's records would not be turned over to anyone. Officers elected, Norman'W. Ream, Pres., Forest V. Ream, Vice-Pres., James S. Ream, Jr., from District of Columbia nominated Sec'y-Treas. but refused to accept the position.

May 16, 1956

A letter from F. V. Ream to Norman W. Ream suggesting that the Ream Reamstown Memorial Committee formed in 1950 be discontinued, and copy of a notice calling a meeting of this Committee in Reamstown on June 2, 1956, was forwarded to all members.

June 2, 1956

The Ream Memorial Committee which was appointed by Herbert L. Ream, President of the Ream Clan of America in Harrisburg, Pa., at the 33rd Annual Reunion was held in the old stone school house recently acquired by the Reamstown Memorial Park Ass'n on east Church Street, Reamstown, Pa.

Only members of the Committee in attendance were Norman W. Ream, member, and Forest V. Ream, Chairman. Others that came were: Paul S. Lesher, Rev. John R. Albright, Cloyd Rhodes, and two members of the Park Ass'n. It rained hard all day.

The information furnished by the Park Ass'n members and maps by PaulS. Lesher and Rev. Albright were very enlightening. They had purchased two large maps of the Township area from county offices in Lancaster at a cost of \$18.00 each. Rev. Albright furnished copies of his publication listing all of the stone markers in the Reamstown Cemetery, located back of the Luthern-Reformed Church on East Church St., Reamstown, Pa.

Norman expressed a desire to have someone take up his work as President, and I wanted relief from the Memorial Committee, but neither one of us was in a position to do anything other than express his sympathy.

There was a resolution which I prepared, but it could not be acted upon, even as members of the old committee due to lack of a quorum, etc.

I was recommending that a new Committee be organized and the old one discontinued. It was to be a Reamstown Memorial Committee under RFA, INC., with immediate object to assist in building in vicinity of Reamstown a recreation Center, Museum and Library. It could not be acted on but this time ends activities of the Ream Memorial Committee of Fred H. Ream, Harvey E. Reem, Violet I. Walker, Norman W. Ream, and Forest V. Ream which was appointed by Herbert L. Ream, Pres. of the Ream Clan of America, Aug. 19, 1950.

August 1, 1956

A report listed payments received by the Committee as follows:

It could be noted that members of the Committee were located in residences far apart and it was not possible to have all members together when details of the operation were planned. If the Committee could have considered the matter of the extra cost of that 12-page booklet that Norman and Fred decided upon without my knowledge, no doubt a great item of expense could have been avoided.

Fred had expended over \$1,000 for printed material, etc., and postage at 2¢ per mailing to about 2,000 Reams, but he was inclined to turn over the \$267 to me as Secretary-Treasurer of RFA, INC., and stand the loss from the effort himself. I insisted that he not do this and that the amount collected be credited to expenses. Furthermore, it was my recommendation to the Committee that Fred make a final report of all financial activities of the Committee since 1950 and any "out-of-pocket" loss to him be charged to the RFA,INC., to be paid to him, if and when the Association was able to pay.

August 15, 1956

A letter, F. V. Ream to N. W. Ream.

Subject: Organization of the Ream Family Association, Inc. Copies to: Fred H. Ream, Irene R. Weidman, Harvey E. Reem, Violet I. Walker, and John O. Ream, Jr.

". . . I have been giving some thought to the matter of the CONSTITUTION and BY-LAWS to be adopted by our Association and have compared what I wrote in 1953 on this subject with the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Genealogical Society, located here in Washington, D. C. The Society here was incorporated under the laws of the District of Columbia, and the certificate of incorporation was recorded in the office of the Recorder of Deeds 16 June 1904. The NGS has an inner Council (equivalent to our Board of Directors) that really runs the organization, and it may change officers as the Council may decide, even though the general assembly of members may elect them at their annual meeting.

"Recently, I also received a letter from one of our <u>influential friends</u> in Penna. giving his opinion of the form of an organization which we should provide for our operation. From that letter a quote below:

"'A widely scattered organization such as the Ream Family Association is rather hard to manage as there are so few who are really <u>interested and willing and</u> <u>able</u> to do any work to keep it going. Many of the local family reunions are really family picnics. It seems to me that your Constitution should provide for a strong Executive Committee that would rule with an iron hand."

(The name of the influential friend referenced above was never disclosed before, but he was one of the best friends we or the Reamstown Community ever had--PAUL S. LESHER.)

"In Paul's letter reference was made to the idea that the corporation should consist chiefly of the Old Ream Reunion Group presently meeting on the 3rd Saturday of August each year in Reamstown, and the basis of original authority for all activity should derive from future meetings of the Reams and others-descendents that would travel from all points in the U.S. to Reamstown yearly.

"A couple copiesof a proposed Constitution to set up the organization on this basis was finally turned over to you with the understanding that you (Norman, now designated as Pres., RFA, INC.) would appoint a committee and attempt to come up with a Constitution of the various ideas in a final draft for approval of the group assembled in Reamstown in reunion.

"As you reported previously you attempted to get other individuals interested in making a study and revision of the proposals before you, but they failed you.

"It is my opinion that very little responsibility, if any, can be attached to the changing group of individuals that meet in Reamstown yearly, and therefor if we are to succeed in completing the organization as set forth in the incorporation papers, we the incorporators--Norman W. Ream, Fred H. Ream, Forest V. Ream, Irene R. Weidman, Harvey E. Reem, Violet I. Walker, and John O. Ream, Jr.--should proceed to pass on a Constitution and get the organization moving."

(The above was followed with an extensive view as to how I thought we should operate to get members-furnish cards for members with the official coat of arms emblem thereon, etc.)

"This would be in line with WORK that I would be willing to do if it met with the wishes of the other incorporators. Likely it might be the work of a position titled Secretary-Treasurer."

I pause here to place on my 40-foot pole the beautiful U.S.A. flag from the American Legion, this Veteran's Holiday, October 27th, 1975, in honor of my son, Lieut. Paul W. Ream, in Transp. & Training, 35th Div., 2nd World War. Paul was the first Pres. of the R.F.H.S. and is buried in the Ream Cemetery, Reamstown, Pa.

August 18, 1956

39th Annual Reunion of the Ream Clan of America in the Reamstown Memorial Park, Reamstown, Pa.

N. W. Ream, Pres., 2128 No. 6th St., Harrisburg, Pa. The ladies of the Reamstown Church will again serve "Eats and Refreshments" at a reasonable charge.

<u>Minutes of the meeting</u>: Prayer by Norman W. Ream. Minutes of last year read by James C. Ream of Phila. Officers elected. Norman W. Ream, Pres. Mr. Wolfskill, 1st Vice-Pres. Fred Ream, 2nd Vice-Pres.

James Ream refused to continue as Sec'y-Treas. and since no one would agree to take the position, Norman was to try to get someone that would serve and appoint them later.

F.V. Ream was requested to send six application

forms for memberships in RFA, INC. to Wm. J. Ream, Akron, Ohio. (The forms were not available until August 1959.)

At this meeting a blanket application form was signed by 37 family members present, all agreeing to pay \$1.00 upon receipt of R.F.A., INC. membership card, etc. The first numbers 1 through 7 were assigned to the Incorporators.

F. V. Ream Journal, Fair Haven, Md., 18 Aug. 1956: "Up at 6 a.m. Drove to Reamstown, Pa. 7:25 to 11:10 a.m. had a good meeting. Fred Ream, Violet I. Walker, Norman W. Ream, and myself made four of the incorporators of the RFA, INC., present and they were unanimous in voting for me to carry on as Secretary-Treasurer until ourConstitution is adopted. My sister Vera A. (Ream) Hall and son Johnie (Garrett Park, Md., and my wife, Eva C. (Wuchter) Ream and her sister, Ruth (Wuchter) and her husband, James Flynn of Hartsdale, N. Y., joined us."

August 17, 1957

The 40th Annual Reunion of the Ream, Reem, Riehm, and Rehm Clan of America.

10:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. in the Reamstown Memorial Park, Reamstown, Lancaster County, Pennsylvania.

"Will you come and help make this the largest attendance, most beneficial Reunion since we FIRST met on Saturday, September 22, 1917?

N. W. Ream, President, 2128 No. 6th St., Harrisburg, Penna."

(SPECIAL NOTE: Since this was the last of meetings billed as the REAM CLAN of AMERICA, most of the three typed pages of the minutes are quoted below.)

"Meeting called to order by Chairman, N. W. Ream, in the pavilion of the Reamstown Memorial Park at about 2:00 p.m.

"At the 1956 reunion Norman was authorized to appoint a Secretary of his choice in the Harrisburg area. He advised that he was unable to find anyone that would take the position. Harvey E. Reem, the 3rd grandson of Harvey E. Ream, Sr., one of the incorporators of RFA, INC. agreed to take the Secretary's position temporarily, and he read the minutes for last year's meeting.

"Norman advised that he had loaned the \$22.00 to the fund in order to keep the balance over \$50 to avoid a bank service charge. It was agreed that the \$22.00 would be paid back to Norman and if necessary the cash balance removed to the Reamstown Exchange Bank, where Mr. Wolfskill advised there would be no charge for a small balance.

"Norman's wife, Elizabeth, arranged for the free coffee and the prizes. . . .

"Willis Ream and wife, Johnstown, Pa., traveled the farthest; Carrie Ream Root, age 82, born in Reamstown, was the oldest lady present; Cloyd Rhodes, age 82, resident of Reamstown, the oldest man present.

"Norman announced his retirement from office as President (understood to mean from the Clan and RFA, INC.) due to approaching age 83 and bad eyesight and Herbert L. and Forest V. were both nominated to legs. succeed him, but both declined. Finally, when it appeared that there was no one else who would accept the position, Herbert agreed to try it again. He made a little talk and wanted the group to agree in advance to anything he might decide upon to build up the attendance. There was no response. After the meeting Herbert approached Paul Lesher and asked that the whole Park be reserved for us next year (the 3rd Saturday in Aug., of course). The request was reduced to the whole Park except the Ball Park. Paul explained that there were three other groups sharing the Park on our day in August and that there was a big demand now on account of the Lititz Park being closed for improvements.

"Harvey E. Ream, the 3rd or 4th, of Elizabethtown was elected Sec'y-Treas. Norman announced that Fred Ream, Dayton, Ohio and Irene Weidman, Ephrata, Pa., would continue as Vice-Presidents." (Note: They were both on the Board of Directors, RFA, INC.)

(We find nothing in the records here to show what

happened to the REAM CLAN of AMERICA, hereafter. You see copies of some of the notices of some of the Annual Reunion meetings 1958 through 1964 by the Harrisburg or Elizabethtown group following.)

(The CLAN. There was an indication of some life when a former officer engaged a lawyer in an effort to preserve what he considered the RFA, INC. was attempting to take away from the Ream Clan of America.)

A young man visitor from the HARRISBURG AREA asked for Forest Ream to speak. I felt required to do I want to call attention here to the fact that the SO. REAM FAMILY ASSOCIATION, INC. operates under the laws of the State of Pennsylvania as required by Charter granted Jan. 26, 1952. Exhibit A, attached to the Court Decree, item 5, names the incorporators: Norman W. Ream, Fred H. Ream, Forest V. Ream, Irene R. Weidman, Harvey Reem, Sr., Violet I. Walker and John O. Ream, Jr., and, item 6 names Fred H. Ream, John O. Ream, Jr. and Irene R. Weidman as a Board of Directors. Item 9 states that this Board would govern affairs of the Corporation until otherwise prescribed under provisions of the By-laws (Constitution) hereafter to be passed; and the within Articles of Incorporation may only be amended in accordance with provisions of Article 7 of the Non-profit Law of 1933.

Also I reported that "the Board" had approved my plan to perfect the organization and to establish a membership. The Plan was to provide an application form and support the organization with memberships at \$1.00 per year, and have Chapters of members over the country with elected or appointed representatives that would meet once a year with "the Board" in Reamstown, Pa.

In accordance with plans outlined at a meeting the previous year in Reamstown, F. V. Ream is serving as Sec'y-Treas., RFA, INC. pending subsequent approval of the Constitution and action of the Executive Committee or operatingBoard. (In accord with an understanding with Norman at a special meeting in Reamstown this summer I was to go to Berlin, Pa. and endeavor to get John O. Ream, Jr. to agree to title of President. For various reasons I was not able to make the trip to Berlin as explained in the minutes. I had hoped that

John O. would be in attendance at this meeting. Since he was not present I agreed to make the trip to Berlin in the near future. There were no objections voiced to the plans outlined.

Elizabeth Ream, Norman's wife, thought we ought to move the meetings back to Harrisburg, Pa. There was considerable discussion on the matter but no motion was made. Finally Forest Ream moved the regular order of business. Norman was not satisfied and thought we ought to settle the matter. I accommodated by making a motion that we continue meetings in Reamstown, Pa. The motion was carried without a dissenting vote. Upon request Norman went through the words of swearing in Herbert as President and Harvey E. Reem, 3rd or 4th, as Sec'y-Treas. but did not turn the meeting over to Herbert. The meeting was never adjourned, and finally it developed into groups here and there talking together, and Norman held up his family record book and said: "That represents 60 years of work and I will not give it up." Later he said he would have to continue as Family Historian since he was the only one that had the records.

Lunches were not served from the pavilion that year. Elizabeth said she sent out about 200 cards to people close around telling them about free coffee and no lunches from the pavilion in the Park.

Paul Lesher, RFA, INC. member C-155 was present and announced that the gates at the Ream Cemetery were open for anyone that wanted to drive in. A visit there disclosed that the grounds were being kept neat and clean under Mr. Lesher's custodianship. He stated that he had a lot of back up papers and was working up a listing of all the burials there. He offered and sold some of the Reamstown memorial plates at \$1.75 each for benefit of the Reformed Church. He reported that our very good friend, The Rev. John R. Albright, Member C-157 could not be with us this year account of being in attendance at a Lutheran Church Convention in Minn.

Papers of incorporation had been reviewed and items for a lawful Constitution were being prepared, which in accordance with wishes of the incorporators would call for a closely knit organization--a central governing body with continuous power. The contact with the

rank and file members to be through representatives from local groups to a Central Board or Council meeting each year.

August 22, 1957

I did manage to make the trip to Berlin, Pa., and our always faithful friend, John O. Ream, Jr., agreed to be President, of RFA, INC. to relieve Norman W. Ream provided it met with the approval of all concerned. He served until he was replaced on his request by an election at an annual meeting of the Assn. I received a printed card postmarked Elizabethtown, Pa., July 28, 1958, without any individuals name thereon which read:

41st REAM FAMILY REUNION, Reamstown, Penna.

Saturday, August 16, 1958

Starting at 10:30 a.m.

Business meeting--meet old friends--Election of Officers Did we see you last year?

(Coffee furnished) Bring your picnic lunch Prizes and Games for all the kiddies

August 16, 1958

At approximately 1:00 p.m. the business meeting was called to order by Pres. Herbert Ream; Norman W. Ream, past Pres. of the Ream Clan formany years, pronounced the invocation.

Forest Ream was requested to speak. I advised that I had had no intention of speaking, but I did give a short report on progress of completing organization of the Ream Family Association, Inc.

Fred Ream then gave a few remarks on the Charter.

Pres. Herbert Ream stated that the Charter was paid for by Norman W. Ream and he should be reimbursed. (He paid \$50 to a lawyer to handle the case through the Court of Dauphin County.) Norman then stated that he would not accept any reimbursement since many others had spent personal funds without reimbursement form any source.

Herbert then asked that a motion be made that the 1959 Reunion be changed. A motion was made then for Reservoir Park, Harrisburg, Pa., as the next location. In a vote it was decided 27 to 15 in favor of changing to Harrisburg. (Mrs. Weidman then said: "I will never attend another meeting." I advised her not to be bothered about this as all would be pokay as soon as organization of RFA, INC. was completed.)

Norman made a motion that the day be changed to Sunday in August instead of Saturday. Harvey E. Reem, 3rd, seconded the motion. It was carried by a large majority. There was a hat collection of \$33.00.

Officers elected, Herbert L. Ream, President, Fred Ream and Mrs. Weidman, Vice-Presidents, Norman W. Ream, Treasurer, Harvey Reem, 3rd, Secretary.

Oldest lady present, Grandma Ida C. Fredericks, Spring Mills, Pa., age 90. Oldest man present, Norman W. Ream, age 85. Largest family present, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Holbert, Sr., 7.

Violet I. Walker, Pres. of the Centre County Ream Club, was present. She advised that it was a hard job to try to keep the Clan together these days.

August 4, 1959

I addressed a letter to all of the Incorporators of the Association, referring to a letter of July 26, 1959, inclosing a sample of a proposed Application for Membership Form for comments or approval. The letter of Aug. 4 advised that the two lady members of the Incorporators were the first to reply--Violet I. Walker, and Mrs. Irene R. Weidman. Irene filled out and returned the Form and it now rests in the permanent files in the fireproof safe in our Library in Reamstown, Pa., supporting her membership No. C-5. The Pink form, "Invitation to membership" was also inclosed, asking for comments. It was signed as follows:

Attest: John O. Ream, Jr., Pres., Berlin, Pa. Forest V. Ream, S. T. Fair Haven, Md.

The two forms proposed, now numbered No. 1 and No. 2, were accepted by the Incorporators without any sugges+ tions for change.

The last paragraph of my letter of August 4 read:

"My sister, Mrs. Vera (Ream) Hall, Garrett Park, Md. and I are now making plans for holding a big meeting of Reams here in D. C. in a Dept. of Commerce Conference Room, 15 Aug. at 2:00 p.m. for the purpose of forming a VINNIE REAM HOXIE Chapter of our Association. Card notices for this meeting being printed by the REAM PRINTING HOUSE, Mt. Ranier, Md." At present it is

Chapter No. 3 with President Charles A. Reams, Jr., 24 Boxwood Circle, Bryans Road, Md. 20616.

The Case of Karl Edwin Seyfarth

Dr. Elmer O. Denniston in his 1939 book titled "Genealogy of the Stukey and Ream families," page 338, refers to Karl Seyfarth family line as follows:

--Son of Harriet McLaughlin, 6q, and W. Seyfarth,

--Dau. of <u>Edwin McLaughlin, 5q</u>, and Rebecca Bonebright,

--Son of J. McLaughlin, and Christine Ream, 4q,

-- Dau. of Frederick Ream, 3q, and Mary Montelius,

--Son of Tobias Ream, 2q, and Juliana Keller,

--Son of <u>Eberhard Ream</u>, lq, and Anna E. Schwab, arrived in Phila. Port in 1717.

Paul Lesher in his records of the Ream cemetery in Reamstown, Pa., had this to say about Karl Seyfarth:

"His great grand parents were Christine Ream and J. McLaughlin (Christine was the daughter of Frederick Ream and Mary Montelius).

"He visited here several times and was very much interested in his Ream and Montelius ancestry."

Our records show that Karl visited with us in 1951 and 1952 and joined with me, the writer, in 1953, in presenting a proposal for a Constitution for our Ream Association. We suggested to Norman that he form a committee to formulate an appropriate Constitution. (See information to follow under date of 22 August 1959.)

That was the last time I ever heard of Karl. I wrote to his wife a few years later and was advised that Karl went to Europe and died over there. Paul Lesher's report indicated that he died of a heart attack in about 1958.

Was Karl a member of the Clan or the RFA, INC.?

In the sense that a society or other organization has a Constitution, or rules or regulations in written form defining conditions for or responsibilities of officers and members, etc., the answer is definitely "NO."

The First Annual Reunion of the Ream Clan as billed by H. E. Reem, Frederick W. Ream and N. W. Ream to meet in Reservoir Park, Harrisburg, Pa., Sept. 22, 1917, continued to meet over the years with various names, but always as a family reunion inviting guests as set forth on the yearly post card notices, and it never qualified as a Society or Association with a regular membership.

The RFA, INC. was organized by seven individuals who signed the Articles of Agreement in the Charter granted by the State in early 1952. Three of the incorporators certified before a Notary Public their willingness to serve as a Board of Directors to govern operations of the Assn. until a Constitution or By-laws were adopted and their successors could be legally qualified. In other words there was no membership involved, and this situation prevailed until the organization was completed and provisions made for membership. This did not happen until August 22, 1959, when the Board adopted a Constitution.

Under date of 18 Aug. 1956 above you will note that 37 individuals agreed to join the Association by signing a blanket application form with a promise to pay \$1.00 membership fee upon receipt of a LIFE MEMBERSHIP card bearing a facsimile of the Ream (Riehm) coat of arms in colors as required by the Constitution to be adopted.

The first seven membership numbers were reserved for the incorporators of the Association--(1) Norman W. Ream, (2) Harvey E. Reem, Sr., (3) Forest V. Ream, (4) Irene R. Weidman, (5) Violet I. Walker, (6) Fred H. Ream, and (7) John O. Ream, Jr.

At this time (1957-58) the writer was engaged in a full time position as Negotiator and Chief of the Freight Regulations Unit, Policy & Regulations Branch, Office Chief of Transportation, U. S. Army, and was assisting in organizing a certain class of employees in a number of Govt. departments, and only a limited amount of time could be given to development of our RFA, INC. organization. My activities in establishing memberships in RFA, INC., after my retirement from Govt. service in 1960 is recorded herein later.

August 22, 1959:

RFA, INC. Meeting of incorporators in Choir Room, Salem Church, Reamstown, Pa., Officers elected were: Fred H. Ream, President; Irene R. Weidman, V. Pres.; Forest V. Ream, Sec'y-Treas.; Norman W. Ream, Pres.Emeritus.

Story of the Constitution and By-Laws

The Charter in item quoted under date of April 16, 1952 above called for "By-laws hereinafter to be passed."

Before considering this subject let's take a look first at the American College Dictionary, by Random House, Inc., N. Y.

"By-Law--A standing rule as of a corporation or Society, not in its Constitution--a subsidiary law."

"Constitution--. . . 7. a system of fundamental principles according to which a Nation, State, Corporation, etc., is governed."

In general where a Charter includes the principal purpose and plan of operation of an organization, often By-Laws are considered the only other document needed, and especially when an organization such as a local bank or business is concerned. But for an organization such as ours, designed to operate on a National or International scale it seemed appropriate to have a Constitution and By-Laws reserved to govern a Board of Directors--one capable of issuing ordinances and/or Rules of Procedure for authorized Committees and Chapters, etc.

Therefor, we now have a Constitution attached to our Charter as the principal governing documents for our Assn.

Items pertaining to a proposed Constitution or By-Laws are included above under dates of Aug. 16, 1952, Aug. 11, 1953, Aug. 15, 1953, and Aug. 15, 1956. To this time there have been only three offerings in writing of a proposed by-Laws or Constitution, one from Norman W. Ream, a single page of 6 articles; one from Forest V. Ream of 7 pages; and one of 5 pages addressed to Norman W. Ream, with a transmittal letter from the law firm of Seyfarth & Atwood, Chicago, Ill., under date of Aug. 7, 1952.

Norman apparently was baffled over the idea of having to have a Constitution, since he had continued to operate a family reunion since 1917 without one. Once he advised me that he thought the origin of such a document was one that should be handled by a lawyer.

Karl Seyfarth's offering was five pages of excellent writing, but it was plain that the principal purpose of

the proposal was to perpetuate in office for life, our great and beloved senior family genealogist (now deceased). As I explained to our RFA, INC., officials, there wasn't anything included in these Chicago By-Laws that was compatible with provisions of our Charter. am sure, Karl, being a lawyer, was too wise to propose anything that might conflict with the laws of the State of Penna. governing non-profit corporations. It could be noted that he did not refer to RFA, INC., but used the term RFA only.

Norman wanted Karl Seyfarth or the writer to accept assignment as Chairman of the By-Law Committee but we Then he said, "I'll try to get Harvey both refused. Reem in Elizabethtown to work with me on it." This was Nothing further was heard about By-Laws or Con-1953. stitution until this meeting was called for the purpose of trying to get some action on the subject.

It was a great surprise when Harvey Reem, Sr., of Elizabethtown, Pa., walked into this meeting and handed me, Sec'y-Treas., Mr. Seyfarth's proposed By-Laws and advised, "This is the Constitution of the Association." There wasn't a scratch made or a word changed in the Seyfarth presentation, although Karl suggested in his letter to Norman that changes might be necessary to suit his desires. Karl wrote in his accompanying letter of Aug. 7, 1953, as follows:

"I think you should refer these By-Laws to a Committee for the purpose of revision and submission to a vote of the members for adoption at the next annual meeting in 1954.

"In reading through these By-Laws you will probably note changes which you desire. I call your attention to the fact that no provision has been made for financial support of the organization or for membership You may also want to add to the qualifications cards. for membership.

"The By-Laws contain only a general provision for appointment of Committees, and it may be that you will wish to have this spelled out in more detail.

"My thought is that during the next year you will have sufficient time in which to give this matter thorough consideration and prepare a final set of By-Laws which will be just what you want. Very truly yours, Karl Edwin Seyfarth*

Comment by the author:

It was obvious in our official family to date, that no one had any particular interest in By-Laws or Constitution beyond the scope of an average "Sunday School Picnic," and, if RFA, INC., operations were ever to be completed and the Association membership increased someone with the foresight and willingness to do a lot of free work would have to be found.

The writer as Secretary-Treasurer of the Assn. agreed to undertake the assignment after he retired from Fed. Gov't Service the next year. In due time I was able to put in almost full time in the work of checking City Directories and Telephone Books at the Library of Congress in Washington, D. C., obtaining addresses of Reams and relatives in the U. S., preparing literature and mailing invitation letters. (This work continued until April 15, 1974.)

The Constitution which was approved by the Board at this time was far from being suitable for continued operations as evidenced by various changes that followed on account of various demands, not the least of which was to meet the requirements of the Internal Revenue Service of the U. S. Treasury Dept. for tax-exempt status. That, however, did have the effect of putting legal status on our operation under the non-profit organization laws of the State of Penna.

The following is only a very brief outline of our first Constitution:

Art, 1. Name, Ream Family Association, Inc.

Art. 2. Board of Governors, Chief Governing body.

Art. 3. Members to make application to the Board and submit family line chart.

Art. 4. Operation of the Board. Family Picnics, groups of Reams and relatives held anywhere privileged to affiliate and elect representatives to attend annual meetings of the Board in Reamstown, Pa.

Art. 5. Annual meetings of the Association to be held yearly in Reamstown, Pa. on the 3rd Saturday in August.

Art. 6. Revenues. Membership, entitling individuals to a membership card, coat of arms info., and assembly of genealogical survey information and full rights to official positions requiring a payment of

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\$3.00 for a five year period. (This was changed to \$1.00 per year in the revised Constitution of 19 Aug. 1961.)

Art. 7. Special meetings of Board of Governors.

Art. 8. Duties of officers, Finance (Auditing) Committee, etc.

Art. 9. Rules of Order. Roberts Rules of Order revised to govern when, etc.

Art. 10. By-Laws, rules of order, etc., may be changed at any meeting by a majority vote of the Board.

The first revision of this Constitution as indicated above was effective 19 Aug. 1961, signed by Fred H. Ream, Irene R. Weidman and John O. Ream, Jr., the Board of Directors, and Forest V. Ream, Sec'y-Treas.

August 23, 1959:

Sunday. 42nd Ream Family Reunion

Reservoir Park, Harrisburg, Penna. Notice on post card signed by H. E. Reem, 111, 421-1/2 Market St., Elizabethtown, Penna.

From here on we write of meetings of the RFA, INC., only.

The principal officers of our Assn. had no desire to attend the Sunday meetings in Harrisburg; however, for the record, we quote a brief of the Sunday picnic group for the years 1960, 1961, 1962, and 1964.

January 23, 1960:

The date of a circular by Paul S. Lesher and Mrs. Clarence W. Good of the Reamstown Hospitality Committee, announcing the Bicentennial Celebration 1760-1960 (account the founding of Reamstown by Tobias Ream in 1760) Reamstown, Pa., June 4-11, 1960. There was a mailing of about 600 of these in a joint operation from Reamstown, Pa., and Fair Haven, Md., and later several hundred, with a special appeal letter from Fred H. Ream, Chairman of the Board of Directors, and RFA, INC., and literature from Fair Haven, Md.

April 15, 1960:

RFA, INC., Board meeting in Salem Church, Reamstown, Pa. Fred H. Ream, Pres., F. V. Ream, S. T.

Board Ordinances as follows enunciated: #2. Increasing the Board to 7 (including the 7 original incorporators):

Norman W. Ream, 2128 6th St., Harrisburg, Pa. Fred H. Ream, 1600 W. Alex-Bellbrk Rd., Dayton, Ohio Irene R. Weidman, 113 East Main St., Ephrata, Pa. Forest V. Ream, 241 Herring Ave., Fair Haven, Md. Harvey E. Reem, 43 W. Summit St., Elizabethtown, Pa. Violet I. Walker, Rural Route 1, Spring Mills, Pa. John O. Ream, Jr., 421 Division St., Berlin, Pa.

#3. Annual Meetings of the Association will be held in Reamstown the third (3rd) Saturday in August each year.

June 5, 1960:

Sunday, a.m. The 2nd day of the celebration. Many visitors enjoyed the services lead by Rev. John R. Albright, supported by the singing sergeants of the U.S. Air Force Band. It was a wonderful service. Rev. Bixler assisted.

Sunday, p.m. UNVEILING THE EBERHARD AND TOBIAS REAM MEMORIAL. IRENE R. WEIDMAN, DONOR.

One of the important events of the celebration on this date was the unveiling of the new white marble memorial to Eberhard and his son Tobias Ream in the Reamstown Memorial Park, located on Church Street, one-half block east of Main Street.

The affair was monitored by Paul S. Lesher. Norman W. Ream, and his wife, Elizabeth, of Harrisburg, Pa. were seated as honor guests, and Norman pulled the string for the unveiling.

Some time after the ceremony was over, a large chauffeured auto drove up and the donor of this stone stepped out and was greeted by Floyd and Forest Ream. It can be told now. This valuable officer of the Ream Family Association, Inc., Mrs. Irene Royer Weidman, member C-5, was always shy of publicity, and fellow officers of the Association always respected her wishes in this regard. Many important decisions were made according to her wishes, and she was a stickler for Reamstown ahead of any other location for the Association's headquarters. Her will provides for benefits from her trust fund only for organizations within a 15-mile radius of Ephrata, Pa.

She designated Pennsylvania in preference to any other State to be used in incorporating our family association, and named the lawyer that cleared our revised charter through the Courts in Lancaster, Pa.

In addition to being the donor of the Memorial stone in the Reamstown Park for our Pioneer, Eberhard, and his son, Tobias, founder of the town, she installed much needed fine new marble stones for Eberhard and Tobias in the Ream (AKA Reddig) Cemetery on South Main Street, Reamstown; and in 1932, Irene and her father, George Royer (hus. of Susan M. Ream) replaced a group of old tombstones in the same Ream Cemetery with a large marble stone bearing a single name--REAM--engraved thereon; and placed seven small stones in the group with bronze lettering as follows:

"<u>Rebecca Ream Royer</u>, b. 1818, d. 1845, dau. of Adam and Catherine Ream. [First wife of Phillip Royer. See Bicentennial History, p. 180.]

Catherine Ream, b. 1783, d. 1852, wife of Adam Ream, dau. of Francis Ruth. [See History of Denver, Pa., p. 25.]

Adam Ream, b. 1786, d. 1862 [son of John and Catherine (Grill) Ream, grandson of Nicholas, 2g., Grave 17, row 10, in Cemetery book. He represented the Reformed Congregation on the building Committee for the Salem Luthern and Reformed Church, 1815-17.]

Johnathan Ream, b. 1811, d. 1872, son of Adam and Catherine Ream.

Susanna Ream, b. 1823, d. 1871, nee Brubaker, wife of Adam R-Ruth Ream.

Adam R. Ream, b. 1823, d. 1899, son of Adam and Catherine (Ruth) Ream."

Adam R. and Susanna Ream had three children:

Maranda, m. Edwin S. Royer.

<u>Susan M.</u>, m. George S. Royer (Ephrata Druggist). Their dau., Irene R., m. Martin L. Weidman, President, Ephrata National Bank.

President, Apinata Mational Ba

Adam Jacob Ream, m. Sabina Fry.

Adam J. Ream was a successful business man in Denver, a railroad Station 1 mile west of Reamstown. He furnished the money to build the St. John's Luthern Church there. An engraved line in stone over the

entrance to the church there reads: "REAM MEMORIAL LUTHERAN CHURCH." He willed everything to his wife, Sabina C. Fry, Aug. 5, 1897, and d. Aug. 22, 1911.

Sabina d. 18 June 1919 and willed the estate in three sums of \$6,300 each to their three children or their families, the balance to be given in equal amounts to ten (10) different Lutheran church organizations, homes, hospitals, missionaries, etc.

Both are buried in the Fairview Cemetery adjoining their church there in Denver, Pa.

Our good member, Irene, had the misfortune to trip on a rug and brake her hip while attending a Board meeting of the Ephrata National Bank, and as a result spent her last three years in the Ephrata Hospital and died in her 88th year, on April 21, 1964. She is interred in a private marble mausoleum with her father and mother in Bowmans Cemetery, Ephrata, Pa. The other three spaces in the mausoleum are occupied by Irene's husband, Martin L. Weidman, and his father and mother.

There was a special assignment of a tent and registration booth in the Reamstown Memorial Park for all RFA, INC., members attending the celebration June 4 through 11.

August 13, 1960:

RFA, INC., Bulletin No. 6, announcing the retirement of Forest Vernon Ream from Federal Gov't service, par. 2 reads:

"Thereafter, following a 30-day vacation period in the land of his birth, Paulding County, Ohio, and some research work in some other places in that state, he primises to devote full time in developing and perfecting the organization of the Ream Family Association, Inc."

August 20, 1960:

RFA, INC., A meeting of "the Board" of seven and friends and prospects. Fred H. Ream, President; Forest V. Ream, Sec'y-Treas.

The Rev. John R. Albright opened the meeting with prayer. Elizabeth, Mrs. Norman W. Ream, spoke. Mrs. Irene Weidman spoke in favor of meetings in Reamstown. Norman W. Ream spoke in favor of Harrisburg, Pa. John O. Ream, Jr., spoke in favor of Reamstown, Pa. Fred Ream spoke. Herbert L. Ream, Hummelstown, Pa., told about history of meeting places of RFA, INC. Paul Lesher talked about history of family associations. He said: "Generally one man has to carry the main load." Rev. Albright spoke of his activities in connection with publication of the Reamstown Bicentennial book and references therein to Ream family history. Norman W. Ream spoke of additional family history.

The Senior member of the RFA, INC., as of this date: Norman W. Ream, Cert. #1, b. 10 Dec. 1873, Harrisburg, Pa.

The youngest member now registered: Terry Lee Ream, Cert. #115, b. 11 Aug. 1945, R. R. 1, Elizabethtown, Pa.

August 28, 1960:

A Ream Family Reunion on this Sunday. Post card notice from H. E. Reem, III, 401-1/2 N. Market St., Elizabethtown, Pa.

<u>A REAM DREAMS OF A REAMSTOWN LIBRARY AND MUSEUM</u> <u>Special Note</u>: Excerpt from our File paper No. 38 in our Incorporation file dated March 16, 1951:

"To Cousin Norman:

"Your suggestion re Mrs. Weidman joining us in the incorporation of the Ream Family Association sounds o.k. to me. . .

"Some day I hope to see in Reamstown a <u>Memorial</u> <u>Library and Museum</u>. All o.k. here except my wife had a severe attack of what the doctor thinks is a form of Flu. . . .

"Very sincerely yours, Forest V. Ream,

Chairman, Reamstown Memorial Committee"

Eberhard and Tobias Ream homestead acquired by the Lesher family being sold.

August 30, 1960:

Date of sale of Real Estate -- A 2-1/2 story frame

house, barn & pig sty. Household goods and antiques at public auction by Paul S. Lesher and Ralph A. Lesher, Executors under the will of Augustus Leasher, deceased.

This was a very unusual sale since it involved the site of some very historic events of our pioneer settler and his family in East Conestago, Chester County, Pa., now Reamstown, East Cocalico Twp., Lancaster County, Pa. The sale was billed as being on <u>West Main St.</u> It is now 31 South Main St. the home of John Lesher Lee and his wife Shirley Ream Lee and family.

Comments about this location by Paul S. Lesher are important in order to get the significance of the location relative to early history. On the back of the sale bill Paul wrote:

"This is the tract of land on which the home of Tobias Ream stood. My Great Grandfather Showalter bought it April 1, 1830. My Grandfather Lesher owned it next. After he died my father bought it, took away the old 1 story stone house back at the meadow near the spring (where Eberhard and his family settled in 1720) and built the present home at the street."

A little later Paul wrote:

"Spending all the time we can find getting ready for sale of mother's furniture and home Tuesday night. It is a rather depressing task as this is where my brother and I were born and raised. . . .

"I was at the Showalter reunion at Lititz Springs Park on Sunday afternoon (1960), the 3rd one I have attended. I sold 3 histories. About 160 present. A very well managed affair. This was their 50th. Henry Showalter their Historian is 86, first cousin of my father. . . ."

Federal Tax Exempt Status Denied.

January 31, 1961:

A letter from IRS, U. S. Treasury Department, read: "Income tax returns are required until such time as an exempt status is established, etc.

"Any further communication regarding the application for exemption should be addressed to . . . Washington, D. C."

The writer called at the IRS offices in D. C. in

February and March and May 31, 1961 and brought forth the information that they were 3 months behind with their work and could not reply immediately, but finally in a letter of July 26, 1961, we were advised that we were not entitled to exemption from Federal Income tax as an organization described in Section 501(c)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Also, in a four-page letter accompanied by IRS Publication No. 183, we were advised:

"Contributions made to you are not deductible by the donors in computing their taxable income. . . ."

June 1, 1961:

RFA, INC. In response to a request of the writer, "the Board" approved Ordinance No. 4 which granted Honorary Membership to Anton Riehm, Leimen, Germany.

August 5, 1961:

RFA, INC. "The Board" approved Ordinance No. 5 as follows:

"The Sec'y-Treas. is authorized to solicit contributions from individuals for a 'Building Fund' to be deposited 100% in our Building Fund in the Reamstown Exchange Bank, Reamstown, Pa."

Annual Ream Day Reamstown Established

Notice of a special program for August 1961 with Open Meeting at 2:00 p.m. with citizens of Reamstown urged to attend, mailed August 1, 1961.

August 19, 1961:

Fred H. Ream, President; Forest V. Ream, Sec'y-Treas. REA, INC., 10:30 a.m. meeting.

The Secretary's report of the meeting read in part as follows:

"The Board approved Ordinances as follows:

No. 6. "Officers of the Association are hereby authorized to request change of our officially registered headquarters to Reamstown, Penna."

No. 7. "In consideration of the death of our patriot Norman W. Ream and the resignation of Harvey E. Reem, Sr., it is decreed that the Board of Directors, effective immediately, be reduced to five (5) members,

viz: Fred H. Ream, President; Irene R. Weidman, V. Pres.; Forest V. Ream, Sec'y-Treas.; Violet I. Walker, and John O. Ream, Jr."

Earl Root, Reamstown, a delegate from the Eberhard Ream Chapter No. 1, suggested that something be done to get the names and addresses of more individuals living nearby on our mailing list, Association members to canvas the situation locally and send names and addresses to our National Sec'y-Treas.

It was ordered that the annual meeting of Chapter representatives with the Board be changed from 10:00 to 11:00 a.m.

The 2:00 p.m. meeting at the pavilion in the Park: Our President and Chairman of "the Board" introduced all in attendance that were registered.

The Rev. John R. Albright, member C-157 led in prayer.

There was a moment of "Silent Prayer" for our lately departed family genealogist, Norman W. Ream, of Harrisburg, Pa. (Norman passed away of a heart attack in his doctor's office in Harrisburg on August 4, 1961. The writer considered him one of my best friends since 1937. By his works he will be long remembered.)

Attendance from out of State: Maryland 3, New Jersey 2, New York 1, Ohio 2, Kentucky 1.

After the meeting your reporter called on our Vice-President, Mrs. Irene R. Weidman, confined to the Ephrata Community Hospital. She was found to be in good spirits and slightly on the mend. (Irene had a keen interest in affairs of the Association, and her advice and assistance was appreciated by all the other board members.)

August 27, 1961:

Received in Office of S. T., RFA, INC., a post card notice, announcing the 44th Annual Ream Family Reunion on Sunday, the date above, in Reservoir Park, Harrisburg, Pa., from H. E. Reem, III, Sec'y Elizabethtown, Pa., July 26, 1961.

Sept. 28, 1961:

A letter from E. James Trimarchi, Jr., Sec'y of the Commonwealth read: "Statement of change of registered

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office of Ream Family Association, Inc., is approved and recorded by the Dept. of State, on Sept. 28, 1961."

RFA, INC., Non-Exempt Status Confirmed by IRS May 8, 1962:

A letter this date received in Office of S.T., Fair Haven, Md., from IRS, U. S. Treasury Dept., Washington, D. C. It was a three-page letter of explanation of basis for our proclaimed non-exempt status as set forth in their ruling of May 26, 1961 which "is hereby affirmed." And the last page of the letter read:

"At some future time when you have perfected your organizational structure, and have operated under your new purposes for a period of twelve months or longer, and to a sufficient degree to establish your entitlement to exemption you may file a new application for exemption.

Pastor Albright transfers to Catawissa, Pa. May 21, 1962:

A farewell party of the Reamstown Lions Club for the Rev. and Mrs. John R. Albright moving North to Catawissa.

Excerpts from an address by PaulS. Lesher:

"I appreciate your invitation to speak tonight on behalf of the Reamstown Civic Association. Before I do that I would like to say a few words for myself:

"Most of the Reams in the United States are descended from our pioneer settler here. The tradition that there is a town in Penna. named for the family has been passed along from generation to generation. Every year someone stops in Reamstown for the first time. All the descendents on the family mailing list were notified of our Bicentennial Celebration. There were people here from Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana, New York, New Jersey, and Penna. They are still coming. Last summer I greeted Reams from Ohio, Penna., Mo., Iowa, and New Mexico. Thus far this year we have had visitors from Nebraska, Maryland, New Jersey, and Leimen, Germany....

"Norman W. Ream, of Harrisburg, was historian and genealogist of the Ream family for sixty years. He unveiled the Ream memorial here on Sunday, June 5, 1960. He died at the age of 87 last August. He has been succeeded by Forest V. Ream, Fair Haven, Maryland, a

retired Gov't employee. He is soliciting memberships in the Ream Family Association at \$1 per year, for which he issues a membership card with the Ream Coat of Arms in color. He carries on a large volume of correspondence with Ream descendents all over the country and tries to help people trace their family lines. He has invested about \$500 of his own money to start the project. He is soliciting contributions which he hopes in time will enable the Ream Family to erect a library and Museum in Memorial Park. With the literature he includes a letter which we supply, offering our Bicentennial History for sale by mail. We have mailed the book all over the U.S.A.

"As you know, Mrs. Irene Weidman of Ephrata paid for the Ream Memorial at the Park. She was evidently pleased with our celebration. After it was over she purchased two tombstones from Arlan Withers which were placed on the old cemetery. The one on Eberhard Ream's grave is headed Pioneer Settler, and the one on Tobias Ream's grave reads: Founder of Reamstown.

"Pastor Albright: We are glad you came to Reamstown. We appreciate what you did for the community. We are very very sorry to see you leave us . . .

"John Albright as a pastor and citizen here was a servant. He accepted us for what we are--God's erring children with that occasional streak of stubbornness that goes with our Penna. Dutch Heritage. He was loyal to his church and denomination, but his interest as a Christian Minister went beyond that, and embraced all the people of the communities he served.

"Our Bicentennial celebration two years ago was a grand success. We did it ourselves. It was a clean cut production without any gambling or gouging on prices:

"I have never known the people of the Reamstown Community to cooperate on anything like they did for this event. In addition it was a financial success. For a small town it was really fantastic. How many of you really know that if it had not been for John Albright there would never have been a Bicentennial celebration?"

Many kind words of appreciation followed, and Paul finally said: "It is with much pleasure that I present

you with this token of remembrance from the Reamstown Civic Association." It was a plaque appropriately inscribed by the Lions Club, and a gift of a Bible and a wallet containing \$50. Mrs. Albright received a corsage.

After Norman Ream passed on, Paul and Rev. John R. came to me and said: "You will just have to take over the genealogical work for the family Association." At the time I was so involved with other activities I just couldn't agree, but time gives us the answer to many things that were once thought impossible. Call it what you may, I am now surrounded with five cabinets full of records of Reams in the U.S. accumulated over the past years of research that started long before I met Norman Ream, and now I just can't say "No."

May 26, 1962:

One of the writer's valued possessions is an autographed copy of the Reamstown Bicentennial (1760-1960) book. On page 2 there is a fine picture of the Rev. John R. Albright with a foreword from our fine beneficiary, Paul S. Lesher. It is a brief story of our historian the Rev. John R. Albright. In presenting the book to me, friend John R. wrote:

"To Forest Ream and the Ream Foundation:

"With a profound feeling of gratitude to you for your many kindnesses to me through the years and in appreciation for the contribution made by the Ream family in the history and development of Reamstown, we present this humble work on the history of your ancestral home. May the contributions of your ancestors to the development of America of their day inspire you to continue giving yourselves for the America of the present and future. May 26, 1962. Rev. John R. Albright."

Also Paul gave me another copy of the book in June 1960 for filing in the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. An assignment that apparently would not be too difficult, but it took a follow up over several years with the librarian before we finally succeeded in getting a letter of Oct. 22, 1968 from Associate Director, Lewis C. Coffin, explaining that the delay was because of a shortage of staff and an unusually heavy receipt

of books during the past few years, etc. "However I have instructed our cataloging staff to give priority to the book. It should be available to readers within a few weeks and you will find an entry for it in our card catalogs." Visitors to the Library may now call it up by merely listing Reamstown, Pa., No. F-159 R25 R4 on the call slip.

August 18, 1962:

RFA, INC. Annual meetings, Reamstown, Pa.

Fred H. Ream, Pres.; Forest V. Ream, Sec'y-Treas. Excellent meetings at the 11:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. meetings as reported to members that could not attend in Bulletin 17.

August 26, 1962:

45th Ream Family Reunion in Reservoir Park, Harrisburg, Pa.

A Post Card notice of this meeting was received in Fair Haven, Maryland, on August 5, 1962, and no name appeared anywhere on the card which was mailed at Elizabethtown, Pa., on Aug. 2, 1962.

September 10, 1962:

A letter from Forest V. Ream, S. T., RFA, INC. to J. Marlin Shreiner, Attorney, Lancaster, Pa:

"We would like to have you proceed in the manner requested in the third paragraph of our letter of Sept.18, 1961, which read in part as follows: 'and we would like to have you file a request with the Common Pleas Court in Lancaster to change the Charter to agree with copy of our Constitution inclosed herewith.'

"At the present time we have no By-Laws. Operation policies of the Board are set forth in a series of Ordinances. The Board might or might not adopt By-Laws at some future date."

March 9, 1963:

A Public Sale of HHGds, Antiques, etc., from the old home of John Ream, 2g., the house built in 1767, later of the Reddig family -- 300 feet south of the Ream-Reddig Cemetery. The house where horses were hid in the basement during the Rev. War. H.H. Leid, Auct. Terms by Mrs. Hubert Roth.

August 17, 1963:

Marking the end of a Clearance Sale at the large Lesher general store, Reamstown, Pa., the first storage place of books and documents for the Ream Family Memorial Library and Museum. (The writer wanting to patronize home industry purchased a table and four chairs from the 2nd floor Furniture Dept. as mementos of a very old historic site in Reamstown.)

August 17, 1963:

RFA, INC. Annual meetings in the Choir Room Salem Church and in the pavilion, Reamstown Memorial Park.

Fred H. Ream, President; Forest V. Ream, Sec'y-Treas. There was a joint meeting with Earl Malsnee's Chapter 1--members from York, Lancaster and Berks Cnty. at 9:30 a.m.

Various Ordinances were approved by the Board and references were made to two yearly family reunions being held in the midwest—Plainfield, Ill. and Bowling Green, Ohio--the Sec'y-Treas. being requested to solicit them for affiliation with RFA, INC.

In a previous telephone conversation with our S.T., Violet Walker asked that her name be removed from the Board on account of her inability to attend meetings.

At the l1:00 a.m. meeting the President turned to the Sec'y-Treas. and said: "You will have to take over since you are the only one that knows the procedure." I left the meeting at 12 noon in order to have lunch with a group of members of my immediate family. This gave Herbert Ream opportunity to make a speech. There are still members that will vouch for the nature of Herbert's theories.

President Fred failed to show up for the 1:00 p.m. scheduled Board meeting. But after the 2:00 p.m. meeting in the Park pavilion the Sec'y-Treas. checked with him: Ordinances 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, and 14 which had already been signed by other Board members. He had no objections to any of them.

EARL J. MALSNEE, Adamstown, Pa., elected President

Ordinance 14 signed by a majority of the Board members read as follows:

"Due to the necessity of having the President of "the Board" nearby for the purpose of certifying and

signing legal documents that will soon be required by the Court, and other equally important matters Earl J. Malsnee, Adamstown, Pa., is hereby, by our signatures below elected as President and Chairman of the Board, and effective immediately will replace Fred H. Ream, Dayton, Ohio, who will continue as a member of the Board."

September 19, 1963:

RFA, INC. Ordinance 15, a full-page resolution requiring a change in our CHARTER. It was certified to our lawyer in Lancaster, Pa., for Court action by Earl J. Malsnee and Forest V. Ream, 9/19/63.

Contents included in the Court decree to follow under date of Oct. 4, 1963.

A copy of the ordinance was furnished to all members of the Association in information Bulletin 19, 1 Nov. 1963.

By-Laws for the Board of Directors Sept. 19, 1963:

RFA, INC. The Board met at Lesher's Store, Reamstown, Pa., and signed Ordinance 15 and the accompanying By-Laws establishing the first regulation governing activities of the Board of Directors.

Earl J. Malsnee, President, and Forest V. Ream, Sec'y-Treas. went to Lancaster and certified before Catherine I. McGeever, a Notary Public as to the authenticity of a Resolution that was filed with Judge W. G. Johnson, Jr., Oct. 4, 1963, by our attorney, and recorded in Deed Book B., Vol. 53, p. 141, Oct. 7, 1963 (Charter Book 5, p. 42).

Amended Charter

October 4, 1963:

RFA, INC. The amended Charter file includes pages B-53-141 through 150. Articles of Agreement were included on pages 141, 142, and 143, and signed for the Association under our Corporate Seal, Sept. 19, 1963, by Earl J. Malsnee, and Forest V. Ream.

The original Charter decree by Judge Homer L. Kreider, January 26, 1952, County of Dauphin, page B-53-148 contains a copy certified under our Corporate

Seal as recorded in Charter Book T-303 for Dauphin Cnty. by our Sec'y-Treas., Forest V. Ream, Fair Haven, Md., December 28, 1960.

Page B-53-149 is a recording of a copy of our resolution in Ordinance 15 amending purposes of our Association. It reads as follows:

"RESOLVED, that the purposes of said corporation as set forth in paragraph 2 of the original Articles be amended so that the original purposes are deleted and the following purposes be substituted therefor:

 a. To assist in civic improvements and social welfare.

b. To provide historical markers, grave stone and cemetery improvement of historical significance.

c. To provide public buildings, such as libraries, museums and recreational halls.

d. To provide other public services as memorials to early pioneer settlers.

e. To do such other things necessary for above purposes.

"AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a new paragraph and Article be added to the original Articles of Incorporation by adding the following Article to be knows as Article 10.

"'No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall ever inure to the benefit of any donor, member, director or officer of the corporation or any private individual shall be entitled to share in the distribution of any of the corporate assets. In the event of dissolution of this corporation all of its tangible assets and holdings shall be distributed to the REAMSTOWN MEMORIAL PARK ASSOCIATION, INC., Or in the event of the dissolution of that corporation or subsequent change in its operation that would not meet the requirements for an organization existing as a non-profit corporation subject to the approval of the Internal Revenue Service, then to a corporation with objectives and purposes as defined in Article 2 of the Charter as amended herein, as directed by a majority of the voting members of the governing body of the Ream Family Association, Inc.'

"I, Forest V. Ream, Secretary of the Ream Family

Association, Inc., certify that the above is a true and correct copy of the Resolutions adopted by the corporation at their annual meeting held August 17, 1963.

DECREE

"AND NOW, this 4 day of October, A.D., 1963, an application for the amendment of the charter and the Articles of Amendment of 'Ream Family Association, Inc.' under the 'Nonprofit Corporation Law' approved May 5, 1963, as amended having been presented for approval to me, a law judge of said County, accompanied by proof of publication of notice of said application . . .

"It is therefore, ordered and decreed that the Articles of Amendment of the 'Ream Family Association, Inc.' be and the same are hereby approved and upon the recording of the said Articles of Amendment and this decree, the amendment specified in the Articles of Amendment shall become part of the original Articles of Incorporation and of the original Charter.

W. C. Johnston, Jr., Judge"

May 19, 1964:

A letter, Dist. Mgr., IRS, Baltimore, Md., to RFA, INC.:

"Since a review of the form and supplementary evidence submitted discloses that it is not the type of organization on which the District Director's office may make a determination, the data has been forwarded to the National Office of IRS for appropriate action and you will be advised of their decision in the matter. . . ."

Tax Exempt Under Code 501(c)4

June 23, 1964:

A letter, IRS, Washington, D. C., to RFA, INC., Fair Haven, Md.:

"Based upon the evidence submitted it is held that you are Exempt from Federal Income Tax under provisions of the Internal Revenue Code indicated above--\$501(c)4."

August 9, 1964:

Date of the last REDDIG Family Reunion held in Reamstown Memorial Park. The Ream line to the Reddig family is as follows:

Eberhard Rim (Rihm, Ream), 1687-1779. John Ream, 1723-1784; Samuel Ream, 3/4/1770. Samuel's dau. Elizabeth m. John Reddig, 1792-1873. RFHS File 2-1-R.

August 2, 1964:

47th Annual Ream Family Reunion, Reservoir Park, Harrisburg, Pa.

On Sunday, starting at 11:30 a.m. (home-made bean soup), H. E. Reem, Sec'y, Elizabethtown, Pa.

This was the last notice of this kind filed in records of RFHS. The next year or a little later, the writer received a letter from some lady advising: "We don't have a President any more but would like to have you join us at our annual reunion this year if possible."

The RFA, INC.'s chief interest in the Harrisburg group was to see some one at our 11:00 a.m. meeting in Reamstown the 3rd Sat. in August each year representing the Norman W. Ream Chapter No. 2 of the Association as designated by the Board when the original plan for chapters was developed. But no one in Dauphin County seemed interested in our kind of an organization.

August 15, 1964:

RFA, INC. Annual Meetings, Salem Church, Reamstown, Pa.

Earl J. Malsnee, President; Forest V. Ream, Sec'y-Treas.

On account of the passing of Irene Weidman in April the Board was reduced to four, viz., Earl Malsnee, Vera A. Hall, Fred Ream and F. V. Ream. All agreed that the Board should be increased to seven again as soon as we could find additional eligibles that could attend meetings.

August 21, 1965:

RFA, INC. Annual Meetings in Reamstown, Pa. Local newspapers have always been good about publishing material for us. For 1965 we quote from the

August 19 issue of EPHRATA REVIEW: "REAMS MEET ON SATURDAY

"The annual meeting of the Board of Directors and chapter representatives of the Ream Family Association, Inc., will be held in Reamstown on Saturday. Representatives from the District of Columbia, Indiana, Maryland, Ohio, and Penna. will attend.

"There will also be an open meeting at 2 p.m. in Reamstown Memorial Park for members, relatives and friends. The program will include a tour of historical points in charge of President, Earl J. Malsnee, award of prizes for eligible members and a drawing for prizes for all persons registered.

"Earl Ream Root, Reamstown, is secretary-treasurer of the Eberhard Riehm Chapter No. 1, comprising Association members in Berks, Lancaster and York Counties.

"Official headquarters of the Association is Reamstown. Forest V. Ream, Fair Haven, Md., is National secretary-treasurer and family historian."

Our member C-845, Mrs. Mariam Yeager Harnish, is publisher of the Ephrata Review. She is a relative through the Reddig-Ream line--Elizabeth, dau. of Samuel Ream, son of John Ream, 2g. See August 9, 1964 above.

March 31, 1966:

A letter addressed to Mrs. Harvey E. Reem, Sr., Elizabethtown, Pa. from F. V. Ream, Sec'y-Treas. RFA, INC., expressing our sorrow at the recent passing of Harvey, Sr., our patriot in the movement and honored member C-2.

August 21, 1966:

RFA, INC. Annual meetings in Reamstown, Pa.

Earl J. Malsnee, President. Forest V. Ream, Sec'y-Treas.

Chapters 1, 3, 4, & 6 represented at the 11:00 a.m. meeting in Salem Church.

A very interesting report received from Wm. L. Phillips, Pres. of Stark County, Ohio, Chapter No. 5.

The Sec'y-Treas. reported that he and President Malsnee had called on Rev. Ira D. Landis in the new Mennonite Library and Archives just east of Lancaster on Route 30 and obtained permission to store some old deeds and valuable out-of-print books in their especially equipped facilities for such material, until our own fireproof storage space could be made available in Reamstown.

From the press release for the meeting, our new Acting Librarian, Charles W. Steffy, was holding open house for our Library display in an old house that he was refurbishing. It was the first stop on the Historical Tour following the 2:00 o'clock meeting in the Park. Some of the members were so much interested in looking at the books that they lost out on balance of the tour.

It was a sad time for me and my family, on account of the loss of my wife on July 7th. She was interred in the Ream-Reddig Cemetery, Reamstown.

April 6, 1967:

A letter from the law office of Eaby & Eaby, Lancaster, Pa., to RFA, INC., c/o Forest V. Ream, S. T., Fair Haven, Md.:

"I represent the Ephrata National Bank of Ephrata, Pa., and you had informed me that you had received an exemption from the Internal Revenue Service by letter of <u>June 3, 1964</u>. Would you be so kind as to forward me a copy of this letter so that we can properly ascertain whether you should continue to receive a contribution from the Irene R. Weidman Trust.

"I want to point out, we want to be able to do this, but want to be sure you have a proper exemption. David R. Eaby"

April 11, 1967:

With copy of our letter to Earl J. Malsnee, President, RFA, INC. at his new address, 346 East Elm St., Shillington, Pa., we advised lawyer Eaby as follows:

"In compliance with your request there is inclosed a copy of the IRS letter of <u>June 23, 1964</u> authorizing tax exempt status.

"Irene Weidman, as Vice-President of our Association, was very much interested in establishing tax exemption, and urged continued effort over several years until it was obtained."

April 26, 1967:

Date of a letter from lawyer David R. Eaby with copies to the Ephrata National Bank, Ephrata, Pa.; Earl J. Malsnee, Shillington, Pa., and John B. Weidman, Ephrata, Pa., reads:

"I have received the copy of the letter you sent me from the Internal Revenue Service. I have checked this with Internal Revenue and I am extremely sorry to advise you a 501 (c) 4 organization does not qualify for income tax deductions except if they are Volunteer Fire Company, or a Veterans organization.

"Under the circumstances I have no other alternative but to advise the Trustee of the Irene Weidman Estate that future contributions cannot be made to your organization. If you have any questions kindly let me know."

From this time on the battle continued and the writer made a number of trips to D. C. and to the IRS offices in Baltimore, Md., until finally we received the following from the Baltimore IRS office:

December 22, 1967:

A letter from Irving Machiz, Dist. Director, IRS, in reply to a Personal letter to his read as follows:

"You had been advised by letter dated July 18, 1967, that your organization was not entitled to exemption from Federal Income Tax as an organization described in section 501(c)(3) of the Code. On the basis of Ordinance No. 20 adopted by the Board of Directors of the Ream Family Association, Inc., and additional information furnished, we are now of the opinion that your fund is entitled to exemption as an organization described in section 501(c)(3) of the code. Accordingly, our determination of July 18, 1967 is hereby revoked.

"This determination is based on evidence that you funds are dedicated to the purposes set out in section 501(c)(3) of the Code. To assure your continued exemption, you should maintain records to show that funds are expended only for those purposes."

In order to complete the historical angle to the situation, copy of two items referred to in District Director Irving Machiz's letter above we record below--Ord. 20 & a letter from Reamstown Mem. Park Ass'n, Inc.

LOCAL HISTORY

Ordinance No. 20; RFA, INC., Board of Directors Effective July 1, 1967.

We the governing Board of the Ream Family Association, Inc., in order to establish a separate fund exclusively for charitable and educational purposes hereby resolve:

The name of the fund shall be the "Reamstown Building Fund," by the Ream Family Association, Inc., controlled and managed by the Board of Directors.

Said fund is organized exclusively for charitable and educational purposes including:

Establishment and maintenance of a public library and museum in Reamstown, Penna.

This "fund" is established separate and apart from any other funds of the Ream Family Association, Inc., and upon dissolution of the "fund" any remaining balance may not be used for general purposes of the Ream Family Association, Inc., as set forth in its charter, but shall be distributed exclusively for the purposes of the fund by an organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for charitable, educational, religious or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501C3 of the Internal Revenue Code.

No part of the net earnings of the fund shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to members, officers or other private persons, except the organization shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of purposes set forth herein.

The "fund" shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on by an organization exempt from Federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) or by an organization contributions to which are deductible under Section 170(C)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954.

Ordinance No. 21 adopted at this time, effective July 1, 1967, reads as follows:

"The Sec'y-Treas. is authorized to continue maintaining funds of the Association as follows:

1. Receipts from members or others not designated for any specific purpose or fund will be deposited in the Bank of the American Bank and Trust Co. of Penna., Reamstown, Pa.

2. Amounts directed for the "Reamstown Building Fund" will continue to be placed in the Ephrata National Bank, Ephrata, Pa. (Irene Weidman's old Bank).

3. Amounts designated for "RESEARCH" will be forwarded to the Sec'y-Treas. of the Ream Family Historical Society. (A voluntary affiliate of RFA, Inc.)

4. Amounts on deposit in any bank considered in excess of a normal checking account balance that isn't considered necessary for expenditures over a projected 12-month period will be deposited in a Savings Account bearing interest as directed by the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors.

(A copy was mailed to all Board members by F. V. Ream, on October 6, 1967.)

(As this is written in 1976, the Joint Collection Arrangement between RFA, INC. and RFHS as outlined in RFA, INC. Yearly Report of September 1, 1971, is still in effect. Although F. V. Ream no longer is Sec'y-Treas. for both organizations after Nov. 1967, the S.T.'s of each organization, still respecting past practice, have continued to exchange quarterly financial reports. The important thing is that when a check is issued for 2 or more items, distribution should be designated. Members' choice to govern. This practice, of course, subject to change any time.)

Board members present agreed to a new line up of officers as follows:

Forest V. Ream, President, Fair Haven, Md. Earl J. Malsnee, Vice-Pres., Shillington, Penna. Shirley Ream Lee, Sec'y-Treas., Reamstown, Penna. Fred H. Ream, Pres. Emeritus, Dayton, Ohio. John O. Ream, Jr., Member, Berlin, Pa. Brandt B. Ream, Member, Elizabethtown, Pa. James A. Ream, Sr., Member, Chester, Pa.

The three top-named members comprise the EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

It might be said that those named above were elected, but there was no assembly of members with authority to elect anyone. The Board of Directors is the sole governing body according to the Constitution and any election must come from the Board members only. And, as it has been for years, the Board and the Association has been kept alive simply because the original organizer of RFA, INC. has struggled year after year to keep in tow members that will agree to accept the position of a Board member. For example, this year 1967 JamesReam would not consider being President, and only agreed to take assignment on the Board with the understanding that he would not be put on any Committees because of his unusual assignment with the Chamber of Commerce, Chester, Pa. Earl Malsnee preferred to just continue as a Board member, but finally agreed to be Vice-Pres. when it was explained that we

needed someone on the Executive Committee that would be in a position to sign legal documents as a member in authority of a governing Committee in developing Court action on our Charter change, and our case for tax exemption.

August 20, 1967:

Sunday. The writer returned to Reamstown and met with Earl Malsnee and Earl Root and Newton Overhalser to plan for a new location for our Library that would be closer in. Newton took us on a tour of the old stone school house that the Memorial Park Association had purchased at 23 East Church St. It was decided that this would be an excellent location for our library. See letter of Sept. 22, 1967, above from the Reamstown Community Center. This was given to us in hopes that it might help in our claim for tax exemption with IRS.

RESERVE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

May 1, 1971:

RFA, INC. Board Ordinance No. 24:

The President is authorized to appoint 5, 7, or 9 members of the Association to serve as a Reserve Board of Directors.

Selection to be made from Association members in "good standing" of the 10th generation or younger.

The Reserve Board to be active only in case of default of the regular Board of Directors. Its members to have the privilege of attending all meetings of "the Board," with a voice but not a vote, except when one is elected by "the Board" as a stand in for a regular Board member absent from a particular meeting.

July 17, 1968:

RFA, INC. A surprise announcement was received in office of the Sec'y-Treas., Ream Family Historical Society, Fair Haven, Md. on this date from our RFA, INC. member C-324, Lloyd W. Ream, R. D. 2, Lebanon, Pa. It was an invitation to attend a meeting of ancestors of the Reem Clan in Reservoir Park, Harrisburg, Pa., Aug. 4, 1968, "to effect a permanent organization."

In checking the records it was noted that Lloyd's application for membership in RFA, INC. was headed, "Lloyd W. Ream, Chapter 3" Jan. 9, 1964. Since Chapter 3 number properly belonged to the Vinnie Ream Hoxie Chapter in the Washington, D. C. area, a very active group, Lloyd's intention not known, and therefor he was furnished a copy of the RFA, INC., Constitution and forms for forming a chapter on July 10, 1968. No reply to date.

The announcement was signed Lloyd W. Ream, President and Linda D. Ream, Sec'y, 2323 Patton Road, Harrisburg, Pa. The scheduled program included a prayer by Chaplain John Shunk, and a speech by Herbert Ream.

(Author's comment: No one in RFA, INC., or RFHS could object to the action suggested by the above, but your author by the effort indicated is reminded of what Paul Lesher had to say in his address to the Lions Club as recorded above. He said: "We are God's erring children with that occasional streak of stubbornness that goes with our Pennsylvania Dutch Heritage." But the writer refuses to believe that we Pennsylvania Dutch have an unusual claim to stubbornness.)

August 17, 1968:

(FVR Diary: Had a good meeting at 11:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Everyone liked the Library set up and it was a nice place for the Board meeting. Didn't get relieved of the President's job. Floyd wanted to wait a year before taking the plunge. Had dinner with sister Cecile and husband at the Dutch Diner.)

August 21, 1971:

RFA, INC. Annual Meetings in Reamstown, Penna. Forest V. Ream, President; Shirley Ream Lee, Sec'y-Treas.

A good meeting at 11:00 a.m. and the Board meeting at 1:00 p.m. Over 50 present at the 2:00 p.m. meeting in the pavilion of the Park. It was joint with the Eberhard Rihm Chapter 1, Floyd Ream, President, Elizabethtown, Pa. and Thelma Fitzke, Sec'y-Treas., Mt. Joy, Pa.

Board meeting continued at 4:00 p.m. The Board adopted Ordinance 25 to become effective 1 October, 1971, nominating and electing Officers and Board members as follows:

Fred H. Ream, John O. Ream, Jr., Earl J. Malsnee, Shirley Ream Lee, Brandt B. Ream, Floyd L. Ream, and Forest V. Ream.

Floyd L. Ream, Pres., Forest V. Ream, Vice-Pres., and Shirley Ream Lee, Sec'y-Treas. to serve as Executive Committee to operate the Association between meetings of the Board of Directors. The President as Chairman authorized to name a substitute for any meeting and to appoint a recording secretary.

August 19, 1972:

RFA, INC. Annual meetings, Reamstown, Penna.

Floyd L. Ream, President; Shirley Ream Lee, Sec'y-Treas.

The Board met at 10:00 a.m. at the Lee residence. There was no action on anything. Everything tables at the President's request until a special Board meeting to be called for September 16. Good meetings held at 11:00 a.m. in the Library and at 2:00 p.m. in the Memorial Park.

September 16, 1972:

RFA, INC. Board meeting, Reamstown, Penna. The Board met at the Lee residence, 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

No record of any accomplishments here. Earl Malsnee entertained Floyd and Forest Ream at dinner at Zinn's on Route 222 and took us to the cottage he was building on a Mt. side near Adamstown, Penna.

August 18, 1973:

RFA, INC. Annual Meetings, Reamstown, Penna.

Floyd L. Ream, President; Shirley Ream Lee, Sec'y-Treas.

Four Board members and representatives from five chapters met at the 11:00 a.m. meeting. No copy of minutes of other activities for the day on file in RFHS office in Fair Haven, Md.

August 17, 1974:

RFA, INC. Annual meetings in Reamstown, Penna. Floyd L. Ream, President; Shirley Ream Lee, Sec'y-Treas.

"The Board" met from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. at the Recreation Center in the gymnasium hall back of our Ream Family Memorial Library & Museum on the 2nd floor. The Board was increased to nine (9) members as follows: Floyd L. Ream, Shirley Ream Lee, Forest V. Ream, Wallace Ream, Brandt B. Ream, John L. Lee, Thelma Fitzke, Earl Malsnee and Calvin R. Rheam.

The President asked to have Forest V. Ream replaced as Vice-President by Wallace Ream of Dayton, Ohio, but with only five (5) members present, a majority vote

could not be obtained to accommodate his wish, and the Sec'y-Treas. was requested to solicit a vote from the absent members and report at the next meeting. This procedure all in accordance with the By-Laws governing Board activities.

November 2, 1974:

RFA, INC. Special meeting of the Board of Directors in the Library, Reamstown, Pa., at 2:00 p.m.

Seven (7) members of "the Board" were present. Calvin R. Rheam's resignation accepted. No action on any motions or Ordinances. The Chair refused to allow any action on "Proposed Articles of Agreement between the RFA, INC., and the RFHS spelling out past practices re the joint operation, financial settlements between the two Secretary-Treasurer's etc. since F.V. Ream no longer handled the accounting for both organizations, Shirley Ream Lee accepting the job for RFA, INC., in Nov. 1967. Floyd said he didn't want anything in writing like that. The joint collection business as outlined in RFA, INC. yearly report of September 1, 1971, and years before, and operated successfully thru 1975 with quarterly financial reports being made between the two S.T.'s.

The "Articles of Agreement" were certified by the RFHS Nov. 30, 1974, and the two financial officers being honest persons will continue to meet the desires of the members that choose to send in a check for two or more items respecting the distribution requested regardless of any arbitrary wish on the part of any other officer.

Any member desiring a copy of the joint financial arrangement can obtain it by sending a note to the Sec'y-Treas., RFHS, Friendship, Maryland 20758.

The session didn't vote on anything. The President talked a long time about his plans for the future. The Secretary reported on the vote for Vice-President--Wallace Ream, 5 votes; Forest Ream, 4.

August 16, 1975:

RFA, INC. Annual meetings in Reamstown, Pa.

Floyd L. Ream, President; Shirley Ream Lee, Sec'y-Treas.

The Board meeting at 10:00 a.m. was adjourned a little late in order for the group to move over to the meeting scheduled for 11:00 a.m. with chapter representatives.

The Secretary-Treasurers of the RFA, INC., and RFHS exchanged financial reports.

The Board could reach no conclusion on the request that the abortive order in the yearly report to the effect that "all monies should be sent to Reamstown" and arranged to extend the meeting to Nov. 1. Only four (4) members of the Board of (9) were present on November 1, and a majority vote would have been impossible. As this is written it is a moot subject, but one that cannot be settled by just one of two organizations.

Our sign is now up on the front of the building. It reads:

"REAM FAMILY MEMORIAL PUBLIC LIBRARY AND MUSEUM, Sponsored by the Ream Family Association, Inc."

TIDBITS OF FAMILY HISTORY:

Elmer L. Denniston's page 235: "The little town of Leimen where the Riehm family lived for many generations was near the ancient city of Heidelberg, Europe on the river Neckar. . . . Until the time of the Reformation these people were Catholic, but since that time many including the Riehm family have been members of the Reformed Church, and later, the Evangelical Protestant Ch.

Cyrus Ream, b. 12 Dec. 1812 was the great grandson of Tobias founder of Reamstown. He was a Justice of the Peace, and in 1860 was the Census Marshall for the townships of Brecknock and East Cocalico, also the borough of Adamstown; and, as reported in the history of Lancaster Co. in 1883 he had been Treasurer of the Reformed Congregation of Reamstown since 1869.

Elmer E. Denniston's p. 233: "The Rihms of Freudenheim are said to have come from Switzerland, and according to old tradition the Riehms of Leimen are also said to have come fr. that cntry. but no proof ever found."

To Fellow Members, RFA, INC., and RFHS:

The genealogical data that follows is based primarily on reports received from you. Basic sources include your membership applications to RFA,INC., and correspondence in files of the RFHS. In addition information has been picked up over the years during field trips through briar and weed patches, etc., to locate public, as well as small private farm cemeteries. Such searches produced data never before published in a family history. (Much credit is due here to individuals, too numerous to mention, who gave encouraging assistance in obtaining information in this manner)

Memberships, C and HS numbers

C#. "C" means Certificate. The certificate of your Life Membership is on your Membership Card, and the C. files are now maintained by Shirley Ream Lee, S.T. RFA, INC., Reamstown, Pa.

HS#. The number assigned by the HS after application for membership is received through RFA,INC. Membership in RFHS is open only to members of the RFA,INC. When the Association's membership card is furnished to members it is accompanied by an application form that can be used to obtain membership in RFHS. When this form is executed and sent to the S.T., RFHS, Friendship, Maryland 20758 the member is then given a double membership number, such as 17-108 now held by Wm. J. Ream, DMD, Akron, Ohio, and 950-362 owned by Kenneth Cramer Ream, Office Machines, Larned, Kansas: The last number refers to the HS file.

Addresses

The date of the membership is shown next to the C, number, and the address at that time follows the name of the member. If a later address is included in the file, it follows the original address, but it is not recommended for mailing purpozes. The only membership card is the one issued by the Association, none by the Society. The agreement on the membership card to be signed by the member reads:

"I agree to cooperate with the Association, keeping the National Office advised of my current address" However, since long period of time elapse between contact with many members it would be too much to expect full compliance with this rule.

Acknowledgemwnt of Book Orders

The number of books ordered by each member is shown opposite the HS number in the charts to follow, or in space generally used for this purpose.

Generation Numbers

Numbers opposite the members' names, such as 6g. 7g. 8g. etc., indicate that the forefather's arrival at a port of entry in the United States has been established. There is no record of many arriving before 1725, and records are incomplete for 100 years thereafter. But, fortunately, as recorded in part 2 herein, there is an official record of our Eberhard Ream (Rim. Riehm, Rihm) arriving in the Port of Philadelphia, Pa., in 1717. This record helped members doing research overseas in recent years to establish the only authentic Coat of Arms, known at the present time for the Ream family in America.

Some members had a forefather of rather recent arrival in America and they have a very low g. number. However, none of them to date have any claim in the way of a blood line relationship to a Coat of Arms originated by any overseas nation.

The family line reports to follow are by C. number in numerical order. To locate your family line check the C. number on your membership card, or turn to the index of names in alphabetical order on pages 276 thru 291.

After publication date all inquiries accompanied with a stamped envelope will be answered. From the U.S. 1900 Census records now available at the U.S.Archives in Washington, D.C. it may be possible to complete some family lines that could not be developed to date.

Moravian Church records Bethel Twp. Lebanon, Co. Pa:

Site of the old church and cemetery, 3 miles N.E. of Jonestown Most of the old tombstones illegible.

The church records show that the four listed below while plowing in a field June 26, 1756 were murdered by the Indians. They were buried the day following the massacre:

Jacob Handok, Frank Albert, J.George Miers and Frederick Weiser, b. May 21, 1740.

INQUIRY: Who were the parents of this Frederick Weiser?

In 1718 Eberhard Ream (Riehm) left his family in Germantown, Philadelphia, Pa. and traveled to Conestoga Twp. Chester County where he made arrangements with the Indians, and purchased the right to settle opposite their village just west of a small branch of Cocalico Creek in what is now a part of Reamstown, Pa.

In 1957 after the retirement of Norman V. Ream, Harrisburg, Penna, as President of RFA, INC. on account of poer health, Paul and Pastor John R. Albright (see C-157)came to me in Reamstown and insisted that I would have to take over as Family Historian.I was still in Government service and was reluctant to agree with my friends in the genealogical field, but there was "no one else available."

The same situation exists today with the writer surrounded with files and correspondence that cannot be passed on because there is "no one else available"I am 84 now, but as long as my health continues good I will do all I can to help, and continue to carry the torch.

Paul had a great interest in the Ream Family lines and was second to none when it came to making reports of Reamstown visitors for the Historical Society files. From his large general store in the center of Reamstown it was a natural for him to be cited when strangers came to town and were seeking information. Over the years, many came from various parts of the United States and Canada, and they always received a warm welcome in Reamstown by Paul. He served as Chairman of the Hospitality Committee when the Reamstown Bicentennial celebration took place there in June 1960.

The above is apparently a quote from an item in the "Taylor papers" where Eberhard Riem was granted 200 acres of land in Chester County, Conestoga, now E. Cocalico Twp., Lancaster County, Pa. but it should be noted that the name is Franciscus, not Francisco. In general the different spellings originate in different parts of Europe.

In her letter of Oct. 17, 1961 to the writer she inclosed copies of two two page letters from Rev. John R. Albright under date of Sept. 14, and 21, 1961.

A lot of excellent data was furnished by Rev. Albright, but they could not establish a tie-in with Margaret the 2nd wife of Christian or Christopher Franciscus.

Another file to follow in this listing for John Allen Franciscus, 68 Ojeda St. Puerto Rico, C-470, will establish that the Margaret or Margaretha in question was a sister to Anna Elizabeth, Eberhard Riem's wife. Mrs. Sam's family line back to a Franciscus has never been filed in this office of the RFHS.

Here there is a break in the line , and we quote from the members letter of 21 July 1965:

"I would love to have some:

- 1. history of the area in which Ludwig Christopher lived.
- 2. who his parents were,
- 3. how they got from the Kingdom of Naples to what is now Southern Germany. Even if we can't document every move I would like to be able to explain it historically in our coming book.

"Between Mrs. Hargis and myself we have the most complete data in the world on Franciscus, but we need just a bit more between 1590-1710."

THE ORIGINAL IMMIGRANT

Christopher Franciscus, b. 23 Dec. 1680, emigrated to America in 1710, d. 27 Sept. 1757. He m. 2nd Anna Margaret Schwab, dau of Jost Schwab. She was a sister toAnna Elizabeth Schwab, wife of Eberhardt Riehm (Ream) the (first?) emigrant to America in1717.

Another member intensely interested in this Franciscus line--Mrs. Luther Melba T. Hargis, 1161 Parker St. N.E. Cleveland, Tenn. file HS-269-45. See C-269 above. In a four page letter of 24 April 1963 we have a story of the voyage of Christopher from overseas which redas in part as follows:

"Ship Maria Hope sailed from London 29 June 1710; 'MARY HOPE', John Annis, Master. Arr. Philadelphia Sept. 1710...... Swiss and German passengers of S.E. Pa. Chris'not being a Mennonite as established from a quote in Chalkley's Journal, Eshleman's list 1917. "We had a sweet and solemn meeting on the first and fifth days; had one meeting with the Germans or Palatines on the ship's decks, and a person who understood both languages and interpreted for me." A further quote from Mrs. Hargis's letter:

"..... embarked at Gravesend-a small ship loaded with 94 passengers all of whom were brought well and safe to Philadelphia in Sept.1710. Jacob Miller, Martin Oberholtz, Martin Maily(Mylin) Christian Herr, and Martin Kindig were all aboard this ship. All of these men obtained land in the first survey for them in Pa. and Christopher's land was between Jacob Miller and Rudolph Bundely"

In my notes of 9 July 9, 1965, at Historical Society, West Chester, Pa. Christopher Franciscus's name appeared in first assessment in Conestoga Twp. in 1718 (it was still Chester Co. at that time). Notes from Ellis & Evans History of Lancaster Co. Pa: p.20 Dutch Inhabitants, Christopher Franciscus, p-370 Christopher Franciscus, Carpenter.

Mrs. Ida Belle Sams, Uvalde, Texas, HS-222-25 in a letter of 17 Oct. 1961 writes:

"Christopher Franciscus is my ancestor--to have been a (Cont. next page)

*(The writer never met the grandfather, Norman B. Ream, but we had a common interest in some things, including service to the B.&O.R.R. and the care and preservation of the Ream Cemetery in Ursina, Somerset County, Pa.located about one mile east of Confluence, Pa. on the Laurel Hill Creek, Lower Turkey Foot Twp.

The B.&O. RR tracks were on the west bank of the creek, and Norman B.as President of the Railroad had timber cut back so he could see the burial place of Capt. Andrew, 3g. and his son John B. and wife, Anna Rosina Weitzel, and other relatives as the trains went by, and later he had a cement wall built around the cemetery plot of 1 acre or more.

When Norman's private car-was on the siding at Confluence, sometimes for as long as a week, he visited with Ream folks and friends in the neighborhood, and in my visits to the area in years gone by with Ream families there, such as Norman Richard, Harnedsville, Charles and Edgar, Ursina, and Ruth and Hulda Belle of Confluence, and others, I learned much of Norman B. and found that he was an esteemed and most welcome visitor to the land of our early settlers there, that first built a fort in Ursina with an underground passage to the Creek.

In 1964 when Vandals did some damage in our Ursina Cemetery the stone of John B. was pushed over and broken in two, and I had it repaired and replaced.

Norman was a Lieutenant in the Civil War and there is a story in our RFHS files here that records the name of the individual that drug him off the battlefield in Va. when he was seriously wounded and saved his life.

In my research in Ohio I was reminded of the Ream-Schwab family connections when I discovered in a Lake Erie port two large Ore carrying vessels named Charles M. Schwab and Norman B. Ream. Charles M. Schwab's relation to our Jost Schwab and his daughter Anna Elizabeth, wife of our Eberhard Ream, 1g.has never been documented in this office. But it can be said that Charles M. Schwab was a very important man in the steel industry in this country, and a popular President of the U.S.Steel Corporation, and very well liked by Labor.

Much has been written and published about our famous Norman B. Ream, successful business executive and financier. He died in New York City,9 Feb. 1915. His picture and some of his life experiences are recorded on pages 104 thru.109 of the NEW YORK GENEALOGICAL AND BIOGRAPHICAL RECORD, Vol. 47 #2, pub. New York,N.Y. April 1916.)

" Dear Cousin;

"With great pleasure I received the letter which made me an honorary member of the American "Ream Family"

"I showed the membership card proudly to all my friends and relatives. I will always cherish it. Gradually American relatives from all parts of America are finding their way to Leimen where we receive them as welcome guests in the homes of their fathers.

"I spent my youth in the tavern "ZUM BAREN (To the Rear). In earlier times it was not only a tavern, but also a station for the mail coach where the horses were changed.

"As a child I played with the old deserted trough where the horses drank. Unfortunately one did not pay attention to these keepsakes at that time and many a coat of arms in stone was lost. Concerning the color red of the lion in our coat of arms; a keeper of the records in Berlin tells us this about the color red:

"It stands on record: Red is recognized as the fiery desire for virture, to make one worthy of his country. It is the color of the sunrise & therefor means a conquering power & triumph of the sovereign authority.

"The lion itself originally a symbol of the princes of smaller dynasties, later only that of bravery, is the mark of abundent warlike virtue.

"And now to the question; Why has the tavern "The Black Bear" become 'To the Bear.' Very simple, in the course of years one left out the Black-without special reasons.

" Through the centuries there were many bear hunts in our forests. In closing I would like to thank you once again for your letter dear cousin, in which I received so much honor.

"With Heartily Greetings."

PART 2 PENNSYLVANIA ARCHIVES (138 Volumes)

INTRODUCTION

More Ream families in America had their "roots" in Lancaster County, Penna., than in any other county in the United States. That fact, along with a desire to record herein everything included in the Penna. Archives pertaining to members of the family for the benefit of student family genealogists of the future that would not have access to the Penna. Archives or time to make a complete check of all the volumes when available, prompted the writer to undertake to develop in Part 2 of this work the highlights of the history of this State along with all references to members of the Ream family contained in the 138 volumes, seldom found complete in most libraries.

The earliest official record of the governing body of the Province of Penna. was known as "Hazard's Journal" by Samuel W. Hazard. A copy is in the Rare Book Dept. of the Library of Congress and probably in the Penna. Historical Society Library, Philadelphia, Pa. and the State Library in Harrisburg, Pa.

Later the Assembly authorized Hazard to develop and publish the Colonial Records and the Penna. Archives. Later issues were cross-referenced by the State as C.R. for Colonial Records and O.S. for original series Penna. Archives, the latter known years later as the First Series.

Years before any thought of this Ream Family publication, the writer had copied all of the index references to Reams from Series 3 through 9 of the Penna. Archives, and I felt a good part of the work was ready to be put in final draft form for the printers. But considerable difficulty arose when it was found that there was no index to the 19 volumes of the 2nd Series. Late in the 19th century an index for this series had been developed in Harrisburg but due to so many errors it was never published. (As late as 1975 the State Library, Harrisburg, Pa., advised still no index to the 2nd Series.) Therefore, in order to make our work complete we checked every volume in the 2nd Series page by page.

We still had volumes of the Colonial Records and 16 volumes of the original Series of the Penna. Archives to check, with chiefly only "context" indexes to assist. In cross-references in later series the State merely referred to the "original Series" as O.S.Vol. so and so; however, in the U.S. Archives this O.S .-- original Series--was identified as the 1st Series merely by a pen note on the spine of the binding. The Colonial Records were plainly marked, but to confuse the researcher working at both the Library of Congress and the U.S. Archives it was discovered that at the Library of Congress the Colonial Records were bound in red with the years indicated on the spine in gold letters just as were the O.S. volumes at the U.S. Archives. In your checking beware of this. Since we were not checking all items in a particular volume, much work had been done before we discovered that we had a lot of material with doubtful page references and we had to retype many pages to get the Penna. Archives material segregated from the Colonial Records.

Another item that has caused some trouble is the fact that in checking the various volumes of a series for proper page references, you will find that a particular volume may not read the same in a different library. For example, volume 10 of the 2nd series as published by the State of Penna. in 1880 was reissued in 1890 with a different number of pages. In some cases where we refer to different issues of the same volume we have made reference to a higher or lower page reference to be used for the reissue volume. However, we are not sure that we have the full story on the reissue volumes, and you are cautioned to be sure to use in your work the page numbers quoted for the original or reissue volume shown at the beginning of each volume quoted herein. Or, if you are working on a file using a reissue volume not reported herein, be sure to make allowance for variation in page numbers from the ones quoted herein.

There is a small book in some libraries titled, "Guide to Published Archives of Penna., Series 1 through 9," by Henry Howard Eddy, Div. of Public Records,

p. 9 "Philadelphia, Dec. 8, 1836.

"Memorial of the American Philosophical Society and of the Historical Society of Philadelphia.

"Recommending the publication of certain Ancient Records.

"To the Honorable, the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

"The Memorial of the American Philosophical Society held at Philadelphia for promoting useful knowledge, and of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania by their Committees for this purpose specifically appointed most respectfully showeth:

"That it is the misfortune of nations of the Old Continent that their early history is lost in the night of time. Excepting the Holy Scriptures, no records have been preserved of the first settlements of mankind. All else beyond a period not very remote is vested in obscurity. Recourse has been had to fabulous traditions made up of fabled Heroes and Demi-gods in abundance, the offsprings of vanity and of ignorance. Of our British ancestors, nothing is known before the invasion of their island by Julius Caesar, of our German forefathers, the noble defence made by the immortal Herman against the legions of Varus, whom he defeated and conquered, is the first authentic account, after which follows a long period of darkness to the time of their great emperor Charlemagne. The ancient history of Asia (the cradle of mankind) engages at this moment the attention of the learned of Europe. For that purpose, Asiatic societies have been formed under royal patronage, both in England and in France. . . . England boasts of the rosetta monumental stone, France of her Egyptian obelisk which once adorned ancient Thebes and is now erected in the midst of her capital, where it is the most attractive object to the admiration of travelers. Unable to penetrate into the future, man loves to inquire into the past, to interrogate his most

remote ancestors, and to learn from their experience how to pursue good and eschew evil. He is disappointed and mortified when instead of historical facts he finds fabulous records and incredible tales, more calculated for the amusement of children than the instruction of mankind."

p. 10 "It is the good fortune of the people of the United States that their early history is not involved in obscurity and doubt. Although of recent origin it already engages the attention of the learned in this country and elsewhere. Historical and antiquarian societies are established in almost every state in the Union and their labours are eagerly sought after and read by our citizens with patriotic pleasure and by foreigners with ardent curiosity.

"The history of Penna. deserves and obtains a particular attention. She alone can boast of a founder whose name will go down to posterity with those of the most celebrated Legislators. Her citizens are descended from two illustrious nations, alike renowned for science and for the glory acquired by arms. . . . [A plea followed to have early records and documents of the State preserved in appropriate publications. Among those documents the most important is undoubtedly minutes of the Provincial Council from the organization of the Colonial government under William Penn down to the revolution. . . . Next to the minutes of Council your Memorialists consider the treaties made with the Indians under the Colonial government to be the most important. They will be of the utmost interest to our descendents and it will be highly honorable to this great state to show to the world that in all the relations of Penna. with the Indian tribes, no recourse has been had to war or to the shedding of human blood, except when we were obliged to combat them as the allies of another nation who employed them for the purpose of subduing our Country. . . .

p. 17 "Document No. 5, CHARTER of the Province of Pennsylvania.

"Charles the Second, By the Grace of God, King of England, Scotland, France and Ireland, defender of the faith, etc.

"To all to whome these presents shall come greeting,

"Whereas our Trustie and well beloved Subject, William Penn, Esq., sonn and heire of Sir William Penn, deceased, out of a commendable desire to enlarge our English Empire, and promote such usefull comodities as may bee of benefit to us and our Dominions, as also to reduce the Savage Natives by gentle and just manners to the love of Civill Societie and Christian Religion hath humbly besought leave of us to transport an ample colonie unto a certaine country hereafter described in the partes of America not yet cultevated and planted, And hath likewise humbley besought our Royall Majestie to give, grant, and confirme all the said Countrey with certaine priviledges and Jurisdiccons requisite for the good Government and saftie of the said countrey and colonie, to him and his heires forever.

"KNOW YEE, therefore, that wee, favouring the petition and good purpose of the said William Penn, and having regard to the memorie and merits of his late father, in divers services and particularly to his conduct, courage and discretion under our dearest brothers, James, Duke of Yorke, in that signall battell and victorie, fought and obteyned against the Dutch fleete, commanded by the Heer Van Opdam in the yeare one thousand six hundred sixtie-five, in consideration thereof our special grace certaine knowledge and meere motion, have given and granted, and by this our present charter, for us, our heires and successors, doe give and grant unto the said William Penn, his heires and assigns all that tract or parte of land in America with all the Islands therein conteyned, as the same is <u>Colonial Records, Vol. 1 (Cont.)</u> bounded on the East by the Delaware River, from twelve miles distance northwards of New Castle Towne unto the three and fortieth degree of Northern latitude if the said River doth extend soo farre northwards. . . . [The document continues 8 pages to page 26.] It was signed--

pp. 29-37 Frame of The Government of the Province of Penna. in America; together with certain laws in England by the Governor and divers freemen of the aforesaid Province . . . Granted and confirmed, 25 April 1682. WILLIAM PENN.

p. 57 FIRST COUNCIL MEETING. At Council, Phila., 1 Jan. 1683. Present Wm. Penn, Proprietary and Governor of Pensilvania and territories annexed, and 16 Councilmen. The Sherifs of each county were called in, viz.: Phila., Chester, Bucks, New Castle, Kent, and Sussex. Matters of procedure for the Council were discussed and voted upon. Adjourned till 12 Jan. 1783.

p. 67 Provincial Council Meeting held Phila., 26 Jan. 1683. Present Wm. Penn, Proprietory Governing Pennsilvania, and Countys assembled (13 Councilmen, including Jas.'Hilliard, and John Moll, and Christopher Taylor).

"The Council ordered a conference to be had with ye whole house of assembly concerning some amendments. This afternoon a conference held in Council concerning the petieon from the assembly relating to Fishing, Fowling, Mines, Quarries and minerally, and a report on fees of officers of ye custom house.

"Christopher Taylor and John Moll ordered by Governor and Council to carry ye old Laws to ye assembly for them to look over." The Council was adjourned to meet again the next day.

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p. 86 "At a Council held at Phila., 25 Aug. 1683. Present, Wm. Penn, Proprietor and Gov., Chr. Taylor, Wm. Clayton, Tho. Holmes, Lasse Cock, Wm. Biles, Jno. Symcock, and Jas. Harrison.

"A complaint made about new Bitts and New England Shillings. Griffith James said that Charles Pickering sent him eight pounds in new Bitts to pay New England men, but they would not take it, therefore, he went to Mary Bartholomew and changed fourty Shillings to make up a sume which otherways he could not have done, and he promised to change it againe and further saith not. Adjourned till 26 Aug. 1683."

p. 93 At Council, Phila., 12 July 1683.

"Margaret Mattson and Yeshro Hendrickson examined and about to be proved Witches; whereupon this board ordered that Neels Matson should enter into a recognizance of fifty pounds for his wiffs appearance before this board the 27th instant. Henrick Jacobson doth the same for his wife.

"At Council, Phila., 11 March 1685. The President announced the death of the late Sovereign King Charles the Second and the proclaiming of James, Duke of York and Albany, JAMES the second of England, Scotland, France and Ireland, King.

p. 100 At Provincial Council, Phila., 31 Jan. 1684.

Present, Wm. Penn (and 10 Councilmen listed).

"A Bill drawn concerning our Government joyning with West Jersey, for all warrants to apprehend all persons by law punishable ordered to be read tomorrow [read and passed by Council the next day and left for a treaty with them].

"A Bill concerning steeling of cattle read at first reading; past in the affirmative."

p. 101 Council Meeting, 1 Feb. 1684:

"Jno. Richardson, The Heathes and Thos. Wilson, made a complaint against this Governmnt, and made their address to ye Ld. Baltimore that they were taxt too Colonial Records, Vol. 1 (Cont.)

much; he thinks Frances Whitewell and Jno. Hilliard are psuaded to the rest.

"Jno. Richardson's land was sued for in Maryland.

"A Bill to Prosecute Persons that put water into rum and was read and past ye first reading in ye affirmative.

"A Bill about arests by proveing his debt, and takeing him in any County, and concerning members of Provll Council and assembly not to be arested before such time allowed them; past a last reading unanimously.

"A Bill that every Court of Justice shall be a Court of Equity as well as Law; also a Provll Court for Quarter Sessions; past on last reading unanimously."

p. 102 At Council, Phila., 2 Feb. 1684.

Present, Wm. Penn, Prop'tr. and Gov'nr; and 12 Councilmen.

"A Bill concerning lands, corne, beef, pork, tobacco, hides, etc.: to goe for current pay; past Nemine Contradicente..."

p. 103 "Quest put: all that are of opinion that halfe of an intestates estate shall goe to ye wife, say yee. Put in ye affirmative that shee shall have no more.

"All that are for having intestates estates divided equally, provided the eldest son shall have halfe of ye reall and personall estate and ye rest to be devided equally amongst the rest of the children, say yee; past in affirmative.

"A Bill to limit the disposall of estates read a last reading: past in the affirmative.

"Ordered that James Harrison, Wm. Welch, Jno. Symcock and Jno. Cann, goe to Kent County with a boat and good attendance, to know what the reasons is that Frances Whitewell, Jno. Hilliard and Jno. Richardson, doe not come up to Councill to give their attendance."

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[p. 27 of Vol. 1, First Series of Penna Archives makes reference to Vol. 1 of Hazard's Annals of Penna., pp. 362-412, apparently an example of confusion that existed in the early day between Penna Archives and Colonial Records. In order to locate the subject matter referenced above as being in Hazard's publication, it is necessary to refer to Penna Colonial Records by the State, Vol. 1. Errors of this nature sent your editor to the Library of Congress, the U.S. Archives and Public Library, Lancaster, Pa., in effort to make references herein more nearly correct.]

p. 118 "At Council held at Sussex the 14th of June, 1684.

"PRESENT: Wm. Penn, Propor and Govr., Tho. Lloyd, Tho. Holmes, Wm. Darvall, Wm. Clark, Ja. Harrison, Luke Watson.

"The Difference between Luke Watson and Jno. Bellamy touching the appraismt formerly Ordered by ye Govr. and Councill, etc. The sayd Luke Watson and Jno. Bellamy agreed before ye Govr. and Councill as followed:

"Adjourned till the 18th of ye June, 1684. Next Council Meeting at <u>New Castle</u>, 18 June 1684, Thomas Lloyd, Pres."

It was decided that Samuel Laud should continue as Sheriff of New Castle County for another year and boundary lines for New Castle County agreed to.

p. 130 At Council, Phila., Pa., 8 Feb. 1685. Present, Thomas Lloyd, Pres., and 13 Councilmen, <u>Colonial Records, Vol. 1 (Cont.)</u> including <u>Tho. Holmes</u>. "A Bill for Persons in Season for their pay in Pork, Tobacco and Corne was past." The Bounds of Bucks Co. established.

p. 312 At Council, Phila., 1 Nov. 1689-90. Present, John Blackwell, Esq., Goverr and 12 Councilmen, including Tho. Lloyd, Samuel Richardson and Wm. Markham.

"After ye Goverr [Wm. Penn] had apologized for haveing his speech in writing and had read ye same, wch follows verbatim, viz:

"Gent, I had not called you together at this unseasonable time of ye year, had not the Extraordinary occasion which I shall acquaint you with all, required it, wch is indeed such wherein as well my owne interes. peace and comfort, as your contentment are concerned. . . . I tould you fformerly (at what time I began to be sensible of some of your ill resentments of me) that I sought not to be your Goverr; But it arose from ye mere good will and Pleasure of ye Proprietor to propose and require that Service of me, by his Comission sent me to New England (with Instructions bearing date ye 12th day of ye 50 mo., called July 1688) which I have heard some of you sayd 'twas but probationary. As I never looked upon it as an inharitance, so I am sure I came on no other terms of my making or accepting then to doo you service at his Request, wch I have Diligently and ffaithfully (according to ye best of my understanding) indeavored to manifest, my conscience not upbrayding me, wch I shall willingly doe in any capacity rather than this Highest."

p. 313 "I came (indeed) with full purpose of returning before ye advance of ye Last Summer's Season, but such has been ye state of Publick affayres as Inginuity would not permitt me to leave ye trust committed to me whilst my master was under any Evill Circumstances (by ye Late Revolutions) without his free consent and Directions about your future Settlement, wch I have now Received. . . .

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p. 314 "And lastly, to lett you know that I quit ye place of Goverr as a man that sought to be discharged from it

"And I doe accordingly very ffreely and fully resigne and Surrendering all ye powers and authorityes in my Commission and Instructions from ye Honorable Proprietor, given me as Goverr, into your hands and acceptance, viz: to ye Provinciall Councill."

p. 315 "And if I may be any way serviceable to him or you whilst I remain in these parts, be pleased to honor me with your Commands. In ye meantime I take my leave of you and pray ye Lord be with you . . .

"The Govr. then withdrew and then was read by ye Secretary two Commissions from Wm. Penn absolute Proprietary of ye Province of Pennsilvania and Countys annexed, To his Trustie beloved Friends, The Provincial Council for ye Province of Pennsilvania, etc. Greeting: Both given at London, 25 July 1689, over signature of Wm. Penn. The Council being left to decide which one they preferred. . . ."

p. 317 At Council, 2 Nov. 1689-90 Present 12 Commissioners including Tho. Lloyd and Wm. Markham, Sc.

"It was debated wch of ye two Commissions that was Read yesterday should be put in Execution, and Resolved unanimously that ye Commission wch Impowred y Council to be Deputy Goverr. or Lieutenant to be accepted; accordingly, ye Council elected Thos. Lloyd President.

"Then was Read this following clause in a Letter from the Proprietary to his Commissioners of the same, viz:

"Whereas, there is 600 lb. due to me which has been neglected or refused to be paid, if ye Province will build me a house in the city for my reception, upon my Lott, Leaving me to make additions hereafter, if there be occasion, I hope to be there as soon as that is finished. I have sent Capt. Wm. Markahm my Model or stock, ye three Plantations of my Three Children, with each two Hundred pounds, wch comes to ye sum, I shall Colonial Records, Vol. 1 (Cont.)

take it well, and this may be sooner and safer done yn returning me yt sum, tho' here it would have done me most good. . . ."

The Council unanimously accepted the Commission making the Provincial Council Deputy Govr. or Lieut. and chose Thomas Lloyd to be President.

p. 318 In a letter of instructions from Wm. Penn dated London, 25 July 1689 we find the following:

"1. That things be transacted in my name, viz: absolute Proprietary of Pennsilvania.

"2. That all Commissions signed by me and sealed here with ye Lesser Seal, be taken for sufficient warrts and directions for passing them under ye broad seal, without any other authority.

"3. To collect ye Laws that are in Being and send them over to me in a stitcht book, by ye very first opportunity, which I have so often and so much in vaine desired.

"5. That fines be in proportion both of ye fault and ability of ye party, yt so they may be paid.

"11. That care be taken of ye Roads and Highways in ye Country, that they may be streight and Commodious for travelers; for I understand they are turned about by ye planters, wch is a mischief yt must not be endured.

"12. Rule ye meek meekly, and those that will not be so Ruled rule with authority; and God Almighty prosper all honest and prudent Endeavours."

pp. 371-72 At Council, Phila., 10 May 1693. Present, Benj. Fletcher and Wm. Markham, Esqr., Lieut. Govr.

"Humphrey Waterman had the Oaths and Test, and oath of a Justice of the Peace for the Countie of Phila. administered unto him.

"His Ercell [Benj. Fletcher] did propose the necessitie of building a fort in some convenient place upon the River Delaware, to command the Channel for the Securitie and defence of trade and the Inhabitants. . . Put to a vote and carried in the affirmative."

Afternoon, 10 May 1693.

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"Some Indians from the upper part of the River being come to Towne to pay their respects to his Excell., His Excell. sent for them and gave them audience. Lawrence Cock, Esq., their Interpreter.

"Their Speaker laid a belt of Wampum att his Excell. feet, saying: 'This Belt of Wampum came to us from the Indians of Virginia and Maryland, for a token pf peace between them and us and now we lay it before your Excell. in token that wee desire peace with all the Indians that belong to anie English plantations in America; and desire your Excell. to persuade the Senecas from doing them any harme in their hunting (as was done to some of them last summer) that they may hunt in safety.'

"His Excell. did answer: That he was shortlie to return to New Yorke; That their Majesties have made him Governor of Pennsilvania and New Castle and putt all the forces of East, and West Jersey under his Command and hee was come here to publish it, But so scone as hee shall returne to New Yorke, will go to Albany and there meet the five Nations, and have conference with them, and that he would enjoine the Senecas and all the other Indians to peace and friendship with them and all other Indians belonging to the English provinces in America. Therefore, they should not doubt his protection whilst they are of good behavior. . .

"The speaker sayes: 'We are verie thankful to your Excell. for appointing one [Lieut. Govr. Markham] over us in your absence who hath done good to us formerlie and whom we have known a long time;' and in token thereof Laid down some Bever at his Excell. feet.

"The speaker again says: 'We are now glad to know our Governor; when the Quakers governed sometimes one man and sometimes another pretended to be Governor and when wee were in feare of the French and their Indians, and inclined to make warr with them, they would not encourage us, nor make anie preparations themselves, nor give us assistance; although we are a small number of Indians, yet wee are men and know fighting. We hope yor Excell. will encourage us in it;' and gave some raccoons."

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p. 373 "Hiss Excell. told them That in February, Last, theFrench and Indians did invade the Mohoggs Countrey, and in three days he was got to Schenactady with force sufficient to have destroyed them all; that they stole away in a stormie night. But were sufficiently beat the day before, and the most of their officers killed. Also that he was a man of armes and not of the Quakers principle; That he had served their majesties in their army before he came hither and wold now goe as farr as any man to protect them, and all that do owne their majesties authoritie, as well Indians as Christians.

"His Excell. told them He hoped they will give him a proofe of their Manhood and valor by sending some of their best men up to Albany to assist our people agt. the enemy. That here they were in safety, for the French and their Indians cannot come near to hurt them, unless they come over him, which they should never doe.

"The Speaker said that some of them had been drunk; His Excell. must pardon it and not putt them in the stocks for they knew no better and the Christians did sell them the Liquor; and gave two deer skins.

"His Excell. Replied that their Brethern at Albany were not of their mind; in February last some of them being drunck one killed another, and they came to me and prayed that I should discharge the selling of Rum to the Indians during the warr, or that I wold punish such as were drunk.

"The Speaker, we profess wee will be one Heart and true to the English and to one another; We submit ourselves to your Excell. and if ever you find us false, you shall cutt us all to pieces, making signs all over his body; and gave some deer skins.

"His Excell. Replyd he was glad to see them so dutifull and wold give them protection accordinglie. That he wold order something for them in testimony of his satisfaction with their friendship and submission."

pp. 381-2 At Council, Phila., 18 July, 1693. Present, Wm. Markham, Lt. Govnr., and 3 Councilmen and Pat Robinson, Secry. . .

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Colonial Records, Vol. 1 (Cont.)

"Robert Brett Harring made known to the Lt. Govnr. and Council that he had a Comission from his Excell. Govr. Fletcher, for Clark [clerk] of the market of Phila. Requested that they wold establish suteable fees to the said office.

"Ordered, That the Clark of the market for the sd. towne shall and may receive for all cattle killed for the market sixpence p. head; for everie sheepe, calf, lamb, two pence p. head, for everie Hogg or shoot [a pig or young hog] brought to the market or cut outt for sale there, three pence, AND that nothing shall be paid for whil the Countrie people bring to towne readie killed; and yt hee shall and may receive for weights and measures, one pennie for each great or small.

"And they also Ordered, that all persons concerned should duely pay the Clark of the market the above said rates; and that all Justices, Sheriffs, Constables and other officers be ayding and assisting to him in the Execuon of his said office."

pp. 391-2 At Council, Phila., 1 Oct. 1693, Wm. Markham, Lt. Govnr. and 5 Councilmen.

"The Lt. Govnr. produced a letter received from his Excell., Benj. Fletcher, the Chief Governor, wherein he ordered him to summons a Council, which was then convened accordinglie. The letter read:

"Sir, I have appointed the first Wednesday in October next for the meeting of Commissioners from all the neighbouring Colonies and provinces, att New York, to concerte and agree upon a Quota of men and money for the <u>defence of the frontiers</u>. You have seen their maties Commands to mee as Governor of pennsilvania for that purpose, you are therefor to gett the Council or a Quorum, together, to consider of a fit person for pennsilvania and the Countrie of New Castle. Signed Benjn. Fletcher, dated att fort William Henry; the 23 7br, 1693. . .

"It was this day, by the Lt. Govnr., with the advice of the Councill, Agreed, That the <u>Regulation of</u> the <u>Market of Philadelphia</u> should be as follows, viz: Colonial Records, Vol. 1 (Cont.)

"1. That the place for the markett be in the High Street, wher the second street crosses it and in no other place.

"2. That the market be kept there two days in the week weeklie, viz: Wednesday and Saturday.

"3. That all sorts of provisions brought to this town for sale, viz: flesh, fish, tame foull, butter, eggs, cheese, herbs, fruits and roots, etc. be sold in the aforesaid market place . . . and in case anie of the said provisions be exposed to sale in anie other place in this town . . . they shall be forfeited, the one half to the poor of philadelphia, the other half to the Clark of the market. . . .

"7. That the Clark of the Market shall and may receive for all cattle killed for the market six pence p. head . . ." etc.

p. 397 "PROVINCE OF PENNSILVANIA, AND COUNTREY OF NEW CASTLE

"Minutes of Councill in the Assembly, ANNO Ret, Rae Willielmi et Marie Angliae, etc., Quinto.

p. 398 15th May 1693

"Att a Councill held at Philadelphia on a Moonday, the 15th of May, 1693, Present: His Excell., BENJAMIN FLETCHER, etc., William Markham, Esq., Liuet Governor [and six Councilmen] . . .

"The persons Returned for Representatives being in number Twenty, 'viz: foure for the County of Philadelphia, three for the County of Bucks, three for the County of Chester, foure for the Countie of New Castle, three for the County of Kent, and three for the Countie of Sussex, came to wait upon his Excell. in Councill, and were admitted.

"Six of them took the oaths appointed by act of parliment to be taken instead of the oaths of allegiance and Supremacie, and subscribed the test; the other fourteen did subscribe the declaraon of fidelitie, profession of the Christian faith, and test.

"After which his Excell. did speak to them as foloweth, viz:

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"Gentlemen: Before you goe to the choice of your speaker, I think it convenient to let you see by what authoritie you are convened; My reason is because I observed some commissionated by your proprietor [Mr. Penn] did withdraw themselves att the publishing of their Maties Comission; others have refused to act under that power and manie of you wer absent att that time.

"Then the Clark, by his Excell. order did read the Commissions, upon which his Excell. continued to say:

"Gentlemen: You see by the clauses of these two patents relating to Assemblies, that you are all obliged, befor you can be qualified to sitt, to take these oaths prescribed by Law, yet I have some Latitude in my Instructions, which enables me to admit such to act in the Government as for conscience sake refuse an oath and are yet willing to make their Protestation and Subscribe the Test, etc.

"It has ever been my endeavor and desire to act soe as that all people under my care might be in love with their maties' Government and Laws, and am therefor willing to allow such to sitt in this house of representatives, as are chosen by the freeholders of the rexive Counties, who not being free to take an Oath, are willing to perform the other obligations; Provided this be entered in the Journalls of your house as an act of grace from their majesties, and not taken as a president.

"Gentlemen: I must add if there be anie amongst you who doe not take an oath whom you cannot own as members of yor Comunion, but may, under that pretence, shelter themselves from what the Law requires, pray let me know them, otherwise you will bring a blemish upon yourselves by Countenancing Hypocrites. And in this matter I expect you will be plain and answer for such men, if anie there be, who for private ends put on a false dress. . .

p. 399 The Clark to keep the Journalls of your votes and otherproceedings; That you cause him particularlie to enter in his book that your being admitted to Colonial Records, Vol. 1 (Cont.)

sitt upon Subscriptions without an oath, is an act of grace, and not to be insisted on as a right, and for the future taken in president [as a precedent].

"Your Clark must also take care to give me a copie of everie day's votes and minutes the night following.

"Then bid them withdraw to some Convenient place and choose their Speaker, whom he would be readie to see morrow morning.

p. 402 At an Assembly held att Phila., Wed., 17 May 1693.

"TO BENJN. FLETCHER, Esqr., Capt. Generall and Governor in Chiefe in and over the province of pennsilvania and Countrey of New Castle, etc.

"The humble address of the freemen of the said province andCountrey of New Castle, etc. in Assembly mett, sheweth:

"That since it Hath pleased the king and gueen that the absence of the proprietarie's personall attendance in this government should be supplied by thee, or by thy Liuet. [Lieutenant], wee, the Representatives of the freemen of this province, territories, with due respect to the power of the Comission and heartie acknowledgement of thy good will, care and tenderness to us, doe readily acquiesce with the kings pleasure therein, earnestly beseeching that our procedure in Legislation may be according to the usuall method and Laws of this government, founded upon the late king's Letters, patents, which we humblie conceive to be yet in force; But att present I must tell you, Gentle., you are verie much mistaken in alledging yor Laws to be in force, and at the same time, in yor present station, to desire a confirmaon of ym. [Balance of p. 402 discusses the point raised by the Assembly.] "

His Excell. goes on to say:

"If the Laws by virtue of Mr. Penn's Charter be of force to you, and can be brought into competition with the great seal of England that comanded me hither, I have no business here. There is therefor nothing left for you but to own the king's authority, or disown it. There cannot be two establishments of government, in

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Colonial Records, Vol. 1 (Cont.)

opposition to one another, I wold have you satisfied in that point . . .

"By your former constitution the people did present to the Gov. a double number of Sheriffs, Justices of the peace, . . .

"I do understand that it is the opinion of the Learned in the Law that the Revenue of the Corwn; The Making of Laws; The Power of Life and Death; arming of the subjects and waging of warr; which wer granted to Mr. Penn, are the Regalia of the Crown and cannot be demised; as in case of an entailment they are entailed upon the successor; you have heard of an entailed estate; the father is only tenant for life and cannot demise it from the son; if he grant it for longer than life, it is void, and the son shall recover his estate. If there be anie Lawyers among you, they can informe you King Charles' grant of these things might be good to you during his life because he might maintain his own act; But since his death they are become utterlie void. I wold have you advised of this point. These Laws and that Model of Government is dissolved and att an end; you must halt between two opinions. The kings power and Mr. Penn's must not come in the scales together."

p. 404 His Excell., B. Fletcher, still speaking: "The Constituon of their Maties govermt and that of Mr. Penn's are in a direct opposition the one to the other"

pp. 405-6 "But in yor former Law book I find sundrie Laws that are altogether repugnant to the Laws of England and seem to supersede them, viz: the 9th Law, Sodomy and Bestiality; 10th Rape; 16th, burning of houses; 96th, stealing of hoggs and other cattell; 109th, estates of persons deceased; 117th, manslaughter; 116th, marriages; 121st, Mr. Penn's person.

p. 407 At Council, Phila., 18 May 1693, His Excell. Benjamin Fletcher, etc., Wm. Markham, Esqr., Lt. Governor and 6 Councilmen.

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At this Council meeting and numerous others thru Feb. 1695 the Chief subjects and controversy between Governor Fletcher, the Council and the Assembly was the nature of Laws required to govern the province of Pennsylvania under the new management.

pp. 472-473 At Council, Phila., 26 March 1695, Wm. Markham, Lt. Governor.

WILLIAM PENN RETURNS

"The Lieutenant Governor said to this effect: Gentlemen: I am glad of this opportunitie to acquaint you that I have latelie received their maties Letters patents by which they have been graciouslie pleased to restore the proprietor to the Government of this province of Pennsilvania and territories and that the proprietor has been pleased to send me a Commission to be Governor thereof under him. . . .

"Then the Lt. Governor said:

Gentlemen: I desire you will attend the publishing of their Maties Letters patents which will be the <u>Last</u> <u>Act</u> you can doe as their Maties Council <u>under His</u> <u>Excellie Governor Fletcher</u>; whereby you will pet the more express your readie obedience to their maties commands. Soe bid you Heartilie farewell.

"Their Maties King William and Queen Mary's Letters patents restoring Wm. Penn, Esq. proprietor of Pennsilvania to the government of the said province:

"William and Mary, by the Grace of God, King and Queen of England, Scotland, France and Ireland, defenders of the faith, etc.

"Whereas, upon informacon that by reason of great miscarriages in the government of our province of Pennsilvania in America and the <u>absence of the proprietor</u>, the same was fallen into disorder, and confusion . . But there was also great want of provision for the guard and defence of our sd. province agt. our enemies, whereby it was apprehended that our sd. province and the adjacent colonies were much in danger of being Lost from the Crown of England . . . during this time of Warr, Wee did find it absolutelie necessarie to take the government thereof into our hands . . . and did thereupon . . . the 21st day of October in the

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fourth yeare of our reign Constitute and appoint our trustie and well beloved Benjamin Fletcher, Esgr., our Captain General and Governor in Chief of our province of New York . . . over our said province of Pennsilvania and Countrie of New Castle . . . and whereas Humble application has been made unto us by our trusty and well beloved Wm. Penn, Esg., proprietor of said province of Pennsilvania that he be restored to the administration of the government thereof as formerlie

"And whereas, the said proprietor Has given us good assurance that hee will take care of the government of our said province and territories, and provide for the saftie and Securitie thereof that in him Lyes, Wee have thereupon thought fitt to restore him to the administration of the government . . . [the Commission to Benjamin Fletcher declared void] . . .

"All persons whom it may concern are to take notice and govern themselves accordinglie, under paine of our Highest displeasure . . .

"Witness outselves att Westminister, the 20th day of August, in the Sixth year of our reign.

"By writt of privie Seal with the great Seal appended in yellow wax. PIGGOTT

"Indorsed a duplicate of the grant to William Penn, Esgr. PIGGOTT"

"Proceedings of Council from Dec. 18, 1700 to May 16, 1717.

p. 13 "At a Council meeting Phila. 5 Jan. 1700 a petition subscribed by Fr. Daniel Pastorius by order and in behalf of the German corporation was read: 'Setting forth that by the proprietaries advice and direction they had seated themselves so close together that they scarce have room to live but especially that the proprietry by his Charter in the yr. 1689 had granted several considerable privileges to the Germans of the said town (Germantown) by making them a corporation by virtue of which they looked upon themselves exempted from the jurisdiction of ye County Council of Phila. and from all taxes and levies of the same, having a Court of Record and Magistrate within themselves Colonial Records, Vol. 2 (Cont.)

request that the Governor by way of explanation would declare that they are exempted from all the said charges and County levies.'..It was then ordered that about a score of the most considerable inhabitants in ye lower end of the Front and Second St. should meet the Governor at 4 in the afternoon. Seventeen of the inhabitants appeared and the subject matter was discussed, but they showed no inclination to comply with what the Governor thought might be reasonably be expected of them and they were thereafter dismissed."

p. 15

"At a Council held in Phila. 23 Feb. 1701," an important treaty and agreement was reached with:

"Connodaghtoh, King of the Sasquehannah Minquays of Conestogo Indians, Wopaththa (alias Opessah), King of the Shawanese, Weehinjough, Chief of the Ganawese, inhabiting at the head of Potowmeek; also Ahoakassongh, brother to the Emperour or great King of the Onondagoes of the five nations, having arrived in town two days ago, with several others of their great men, and Indian Harry for their interpreter, with some of the young people, women and children to the number of about forty in the whole after a treaty and several speeches, the following articles were solemnly agreed on:"

Complete text of treaty for the purpose of promoting peace and tranquility recorded on p. 15 through 17. The last item read:

p. 17

"The said Wm. Penn doth hereby promise, for himself, his heirs and successors, yt he and they will at all times show themselves true friends and brothers to all and every of ye said Indians by assisting them with the best of their advices, directions and counsels and will in all things just and reasonable befriend them, they behaving themselves as aforesaid and submitting to the laws of the Province in all

things, as the English and other Christians therein do. To which they, ye said Indians hereby agree and oblige themselves and their posterity forever.

"In witness whereof, the said parties have as a confirmation, made mutual presents to each other: The Indians in five parcels of skins, and the said Wm. Penn in several English goods and merchandise, as a binding pledge of the promises, never to be broken or violated, and as a further testimony thereof, have also to these presents sett their hands and seals the day and year above written (23 Feb. 1701). - -. . . .

Henry Sprogel, this the contrivance or plotting of Daniel Fulkner, in ve last adjourned Court held for the County of Phila. the 13th of January, by means of a Fictis Juris as they term it (wherewith your Petitr. is altogether unacquainted) hath gott a

"A Petition to his Honour Chas. Gookin, Esgr., Ltt. Govr. of ye Province of Pennsylvia C.C. and his Honable Council by Johannes Jawert Sheweth . . .

"That whereas your Petitr., by a Lettr of Attorney, a copy whereof is here enclosed, has been Imporvid together with Daniel Falkner [and Johannes Kelpius, now deceased] Jointly to administer a certain Estate in this Province, consisting of 25,000 acres of land and belonging to some persons who live in Germany as by the said copy more fully doth appear; and seeing of late our Jno. Henry Sprogel, upon his arrival from Holland, first told your Petitr. that he had bought ye said Estate of those persons residing in Germany, but afterwards, Denying it, again prepared to buy ye same of your Petitr. [who is a partner thereof] and his Joynt Attorney, Danll Falkner, and when your Petitr. could not accept of his terms he offering a very considerable summ, then he promised one hundd pounds to your Petitr. put up for himself; But your Petitr. not willing to betray his trust, broke off: and so before he was aware, and without ve least of his knowledge, the said Sprogel under a Pretense of a Dept owing him by the said Falkner, under hand solely by the connivance and collusion of ye said Daniel Falkner, who nevertheless, was not Inabled to Act without your Petitr. ejected the said Germans out of ve sd. their Estate at the last County Court held ve 12th of Janry. not giving any notice thereof to your Petitr., or any other person concerned, and, besides, he ye said Sprogel and Falkner, to make this their abominable Plott to bear, did fee all the known attornies, or Lawyers of this Province, either to speak for you, or to be silent in Court, in order to deprive your Petitr. of all advice in Law, even so much as to find none to signify this, your Petitr.

"Therefore, your Petitr. most Earnestly intreats your Honour ye Govr. and Council to take ye Premises into your serious consideration and for ye preventing of ye scandal, which by ye above menconed treacherous Plott, between Sprogel and Falkner will be caused to be cast upon ye Proprys Governmt and Courts of Justice of this Province, in several parts of Germany and where your Petitr's Imployers and Copartners do dwell. To put a timely stop to ye Wasting of Timber on ye aforesaid Estate which ye said Sprogel hath already begun to make and to lett or hinder both his receiving of the Rents or arrears of Rents, due to the said Persons in Germany; and more especially the selling of the whole, or any Tract or parcel of the above sd. Estate till your Petitr's Imployers and Copartners in Germany may be acquainted with ye foul and unanswerable fact of Danl Falkner, their untrusty attorney and

letter may be had from them concerning this business and your Petitr. not only for himself but also in the behalf of those in Germany, shall ever acknowledge this, your Justice and favor, and pray as in Duty bound. JNO. JAWERT"

"And the mentioned attempt being so heinous that it was scarce accounted credible, they were called in and examined upon ye circumstances of the case, by which it appeared that David Lloyd was principal agent and contriver of the whole, and it was affirmed that he had for his pay a thousand acres of Benjamin Furley's land, which he, the said Benjamin was so weak as to intrust Sprogel with the Disposal of.

"Ordd. hereupon, that notice to be given by all ye conveyances that may be to the francefort Society of Purchasers, yt they forthwith send full powers to reverse ye judgmt. according to law."

FRANCIS DANIEL PASTORIUS was considered a great leader in the interest of his fellow immigrants to America in the early pioneer days and visitors to Germantown, Phila., Pa., will observe a large monument there in his honor.

p. 449 "At a Council held Phila. 28 May 1709

"Present Cha. Gookin, Lt. Gov. [10 Esgrs.]

"The Govr. being yesterday returned from New York, informed the Board that the Intended Expedition against Canada, with the measures to be concerted by the several Govrs. who mett on that occasion in New York in order to carry it on, had thus long detained him from returning.

"That now upon his return he had immediately called them to lay before them what he had rec'd relating to this Expedition and then communicated her Majesties Letter in these words, all wrote in the Secry. of State's own hand. ANNE R.

"Trusty and well beloved, we Greet you well. Whereas, we are fitting out an Expedition with great Expense, for the security of our subjects under your Goymt., from the neighborhood of the french at Canada, which hath been very troublesome to them of late years, according to certain proposals laid before us by our trusty and well beloved Colonel Vetch. and pursuant to many applications that have been made to us by our subjects, who have suffered very much from the french in that neighborhood, we do strictly require and command you to be assisting to this our Expedition, after the manner that the said Coll. Vetch shall propose to you in Our name, and that you look upon those parts of his Instructions which relate to you and the Governmt. under your care and which we have ordered him to communicate to you in the manner as if they were our positive commands directed to yourself, and that you pay the same obedience them.

"And so We bid you farewell. Given at our Court at St. James the second day of March 1708 - 9 in the seventh year of our Reign. By her Majesty's Command SUNDERLAND.

"DIRECTED:

"To our trusty and well beloved, the Governer, Lieut Govenr., Commander in Chief, for the time being of our Province of Pennsylvania in America. Under the privy seal flying.

"The Govr. also laid before the board a copy of her Majesty's Instructions to Coll. Vetch, dated the 28th of ffebry., signed by the Queen attested under the said Coll.'s own hand by which Instructions this Province is required to raise one hundred and fifty men to be joined to 800 from N. York including the four regular Companies, 350 from Connetticutt, and 200 from Jersey making in the whole 1500 men to be

divided into four Battalions, each Battalion to have one of the four Regular Companies mixed or incorporated in it to be commanded by the Capt. as Coll. whose Co. is so incorporated in it and under him by the respective officers."

Page 450 and 451 included such items as follows:

p. 450 "1. Quota of N. York Govt. be ready at Albany by middle of May and all troops be furnished with arms from the magazine at N. York and 3 months Provisions gott ready to be transported and lodged at Wood Creek or elswhere; for security of which he shall in conjunction with the Govmt. of Conn. and Pennsylvania cause to be built a large wooden Store House, as also six or more large boats that will carry 60 men each for the transportation of their heavier stores by water and also contract with the five nations to make with all speed as many canoes as will be wanted for this Expedition.

Ye Govr. of New York shall engage the "2. 5 Nations and River Indians to joyn with all their fighting men, and promise them a good Reward and all fitting encouragement to all gentlemen and others who shall offer themselves to go as Volunteers in this service.

"3. Ye Govr. of Conn., Govr. of Penna., to have their men ready by middle of May at farthest.

"4. The Govr. of New England and Rhode Island be strictly commanded to raise at least 1200 of their best men and give all fitting encouragement to others who hsall go Volunteers and to have in readiness a sufficient number of Transports, with 3 months Provisions to be ready by the middle of May, upon the arrival of the fleet from England and that for their greater encouragement, arms and ammunition are now sent.

> "5. Coll. Vetch with concurrence of the

Govr. of N. England shall contact with ship carpenters for building ten or more flatt bottomed boats to carry 60 men each for landing troops and with proper persons to furnish 8 months provisions, to be left at Quebec and <u>Montreal</u> in case the forces have success."

p. 451

"6. Tis Ordered that a <u>general Embargo</u> be laid upon all ships and <u>vessels in the ports of this</u> <u>Govmt.</u> and therefore, that the collrs. of her Majesty's customs, naval and other officers in the several Ports shall not in their respective offices clear any vessel outward bound to sea, till such time as further orders shall be given by this Board. Ordered that the Mayor of the city of Phila. forthwith solemnly publish the Printed Proclamation issued by Coll. Nicholson and Coll. Vetch countersigned by the Lt. Govr. of this Province, in the most public place of the city according to the usual form, and that the same be also published in the <u>other Counties of this Govmt.</u>

"7. The Govr. laid before the Board a Letter which he had rec'd from the Sheriff at New Castle pointing out the necessity of furnishing them the stores of ammunition as might prove requisite for defense of the place above and below and also requesting that the Govr. would forthwith issue necessary military commands. Resolved that this letter also be referred to the assembly when they meet.

"Ye Honorable Chas. Gookin, Esqr., Lieut. Govr. [and 10 other members of the Council] met at Phila. 2 June 1709.

"The Secry. was sent to the House of Representatives who mett not before this day to require their attendance immediately and being come, the Govr. spoke to them as follows: Colonial Records, Vol. 2 (Cont.)

p. 452 "Gentlemen:

"The Queen for the good of her subjects of these northern Provinces, has fitted out an Expedition with great expense for retaking Newfoundland and for the Conquest of Canada and has intrusted Coll. Vetch with her Majesty's Letters and Instructions to the Respective Governrs to agree on proper measures for the putting her Majesty's Design in execution. Boston, Rhode Island and <u>Conetticutt</u> have outdone Her Majesty's Expectations and I hope you will not be wanting in your Duty.

"The Quota for this Province is 150 men besides officers who must be Victualled and paid as others are: The Charge I believe will amount to about f4000, perhaps, it may seem difficult to raise such number of men in a Countrey where most of the Inhabitants are of such principles as will not allow them the use of arms; but if you will raise the sum for the support of Govmt. I don't doubt getting the number of men desired whose principles allow the use of ym., and Commanders may be appointed so to manage this affair that this Countrey may be satisfied, their money is not applied to any other END than this Expedieon. I must desire you also to consider the present circumstance of the three lower Counties [New Castle, Kent and Sussex upon the Delaware FVR, Ed.]; you are not now falsely alarmed; I find them ready and willing to defend the Countrey, for they look on themselves as a frontier to you tho' a weak one, and if they perish, your Destruction in all probability will not be far of;

"Therefore in my opinion, it is your interest they be furnished with all things necessary to oppose the Enemy.

"I have only to add that as all private affairs ought to be postponed to her Majesty's immediate service, so it will not consist with my Duty to hearken to any proposals, or enter

on any business with you till her Majesty's commands are complied with, and therefore, I desire you will give this affair all possible Dispatch." [Chas. Gookin, Esgr., Lieut. Govr., 1709-Ed.]

p. 533 "At Conestoga June 18, 1711. Lieut Gov. Gookin speaking to the Indians [by Indian Harry ve Interpreter] said in part:

> "Govr. Penn upon all occasions is willing to show how great a Regard he bears to you therefore has sent this small present [a forerunner of a greater to come next spring] to you and hath required me to acquaint you that he is about to settle some people upon the branches of Potowmack, and doubts not but the same mutual friendship which has all along as brothers, past betwixt the Inhabitants of this Govermt. and you will also continue betwixt you and these he is about to settle; he intends to present five belts of Wampum to the five Nations and one to you of Conestogo, and require your friendship to the Palatines settled near Pequa. To which they answered:

"That they are extremely pleased with the Govrns speek, but as they are at present in Warr with the TOSCORORES and other Indians, they think that place not safe for any Christians, and are afraid if any damage should happen to these the blame will be laid upon them, that settlement [on the branches of the Potomac] being situate betwixt them and those ar Warr with them. As to the Palatines, they are in their opinion safely seated, but earnestly desire that the Death of LETORE may be now adjusted for they shall not think themselves safe until it is."

SASUNNAN their Chief SCOLLITCHY EALOCHELAN and eleven others waited on the Govr. and he being seated with the Council, SCOLLITCHY, their speaker, addressed the Govr. by Interpreter." [Continued on pp. 547-8-9.]

p. 553 Council Meeting Phila. 23 July 1712, a speech of a Conestogoe Indian Chief by Indian Harry Interpreter refering to first agreement with Govr. Penn that they should all live as brothers and friends and naming many complaints about animals of settlers running about and damaging their crops, etc., and requesting relief therefrom.

"The Chiefs of the sd. Indians being met to confer and treat with the Governor, Peter BIZALION was sworn to interpret trully and faithfully in the Delaware Indian Tongue what Colonial Records, Vol. 3 (Cont.)

should pass between the Govr. and Council on the one hand and the Indians on the other."

A very successful meeting was held through the 2nd day 19 July 1717.

p. 24 "Their presents being laid upon the Ground before the Indians, the Governor proceeded to tell them. . . [1 thru 5] . . . [included much concerning peace between the Indians and the settlers as well as peace between the Indian tribes. Ed.]

> "And the Governor hereupon did promise on his part to Encourage them in peace, to Nourish and to Support them like a true friend and Brother.

> "To all which the several Chiefs and their Great Men presently assented, it being agreed that in Testimony thereof they should rise up and take the Governour by the Hand, which accordingly they did with all possible marks of friendship in their countenance and behavior."

p. 28 "Council at Phila. ye 17 Sept. 1717, present Honable Wm. Keith, Esqr., Lieut. Govr. [and 8 Councilmen].

p. 29

"The Governour opened to the Board that great numbers of foreigners from Germany, strangers to our Language and Constitution, having lately been imported into this Province daily dispersed themselves immediately after Landing without producing any Certificates from whence they came or what they were: and as they seemed to have first landed in Britain and afterwards to have left it without any License from the Government, or so much as their knowledge, so in the same manner they behaved here, without making the least application to himself or to any of the Magistrates; that as this practice might be of very dangerous consequence, since by the same method any number of foreigners

from any nation whatever, as well Enemys as friends, might throw themselves on us; the Governour therefor thought it requisite that this matter should be considered by the Board and accordingly it was considered and tis ordered thereupon that all the masters of vessels who have lately imported any of these foreigners be summoned to appear at this Board to render an acct. of the number and characters of their passengers respectively from Britain; that all those who are already landed be required by a Proclamation, to be issued for that purpose, to report within the space of one month to some Magistrate, particularly to the Recorder of this City, to take such Oaths appointed by Law as are necessary to give assurances of their being well affected to his Majesty [King Charles, II; see p. 35 Ed.] and his Governmnt; but because some of these foreigners are said to be Menonites, who cannot for conscience sake take any oaths, that those persons be admitted upon their giving any equivalent assurances in their own way and manner and that the Naval Officer of this Post be required not to admit any inward vessell to an Entry, until the Master shall first give an exact list of all their passengers imported by them."

[Apparently, this requirement for entry was not fully complied with at least until 1727 when lists were first noted in I. D. Rupp's "30,000 immigrants." Ed.]

p. 29

"At Council Phila. ye 9th Sept. 1717, 'List of Palatines Exhibited.'

"Capt. Richmond, Capt. Towor, Capt. Eyers waited upon the Board with the List of the Palatines they had imported here from London; By which List it appeared that Capt. Richmond had imported 164, Capt. Towor 91, and Capt.

"At Council, Phila. 15 Feb 1717. Wm. Keith, Lt. Govr. [and 5 Councilmen[present. The Governor advised the Board that the Proprietors Commission of Property had lately reported in writing:

"That certain persons from Maryland had, under Colour of Rights from the province, lately Surveyed out Lands not far from Conestogo and near the thickest of our settlements to the great Disturbances of the Inhabitants there, and that for preventing the Disorders which might arise from such Incroachments, they desired that magistrates and proper officers should be appointed in those parts in order to Prevent the like for the future.

"Therefor the Board was of the unanimous opinion that these procedures being a Bold and unjustifiable attack upon the proprietor's rights and possessions that have never been hereto disputed, the consequences of which must necessarily be injurious to the settlements of those parts of the Country, and very much disturb our friends, the Indians in that neighborhood, therefor some speedy or effectual measures ought to be taken to prevent these Inconveniences.

"And Whereas Collo. French (of New Castle, Chester Co., Pa.) had heretofore shown a zeal equal to his capacity to serve the Proprietor in all such cases: It is therefor proposed that he should be appointed by Commission from Governor Ranger and Keeper of the Marches of this Province as well as of the Lower Counties, on such terms as he and the Commissioners can agree, with full Power to apprehend and bring

before the Governor all such Invaders, in order to be proceeded against according to LAW.

"It is also further resolved, That magistrates shall be appointed in the said Parts as soon as the names of the most fitt persons residing there can be had."

"At Council Phila. 3 Nov. 1718, Wm. Keith, Lt. Govr. [and 10 named Councilmen] present. The Governor spoke:

"Gentlemen The important occasion of your meeting at this time is that I May communicate unto you, in the most decent and respectful manner the accounts which I have just received, of our late Lord proprietor and Governor in Chief, the Great Mr. Penn's Death. . . ."

p. 59

- p. 122 "At Council held at Conestogoe 7-6-1721.

"Govr. Keith spoke to the Chief of the Indian Nations regarding hunting grounds north and south of the Potowmeck, respecting the Virginias Governors request that the five nations refrain from hunting in the smaller woods area to the south for the benefit of Virginia Indians.

An investigation followed and the Secretary of the Council reported:

"That he finds most of the Petitioners passed over Schuylkill from the Settlement on the Eastern Side of it, which were considerable before there were any of note on the Western side so high up the River and accounting themselves to be still in Philadelphia County as they had been before they passed the River. They were accordingly taxed in the township formerly called <u>Mahanatawny</u> but now <u>Amity</u> Township there being no practicable road or communication between those parts and Chester.


"The Board was of the unanimous opinion and ordered the Commissioners and assessors of Chester County to forbear to claim those Inhabitants who being settled on or near the Western Side of Schuylkill have hitherto been reported part of Amity Township and as such have been and are taxed in the County of Philadelphia as formerly, without any further molestation from the County of Chester, or any officers by authority of the Court of Commissioners of said County."



"The Council being met, upon the arrival of Major Patrick Gordon with a Commission from Springett Penn, Esq. with the assent of Mrs. Hannah Penn and His Majesties Royal approbation thereof to be Lieutenant and Deputy Governour of the Province of Pensilvania and lower counties of New Castle, Kent and Sussex upon Delaware as in the said approbation expressed. . . and Sir William Keith being well satisfied with the authority of the said Commission declared he had no objection thereunto and immediately ordered the Keeper of the Great Seal to affix the same unto the said Commission in order to its publication in pursuance of a Warrant from the Honble Sprigett Penn, Esq., for that purpose."

p. 281 "Council Phila. Aug. 31, 1727. The Board received news of Death of his majesty, King George.

"At Council, Phila. 1 Sept. 1727.

"After the Governour had acquainted the Board that yesterday His Royal Highness George, Prince of Wales had been publickly proclaimed here King of Great Britain and by the name of George the Second with the solemnity and ceremony suitable on that occasion, His Honor took



The Board was of the opinion that it is sufficient to be done in New Castle."

p. 282 "Council Phila. Sept. 14, 1727. Present: Hon. Patrick Gordon, Esqr., Lt. Govnr. [and 5 Councilmen named].

> "The Governour acquainted the board that he had called then together at the time to inform them that there is lately arrived from Holland, a Ship with four hundred [400] Palatines, as tis said, and that he has information they will be very soon followed by a much greater number who design to settle in the back parts of this province; and as they transport themselves without any leave obtained from the Crown of Great Britain, and settle themselves upon the Proprietors untaken up lands without any application to the Proprietor or his commissioners of property or to the Government in general it would be highly necessary to concert proper measures for the peace and security of the province which may be endangered by such numbers of strangers daily poured in, who being ignorant of our language and laws and settling in a body together, make, as it were a distinct people from his majesties subjects.

The Board were of the opinion that mercy should be shown to the said Morgan Herbert and that the Justices be consulted as to the most proper manner of doing it."

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

Publisher's Responsibility

"The Governor acquainted the Board that he now called them together to lay before them a newspaper published in the Province, printed and sold by Andrew Bradford numbered 506 in which a letter signed BRUTUS or CASSIUS, or both, appears to reflect on the King and Government of Great Britain and to incite the Inhabitants of this Province to throw off all Subjection to the regular and Established Powers of Government, and the same being read and considered by the Board, it is their opinion that it is a wicked and seditious Libell, tending to introduce confusion under the Nation of Liberty, and to lessen the just regard due to Persons in authority. Tis therefor ORDERED, that the said Bradford be immediately taken into custody and examined by the Mayor and Recorder of this City, or any other two Justices of the Peace and that his Dwelling House and Printing Office be searcht for the written copy of the said Libel, that the author may be discovered and that the attorney general commence a Prosecution against the said Bradford for Printing and Publishing the same. N.B.

"This order being executed and the original Copy found, it appeared to be wrote by one Campbell, a Parson of a dissolute Character who had lived for some time in New Castle County, but his scandulous Behavior proving intolerable to his Hearers there, he removed to Long Island from whence he sent that Paper, with others of the same strain, by the Post, to Andrew Bradford who without considering or knowing its Tendency, printed it as he did other Papers in his Mercury. His ignorance

England obliged him to leave this Country he gave it strictly in charge to all his Governors and People in Power under him, that they should in the same manner treat all the Indians as he had done; that they should be as Fathers to them and that all his People should live in perfect Peace and Brotherhood with all the Indians as if they were of one Blood and one Body, without distinction.

"I am but young and having been bred in England could not see these things with my own eyes, but I constantly had accounts in writing of all that was done here as if I had been myself in the Place and by reading these over again I now know them better than if I had been present and were to be informed by memory only so that I can fully speak to them."

"The Board ordered three copies of the Report with three copies of minutes of this Council Meeting attached and the Great Seal of this Province be thereunto affixed."

"At Council Meeting, Phila. Aug. 2, 1735. Present: Honorable Thomas Penn, Esq., The Lt. Governor and [four Councilmen].


"The Proprietor spoke to the Indians by Interpreter as follows: Friend and Brethren."

[Only a brief of the statements and agreements that follow can be stated here, however, since land of our forefathers is so much involved we feel that highlights of the 8 pages should be stated. Ed.]

1. "Thomas Penn explained that he left his Brother at Pennsbury because of the Indisposition he labours under will not suffer him to travel, and deprives him of the pleasure he would have taken at your visit, and he added:

"You are sensible he is your Countryman, being born in the same land with you and for this reason he would have desired to see you; but he has sent me a Letter by which I know his

p. 602 5. Item -- "that the said Kings and Chiefs and their successors and People shall not suffer any strange Nation of Indians to settle or plant on the further side of Susquehannah or about Potomack River, but such as are there already seated, nor bring any other Indians into any part of this Province without special approbation and permission of the said Wm. Penn, his heirs and successors."

6. An item -- "that for the prevention of abuses that are too frequently put upon the said Indians in trade, no one permitted to trade with the Indians until first approved by the Government of the Province."

7. Item--"that the said Indians shall not sell or dispose of any of their Skins, Pelts, or Furs, or any other effects of their hunting to any person or persons whatsoever out of the said Province or to any other person but such as shall be authorized to trade with them as aforesaid, and that for their Encouragement the said William Penn, his heirs and successors, shall take care to have them, the said Indians, duly furnished with all sorts of necessary goods for their use, at Reasonable Rates."

8. Item -- "that the Potomack Indians aforesaid, with their Colony, shall have free leave of the said Wm. Penn to settle upon any part of Potomock River within the bounds of this Province, they strictly observing and practicing all and singular the articles aforesaid to them relating."

p. 603

9. Item -- "the Indians of Conestogoe and upon and about the River Susquehannah and more especially the said Connoodaghtah, their King, doth fully agree to and by these presents absolutely Ratifie the Bargain and Sale of Lands lying near and about the said River formerly made to the said William Penn, his heirs and successors, and since by Orytyagh and Andaygy-

junkquagh, parties to these presents confirmed to the said Wm. Penn, his heirs and successors by a DEED bearing date the 13th day of September last.

"It further provided the Indians of Susquehannah were to answer to Wm. Penn, etc., for the good Behaviour and conduct of the said Potomock Indians and for their performance of the several articles herein expressed."

10. Item--"the said Wm. Penn doth hereby promise forhimself his heirs and successors that he and they will at all times show themselves true friends and brothers to all and every of the said Indians by assisting them with the best of their advices, direction and councils and will in all things just and reasonable befriend them, they behaving themselves as aforesaid and submitting to the laws of the Province in all things as the English and other Christians, doe to which they the said Indians hereby agree and obliedge themselves and their Posterity forever.

> "In Witnesse Whereof the said parties have as a confirmation made mutual presents to each other, the Indians in five parcells of skins and the said Wm. Penn in several English goods and merchandizes as a binding pledge of the premises never to be broken and violated and as a further testimony thereof have also to these presents interchangeably sett their hands and seals the day and year above written."

Twelve Indian names followed with [L.S.] following each one and PENROQUENICHCHAN, his X mark and PASSAQUESSAY, his X mark.

p. 604 Thomas Penn, Esquire, continues to speak:

"Those Articles you see were made principally with the Susquehannah Indians who then mostly lived at Conestogoe and the Shawanese, as their friends, came also under our Father's Protection and entered into the same League... and now on these heads there remains no more, that we should most solemnly ratify and confirm all these Articles so far as they relate to Friendship and Union, to be observed not only by us but <u>our Posterity to all Generations</u>.

"CIVILITY, in the name of all the Indians, expressed their Satisfaction with what had been spoke and read unto them.

"The Indians being withdrawn . . . an estimate of the value of the skins delivered by the Indians was produced and is as follows:

The Indians were told that tomorrow or the next day a return would be made to their present, in such goods as they might most want. It was considered that the charges of their entertainment in town will rise high. The value of thirty pounds in goods suitable for them was thought sufficient.

"At a Council held Phila. Aug. 4, 1735, present Hon. Thomas Penn, Esqr., Proprietor, The Lt. Governor [and 4 Councilmen].

"The Indians being likewise come and seated. "The Proprietor told them that having at the former meeting fully ratified and confirmed

all the Articles of Friendship between this Government and the several Nations in whose name and behalf they were come hither, these following goods are now given to bind our Words to wit:

Four fine Guns Eight Strowds Eight Blankets Eight Shirts Four Hats Twenty-two pounds of Powder Forty pounds of Lead Thirty Knives and Fifty flints with some Rum, Pipes, Tobacco and Bread.

"The Governor then spoke to the Indians by Interpreter.

"The Governor spoke of the government effert to be fair and just and to preserve the excellent relations with the Indians and the great Articles of Peace and Friendship and ented a case of where two of our People had been so wicked to kill two of our Indian Friends, we brought the guilty Persons to a Trial in the same manner as if they had killed a White man and they both suffered Death for the Crime they Committed.

"He then expressed expectations that the same treatment be given to us in cases of atrocities by the Indians and then said:

"ULLALOES, the GANAWESE Chief, may remember that in the Summer, 1733 he came hither with four others of that Nation to satisfy us that there was no truth in a report that there was spread of three of their young men having killed two white people in Virginia the winter before. ULLALOES assured us he had seen the scalps that those young men had brought home; that they were of Indians and not of white men

and that these Ganawese Warriors entirely denied they had been guilty of any such crime. .. But, however, they may have endeavoured to impose upon you, whom we believe to be honest and good men. Yet it is but too true that in the back part of Virginia they cruelly murdered a poor man and his wife and scalped them both. . . . The Information of this affair has been so particularly given to the Governor of Virginia . . . and as that Governor has demanded those guilty persons to be delivered up to him to be punished, I must require of you the names of those Indians and if you will undertake to carry them to Virginia and deliver them up to the Governor there, he hath assured me that he will receive you as his friends and give you an handsome Reward for your trouble.

"ULLALOES replied fully and in part said: 'but whether those three Indians of our Nation who returned that year from the Southward were guilty or not, they are not now alive for in a fight with the flatheads last Spring was a year, near Roanoke River in North Carolina, they were all killed, as a young man now here named ENACHSCAPPI, who was in that fight, and saw them with nine more fall before he fled, can fully testify. . . .

p. 607

"The Indians promising to take all proper care herein, and adding that they intended to sett out tomorrow on their return home were invited to drink a friendly glass after which they took leave of the Proprietor, Governor and Council.

"The Board then taking into consideration the services of <u>Conrad Weyser</u>, the Interpreter, on the present treaty and on the two late messages from the Six Nations, are of opinion that the sum of Twelve Pounds be paid him for his trouble and that the account exhibited by him of 56,12,8 expended for Provisions lodged at Shamokin for the Entertainment of Indians of

the six Nations who were expected there this Summer be likewise allowed. [Conrad Weyser was the father-in-law of our Sophia Riem, daughter of the Scheafferstown, Pa., Peter Riem line.]"

p. 611 "Phila., Pa., Sept. 20, 1735, and having understood that the Hon'ble John Penn, Esq., was speedily to embarque for England, the whole House with their Speaker waited on him with numerous speech praising his conduct while here and referring to the Esteem and Affection of the People.

"Mr. Penn answered as follows:

"Gentlemen: I am very sensible of the concern you express for me and am obliged to you for this kind address. I am glad of this opportunity of seeing the Representatives of the FREEMEN OF PENNSYLVANIA at my departure, and you may be assured, I shall make it my particular care to do everything in my power that may advance the interest of this, MY NATIVE COUNTRY."

p. 432 At Court House, Phila., Pa., 11 Sept. 1732, 70 Palatines with their families, and took the customary Oaths, including Hans Jacob Meyer.

p. 569 "Phila., Pa., Sept. 21, 1734. News by Express from New Castle in the night of the 19th instant was that the Honourable John Penn, Esquire, the Eldest of our Proprietaries was on board ship from London standing up the river. His brother and several gentlemen went early next morning to CHESTER to receive him where he landed in the afternoon, and setting out this morning was met on passing the river Schuylkill by the Mayor, recorder and commonalty of the City, in whose name the Recorder made a congratulatory speech to Mr. Penn which he answered in very obliging Terms, and then proceeded forwards, with a very numerous company, came to his Brother's House about noon. "The President acquainted the Board that he had last week been informed by Samuel Blunston, of Lancaster Co., now in Town, that the Dutch People or Germans, who with others going over from this side of the Susquehanna River to the West of it had been prevailed on by some Agents from Maryland to acknowledge the authority of that Province.

"About 60 of them acknowledged their mistake and resolved that they belonged to Penn. MARK EVANS from the County of Bucks that had gone over the River and accepted a Commission of the Peace from Maryland sent his resignation along with a letter of 60 signatures to an officer in Baltimore Co."

p. 100 At Courthouse, Phila., 19 Oct. 1736. "37 Foreigners from the Palatinate with their families, 110 persons qualified as usual including Abraham Beer, John Jost Meyer, and Gotfried EBERHARD."

p. 151 At Council, Phila., 20 Jan. 1736-7, James Logan, Pres.

WAR WITH MARYLANDERS WEST OF THE SUSQUEHANNA RIVER

"The Board. . . Ordered that the Sheriff of Lancaster be called upon to raise a sufficient Number of Men of his County to be disposed in such places on the West side of the Susquehannah, under proper officers to be by him deputized as may prevent further disorders... and exert their utmost Endeavor for preserving the Peace, protecting the inhabitants and use all legal means in their power for apprehending HIGGINBOTHAM &

HIS ASSOCIATES, and all others who have been, or hereafter shall be guilty of Committing Any Acts of violence within the said County.

p. 655 Phila., May 7, 1743. "Conrad Weiser to be dispatched immediately to Onondago to seek peace with the Indians of the Six Nations in behalf of the Council and the Governor of <u>Virginia</u> on account of the late unhappy skermish between some of their back inhabitants and some Indians of those Nations. A present in hand of one hundred pounds sterling value in such goods as most agreeable to be given, and thereafter you are to agree with them upon time and place of meeting next Spring for treating with the Governor of Virginia concerning the land in dispute."

p. 675 Phila., Pa., 25 April 1744. "The Governor then laid before the Board from Mr. Cookson at Lancaster purporting 'That John Armstrong, an Indian Trader with his two servants, woodward Arnold, and James Smith had been murdered at Juniata by three Delaware Indians,' and that John Mussemeelin and John son of Neshalleeny, two of the Indians concerned in the murder had been seized by the order of Shick Aalamy and the other Indian Chiefs at Shamokin and sent under guard of Indians to be delivered to Justice, but the other had made his escape from the persons to whose care he was committed."

p. 2 At Council, Phila., 17 Dec. 1745, George Thomas, Lt. Govr. and three Councilmen.

"... The Governor further asked the opinion of the Board whether Mr. Conrad Weiser should not be directed to employ some young Indians as Scouts to procure Intelligence and to send notice of any march of Indians and it being judged very proper, his Honour said he would write such Letter and send it to Mr. Conrad Weiser along with the EXPRESS. ..."

p. 3 The Council considered Commissions of the Peace for the Counties of Bucks, Chester and Lancaster. Conrad Weiser was named Justice for Lancaster County

". . . Mr. Weiser was charged with a message to the Indians at Shamokin to notify to them the Death of the Late Proprietor Mr. John Penn and likewise the departure of Governor Thomas. . . ."

p. 74 At Council, Phila., 15 June 1747. Anthony Palmer and seven Councilmen.

"... Mr. Kinsey said he had consulted with his Brother members and they were all of the opinion with him that should they be now called to meet in assembly they would not answer Governor Shipley's expectations. Their principles were too well known to give any reason to believe they would contribute to <u>offensive Warrs</u>; besides, it had long been his opinion that whatever presents were made to the Indians they should be given immediately to them by this Province by their Interpreter. ..."

p. 98 At Council, Phila., 18 Aug. 1747, Anthony Palmer, Pres. and 6 Councilmen.

The President spoke to the Speaker and the whole House in the Council Chamber as follows:

"As upon our late Governor's [George Thomas] departure for England for the recovery of his Health, the administration of the Government (by an act passed in the 10th year of Queen Ann, entitled 'an Act for the further securing the administration of the Government'), devolved upon the Council, we have pursuant thereto taken upon us the Execution of that Trust. .

"We have received a Letter from Governor Shirly [of Virginia] informing us 'That divers Patries of Indians were then out and others daily offering their service to the English'. . . and That he had appointed Commissioners to meet in a Congress to be held at New York on the Second of Sept. next with such Commissioners as should be appointed by all his Majestie's

<u>Colonial Records, Vol. 5 (Cont.)</u> Governments from New Hampshire to Virginia, inclusive. . .

"Thereupon we dispatched <u>CONRAD WEISER</u>, the Provincial Interpreter, to Shamokin to sound the Indians and get the best Information he could of their Sentiments, which he accordingly did and sent us a Report of his proceedings with his opinion which with Governor Shirley's Letters we have ordered to be laid before you as well deserving your most serious consideration, since they contain matters of very great Importance to the safety of this as well as the rest of his Majestie's Colonies on the Continent. . . .

"The Indians seated on Lake Erie and on Inomoy Creek that runs into that Lake being part of or in alliance with the Six Nations, said by the Indian Traders to be numerous and People of consequence, have sent messages to this Government, which will be delivered for your perusal as they are desirous to be taken into Friendship and it may be of great service to encourage such applications, you will enable us to make proper Presents.

"You will find by Mr. <u>WEISER</u>'s Report that some Complaints have been made by the Indians of several Injuries done them by White People, which deserve your particular Notice and, if true, require some reparation should be immediately made"

The Secretary having delivered a copy of the speech to the Speaker, the House immediately withdrew and the Council completed its business for the day.

p. 410 At Council, Phila., 11 Sept. 1749, James Hamilton, Pres. and 4 Councilmen.

A Report:

"The Governor having ordered Doctor Groeme and Doctor Thomas Bond to visit the Ship Francis Elizabeth. arrived in the Cove below the city with Palatines on board from Rotterdam and they having reported that she was an unhealthy vessel, several of the Passengers labouring under an eruptive fever which they were of the opinion was infectious, he had ordered the Trustees of the Province Island to attend the Council to be informed of the condition of the Pest House . . . the Trustees promised to put the Rooms in the best order they could and to build some slight out Houses that might serve the present occasion; whereupon the captain of the Ship was ordered to remove his vessel to the mouth of Schuvlkill as near to the Pest House as he could conveniently lye, to send there all the sick and to keep the well on board, and not to suffer any persons to go near them except the Doctors, necessary nurses and servants."

p. 426 At Council, 2 January 1749, Governor James Hamilton.

Two bills read twice and approved and sent to the House for further action:

(1) An act for erecting a County westward of the Susquehanna and north and west of Co. of York.

(2) A bill for amending the Laws of the Province against killing of deer out of season. Proposed amendment not indicated.

p. 428 At Council, Phila., Sat., 27 Jan. 1749, James Hamilton, Lt. Govnr. and 5 Councilmen.

"P.M. The Speaker and the House waited on the Governor in the Council Chamber and presented the following Bills, which having been previously assented to and compared by a Committee of Council in conjunction with a Committee of the House, were enacted into laws, viz:

"AN ACT for erecting part of the Province of Pennsylvania Westward of Susquehannah and northward and westward of the County of York into a County [Northumberland Co.].

"AN ACT for prohibiting the Importation of Germans or other Passengers in too great numbers in any one vessel.

"AN ACT for amending of the Act entitled 'AN ACT to encourage the Killing of Squirrels within the Province.'

"AN ACT for amending the Laws of this Province against killing of Deer out of Season.

"AN ACT for barring Estates TAIL.

"AN ACT for the continuance of an Act of Assembly of this Province entitled 'AN ACT for the more easy Recovery of Legacies within this Province.'

"Then the Speaker read an Address in these words and then presented it to the Governor, together with an Order of the House for Six Hundred Pounds in Part of the annual Support:

"To the Honourable James Hamilton, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Pennsylvania, and Counties of New Castle, Kent and Sussex, on Delaware;

"The Address of the Representatives of the Freemen of the said Province.

"May it Please the Governor:

"We have during this session received divers Petitions from a considerable number of sober and discreet Persons, Inhabitants of this city and several other parts of the Province who though of different perswasions in Religious matters have nevertheless united in those Petitions, complaining that notwithstanding many prudent Provisions have been heretofore made by the Laws of this Province concerning Persons licensed to keep Inns and <u>Public Houses</u> for the sale of strong liquors and the Entertainment of Travellers and the good Order to be kept in those Houses, yet contrary to the Tenor of those Laws they have of late years very much encreased.

"That many of them are neither of sober conversation nor of ability to entertain Travellers, nor do

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they keep good Order in their Houses, as by Law they ought to do, That on the contrary, most of them are Nurseries of Vice and Immorality, such as promote Drinking, Gaming, Idleness and many gross Evils, inticing youth and others to the lavish spending of their money, wasting their time in tippling and corrupt company, and by this means neglecting their proper Business impoverishing themselves and their Families, and [p. 429] endangering the Loss and Ruin of their Souls, Bodies and Estates. To prevent which for the future the Petitioners pray our Interposition, and as our own observations as well as the Testimony of others convince us of these melancholy Truths, we think it a Duty we owe to the Province, to Posterity and to ourselves to contribute the utmost in our Power to discourage and prevent these growing Evils.

[A full page follows including a discussion of the Laws in force in relation to Public Houses, etc. and the speaker concludes as follows:]

p. 430 "The Increase of Vice and Immorality are bad Symptoms in any Government, and the Consequences it might have in this we think too evident to a Gentleman of the Governor's Abilities to need any Illustration; we therefor perswade outselves of his hearty assistance in the Reformation desired, as the best and most effectual means to render the Inhabitants of this Province more generally better subjects, better members of Society, and above all better Christians.

"Signed by order of the House.

JOHN KINSEY, Speaker." "The Governor was pleased to say, 'That it very well became the Assembly, as Representatives of the People, to endeavor the Reformation of the Abuses complained of; that it was his own opinion too great a number of Public Houses might have the Tendency mentioned, and that, therefore, he would in the warmest manner recommend to all the Magistrates a prudent use of their Power in this Particular, as well as in every other,....

"And thereupon he wrote the following letter to the

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Magistrates of the several Counties, to be read in open Sessions:

"Gentlemen: It having been represented to me that the number of Inns and Publick Houses throughout this Province is of late greatly increased and that many of the Persons recommended to me for my Licence to keep the same are neither of a sober conversation or of ability to entertain Travellers in a proper manner. . .

"And that upon all future applications you will make a careful Inquiry into the Characters and circumstances of the appliers and recommend to me so many only as shall be thought necessary for the Public Service, and who for their Discretion and abilities are most likely to answer the good Meaning and Intention of establishing Inns and Publick Houses in all wellregulated communities.

"I am, Gentlemen, Your humble Servant, JAMES HAMILTON"

p. 431 "At conference held with the Indians at Mr. Croghan's Pennsboro Twp., Cumberland Co., 17 May 1750...

p. 432 "Then Catara-dirha, on behalf of the Conestogoe Indians spoke:

"When the Six Nations sold their Land on the Susquehannah to the Proprietaries, the Conestogoe Indians were then living in their town near Lancaster for which reason the Place where they liv'd was excepted out of the sale. It will appear by your records that they were to live there as long as they pleased, and when they should incline to depart they were to signify it to the Proprietaries and receive a consideration; they are now inclinable to remove nearer to the other Indians and according to the Agreement already made with the Proprietaries they request you to inform the Governor of their Intention. They want to sell their Improvements, and now make the Proprietaries the first offer of them. A String of Wampum.

"Brother, the Governor:

"Many of our old People are dead, so that we are now left as it were Orphans in a destitute condition, which inclines us to leave our old habitations. When

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we are gone ill-minded people may tell you store s of our prejudice; but we assure you that distance will not alter our Affections for you. Therefore give no ear to such stories, as we on our part will not think you can loose your Regard for us, tho there are some who would perswade us that we are now not so much regarded by you as we have been."

pp. 470-480 At Council, Phila., 11 Oct. 1750, James Hamilton, Lt. Govr., and 4 Councilmen.

"Conrad Weiser's Journal was read and ordered enter'd.

'A Journal of the Proceedings of Conrad Weiser in his Journey to Onondago, with a message from Honourable THOMAS LEE, Esq., President of Virginia, to the Indians there.

'1750, August the fifteenth, set out in the afternoon from my House in Heidelberg and came to Reading on Schuylkill that day--fourteen miles.

'The 16th Came to Henry Saserman in Maxatawny--20 miles.

'The 17th Came to Nazareth--27 miles.

'The 18th Came to Nicholas Depue, in Smithfield on Delaware--30 miles.

'The 31st Set out through the woods for the Mohocks Country; it rained the most part of the day, having but a very blind Indian Path was lost but met accidentally two Indians, who accompanied me to the Mohocks Country where we arrived about an hour after dark. Came that day about 25 miles.

p. 480 'Onondago was thick with French praying Indians when I was there; 8 or 9 of them came to see me and owned they came from Canada to see their Friends at Onandago and behaved very civil to me . . .

CONRAD WEISER'"

p. 567 At Council, Phila., 24 April 1752.

"By the Honourable James Hamilton, Esqr., Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-chief of the Province of Pennsylvania and Counties of New Castle, Kent and

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Sussex upon Delaware. To Mr. Andrew Montour--Whereas, it is presented to me that many persons are lately gone and continually going over the Kittochtinny Hills to settle lands not purchased of the Indians, notwithstanding the repeated Proclamations issued by this Government against such practices and the sundry persons are now under prosecution for the same;

"And whereas you, the said Andrew Montour have signified to me that if it was permitted, you to go and reside there you could be very serviceable both to this Government and to the Six Nations, in keeping People off from settling on those unpurchased lands and that you are thereby induced to offer your service to me for that purpose. . . "

Montour was given permission to go settle there by a Commission of the Governor after consultation with Mr. Weiser and Mr. Peters. That is on some plantation over the Blue Hills in Cumberland County.

JOHN PENN--ELDEST SON OF RICHARD PENN p. 607 At Council, Phila., 6 Feb. 1753, James Hamilton, Lt. Govnr. and 7 Councilmen.

"John Penn the Eldest son of Proprietor Richard Penn was introduced . . . unanimously agreed . . . and when he shall have taken the legal qualifications he should be considered as the first named or eldest counsellor on the Death or absence of the Governor or Lt. Governor.

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pp. 7-8 We note a very interesting letter of March 21, 1754, Williamsburg, Va., from Robert Dinwiddie to Governor Hamilton, Penna., discussing and working towards the eventual dividing line between Va. and what is now Western Pennsylvania.

p. 105 "At a meeting Wed. 10 July 1754 pres.: Lt.

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Govr. and 4 gentlemen of the Council of New York and all of the commissioners of the respective Governments, consideration of the Plan of a Union re-accured which plan is as follows, viz:

"Plan of a proposed Union of the several Colonies of Massachusetts Bay, New Hampshire, Connecticut, Rhode Island, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina for their mutual defence and security and for extending the British settlements in North America.

"That humble application be made for an Act of the Parliment of Gt. Britain by vertue of which one general Government may be formed in America, including all the said colonies within and under which Government each colony may retain its present Constitution exempt in the particulars wherein a change may be directed by the said Act as hereinafter follows: [continued on p. 106 thru 109 of Vol. 6]."

pp. 114

- to 125 There is reference to a deed from the Six Nations to the Proprietors of Province of Penna. --for 400 pounds all the land west of the Susquehanna (river) as specified on line to North and South to western boundary of the Province.
- p. 423 "At Council Meeting, Phila. June 1756, a proclamation ordering a FAST account of a drought --no rain for two or three months."

Soldiers on the Frontier Voting to Return in Face of Danger

p. 673 "A letter to Mr. Peters--CONEGOGIG, 3 Nov. 1755.

> "Sir: This comes ye melancholy account of the ruin of the Great Cove which is reduced

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to ashes, and numbers of the inhabitants murdered and taken captives on Saturday last about 3 of the clock in the afternoon "

p. 674 ". . . a Recruit came of about 60 men, then we held Council whether to pursue up the Valley all night or return to McDowel's the former of which I and Mr. Hoop and some others plead for but could not obtain without putting it to Votes, which done we were out voted by a considerable number, upon which I and my Company (40 men) was left by then that night and came home, for I will not guard a man that will not fight when called in so eminent manner, for there was not six of these men that would consent to go in pursuit of the Indians.

> " I am much afraid that Juniata, Tuscarora, and Sherman's Valley hath suffered. . . . Last night I had a family of upwards of an hundred of women and children who fled for Succor. You cannot form a just idea of the Distressed and Distracted condition of our Inhabitants unless your eyes seen and your ears heard their crys. . . . If our assembly will give us additional supply of arms and ammunition, the latter of which is most wanted, I could wish it were put into the hands of such persons as would go out upon Scouts after the Indians, rather than for the supply of Forts.

> "I am, Sir, your most Obedient very humble Servent.

> > John Potter Sheriff

"Sr--Please to call upon the assembly for the money due me.

p. 703 A letter from Peter Spycker at Tulpehocken to Conrad Weiser, Esq., Phila., 16 Nov. 1755. "John Anspack and Frederick Reed came to

me and told me the miserable circumstances of the People murdered this side the mountain vesterday, the Indians attacked the Watch, killed and wounded him at Derrick Sixth, and in that Neighborhood great many in that night. This morning our people went out to see; came p. 704 about 10 o'clock in the morning to Thomas Bower's house, finding a man dead, killed with a Gun Shott. Soon we heard a noise of firing Gunns: Running to that place and found four Indians sitting on children scalping, 3 of the children are dead and 2 are alive; the scalps are taken off. Hereafter we went to the Watch House of Derrick Sixth, where the Indians first attacked finding 6 dead bodies, 4 of them scalpt; about a mile this side the Watch House as we went back the Indians set fire to a stable and barn, where burnt the Corn, Cows and other Creatures, where we found 7 Indians, 5 in the House eating their dinner and drinking Rum which was in the House and two outside the house, we fire to them but in vain; the Indians have burnt 4 Plantations more, the above account told me: Peter Anspack, Jacob Caderman, Christopher Noacre, Leonard Walbone, told me the same manner; George Dollinger and Adam Diffenbach sent me word in the same manner.

> "Now we are in great danger for to lose our lives or Estates, Pray, therefor, for help or else whole TULPEHOCCAN will be ruined by the Indians in a short time, and all buildings will be burned down and the people scalped. . . . The assembly can see by this work how good and fine friends the Indians are to us. We hope their eyes will go open and their hearts tender to us and the Governor's the same, if they are true Subjects to our King George the Second, of Gt. Britain, or are willing to deliver us in the hands of those miserable creatures.

> "N.B. The people is fled to us from the Hills, Peter Kryger and Jno Weiser are the last.

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In a letter Paxton, 9 ber 1755, from John Elder to the Secretary: It reports shocking accounts of Indian atrocities reported to Phila., yet to no purpose. "So that we seem to be given up into the hands of a merciles Enemy. There are within this few weeks upwards of 40 of his Majesty's Subjects massacred on the Frontiers of this and Cumberland City besides a great number carried into captivity and yet nothing but unreasonable debate between the two parts of our Legislature instead of uniting in some probable Scheme for the Protection of the Province and the preservation of its Inhabitants, what may be the end of these things God only knows."

p. 705

In a letter from Edward Biddle, at Reading, to his Father in the City--

"My Dearest Father: I'm in so much horror and confusion I scarce know what I am writing. The Drum is beating to arms and bells ringing and all the people under arms within two hours we have had different tho' too uncertain accounts all corroborrating each other and this moment is an Express arrived dispatched from Michael Reis at Tulpehoccon, 18 miles above this Town, who left about 30 of their people engaged with about an equal number of Indians at the said Reis'. This night we expect an attack, truely alarming in our situation. The people exclaim against the Quakers and some are scarce restrained from burning the Houses of those few who are in this Town. Oh my Country! My bleeding Country! I recommend myself to the divine God of Armies. Give my dutiful love to my Dearest Mother, and my best love to Brother Jemmys.

"I am, Honoured Sir, your most effectionat and obedient Son.

E. Biddle

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"Sunday, 1 o'clock. I have rather lessened than exagerated our melancholy account. "Copied from the Original.

p. 706 "Phila., Nov. 18, 1755.

"Mr. Potter, the Sheriff of Cumberland County, being in town, was sent for and desired to give an account of the upper part of that County in which the Indians had committed their late Ravages; and he said that 27 Plantations were burnt and a great quantity of cattle killed; that a woman of 93 years of age was found lying killed with her Breast tore off and a stake run thro' her Body; that of 93 Families which were settled in the two Coves and the Conolloways, 47 were either killed or taken and the rest deserted."

p. 736 "At Council, Phila. 26 Nov. 1755, a Bill granting the sum of 60,000 pounds and striking Fifty Five Thousand pounds thereof in Bills of Credit, etc. in consideration of the distressed state of the Province and the need for a proper force for defence was returned to the House with advice that the Governor was ready to pass it."

p. 744 "At a Council held at the State House Tuesday, 2 Dec. 1755.

> "Present: The Honourable Robert Hunter Morris, Esq., Lt. Governor, and C.A., Robert Strettell, Richard Peters, Esgrs.

"The speaker and the whole House waited on the Governor and presented the Bill entitled 'An Act for the relief of George Crogan and William Trent'; and the Govr. having enacted it into a Law, the Great Seal was affixed thereto and it was lodged in the Rolls Office.

"The Governor being advised by Mr. Weiser

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that we had still some friendly Indians left on the Susquehannah, and that it would be for the Publick Service to invite them to a conference, he sent yesterday the following letter to the Provincial Commissioners:"

pp. 744

& 745 The letter dated 1 Dec. 1755 to the Commissioners of the Province from the Govr. requesting messengers be sent to the friendly Indians on the Susquehanna asking them to come down to Harris Ferry in order to concert measures with the Government upon present circumstances of affairs, when it may be proper to communicate to them parts of the General Plan of operations as they may assist in the execution of.

> The Mr. Weiser referenced above, of course, was the famous Conrad Weiser, father of Phillip Weiser who was M. to our Sophia Riem in Womelsdorf, Pa. in 1748. Phillip took charge of a Company of Militia sent to the mountain pass to meet the enemy.

Just what conditions were at this time in connection with our Eberhard Ream family settled on a branch of Cocalico Creek, Lancaster Co., opposite a group of Delaware Indians is not known. In the absence of a report to the contrary, we can only assume that relations with the Delawares were as usual--friendly.

"Phila. 3 Dec. 1755. . . . The following adp. 747 dress of the Bethlehem Indians and the Governor's Answer, were read and ordered to be entered.

> "To the Honorable Robert Hunter Morris, Esquire, Lt. Governor of the Province of Penna. and the Counties of New Castle, Kent and Sussex upon Delaware,

"The humble address of the Indians, late residing in Gnadenhutton, at their instance taken from their own mouthes as followeth to wit:

"First, we present our Love, Respect and Duty to the Honble, the Govr. of Pennsylvania, Because we are not able to express ourselves

as it should be, we beg therefor that the best construction may be put upon what we have to lay before him.

"We have been heretofore poor Heathen, who knew nothing of God but lived in blindness and abominable Sins.

"The Brethern have told us words from Jesus Christ, our God and Lord, who became a man for us and purchased Salvation for us with his Blood. . .

"It is now a great many years that we have lived in Quiet Peace under the protection of the Government of this Province, so that we have not been burthensome to none, nor has any body molested us. But now it has come to pass that wicked People who serve the Devil have committed horrible murthers and inhumanly butcherid even our own Bretheran.

"We well knew that we had nothing better to expect at their hands as long as we continued with the Brethern under this Government. For which cause we sought to save our lives by flight, leaving everything behind which we had in Gnadenhutten that is not only our habitations but also our clothing and provisions fleeing in the dark night naked and empty with our wives and children.

"Now that we are here in Bethlehem with our Brethern, willing rather to suffer and live with them as heretofore, we cannot but declare to our Honourable Governor.

"First that we are thankful from the bottom of our Hearts for this Protection and Peace we have hitherto enjoyed in this Province.

p. 748

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"2nd. That none of us have any hand in the abominable murthers lately committed by the Indians but we abhor and detest them.

"3rd. It is our desire, seeing that we are persuaded that our lives will be principally sought after, to put outselves as children under the Protection of this Government, we cannot say otherwise but that we are intirely devoted to the English Government and wish success and prosperity to their Arms against their and our Enemies.

"We hope that our Honorable Governor will give us gracious answer to this our humble Petition and provide for our future welfare."

- p. 749 Bears a copy of signatures of 14 Indians that were subscribed before Timothy Horsefield, Esq. (spelled Horsfield later FVR), one of the Justices in and for the County of Northampton on Nov. 30, 1755. Witnesses Bernard Adam Grube, John Jacob Schmick and J. Oakley.
- p. 750 An appropriate reply was made by the Lt. Govr. including these words: "I have determined to build a FORT at Gnadenhutten from which you will receive equal Security with the White People under my care."

Definition: Gnadenhutten--a village in Tuscarawas Co. Eastern Ohio, 9 miles south of New Philadelphia, Ohio, a State Memorial Park. There marks the site of massacre (1782) of 96 Christian Indians by white men. However, it is apparent the Gnadenhutten referred to above is not the one Lippincotts now defines as being in Ohio, but the one as mentioned on p. 747, where a chronological narrative of the Secretary of the. .." incursions and ravages made by the French and Indians was made for the month of Oct. 1755 which reads: "Oct. 21 a fine Colonial Records, Vol. 6 (Cont.)

Settlement of Moravians called Gnadenhutten situate in Northampton Co. on the West Branch of the river Delaware was attacked, six of them killed and their dwelling houses, meeting house and all their outhouses burnt to ashes, with all the Grain, Hay, Horses and upwards of forty head of fat cattle that were under cover."

p. 762

p. 760 A letter of Dec. 13, 1755 from Conrad Weiser, Reading Pa. to Governor Morris cites reports of desperate situations at Broodheads and McMichaels in North Hampton Co. and in Berks Co. and closes with these words: "This country is in a dismal condition; believe me, kind Sir, that it can't hold out long. Consternation, Poverty, Confusion, Parties is every where. If no haste is made for our Relief, I cannot stay but must move with my Family to a Place of better Security than this, I can add nothing agreeable, must therefor conclude, who am, Honoured Sir, your very obedient, Conrad Weiser."

The family referenced here of course included our Philip and Sophia (Riem) that were M. in 1748, and their children.

Later a letter from Conrad Weiser to Governor Morris dated Heidelberg (now Womelsdorf) in the County of Berk, Penna., Dec. 22, 1755, read in part as follows:

"Last night I arrived home [Heidelberg] from John Harris' Ferry [Harrisberg] . . . I set out on the 16th for Harris' Ferry where I found no Indians but the Old Belt and another SINICKER, called commonly Broken Thigh, a lame man.

"Their young men, about six or seven in number, being sent out by John Harris to fetch scalps from Ohio, but stopt at AUGHWICK by Mr. Croghan. I sent for Thomas McKee, John Carson, and Samuel Hunter to John Harris' to consult

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with them how to send your Honour's Message to the Indians on the West Branch of the Susquehannah. They recommended one Hugh Crawford to me, on whom I prevailed to go to Aughwick with the message and from there send Indians to the West Branch of Susquehanna with it. . .

"I had the two old Indians in Council with me. . . .

"Upon my first arrival at John Harris' I gave a string of Wampum to the two old Indians above mentioned, requesting them to look upon me as a publick messenger from Brother Onas, and desired them in his behalf to let me know all that they knew about this Warr and who it was that murdered Onas' people and for what reason?

"Next morning they made answer to the following purport:

"'Brother: We are very glad to see you here once more at these troublesome times. We look upon you as our Brother Onas' messenger as we always did. The author of the murders of the people of Pennsylvania is ONONTIO; he employs his children for that purpose, and they came to the River (Susquehannah) to murder. We are sorry to tell you that they have prevailed upon our cousins, the Delawares, living about half way from Shamokin to Schantowano (Wayoniack) in a Town called NESCOPECKOK. Them Indians have given their Town (in defiance of us their uncles) to ONONTIO's children as a place of their Rendevous, and had undertaken to join and guide them the way to the English. That thereupon the SHECKELEMY's and other of the Six Nations fled towards the Six Nations Country; that a Report was spread among the Delawares on that river, that the Pennsylvanians were coming with thousands to destroy the Indians on Susquehannah which had

p. 763

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occasioned the Six Nation Indians before named to fly because they would not fight against their Brethern nor against the Indians and that everything was in a great confusion. "

A P.S. to above letter by C. W. states that the Paxton people took an enemy Indian on other side of the Narrows above Samuel Hunter's and brought him down to Carson's House where they examined him. The Indian begged his life and promised to tell all what he knew tomorrow morning but (shocking to me) they shott him in the midst of these, scalped him and threw his body into the River. C. W. writes further:

"The oldbelt told me that as a child of Onontio he deserved to be killed but that he would have been very glad if they had delivered him up to the Governor in order to be examined stricter and better. I am, Honoured Sir, your most obedient Conrad Weiser."

p. 779

p. 778 Council at Phila. 29 Jan. 1756.

"The Governor communicated to the Council a full and particular account of his conferences and proceedings with the few Indians who met him at the proposed Indian Treaty at Harris' Ferry and Carlisle and with the Conestogoe Indians at Lancaster, and of the measure's he had taken with the commissioners for defending the Province against the Incursions and Ravages of the Indians, etc., by erecting forts or Block Houses at divers proper places on or near the Frontier of the settled parts of the Province, and hiring companies under proper officers for the Garrisoning them with several other material transactions of his late journey and then the minutes of the Indian Treaty, etc. were read with all which the Gentlemen of the Council appeared well pleased, and unanimously declared their appro-

bation and they were ordered to be entered as

follows: [Same as summarized above.]"

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Colonial Records, Vol. 6 (Cont.)

p. 779 At a meeting of the Governor and Commissioners at Reading Friday, the 2nd Jan. 1756, it was reported in part as follows:

> ". . Until it could not be known what number of Indians would come to the proposed Treaty and with what Dispositions, it was agreed to proceed immediately to hold that Treaty as at Harris' there was but one single House and few conveniences. Mr. Weiser was called in and asked if it might not be better to hold it at Carlisle, where all the Business of the County might be done at the same time and proper entertainment provided as well for the Governor and his company and for the Indians should they prove numerous.

"Mr. Weiser in answer said it was his opinion that such of the Susquehannah Indians as were true to us had removed either among the Six Nations or to the Uppermost Branches of Susquehannah and that the rest, headed perhaps by a few French and some of the Shawonese and Delawares from Ohio, were the Indians now perpetuating the mischiefs in Northampton County. . . . He added further that most of the Indians who used to be at Harris' were gone to Mr. Croghan's at AUEQUICK and none that he knew of remained there except the Old Belt and an Indian called, by reason he was lame, The Broken Thigh. . . he thought Carlisle the better place."

p. 780 At Harris' only the 2 Indians mentioned above were present 8 Jan 1756. The Governor had sent an Express to Mr. Croghan to inform them that he and the Commissioners would set out on Monday for Carlisle and hold the Treaty there instead of Harris' on Thursday and he provided carriage for the two Indians and any of their families that were inclined to go along. Colonial Records, Vol. 6 (Cont.)

A Thank you message received from the Belt which read in part as follows:

"I thank you for sending for us to Council and for your kind speech. What you have said is very agreeable.

"The sky is dark all around us. The Mischiefs done to you I consider as done to the Six Nations, and am sorry for what has happened.

. . . . Let me, therefor, by this String entreat you to put away all grief from your Hearts and dry up your tears that you may think and see clearly when you come to Council.

"I accept your Invitation and shall follow you to Carlisle.

"Gave a String."

"At Council at Carlisle, Tues. 13 Jan. 1756.

"Mr. Croghan [an English trades immigrant from Ireland to A. in 1741 established his home and trading post near Carlisle, Pa.; he learned the Delaware and Iriquois Indians languages], having been desired by the Governor in December last to do all in his power to gain Intelligence of the Nations and designs of the Indians, and being now in town was sent for into Council, and at the Instance of the Governor gave the following information:

"That he sent Delaware Jo, one of our friendly Indians, to the Ohio for Intelligence who returned to his house at AUEQUICK the eighth Instant, and informed him that he went to Kittannin, an Indian Delaware TOWN on the Ohio about 40 miles above Fort Duquesne, the Residence of Chingas and Captain Jacobs, where he found 140 men chiefly Delawares and Shawanese, who had there with them above 100 English prisoners, big and little, taken from Va. and Penna. . . . "

p. 782 "That from Kittannin he went to the Log's Town where he found about 100 Indians and 30 English

p. 781

Colonial Records, Vol. 6 (Cont.)

prisoners taken by the Shawanese living at the lower Shawanese Town from the Western Frontier of Virginia and sent up to Log's Town.

"That when at Log's Town which is near Ft. Duquesne on the opposite side of the river he intended to have gone there to see what the French were doing in that Fort but could not cross the River for the driving of the Ice; he was, however, informed the number of the French did not exceed 400

"No more than 7 Indians being as yet come to Carlisle, Mr. Croghan was asked the reason of it; he said that the Indians were mostly gone an hunting but he expected as many more at least would come in a day or two.

"Mr. Weiser was then sent for and it was taken into consideration what should be said to the Indians."

Addendum to Colonial Records, Vol. 6

p. 100 "A draught of the Representation, etc., was read (Council meeting, 9 July 1754, before the Hon. Lt. Govnr. and four Councilmen) and considered paragraph by paragraph, some amendments made, and the whole was agreed to and ordered to be minitued as follows:

"That his Majesties Title to the Northern Continent of America appears to be founded on the discovery thereof, first made and the possession thereof first taken in 1497 under a commission from Henry the 7th of England to Sebastian Cabot.

"That the French have possessed themselves of several Parts of this Continent which by treaties have been ceded and confirmed to them.

"That the Right of the English to the whole Sea Coast from Georgia on the South to the River Saint Lawrence on the North, except the Island of Cape Breton and the Islands in the Bay of Saint Lawrence remains indisputable.

"That all the Lands of Countries Westward from the Atlantick Ocean to the South Sea, between 48 and 34 Degrees North Latitude, were expressly included in the Grant of King James the First to divers of his Subjects so long since as the year 1606 and afterwards confirmed Addendum to Colonial Records, Vol. 6 (Cont.) in 1620 and under this Grant the colony of Virginia claims extent as far west as the South Sea and the antient colonies of the Massachusetts Bay and Connecticut were by their respective charters made to extend to the South Sea, so that not only the Right to the South Sea Coast but to all the Island Countries from Sea to Sea has at all times been asserted by the Crown of England. [Continued for four more pages--most interesting.]"

pp. 486-492 The tragic story of the defeat of General Braddock's Army by the French and Indians, 1755. General Braddock was wounded and died at Great Meadows, July 13, 1755. His advance was contrary to advice of George Washington who managed retreat of the remaining forces. (See Braddock Monument on U.S.Rte 40 near Summit, Pa.)

p. 649 Heidelberg, County of Berks, Oct. 26, 1755. A letter from Conrad Weiser to Governor Morris. It starts out like this:

"Sir: Just now two of my sons, to wit, Frederick and Peter arrived from Shamokin where they have been to help down their cousin with his family, etc."

The two sons were Brother-in-laws to our SOPHIE RIEM, wife of another son, Phillip Weiser. A son Frederick and another young man while plowing in a field, were killed by Indians.

p. 773 At Council, Phila., 7 Jan. 1756, Governor Robert H. Morris writes a letter to the Board as follows: LOSS OF GNADENHUTTEN

"Reading, Pa., Jan. 5, 1756 "Gentlemen: I have only time by the Return of the Express to acknowledge the receipt of your Favor, and to approve of what you have done since I left you.

"I beg you wou'd open all Letters that come to me upon his Majesty's Service, and in every case do what you think most for his Majesty's Service and the good of the Public, of which you are very good judges. The Commissioners have done everything that was proper in the County of Northampton, but the people are not

Addendum to Colonial Records, Vol. 6 (Cont.)

satisfied. Nor, by what I can learn from the Comm'rs would they be unless every man's house was protected by a Fort and a Company of Soldiers and themselves paid for staying at home and doing nothing. There are in that County at this time three hundred men in Pay of the Government. And yet from Disposition of the inhabitants, the want of conduct in the Officers and of courage and discipline in the men. I am fearful that whole County will fall into the enemy's Hands.

"Yesterday and the day before I received the melancholy News of the <u>destruction of the town of Gnaden-</u><u>hutten</u>, and of the greatest part of the Guard of forty men placed there in order to erect a Fort. The particulars you will see by the inclosed papers, so far as they have yet come to hand, but I am in hourly Expectation of further Intelligence by two men that I dispatched for that Purpose upon the first news of the affair, whose long stay makes me apprehend some mischief has befallen them.

"Last night an Express brought me an acco' that seven Farm Houses between Gnadenhutten and Nazareth were on the First instant burned about the same time that Gnadenhutten was, and some of the people destroyed and the accounts are this day confirmed.

"Upon this fresh alarm it is proposed that one of the Commissioners return to Bethlehem and Easton, and there give fresh directions to the troops, and post them in the best manner for the Protection of the remaining Inhabitants.... ROBERT H. MORRIS"

p. 1 calliste, fa., indisday, 15 ban. 1750.

Lt. Gov. Robt. Hunter spoke & explained that efforts were made to have good attendance present through messengers that were sent to various Indian groups but he had reason to believe the messengers he employed had not been able to go to all our friends upon the River [Susquehanna] and thus the attendance not as large as it might have been & he added: "However, you that are come I esteem our Hearty Friends and thank you for meeting us here, which I take the Kinder, considering the dangers that attend those who are our real friends. . ." Council, Carlisle, 1/16/1756; Pres.: Lt. Gov. Morris, Esquires

James Hamilton and Wm. Logan, and Joseph Fox, Esq., Commissioner. Interpreters: <u>Conrad</u> <u>Weiser</u>, and George Crogan, The Belt and various Indians named.

"The Belt speaking in response to the Governor's speech yesterday told of the French refusing to listen to their Half King in regard to taking possession of the Country on the Ohio, home of the Six Nations, and continued to move on as consequence of a Secret Treaty with two tribes, the Shawanese and the Delawares. . . "

p. 4

The Belt then spoke as a warrior:

"Brethern: We are sorry our number is not greater but few as we are we are all Warriors and at your Service whenever you call upon us. We esteem the Blood that has been shed in this Country as running from our own Veins and as the French are the cause of it we esteem our Enemies and shall whenever you think proper, severely revenge it upon them. The coming Spring shall furnish you and us with a favourable opportunity, when we shall gladly join and assist you against them."

At Council held at Carlisle, Pa., Sat. 17 Jan. 1756.

Attendance same as on 15th and 16th above with Indians named as follows: "The Belt, David; Seneca George, Jagia, Silver Heels, Isaac of New Castle."

"The Old Belt addressing himself to the Governor and the People of Pennsylvania, in behalf of themselves and the Government of Virginia, and holding a Stick with an Indian Scalp and two Belts of Black Wampam tied at the END of it said:

"Brethern--We now by this Belt of Wampum put you in mind of your message of condolences sent to us on the Death of TANACHARRISON (the Half King), and as he was accounted by us a

Ruler both amongst the Warriors as well as in Civil Matters, you said Right that his death had greatly affected us all.

"The Belt went on to express appreciation of the condolences and explained action taken to avenge the occasions of the French driving their Half King from the Land he was settled on near the Ohio and suggest a joint message of condolence to the Six Nations via New York as stated below by the Governor."

"The Governor then acquainted the Belt and the other Indians that he joined with them in sending the Message of Condolence to the Six Nations of Indians, and in their manner of doing it and should very soon forward it by way of New York to their several Towns, and should also at their Request make immediate Provision for the building a strong House at Shamokin, and that he should desire and depend on their assistance in guarding the men he should send on that account from any attacks of any of our Enemy Indians."

At Council, Lancaster, Pa. 23 Jan. 1756.

"Attendance Lt. Gov. Robert H. Morris, Esquires James Hamilton and Richard Peters, John Fox, Esq., Commissioner, and The Connestogoe Indians. [In 1719 when the Schwab and Ream families arrived in this territory approximately 15 miles northeast of Lancaster, the entire territory was known as Conestoga Township, Chester Co., Pa. Lippincotts International Gazette, 1766, tells us--CONESTOGA, a post village and township southwest part of Lancaster Co., Pa. bounded by Conestoga and Pequa Creeks about 36 miles southeast of Harrisburg, Pa. Population 3,167, also CONESTOGA, a creek of Lancaster Co., Pa.

flows into Susquehannah River about 12 miles below Columbia. Boats ascend it to Lancaster City, Pa.]

"The Connestogoe Indians having remained peaceable in their TOWN on the Manor of Connestogoe [home of our Eberhard Beam family] and received a support from the Publick since the first attacks of the Indians on this Province it was thought advisable to send for them and give them assurances of a future support and a small Present as a Testimony of the Regards of the Government for them. They were therefor sent for and when seated the Governor made the following speech to them:

"I sent for you that I might have the satisfaction to see you and take you by the hand...

"I have the pleasure to observe by the several papers you have produced to me that a firm peace and kind intercourse have always subsisted between the Indians of Conestogoe and the good people of the Province. . .

"I do on behalf of the Inhabitants of this Province ratify and confirm the Treaties of Peace, Amity and Friendship subsisting between us, and expect you will do the same on your part. A Belt."

p. 8

"I expect you will not leave your place of Residence without first acquainting me with your Intentions and the Place where you propose to move to.

"A String. I expect further that in Virtue of your League with us you will not harbour any strange Indians. You may be assured all such have had designs, and therefor I must insist upon it if any strange Indians shall presume to come amongst you that you instantly give notice thereof to Mr. James Wright, or some of the Magistrates of this County, that they may be apprehended and examined. . . .

"The Indians took some time to consider the Governor's Speech to them, and then made the following reply:

"'Brother the Govenor and the Gentlemen with him: We most heartily thank you for your kindness in coming to Lancaster and sending for and speaking to us in so obliging a manner.

"'We have heard a great noise all about us and expected we should have been killed, but now that we see you here, we are revived and will lay aside our fears.

"'I am lame and infirm, or I would have waited on the Governor at Phila. as soon as I heard of his arrival. I thank you Brothers, for giving yourself the Trouble to come here.

"'You see, Brothers, that the Connestogoe Indians, formerly a large Tribe, are reduced to these few and that there is never an old man among them but myself, and I must die soon. I put them under your Protection; they are all young and some meer children and will want your advice and countenance.

"You may be assured if any strange Indians come amongst us we shall give you the earliest notice, and that we shall not harken to anything that shall be said to your Prejudice. You see by our papers that we have always been your fast Friends and so shall continue whilst we have a Being; and by this Belt I on the behalf of myself and all the Conestogoe Indians do ratify, confirm, and renew the Treaties of Friendship subsisting between us and again repeat my Thanks to you for giving me this opportunity by coming to Lancaster as I am not able to come to you at Philadelphia.'

"A Belt.

"The Governor then said he would order them some Goods as a Token of his affection

"The Secretary informed the Council that as he was this morning taking his leave of the Indians, who were about to set out for Conestogoe Manor under the care of Justice Thomson and Mr. John Ross, he was told by two of the members of assembly who lately came from Lancaster that two Persons would not be sufficient to protect them from being hurt by the People on the Road who were extremely exasperated against all Indians in general and particularly these Indians; that this information was confirmed by Mr. Galbreath and others who yesterday came from Lancaster; and that as one of the Indians now here who was lately sent in search of another of them that was missing, very narrowly escaped with his life from a number of men who assembled together on the Road near George Aston's, and were with Difficulty restrained from murdering him, it is highly probable they will also attempt to do some Mischief to these Indians.

"On this information the Council were unanimously of opinion that the Indians should not be suffered to proceed on their Journey

without an Escort to protect them.

"The Secretary likewise informed the Council that the Chiefs of the Indians now in Town came to him yesterday and told him that they were apprehensive their young men would be perpetually guarreling if the Six Nations and Conestoque Indians should be obliged to live in one place and, therefor requested of the Governor that they might live separately, and some place be prepared on the Manor of the Six Nations at a distance from the Conestogoe Town; and then in their further discourse with him they did not seem to be very willing to live upon the manor. It was therefor thought proper to send for the Chiefs and give them opportunity to speak their minds freely as it would not be for the public Service that these Indians should remain under any kind of Dissatisfaction, as to their place of residence."

"The Governor then recalled previous offer of new residence for the Indians and said therefore I leave it to your opinion whether you will reside on that Manor at a proper distance from the Conestogoe Indians or choose to go to Pennsbury, another Manor of our Proprietaries, situated on this river about twenty miles above the city where you may remain safe and well provided for till Scanoyady returns when further measures will be taken for disposing of you to your satisfaction. . . . and the said Indians after taking some time to consider and consult together decided to go to Pennsbury."

"I do hereby declare and promise that there p. 89 shall be paid out of the said 60,000 pounds to all and every person and persons, as well Indians as Christians not in the pay of the Province; the several and respective premiums and bounties following, that is to say: for every male Indian Enemy above 12 years old who shall be taken prisoner and delivered at any Forts garrisoned by the Troops in the pay of this Province, or at any of the County Towns to the keepers of the Common Jails there, the Sum of One Hundred and Fifty Spanish Dollars or Pieces of Eight; for the scalp of every male Indian Enemy above the age of 12 years produced as Evidence of their being killed, the Sum of 130 Pieces of Eight; for every female Indian taken Prisoner and brought in as aforesaid, and for every male Indian Prisoner under

the age of 12 years taken and brought in as aforesaid, 130 Pieces of Eight; for the scalp of every Indian woman produced as evidence of their being killed the sum of 50 pieces of Eight; and for every English Subject that has been taken and carried from this Province into captivity that shall be recovered and brought in and delivered at the City of Phila. to the Governor of this Province, the Sum of One Hundred and Fifty Pieces of 8; but nothing for their scalps; and that there shall be paid to every officer or soldier as are or shall be in the pay of the Province who shall redeem and deliver any English Subject carried into captivity, as aforesaid, or shall take, bring in, or produce any Enemy Prisoner or Scalp as aforesaid, one-half of said several and respective Premiums and Bounties.

"Mr. Weiser came and informed the Governor that SCARROYADY had been in Liquor two days and was incapable of being conferred with."

p. 90

Memo--On the 14th of April in the afternoon SCARROYADY and the Indians visited the Governor and desired Mr. Weiser might be sent for. He came with reluctance, and there SCARROYADY acquainted the Governor that he proposed to depart for the Six Nation Country in three days and take all the women with him and all the men except three, Aroas, Seneca George, and Cassiowea or New Castle, and desired a safe conveyance and that Passports might be provided for them. He expressed the joy it would give the Relations and Friends of the women and children to see them after so long an absence, and that it would give them at the same time an high opinion of the goodness of the Inhabitants of Pennsylvania whose

commendations he should think himself obliged to publish. He repeatedly said he would serve this Province on all occasions; that all the Oneides were at his Command as well as the Mohocks and Oneocquagoes; that he was in very great repute among these 3 nations and would use all his interest with them in favour of this Province; that when the fort should be built at Shamokin he would return with a number of warriors to help us.

p. 389 "The time limited by the Governor's Proclamation for a Suspension of Hostilities against the Delaware Indians on the East Side of the River Susquehanna being nearly expired, it was unanimously agreed that a further Suspension of Hostilities should be published by Proclamation to continue for Fifty Days viz:

> "By The Honourable Wm. Denny, Esq., Lt. Governor, and Commander and Chief of the Province of Pennsylvania and Counties of New Castle, Kent and Sussex on Delaware."

p. 70 At Council, Phila., 3 April, 1756, with Lt. Govnr. R. H. Morris and 10 Councilmen.

"Since the last Council several of the Indians were seized with Perepneumony, and Doctor Groeme & Doctor Cadwalader were desired to attend them; Moses the Mohock was in particular seized in a most violent manner on Sunday, and dyed on Monday morning. Three members of Council made the usual Condolences to SCARROYADY and the other Indians; gave ten strouds, Ten shirts and a piece of Handkerchiefs to cover his grave; and as he was a warrior, he was buried in an handsome manner and with Military Honours, the Council, the Commissioners,

p. 87 At Council, Phila., 13 April 1756, Lt. Govr. and 10 Councilmen. The Governor's Message to the Assembly as follows:

"Gentlemen: I have this day received information that a number of People from the Back Counties, Inhabitants, have resolved to meet at Lancaster on the 16th and thence proceed to this City to make some demands of the Legislature now setting.

"As Attempts of this kind may be dangerous to the King's Peace, and the authority of the Legislature, I think proper to give you this timely notice of it and, by the advice of the Council shall give immediate orders to the Provincial and other Magistrates to use their utmost Endeavor to prevent the mischiefs that may attend so extraordinary a Procedure.

"Philadelphia, April 13th, 1756.

"The Governor likewise wrote to the Justices of the Supreme Court and to the Magistrates of the City of Philadelphia, and it was left under consideration what further steps to take.

p. 88 Phila., 14 April 1756.

"MEMORANDUM: On the 14th Instant the Proclamation of War against the Delawares was published at the Court House in the Presence of the Council, Supreme Judges, Magistrates, Officers, Etc., and a large concourse of People. [The Proclamation and intercourse with the Delawares followed on several pages.]

p. 296 At Council, Phila., 24 October 1756.

"Captain Newcastle returned a few days ago from the Six Nation County but could not make the report of his Journey for want of an Interpreter. The Governor sent an Express for Mr. Weiser, who being indisposed [ill] had sent his Son Captain Sam, and by his interpretation assisted by Pumpshire and Jo. Peepy, Capt. Newcastle gave the following account: [6 pages omitted here due to lack of space.]

p. 302 A letter from Conrad Weiser to Govnr. Denny.

"Heidelberg in County of Berks, October 19th, 1756.

"Last night 10 o'clock I received the meloncholly news that the Enemy Indians had killed and scalped two married women and a Lad of fourteen years of age, and wounded two children of about four years old, and carried off two more; one of the wounded is scalped and like to die, and the other has two cuts on her forehead, given her by an Indian Boy, in order to scalp her but did not, there being 8 men of Fort Henry posted in two different neighbors' houses, about one and a half mile off; when they heard the noise of guns firing they made towards it but came too late.

"The people are moving away, leaving their Barnes full of grain behind them; and there is a lamentable cry among them. It is with submission a very hard case, that so many men are taken away to protect Shamokin (a Wilderness) and the inhabitants part be without it. I have ordered Eighteen men out of the Town guard of Reading to reinforce Fort Henry immediately, of which I hope your Honour will approve of. . . .

"I am very sorry that I cannot attend in Philadelphia, at this time; I have now an intermitting Feaver upon me, thought it therefore necessary to send my Son Samuel, in order to serve your Honour as an Interpreter to Newcastle, or any other of the Six Nations. I am, Honoured Sir, Your obedient, CONRAD WEISER."

p. 353 At Council, Phila., 8 Dec. 1756. MORAVIANS AT BETHLEHEM & NAZARETH BY MR. SPANGENBERG

"The Governour mentioned to the Council that at this Instance Mr. Spangenberg had made out a list of the Moravian Brethern belonging to the Bethlehem Economy, and a state of their Society in other parts of America, which was read and it appeared by Mr. Spangenberg's account that at this time there are at Bethlehem 516 persons, besides 96 children, some orphans and others belonging to some Brethern and Friends who are not of the Bethlehem economy. That Bethlehem makes out a certain Religious Society interested for the furtherance of the Gospel as well among the Heathen as

Christians . . . Sixty-two of them are merely employed in the education of our children at Bethlehem and Nazareth as attendants and Tudors. Forty-five single men, and eight couples of married people are gone to Carolina to make new settlement there and 50 more, who are come for that end fromEurope will go there soon.

[Anna Cathrina, dau. of Eberhard and Anna Elizabeth (Schwab), Reamstown, Pa., m. Johannes Leinbach, Oley, Pa., Aug. 1735. They moved to Bethlehem, Pa., in Oct., 1746, active in Moravian Church work, teaching in children's schools, Bethlehem, Germantown and Maguntachi for years. Moved to Washovia, North Carolina in 1765. (Bethania)]

"About 90 of the children at Bethlehem and Nazareth have their parents abroad mostly on Gospel's account . . . Some live in Townships joining Bethlehem Twp. There are 82 Indians besides those young Indian women who live with our young women, and besides the Savages who are going and coming and staying longer or shorter with us."

p. 603 Col. Stanwix to Govnr. Denny, 19 June 1757.

"I inclose you a copy of Colonel Washington's two letters of the 15th and 16th. . . . I was made to believe at any Time after a days Notice I might be sure of forty or fifty Wagons, but find myself now vastly disappointed, but shall move the moment I am able with as few [few?] waggons as I can, proposing, if a sufficient number can't be got to leave some heavy baggage behind, proposing to return again to this station when I can do it consistently, being well aware of the great Borders of this Province being left unguarded, therefor have pressed Col. Washington, Capt. Beall, and Capt. Dagworthy to give me the earliest Intelligence of the motions of the Enemy which must in a great measure determine me.

"If Lord Loudon is not sailed, if you think proper, should be obliged if you communicate these particulars to him.

"Col. Weiser hears that French and Indians have cut

"By all which we may perceive that the French are busy in all Places, some real and some to amuse. I shall endeavor to do that which shall appear to me the best for the service, who am truly Dear Sir, Your most obedient hum' Servt., JOHN STANWIX.

"A Post much wanted from Lancaster here."

TIDBITS OF FAMILY HISTORY:

Census reports for 1893 shows population of Reamstown, 539, Denver, 400 and Ephrata, 950. In 1962 Paul S. Lesher gave me his estimate for Reamstown at 1,000 compared to the 1960 Census for Denver of 1827, and Ephrata, 7694. All Penna., of course. Denver gained by accepting the Railroad that Reamstown refused.

A Dictionary of the non-English words of the Penna-German dialect, published in Vol. 30, 1924, by the Penna. German Society, Editor B. Lambert, A.M. On page 28, the writer's Father-in-law, theRev. Astor C. Wuchter, Toledo, Ohio, now deceased, is given credit for assisting in this work.

A petition signed in 1738 requesting a County of Berks included the names of Conrad Weiser, Nicholas Reem, Balser Reem and Johannes Reem. Fourteen years later the request was accepted by an ACT of the House in Philadelphia and made law on 11 March 1752.

 - 123 Space will not permit complete quote but the following will give some idea of the prevailing attitude and intention and activities of our Conestogoe Indians, our Abraham, the Manor, and James Wright of that area and of our famous Conrad Weiser.

p. 113

Under date line <u>Lancaster, Pa.</u> 3rd of May 1758, Edw. Shippen addressed a letter to the Governor which read in part as follows:

"I take the Liberty to acquaint your Honour that the Conestogoe Indians are going to leave their Town. I had my information last night from Mr. Ross of the blue Rock. He tells me that last Thursday they sent Mr. McKee (Interpreter) to acquaint him they wanted to have a conference with him, and when he came to them, they said they had nothing at all against him for he had always been very kind to them in supplying them with all necessary provisions but they had been lately at Phila. on a visit to the Governor to beg a few cloaths and particularly Leather for Moccosins as they were naked and barefooted, but that he had broken his word with them for after detaining them a good many days in Town he sent them packing away in the same destitute condition in which they came; and that seeing this was the case and they were not allowed to hunt for

Deer among the Inhabitants, they were forced to go into the wilderness to seek cloathing for themselves and families, and they proposed to go a little beyond Fort Augustas [Sunbury, Pa.] and there to build Indian Cabbins. But as they intended to return in the Spring they desired Mr. McKee might be permitted to remain in their town, and plant corn to be divided between his and their families when they came back, and as a token of their Friendship with the English Old SOHAISE gave him a String of white Wampum and then Mr. Ross [See Ross--Historical Marker East King St., Lancaster, Pa.] answered, and assured them he would supply their wants immediately from Lancaster. Yet, notwithstanding this Declaration, they said they were resolved to keep their Resolution. Then he let them know, if they would not be persuaded to accept his offer, he hoped they would accept some Beef and Flour for their journey, and as it would be unsafe for them to pass thro' the Country without an Escort, he would employ Mr. McKee to go with them to Hunter's Fort to which they readily agreed. That on Saturday, Mr. McKee came to Mr. Ross again and told him that the Indians were divided in their Council, whether to go off a hunting or to stay and plant their corn but that he understood by Betty Sock that Billy Sock (her son) and some of the young men were absolutely resolved to go (take her own words) and help the French, maybe the English. Since which time Mr. Ross has heard nothing of them. However, that to be a busy time with me, as I think this affair of very great consequence to the Province trifling as the number of those Indians may be, I have thought proper to visit them immediately and shall use my utmost endeavours to appease them and keep them back."

p. 114 The Governor speaking: (5 May 1758)

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"Brother TEEDYUSCUNG: All that you requested will be cheerfully complied with, and with the utmost dispatch. Mr. Hughes, one of the former commissioners who lives in town has acquainted me that he is willing and soon will be ready to go. Notice shall be sent to the other gentlemen who all live in the Country and you may be assured that this Business shall be performed to your satisfaction. . . . You may remember that I promised you and Moses TETAMY at EASTON, that who was committed on Suspicion of having murdered Indians, they should be tried according to our laws. An example of an accused being found not guilty due to a lack of proof and speaking of the Indian Wioning being held in Jail he added: therefore I am informed that he is a therefor I propose sending him out of the Country."

> "Teedyuscung replied to the Governor: "Brother be not discouraged, I assure you

of Success if you press on. For my part, I shall never let it drop; I will do my utmost endeavours so as neither one nor two shall ever Erect this good work. I know there are a great many flying stories more and a great p. 115 deal of bad news; nevertheless, let us press on. I would have you consider I have not all the Indians at my Command; there are many Indians still in the French Interest and here and there some may be found among us who pretend to be our Friends, but whose hearts are not true; therefore, if you desire it, I will go myself or send some sober Indians back in order to find out who has done this mischeif and if you desire it, you may send a white man with my Indians, who will see and judge for himself.

"Brother: As to the Boy who is in Jayl, as

nobody was present when the fact was done, he ought not be condemned to Death; if he be sent out of the Country, it will do very well. I desire no more; I have now done."

"The Governor let him know he took very kindly his proposal of going himself or sending some of his discreetest people to find out the Indians who had done the late Mischiefs. He added that he might depend on nothing on his suffering nothing to discourage him from bringing the present good work they were engaged in to a good issue, and that this Government would faithfully perform all their engagements, and promote, in every respect the Good of the Indians....

"The consideration of the Intelligence respecting the Conestogo Indians was resumed and a Letter read that was wrote to Mr. James Wright, requesting him to sift this matter, and to invite SEWAISE the head man of the Conestogoes to bring Will Sock and the other Indian to see the Governor; and <u>Mr. Weiser</u> was requested to lay in Town in order to interpret for the <u>Conestogoe Indians</u>.

p. 116 At Council Meeting, Phila. Monday 8 May 1758. "The Governor on Saturday received an answer from James Wright to his letter relating to the Conestogoe Indians which was delivered by SOHAISE, Will Sock, and a Cayagu Indian called ."

> Mr. Wright wrote in part as follows: "Much about intelligence from the Six Nations of Indians about the war.

"As to the Conestogoes selling their corn, they have always done it when they have more than they want for food, to purchase little necessities; I have heard some time ago that a part of their number designed to leave their Town and a part of them to stay, which is still their Intention; but they were purposed to go

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away privately, for about a week ago they gave a String of Wampum to Thomas McKee, with a request that he might carry it to the Governor and acquaint him that a number of them were going towards Shamokin to get some Deer, as they could not hunt with any safety in these parts, were barefoot, and in want of cloathing for themselves and their families, but that they left their cornfields and cabbins and should return next Spring, but notwithstanding these assurances, I am of the opinion the younger part of those who go will not return to settle among us, as indeed their way of living will scarce admit of it, for however kind the Government may be to them, yet Hunting is their natural employment, and that they have not dared to follow for two years past, except about my Brother's House and mine . . . [a story of Shahaise and others that will not leavel."

"The people are so prejudiced against Indians in general that I thought it necessary to procure a Substantial Man to take care of these downs. I heartily wish their Journey may be Satisfactory to themselves and of service to the Publick, and am thy respectful Friend. James Wright"

p. 122 "At Council, Phila. 12 May 1758.

"Shahaise speaking for the Conestogo Indians explained that after assurances of relief from the Governor through Mr. Wright, they had determined to stay. Then the Lt. Governor [Wm. Denny, Esq.] answered:

"I am very well pleased with the account you p. 123 have given of your Intention to remove; and much more so, that you altered your Resolution. "The Conestogo Indians may depend on my

protection, and that I will supply their Wants, so as not to put them under the necessity of removing. Shahaise's determination to stay, even if the others should had gone, shows Love towards his Brethern and discovers [deserves] a particular Regard.

"I have directed Mr. James Wright to supply you with Provisions from time to time, as usual, and shall also earnestly recommend it to the Commissioners to send you some necessary clothing, at present, you who are come down shall receive a small Present."

"SHAHAISE then complained of <u>ABRAHAM</u>, who had planted Indian Corn and sowed Hemp in a Piece of their Ground for several years for which he promised to give them every year a Piece of Linnen, but had not paid them for two years past. He desired he might be made to do them Justice. The Governor charged Thomas McKee to apply to <u>Abraham</u>, and if he did not immediately pay them the arrears to let him know and he would order him to be sued and oblige him to give a compensation for the Land agreeable to his engagements.

"CHAGREA informed the Governor that he was inlisted and had served in the Garrison at Fort Augusta, and that there were Six Months' pay due to him, which he desired might be paid him off.

"The Governor directed the paymaster, Mr. Young to settle and pay off Chagrea, which was done."

pp. 135 Cherokees Joining the English Against the French

137 "A Message from TECHTAMA and HOMWHYOIVA or the Wolf King, the Two Chiefs of the Cherokees, to the Delawares, as it was delivered by Lowe, the

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messenger, at Phila. to Mr. Peters and Israel Pemberton, June 20, 1758."

A few sentences will give you an idea of the import of the message:

"We have to acquaint you [the Delawares] that we have received a Tomhawk from our elder Brother; the English, and are going along with them to the war against the French and the Indians that are his Allies.

"We are going to war along with our Brothers, the English, but, as for you, you need not be uneasy or apprehensive of our doing you any mischief, for we love you as ourselves from the Heart, and will not hurt you, for we look upon you as ourselves.

"Nephews: Our Eldest Brothers, the Six Nations, have likewise given us a Tomhawk and desired us to join with our Elder Brothers, the English . . .

"Listen to us, We do not desire you should go to War at all. Formerly you used to wear a petticoat, and did not use to go to War, and we do not now desire you to go to War; you may stay at Home and we will fight for you; we are resolved to go to War along with our Brothers, the English, that you need not go to War.

"We earnestly request that you would come and see us the Ensuing Spring, at some of our Towns, that we may have the opportunity of conversing more freely than we can at this Distance from each other.

"We desire you to tell your Women to be industrious and plant corn, for they may do it safely, that they may have Enough for themselves when you come to see us, and Provisions for your Journey.

"We, your Uncles, the Cherokees, have a real Love and Regard for our Elder Brothers, the English and we hope and desire you may

have the same Love for them that we have. It is out of our particular Love and regard for them that we join in the War with them. We have already demonstrated our affection for our Elder Brothers, the English, by killing 20 Frenchmen, 12 TAWAS and 2 SHAWANESE.

"'You know or can have a clear guess how many of your Country People are Living on the Ohio among the French. We earnestly desire you would endeavour to bring them away, for the Tomhawk we have received from our Elder Brother, the English is exceedingly Sharp. It is a good Tomhawk; we are afraid we shall kill some of your _____ [as recorded on p. 137] in a mistake which we shall be very loath to do Why do your people continue with the French who give them nothing?

"'We hope when you come to our TOWNS in the Spring to see us, you will bring us the good news that you have removed your Brethern from the French and Shawanese and TAWAS, the friends of the French on the Ohio. We shall smoke our pipe and wait impatiently for that good News, and Endeavour to help the Road clear "till you come."'

"Here delivered the Belt [to Chief, TEEDYUSCUNG of the Delawares]. [A similar Belt to be delivered to the Six Nations as soon as he could go to them by water via New York.]

"The above is a true Interpretation. JOHN HART"

p. 129 At Council, Phila., 22 June 1758.

"<u>A message from the Governor of Penna. to TEEDY-</u> USCUNG and the Indians of Wioming--

"I am informed that the Indians about Diahoga and Osaningo are very uneasy with respect to two matters; One, that great numbers of Cherokees and other Southern Indians should come so far North; the other that we have assisted you in settling at Wioming. Now, Brother, in respect to the Cherokees, they came from their country at the Invitation of his Majesty and the Southern Provinces, to help the English General in the present expedition against the French, and we can assure you that notwithstanding the reports that have reached your country these Indians are not come on any

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evil design to hurt you, but to help their Brethern, the English; had it been otherwise, you would have heard from us, for we would never suffer them to hurt you.

"I have the pleasure to assure you that there is now in this city a deputation of Cherokee Indians on their way with messages to the Six Nations and they have likewise a particular message to you, the Delawares. They tell us all is good news for you and us. But the Cherokee intrusted with the messages is taken sick in this town and cannot yet proceed on his journey.

"As to the other part, respecting the Building of Houses at Wioming, you are so well acquainted with our motives and good intentions that you are quite able to answer for this measure to the Six Nations or any other Indians who think amiss of it, and we desire you will take all possible care to set this matter in a true Light everywhere, as it is entirely done at your request and for the good of your Indians; and as soon as we have the opportunity we have been some time past expecting of seeing and conversing with them. We will fully adjust this matter both to your and their satisfaction. . . ."

p. 130 "As the road of correspondence by way of <u>Wioming</u> is open, and we are convinced of your sincerity in doing us all the service in your power, <u>we now send</u> <u>you some white men</u> with these messages that they may be truly and fully explained to you, and we depend on your protecting and seeing them safely conducted thro' the Indian country.

"We know that the Senecas are your aprticular Friends, we would therefor have you send this particular Belt as an invitation to them in our name. . . .

"As I hear there are many parties of Indians scattered up and down the woods near Wioming, I desire you will endeavor to call them together, and to find out what Errand they are come upon, and send one or more of your Indians immediately off to me with the Accounts, and he shall be satisfied for his trouble. . . . "

p. 131 "It may not be in our power to restrain the Cherokee parties when out of our sight, from going beyond the Limits assigned them, as some of the Young Warriors are rash and headstrong.

"I desire therefor, you will caution our friendly Indians of this, and press them to keep on this side of the Susquehannah if they come Lower than Fort Augusta, and not to go over the West Branch of Susquehannah [River]."

TIDBITS OF FAMILY HISTORY:

Susanna, dau. of Peter Riem, m. Jacob Meyer. Their son Michael and his large family moved from Centre Co., Pa., to Stark Co., Ohio, in 1814 and purchased a tract of 900 acres at the rate of \$1.25 per acre. Of course, it was then a wild country and the family had to undergo many privations until the land was put into condition for cultivation, and lines of communication were opened with the more civilized and improved sections of the country. Stark Co. was afterwards divided and Michael's tract happened to fall into the new county of Summit near the line. Michael erected a grist mill soon after his location in his new home and sold it sometime after.--Geneal. Meyer Family by Henry Meyer, 1890.

p. 306 Excerpts from "Minutes of Conference held with Indians at Pittsburgh, Feb. 24, 1759."

Beaver, King of the Delawares, speaking to Col. Hugh Mercer:

p. 307 "Brother: You must be in earnest in your Treaty of Peace, for I shall do every thing in my Power among the Delawares to render it Effectual.

.... The Six Nations and you desired that I would sit down and smoak my Pipe at Kuskusky; what they desired me I intend to do, and shall remove from Sacunk to Kuskusky. I tell you this that you may think no ill of my removing from Sacunk to Kuskusky, for it is at the great desire of my Brothers, the English, and my Uncles, the Six Nations, and there I shall always hear

Colonial Records, Vol. 8 (Cont.) your words:

Monday, Feb. 26, 1759 "The Two Taways told me they wanted to go Home. . Then taking some strings of Wampum, I desired them to be attentive, for what I was to say was addressed to their Chief Men, and to all the Taway Nation.

"'Brothers: I am come to this place with a Friendly Disposition and hearty Desire to make Peace with all Nations of Indians. A great while ago the English lived in the strongest Friendship with all the Indians. At Length the <u>French came</u>, and parted us from our good Friends. <u>But now they are drove off</u>; we put out of our minds every ill Sentiment, and intirely Bury in Oblivion what has happened between us and the Indians during these few years.'"

p. 308 "'All we desire of the Indians is to deliver up our People, now living among them, and to break off from assisting and fighting with the French. We do not offer Peace to the Indians thro' [through] any apprehensions of their Power joined to the French for we have this last year defeated their United Forces in different places; but knowing the Indians have been deceived and many ill impressions of us made upon them by our common Enemy, we, therefore, out of pitty to them, and from the Remembrance of our antient Friendship are now willing and ready to renew our former Friendship in the most sincere and ample manner. The Speeches and Peace Belts of our great men will arrive in your Nation by the time you get Home and I hope your People will readily and joyfully accept of the kind offers their Brothers make them. Your great men are to consider that their Brothers, the English, from a few that came into America are become a great People, every Day increasing in numbers of men and warriors; so they should Weigh well whether it is their Interest to make us their Enemies for Ever, or now Joyfully accept the Peace we offer them. '

"Gave a String.

"They appeared well satisfied, telling me that my words should be conveyed safe to their Great Men."

p. 309 Thursday, the 28th, Feb. 1759, Col. Mercer of the Garrison Pittsburgh speaking to King Beaver of the Delawares:

"'Brother: Now the Country People are bringing up Rum and whisky it is very likely that the Indians will drink too much, and falling out with their Brothers here, may occasion our Quarreling, which I would be very Sorry for, and therefor I desire you would tell your People not to come in the Fort on these occasions, or if they do, to Behave civilly, and then they may depend on being treated as friends and Brothers. None of my People shall begin a Quarrel, but you are to consider that we are Warriors and will not take any abusive Language or Behaviour. If such is given by the Indians when in Liquor, I cannot Protect them from being ill treated.

"'Then I made the Beaver a Present of Sundry Sorts of Goods. He expressed a great satisfaction, and told me he was immediately to set off to the Indian Nations over the Lake and would use his utmost Endeavours to Establish the Peace every where.

Hugh Mercer'"

p. 330 A complaint filed by citizens of <u>Lancaster</u>, <u>Pa.</u> at Council Meeting, Phila., 13 Apr. 1759.

"That in Manifest Violations of an Act of Parliment an act of General Assembly and other wholesome laws, . . . the military officers have, by force, quartered a large number of soldiers in the private houses of that Burrough, committing great outrages upon the

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People, by seiging and depriving of their possessions and property, assulting their Persons (Magistrates not Excepted) in a Violent Manner, and by obliging them to pay sums of money for their quarters or to receive the Troops into their Private Families, notwithstanding the Magistrates offered to provide them convenient Houses for the accommodation of the rest of the Troops which were not billited on the Public Houses.

"That this has been done in an unequal manner to the great termor of the Inhabitants. . . .

"That there has not been the least cause, or necessity, that we know of, to justify these Arbitrary measures; a commodious Set of Barracks being erected near the City of Phila., capable of receiving all his Majesty's troops in the Province; that building them in that Place only was occasioned by the officers refusing to Quarter them anywhere but in or near the City. . . .

The complaint was signed by order of the House, Isaac Norris, Speaker and given to the Governor for attention.

p. 457 Present at a conference with the Conestogo Indians, Lancaster, Pa. 15 Feb. 1760.

"Richard Peters, Richard Hockley, Esquires, and Sewees, Billy, Sack, John, 5 young Boys, Peggy, Interpreter.

"Sewees, by a string of Wampum did let us know that he was extremely well pleased with our visit to him; and our enquiry after his health, and that we took notice of the women and children.

"He then told us that he was old and unable to get his livelyhood; that his young men had not so much as a bit of Powder or Lead to shoot a Bird with.

"John Ross, when alive, promised him a supply of necessities, but he has received nothing since <u>his</u> <u>Death</u>, and desires we will let the Governor know this.

"A String."

"'CANRACH CAGHERA:

"'I am very glad of the Opportunity of seeing you here; I have long wished to have seen somebody at

Lancaster that I could speak with; old William Penn had a particular regard for the Conestogo Indians. . .

"'You may, perhaps, think I will go away, but I tell you I will always stay at Conestogo, and these that are with me will stay too. You must be my mouth to the Governor, and acquaint him with our intention, and that we hope he will be as kind to us as Wm. Penn, and all the Governors to this time.'"

"N.B. This was communicated by the Governor to the Provincial Commissioners and two persons were appointed to supply them with necessities."

p. 458 The Indian agents at Fort Augusta [Sunbury, Pa.] acquainted the Governor that John Chickasalary was there and desired to speak with one Conrad Weiser, and the Secretary wrote to Mr. Weiser to take the trouble of a Journey to SHAMOKIN and received his [Mr. Weiser's] reply, that he was too much indisposed to go himself but would send his <u>Son Sammy</u> if it was agreeable to the Governor and accordingly <u>Samuel Weiser</u> was ordered to go to hear what John Chickasalary had to say."

At this point, Feb. 1760, it can be noted that our Conrad Weiser, who was always ready and willing to accept any call to serve his government as the Governor might direct was in poor health and accepted the call of the Great Father and died 13 July 1760. "His earthly remains moulder in their narrow house 1 mile east of Womelsdorf, Pa." See Rupps, History of Berks County, pp. 195-222.

p. 521 Jan. 27, 1761, the Governor addressed a message to the assembly suggesting a joint message of condolance and congratulations be addressed to his Majesty based on facts contained therein as follows:

"Since your last meeting I have received authentic advices of the Death of our most Gracious Sovereign, King George the Second of Glorious Memory, and of the ascession of his present Majesty King George the Third to the Imperial Throne of his Ancestors, with the universal applause of his people."

The assembly failing to concur in the proposed joint message offered by James Hamilton, the Lt.

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Governor resulted in a three-page reply to the assembly on page 522, 523 & 524 most enlightening on conditions in the province and the world in general.

p. 630 At a conference with Indians at Easton, Pa. Monday, 3 Aug. 1761. Present was Hon. James Hamilton, Lt. Govnr., Richard Peters and Benj. Chew, Esq., of ye Province Council; Joseph Fox, Esq., one of the provincial commissioners and several other gentlemen from Philadelphia and other parts of the province; Deputies of 8 tribes of Indians including men, women and children, about five hundred, Interpreters: <u>Samuel Weiser</u>, James Sherlock and Joseph Pepy.

Taking note of the fatalities of the war various Belts of Condolences and messages were received. For example, SENECA GEORGE speaking:

"Brother Onas:

"We, the Seven Nations, and all our cousins, are sorry, from the Bottom of our Hearts, for the Death of your men, women, and children and by this Belt we collect all their Bones together, bury them in one Grave, and cover them up. 'A Black Belt of 8 Rows streaked with White.'"

"Brother Onas:

"We, the seven Nations and our cousins are at a great loss and sit in darkness, as well as you, by the death of <u>Conrad Weiser</u>, as since his Death we cannot so well understand one another. By this Belt we cover his Body with Bark. 'A White Belt with 7 Rows with 4 Black streaks.'"

"Seneca George still speaking:

"Brother Onas:"

p. 631 "Having taken notice of the Death of Conrad Weiser and the Darkness it has occasioned amongst us, I now, by this Belt (taking hold of the Belt in the middle) raise up another Interpreter by whose assistance we may understand one another clearly.

p. 632 "Brother Onas:

"(Speaking with the other part of the Belt) you know that in former times, when great men grew old and

died we used to put others in their Places, now, as <u>Conrad Weiser</u> (who was a great man, and one-half a <u>Seven Nation Indian</u>, and one-half Englishman) is dead, we recommend it to the Governor to appoint his son (pointing to <u>Samuel Weiser</u>, then present) to succeed him as an Interpreter, and to take care of the Seven Nations and their cousins. We take hold of this Belt and clasp our hands together in Friendship and desire you will not neglect our request."

p. 633 At the next conference with the Indians in Easton, Pa. 5 Aug. 1761 it is noted that the three Interpreters present were: <u>Samuel Weiser</u>, Isaac Stille and David Seisberger.

P. 663 <u>A proclamation</u> by the Governor requiring subjects of his Majesty from other provinces, neighboring colonies come into this Province and without any authority from the Government to possess themselves and settle a large Tract of Land not yet purchased from the Indians near CUSHIETUNCK on the River Delaware and in the upper parts of Northampton County, to immediately remove and whereas the Chief of the Delawares and the Six Nations had complained and threatened to remove this intruder by force if they didn't leave otherwise.

As ordered by James Hamilton, Lt. Governor.

p. 763 At a conference with the Northern Indians held at Lancaster on Thursday, the 26th of August 1762 <u>James Hamilton, Lt. Govr. speaking</u> in particular to the Mohawk and Seneca Indians of the Six Nations relative to the return of our prisoners being held in Indian towns as a result of the late war had this to say relative to land that was once wwned by the Delawares.

"By this Belt you tell me that the English have a Longing Eye after your Land, and desire that we may not covet any more of your Lands; and say further that we have got all the Land belonging to the Delawares, and shall serve you as we have done them.

"Brethern; It is true the Delawares had a large Tract of Land in this Province, bordering on the river

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Delaware, which the Proprietaries of this province have from Time to Time, fairly purchased of them and have honestly paid them for it, which they have acknowledged in your presence.

"By the same Belt you desire we will not think of making any more purchase of Land, or settling your Lands by Force; for if we do, we shall push you back and leave you no land to live or hunt upon, and desire we would confine ourselves to NIXHISAQUA, or Mohony and settle no higher up.

"The Proprietaries of Pennsylvania have never forced a purchase of Lands from any of their Brethern, the Indians, since they have owned this Province. It is very well known that the Native Indians very readily sold their Lands to the Proprietaries, as soon as he arrived here in their Country, about Eighty years ago, and about Thirty years ago the Six Nations, observing greater numbers of White People than those old purchases could accommodate voluntarily sold to the present Proprietaries some Lands lying further West; and their number still encreasing at Albany, in the year 1754, they sold them more Lands, as far as the Limits of the Province to the West, to be bounded by a Line agreed upon to the Northward.

"And let me remind you of their kindness to you in this respect; for no sooner were they informed that you repented of this Sale than they immediately gave orders to their agents here to execute a Release to you for all the Lands over the Allegheny Hills which accordingly was done at Easton in the year 1758, in Publick Council, when a Draught of the part of the Country which the Proprietaries held by the Six Nations' Deed, on this side the Allegheny Hills, was shewn to and approved by the Six Nations some of whom are now present:"

p. 765 An interesting story follows, concerning the right to Lands up the Delaware River at a place called CUSHIETUNCK about 50 miles north of the Blue Hills settled by a number of people of the Connecticut Government that claimed all Lands from thence quite up

to WYOMING. The Proprietary of the Province of Penna. called attention to the fact that those lands belonged to the Six Nations and ordered them to remove away, but they refused to do it. They claimed they had purchased the land from the Six Nations. Etc.

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Minutes of Provincial Council, 1762-1771.

By the State 1852.

p. 35 July 6, 1763. "The Governor laid before the House a Letter received by Express from Col. Bouquet at Carlisle . . . as follows:

"Sir: I am sorry to acquaint you that our Posts at Presque Isle, Le Beuf, and Venango, are cut off, and the Garrisons Massacred by the Savages, except one officer and seven men who have escaped from Le Beuf. Fort Pitt was briskly attacked on the 22nd; had only a few men killed and wounded and dispersed the Enemy. Fort Ligonier has likewise stood a vigorous attack by means of some men who reinforced that small Garrison from the Militia of Bedford. The Indians expect a strong Reinforcement to make new attempts on these two Posts.

"If the measures I had the Honour to recommend to you in my Letters of yesterday, are not immediately put into Execution, I forsee the Ruin of the part of the Province on this side Susquehannah and as York County would be covered by Cumberland, I think they ought to join in assisting to build some Posts and saving the Harvest. It would not be less necessary to send immediately arms and Ammunition to be distributed to the Inhabitants to defend their reapers. . . HENRY BOQUET."

p. 59 "Oct. 20, 1763. MEMORANDUM. The Governor pursuant to His Majesty's Instructions under his sign manual dated the 15th of June last did this day issue a Commission appointing Colonel <u>James Burd</u> Commissioner on the part of this Province to act jointly with a Commissioner to be appointed by the Governor of Conn.

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in communicating His Majesty's Strict Commands to the People from that Colony who are making a settlement at Wyoming that they immediately desist from their undertaking and remove from thence within a reasonable limited time."

[Governor James Hamilton's Commission to Col. James Burd, County of Lancaster and instructions of 15 June 1763 from the Court of St. James printed on pages 60, 61 and 62.]

p. 89 At Council held at Phila. 19 Dec. 1763, John Penn, Esq., Lt. Governor and four Councilmen.

"The Governor having received on Friday last a Letter dated the 14th instant, from Edward Shippen, Esq., at Lancaster acquainting him that a Party of Armed Men had that morning murdered Six of the said Conestogoe Indians at their Towne, laid the same before the Board, viz. . .

[Following a detailed report of what happened at the Conestogoe Town as related by a young Indian boy that escaped and the Coroner inquest, the subject was considered by the Council and a letter as follows addressed to The Hon'ble JOHN PENN, Esq., Governor:]

"Whereupon, the Council being moved with the cruelty and barbarity of the above action and apprehending that the Indians who were settled at Conestogo were under the protection of this Government and its Laws, and that consequently the killing them without cause or provocation amounted in Law to the Crime of murder, advised the Governor to write immediately to the Magistrates of the Counties of York, Lancaster and Cumberland, to exert themselves on this occasion and issue Warrents and do everything in their power for the apprehending all the Principals concerned in the said crime and their accomplices and securing them, that they may be brought to Justice and further, that a Proclamation be issued, ordering all officers of Justice to be aiding and assisting therein.

[In Mr. Shippen's letter from Lancaster, he closed it as follows:] "These last came here this afternoon whom we acquainted with what had happened to their

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friends and relations and advised them to put themselves under our Protection, which they readily agreed to; and they are now in Our Work House by themselves where they are well provided for with every necessary. Warrants are issued for the apprehending of the murderers, said to be upwards of fifty men, well armed and mounted."

p. 100 At Council, Phila., 29 Dec. 1763. John Penn, Esq., Lt. Governor and 7 Councilmen.

A letter was read as follows:

Lancaster, 27 Dec. 1763, P.M.

"Honoured Sir:

"I am to acquaint your Honour that between two and three of the clock this afternoon, upwards of a hundred armed men, from the Westward, rode very fast into Town, turned their Horses into Mr. Slough's (an Inn-keeper) yard and proceeded with the greatest Precipitation to the Work House, stove open the door and killed all the Indians, and then took to their Horses and rode off, all their business was done, and they were returning to their horses before I could get half way down to the Work House; The Sheriff and Coroner, however, and several others, got down as soon as the Rioters, but could not prevail with them to stop their hands; some people say they heard them declare they would proceed to the Province Island, and destroy the Indians there.

"I am with great Respect, Sir

"Your Honour's Most Obedient humble Servant 'EDW' SHIPPEN

"The Hon'ble JNO. PENN, Esqr., Gov."

The story of further riotous groups <u>being formed</u> to do injury to the Indians, <u>especially in townships of</u> <u>Lebanon, Paxton and Hanover in Lancaster Co.</u> and the final movement of the Indians from Province Island (a few miles from Phila. on the SCHUYLKILL) under guard of a detachment of Highlanders under Command of Capt. Robinson, in their march through New Jersey to New York City is included on pages 101 thru 114 of this volume. The government was ready to undertake appropriate steps to protect these friendly Indians, but they decided to

<u>Colonial Records, Vol. 9 (Cont.)</u> move north. (See page 110, Council Memo of 3 January, 1764.)

p. 111 <u>A letter of 5 Jan. 1764, Governor John Penn</u> to Sir Wm. Johnson, Bar', New York.

"Since writing to you the 31st last month, I have had intelligence that the riotous parties, which I then informed you had <u>murdered all the Conestoqo Indians</u>, are again assembling themselves in such greater numbers on the Frontier and have given out that they will come and destroy about 140 other friendly Indians, who have, for the most part, lived several years at Bethlehem and Nazareth and have been lately removed into the neighborhood of this city for their better Security. But tho' I could easily have afforded them a sufficient protection, yet I chosen to gratify them in their desire to be sent to you; and have this day embraced the favoura ble opportunity of sending them off under the Convoy of Capt. Robinson's party of Highlanders now on their march to New York.

"I had two reasons for gratifying these Indians in their request: One, that they might be rendered easy in their minds and the WIGHALOUSIN Indians get home to their Families who will imagine them put to death, as they will hear what has been done at Lancaster; the other, that by then you may have an opportunity of representing this violent outrage as done in defiance of Government and that I have issued Proclamations; my second, being inclosed, to apprehend and bring to Justice all that are concerned in those barbarous murders . . . and I hope they will think it now high time to establish a proper military law. . . . JOHN PENN."

p. 101 At Council, Phila., 29 Dec. 1763, John Penn Lt. Governor and 7 Councilmen.

The Governor was advised to dispatch an Express to Mr. Edward Shippen, Lancaster, to Col. Armstrong, Carlisle and to Rev'd Mr. Elder at Paxton to exert themselves by using all means in their Power to discover and detect the Rioters, and to suppress all such Instructions among the People under their influence.

"The Council was likewise of opinion that a high

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reward should be offered for the apprehending and securing the Ringleaders of the rioters and the Provincial Commissioners being called in, and concurring with this measure, they advised that a Proclamation for that purpose be immediately issued by the Governor, offering a reward of two hundred pounds each, for the detection of the said Ringleaders, and that any accomplice, not immediately concerned. [The Governor's Proclamation of 2 Jan. 1764, page 107 read: By the Honourable JOHN PENN, Esquire, Lt. Govnr. and Commander in Chief of the Province of Pennsylvania and Counties of New Castle, Kent and Sussex, on Delaware . . . and signed "John Penn.

"By His Honour's Command,

"Joseph Shippin, Jun'r Secretary.

"GOD SAVE THE KING."

"The Governor [JOHN PENN] then proposed to the Council that his Brother, Mr. Richard Penn should be admitted as a Member of Council, which was unanimously agreed to by the Board, who expressed a particular satisfaction and pleasure in having so worthy a member added to their number."

p. 103 A report by JOHN HAY, 27 Dec. 1763, P.M., to Hon'ble John Penn, Lt. Govnr.

"A list of the Indians killed at the Indian Town in Conestogo Manor:

[The Council further advised the Governor to write to General Gage and Sir William Johnson and advise of the situation and directing them to command officers of the King's Troops at Carlisle to give support and assist the Government, and to recommend it to Sir Wm. Johnson to acquaint the several tribes of the six nations of the Governments action for apprehending the perpetrators of those Barbarites, that they "may not impute to this Government any breach of Faith with respect to these Indians."]

p. 132 At Council, Phila., 4 Feb. 1764, John Penn, Lt. Govnr. and 5 Councilmen, including Richard Penn.

"The Commissioners acquainted the Governor that they had received Intelligence by a Letter from Lancaster Co. and from Mr. WAINE, a member of assembly, that a very considerable number of the people living on the Frontiers of that and other Counties were actually assembling themselves with an intention of coming to this city to put to death all the Indians in the Barracks under protection of the Government; and that tomorrow morning was the time fixed on for the execution of their unlawful design."

[Appropriate action was taken by the Government in the way of deployment of the King's troops and the arming of citizens of Phila. and confrontation with the rioters from the West was avoided. For the full story of experiences of the Government and citizens on the frontiers and in Phila., read pages 132 thru 146. On

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pages 138 thru 142 an excellent presentation of the grievances represented by Matthew Smith and James Gibson for the rioters during this so-called Indian war and explanation of action by the General Assembly to move the Phila. and some other Indians in Convoy, guarded by General Gage to Sir William Johnson, Superintendent of Indian affairs in New York State.]

p. 138 <u>An appeal for equal representation by Free-</u> men of Frontier Counties with residents of Phila., <u>Chester and Bucks Counties</u>.

"We Matthew Smith and James Gibson in behalf of ourselves . . . the Inhabitants of the Frontier Counties of Lancaster, York, Cumberland, Berks and Northampton, humbly beg leave to remonstrate and lay before you the following grievances.

"First. [An appeal for equal rights with residents of Phila., Chester, Bucks County . . . our five counties being restrained from electing more than 10 representatives, viz: four for Lancaster, two for York, 2 for Cumberland and one for Berks and one for Northampton while three counties and city of Phila., Chester and Bucks elect Twenty-six. . . Wherefore, we humbly pray that we may be no longer deprived of an equal number with the three aforesaid Counties to represent us in Assembly.

"Secondly. We understand that a Bill is now before the House of Assembly, wherein it is provided that such Persons as shall be charged with Killing any Indians in <u>Lancaster County</u>, shall not be tried in the County where the Fact was committed, but in the Counties of Phila., Chester and Bucks. This is manifestly to deprive British Subjects of their known privileges, to cast an eternal Reproach upon whole Counties, as if they were unfit to serve their Country in the quality of Jurymen and to contradict the well known laws of the British nation in a point whereon Life, Liberty and Security essentially depend, namely, that of being tried by their equals in the neighborhood where their own, their accusers, and the Witnesses' character and credit, with the circumstances of the Fact, are best

known and instead thereof putting their Lives in the hands of Strangers, who may as justly be suspected of partiallity to as the Frontier Counties can be of prejudices against Indians; and this too, in favor of Indians only against His Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects . . . However, we hope that the Legislature of this Province will never enact a Law of so dangerous a tendency, or take away from his Majesty's good subjects a privilege so long esteemed sacred by Englishmen."

p. 188 At Council, Phila., 6 July 1764, John Penn, Lt. Governor and two Councilmen, including Richard Penn.

"The Governor proposed to the Provincial Commissioners at a Meeting of that Board, 12 June 1764 that in order to prosecute the Indian war with more vigour and to spirit up the people to pursue and harrass the savages in their own country, it would be very necessary at this time to offer great rewards, by Proclamation, for all Indian Enemys, Prisoners and Scalps that shall be taken within this Province and further acquainted the Commissioners that he had on 9 June wrote to Sir William Johnson to desire his opinion and advice as to that measure and whether it would in any manner interfere with the Indian affairs under his direction.

Whereupon, it was agreed by that Board that the several following Premiums he offered by Proclamation for the prisoners and scalps of the Enemy Indians that shall be taken or killed within the Bounds of this province, as limited by the Royal Charter or in pursuit from within the said bounds, viz:..."

p. 189 Lists details of rewards offered, but space will not permit listing them here.

Sir Wm. Johnson wrote to Governor Penn in part as follows:

"I am heartily sorry for the losses sustained about Fort Loudon, and on the frontiers of Virginia, all which will, I hope, be shortly put a stop to. In the meantime, I cannot but approve of your gratifying the desire of the people in your Province by a bounty on

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scalps and I heartily wish success to the design and to guard as much as in my power against the ill consequence of their killing any of the Friend Indians. I shall make them all acquainted therewith and caution them by no means to appear on your frontiers till affairs are settled. . . . I hope to be at Niagara within 10 or 12 days when I shall do everything in my power for obtaining an advantageous peace with the Indians who desire it for the benefit of the Colonies. . . "

Lotteries Authorized for Building of Various Churches

p. 243 4 Feb. 1765--An act authorizing a lottery for finishing of St. Peter's and St. Paul's Episcopal Churches, <u>Philadelphia</u>, Pa.

For finishing the Episcopal Church of <u>Carlisle</u>. Pa. and the <u>building</u> of an Episcopal Church in each of the towns of <u>York</u> and <u>Reading</u>.

Repairing the Episcopal Church at <u>Molatten</u>, in <u>Berks Co.</u> and the Episcopal Church in <u>Huntingdon Town-</u> <u>ship</u> in <u>York Co.</u> and for repairing the Episcopal Churches at <u>Chichester</u> and <u>Concord</u> and purchasing a Globe for the Church at <u>Chester</u> in theCounty of Chester.

p. 326 18 Sept. 1766*-Supplement to an Act to prolong the time limit for drawing the Lottery instituted to raise 3003 pounds, 15 shillings to be applied to the payment of the arrears of debt due for the finishing St. Peter's and St. Paul's Episcopal Churches, City of Phila.

p. 360 10 Feb. 1767--An Act to permit the Commissioners hereinafter named to sue for and recover from several persons such sums of money now due and unpaid on account of the Lottery for erecting a House of Worship in Borough of <u>Lancaster</u> for use of the <u>Presbyter-</u> ian Congregation.

p. 369 21 Feb. 1767--The date a number of House approved bills including the one listed above for benefit of the <u>Presbyterian Congregation Lancaster</u> was enacted into law, the Governor issuing a warrant for

affixing the Great Seal thereto, the House having been called to the Council Chamber for that purpose.

p. 392 20 May 1767--Date of An Act, made law, "for raising by way of Lottery, the Sum of Four Hundred and Ninty-nine pounds, ninteen shillings, to be applied to the payment of the arrears of debts due for the building and finishing the <u>German Lutheran Church</u> in <u>Earl</u> <u>Township, Lancaster County</u>, and towards erecting and building a School House at the same church."

p. 579 18 Feb. 1769--In Council. Chamber, the following acts made law:

"An Act for raising, by way of Lottery, the sum of 1687 pounds, 10 shillings to be applied to the payment of debt due for erecting and finishing the <u>German re-</u> formed church at York Town and for areas of debt due for the erecting and finishing the <u>German Lutheran</u> <u>Churches at Heidleberg</u> and <u>Lebanon</u> both of <u>Lancaster</u> <u>County</u>.

"An Act for the Sale of a <u>Church</u> in the <u>City of</u> <u>Philadelphia</u> to pay the debts now due for building the same and distributing the residue of the purchase monies arising from such sale, among the several persons who have been obliged to advance monies on account of the said Church.'

"An Act to enable Commissioners therein named to settle accounts of the managers and to sue for and recovery of them . . . such sums of money as are now due and unpaid, on account of the Lottery set up and drawn for erecting a new school house for the <u>High Dutch reformed Congregation</u>, and for enabling the Vestry and wardens of <u>Saint James Church</u> in the <u>Borough of Lancaster</u>, to complete the work by them begun; and also to enable the managers to sue for and recover money due to them for the Sale of tickets in the said Lottery.

"An Act for raising, by way of Lottery, the sum of 3099 pounds, 12 shillings for the use of the <u>first</u> and <u>third Presbyterian Churches</u> and the <u>second Presbyterian</u> <u>Church in the City of Philadelphia</u> and of the <u>German</u> <u>reformed church in the Township of Worcester."</u>

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p. 762 Passed 30 Sept. 1769--"An Act to continue an act entitled 'An Act to Enable the Commissioners. . . to settle the accounts of the managers and to sue for the recovery from several persons such sums of money as are now due and unpaid on account of the Lottery set up and drawn for erecting a <u>House of Worship</u> at the <u>Town</u> <u>of Carlisle</u> in the County of Cumberland for the use of the <u>first Presbyterian Congregation</u> under the care of John Steel.'"

p. 248 At Council, Phila., 17 May, 1765, John Penn.

"A Bill entitled a supplement to 'An Act for prohibiting the Importation of Germans or other passengers in too great numbers in any one vessel; which was sent up to the Governor by the Assembly in February last, was read and considered and several amendments being made thereto it was ordered to be returned to the House in the Afternoon with a verbal message 'that as it was presented at the end of the last Sessions of the House, and is a bill of some Importance, the Governor thought proper to keep it till this time under consideration and now returns it to the House with some amendments.""

Another Bill pertaining to keeping in repair the publick roads and highways within the province was sent up by the House in the forenoon was read and considered and ordered returned to the House with a verbal message that his Honour agreed to it.

EODEM DIE, P.M.

"The Governor received a verbal message from the Assembly by two members that the House acceded to the amendments made to the German Bill and having no material Business before them were inclined to adjourn this week and desired he would be pleased to appoint a time for passing the two Bills [referenced above];-on which the Governor acquainted them, he had no objection to their making an adjournment and would be ready to pass the Bills tomorrow at 12 o'clock in the Council Chamber."

At Council Chamber, Saturday, 12 o'clock, May 18, 1765.

"The House in attendance . . . The German Bill being compared with the engrossed copy and the Act for keeping in repair the Public Roads and Highways within the Province was presented by the Speaker of the House, which the Gov'r enacted into LAWS and signed a warrant for affixing the Great Seal thereto and they were ordered to be deposited in ye Rolls office.

[Maybe here we have part of the answer for the Excellent Roads in Penna. 1974- the early interest of the Government in good roads.]

p. 249 "The Speaker then acquainted the Governor that the House proposed to adjourn till the 9th of September, next if it was agreeable to his Honour, to which the Governor answered that he had no objection."

p. 334 At Council, Phila., 15 Oct. 1766, John Penn, Lt. Gov'r and two Councilmen, Benjamin Chew and Richard Penn, Esgrs.

"Eight members of Assembly waited on the Governor "last night and acquainted him . . . a quorum of representatives had met and having chuse their speaker, desired to know when he would be pleased to receive the House, that he might be presented for his Honour's approbation.

"The Governor having appointed this day, 12 o'clock for that purpose, acquainted the House by the Secretary that he attended his appointment in the Council Chamber and was ready to receive the house with their speaker."

p. 335 "The whole House accordingly came up and presented Joseph Galloway, Esgr., as their speaker."

The Speaker then requested "free access to the Governor at all seasonable times, "that their persons may be protected from all arrents and insults during the time of privilege accustomed. . . . these being requested by the Speaker as the rights and <u>Privileges of</u> <u>the Freemen of Pennsylvania</u> derived and confirmed to them by the charter and Laws of the Province" and the Speaker further requesting of his Honour that his own unwilling mistake may be excused and not imputed to the House, the Governor was pleased to make answer that

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he looked upon them to be essential in a Representative Body and the House might depend on his care in protecting them therein.

"The Governor afterward informed the Board that on the 1st of August last Mr. John Cox, Jr., of this City presented him a memorial setting forth that on the 19th day of June last, when the Sheriff of Lancaster County with a Jury, were pursuant to an order of Court, about to make a view of a Tract of Land in contest between the said Mr. Cox and Robert Potts, and about to run its Boundaries, the Sheriff was interrupted by Thomas Forster, Esq., one of the Justices of the Peace for the said County of Lancaster, at the head of a mob of about 25 men armed with clubs and other Dangerous Weapons, who, together with the said Thomas Forster and at his instigation, abused and assulted the Sheriff and Jurors, broke the Surveyor's chain and committed many acts of violence and outrage; that altho' the Sheriff produced and published his Authority, Mr. Forster treated him with very offensive and opprobrious Language and took great pains to inflame the minds of his adherents and provoke them to a forceable opposition to the Sheriff: That the Sheriff called upon him at several times to exert his authority as a Magistrate to command and keep the Peace which he refused to do; and that upon being told the Governor should be made acquainted with his conduct, he damned his commission, etc."

The Governor by letter immediately gave Mr. Forster opportunity to appear with witnesses, etc., to support his story of the incident.

"But that Mr. Forster had neglected to answer his Honour's Letter."

p. 336 "And that he [the Governor] had since been well informed that Mr. Forster, with several persons were indicted for the misdemeanors above mentioned, at the <u>last Court of Quarter Sessions at Lancaster</u>.

"The Council taking this matter into consideration, were of opinion that Mr. Forster ought no longer to be continued in the Commission of the Peace; the Governor, therefor issued a superseadeas to remove him from the

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Colonial Records, Vol. 9 (Cont.) magistracy."

p. 375 At Council, Phila., 14 April 1767, John Penn, Lt. Govnr.

"The Governor laid before the Board, for their consideration and advice a Letter from his Excellency, Horatio Sharpe, Esq., Governor of Maryland, and also a Petition from John Redick . . ."

The letter from Governor Sharpe, Md., was dated 26 March 1767, Annopolis, Md. and refered to John Reddick whereas the Petition was signed John REDECK.

It's based on trouble due to lack of a definite division line between the Province of Maryland and Penna. at that time.

It is difficult to tell just who a certain individual might be based on a single spelling of a name in the early days but let's assume for the present at least that the Farmer John that was involved in the trouble outlined in the petition was not our John Reddig that married Elizabeth Ream, daughter of Samuel Ream of our John Ream, 2g line, Reamstown, Pa.

A brief from the petition on page 376, we get the following:

"That by the last line run as a divisional line between the Province of Maryland and Pennsylvania, the same land lies in the latter; that a certain William Patterson with a number of his confederates in the absence of your petitioner made a forceable entry into his, your Petitioner's, dwelling House standing upon the said Land; drove from thence his children, siezed upon your Petitioner's wheat, spelts, Indian corn, rye, Flax, Hogs, Sheep, etc." Further information is included on page 376 and 377.

p. 436 At Council, Jan. 28, 1768, John Penn, Lt. Govnr.

Ten friendly Indians murdered on or near Middle Creek. A Report to Council:

"About 10 days ago they were at Mr. William Blyth's who lives at the mouth of Middle Creek, who treated them kindly and from his House they went to one Frederick Stump's, a Dutchman, who lives in that

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neighborhood; there it is supposed that some difference happened, but what it was we have not heard, but they were all found murdered. Six of them in Stump's own House, and four in a cabin at some distance from Stump's House and I am further informed Stump says he killed them all with his own Hands, and that there was no other Persons concerned with him in this act.

The Governor's letter:

"To our Indian Brethern at WIGHALOOSIN on the River Susquehanna:

"On my receiving this melancholy account, the Sheriffs were immediately sent with officers to take up this Stump as the murderer and for their encouragement I offered a reward of two hundred pounds to be forthwith paid to any Person or Persons who should apprehend Stump, the murderer, and I am in hopes he is by this time taken and no time shall be lost to bring him to Trial, that he may suffer Death in the same manner as he would do if he had killed so many white men."

p. 563 At Council, Phila., 2 Feb. 1769, John Penn, Lt. Govnr.

In an amendment to a bill to erect part of Phila., Chester and Lancaster into a separate County, a correction was ordered.

"page 5, line 11. Dele the name Benjamin Lightfoot and instead thereof insert William Scull."

[Do not understand this, since Berks Co. was formed from Phila., Chester and Lancaster Co. in 1752. I do know, however, that Abraham Ream, 3g of my line owned a farm in Berks Co., Pa., that was a part of the original grant to Benjamin Lightfoot. Ed.]

p. 564 "There was laid before the Board a Bill sent up by the assembly for the Governor's concurrance entitled, 'An Act to <u>Dissolve the Marriage of Curtis</u> <u>Grubb of the County of Lancaster</u>, Iron Master, with Ann, his wife, late Ann Few, and to enable him to marry again,' which was read, and referred to a further consideration."

p. 566 At Council, Phila., 8 Feb., 1769; John Penn, Lt. Govnr.

"The Board resumed the consideration of the Bill for dissolving the marriage of Curtis Grubb, and before they thought proper to come to any determination thereon the Secretary was directed to acquaint the Assembly, by a verbal message, 'that the Governor desired they would furnish him with such Papers and Proofs as they had received, to support the Facts contained in the Bill.'"

p. 567 At Council, Phila., 10 Feb. 1769; John Penn, Lt. Govnr.

Papers and Proofs as requested above in the case of a request for a Bill to authorize the Divorce of Curtis Grubb was laid before the Governor. Various amendments to the Bill were made and it was ordered to be carried to the House. All of the conditions of the Bill as amended are not made known here, but by referring to p. 580 we find that the Act to dissolve the marriage of Curtis Grubb became a law of the Province 18 Feb. 1769.

p. 606 <u>A letter from Govnr. John Penn to Colonel</u> Francis at Fort Augusta.

"Phila., Pa., 24 August 1769.

"Sir: As the New England men have not thought proper to observe their agreement made at Easton, but soon determined to retain their unlawful Possessions at Wyoming, I must desire you to exert your Influence in raising as good a Party as you can, in order to assist the <u>Sheriff of Northampton</u> in executing the <u>King's Writ</u> on the <u>New England People</u> at Wyoming who were indicted at Easton and I hope you will find the People in your neighborhood as willing to embark in the affair as they have heretofore Shewn themselves....

"I send you f_____, to defray Expense of the Expedition.

"It is hoped you will be able to procure the People to go without pay, as they have already manifested a very good Disposition to bring the Intruders to Justice and to support the Civil power of the Government under

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which they live. If the Persons Indicted have all left Wyoming, you will be made acquainted with it by Mr. Stewart or Mr. Ogden and in such case you need not proceed. I have a confidence in your activity and Resolution, as well as your Prudence, in this Service, and am, Sir, Your most obedient humble servant, JOHN PENN."

p. 607 A letter of Aug. 24, 1769, addressed to Messenrs Steward and Ogden by Gov. John Penn read in part as follows:

"As the New England men seem determined to remain at Wyoming, there is a necessity that the Government should take proper measures to bring the People indicted at Easton to Justice; AND for that reason I desire you will immediately repair to Wyoming in order to carry on correspondence with Colonel Francis, who is desired to assist in this matter, and also with Mr. Jennings, the Sheriff of Northampton who is properly instructed in the manner of executing the King's Writ against the offenders.

p. 608 "Instructions to the Sheriff of Northampton relative to his conduct in executing the King's Writ upon the New England men at Wyoming, Indicted for Forceable Entry, etc.:

"You are to summon to your aid as many of the Inhabitants of the County as you may judge necessary. It is expected that a number of People from the West Branch of Susquehanna will join you in the Neighbourhood of Wyoming whom you will also take to your assistance; but of this you will receive further and more particular Intelligence, either from Wyoming or Philadelphia, and you are to wait till such further information is given you . . .

[A full page of detailed instruction followed. It was signed:] JOHN PENN

"To JOHN JENNINGS, Esq., Sheriff of the County of Northampton. Philadelphia, Aug. 24, 1769."

p. 603 At Council, Phila., 18 July 1769; James Hamilton, Pres.

"Colonel Francis having Yesterday come to town from the Forks of Susquehanna [Fort Augusta] and brought the disagreeable news that on the ______ day of ______, an Indian man, called young Seneca George, was unfortunately shot on the west side of Susquehanna a few miles below Middle Creek, attended by the Board by the desire of the President, and acquainted them that He, with some other persons, had apprehended one Peter Read as the Person suspected to have shot the said Indian, and brought him before James Burd, Esquire, who after taking the Deposition of the said Colonel Francis, James Parr and William Patterson, committed the said Read to Lancaster Goal 'till further Orders should be given by the Judges of the Supream Court."

[The Board took the matter into consideration and decided that a present and a message of condolence should be sent immediately to old Seneca Goerge and the next post to Sir William Johnson should inform him of the unfortunate accident, that he may acquaint the Indians with it in the most proper manner.]

p. 604 [The assembly agreed to a list of goods to be sent to Colonel Francis at Fort Augustus (Sunbury, Pa.) as a present for Seneca George. The list shown on this page 604.]

"It is also agreed that Flour and Indian Corn sufficient for the Indians that may come to Augusta be provided by Colonel Francis on the Frontiers or at the Susguehanna."

At Council, Phila., 22 Aug. 1770; John Penn, Lt. Govnr.

"A Company of Indians to the number of 37 including men, women, and children, came to town on Friday and today five of their principal men waiting on the Governor they were invited into the Council and on their behalf SHOANASTOWN, a Seneca Indian, made the following speech to the Governor:

"Brother: "I am glad to have opportunity of seeing you; we are of your Brethern that live at Chenango, on theSusquehanna, and we come down to see our Brother, to tell him that We have of late had a good deal of sickness, and are in great Distress, our Brothers here have

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always been kind to us and We hope We shall now meet with the same kind Treatment We have always had from You. A string of Wampum. . . .

"Brother: We find what you told us then to be true, for We have come here without any Molestation. The way has not a Stick in it, but all is free and open, and our Journey has been safe.

"In former Times all this Country belonged to the Indians; now it is otherwise. You have a large share of it, and I am glad to find you carry on a good trade with Us, and We live together in Peace and Love. This is just as you promised it should be at the last Treaty. . . ."

p. 605 "24 Aug. 1769. Mr. Fox having at the Instance of the Governor provided a present for the Indians it was this Day delivered to them, and the Governor at the same time spoke to them. . . . "

p. 606 Instructions to Col. Francis at Fort Augustus, Chas. Stewart, Amos Ogden and Mr. John Jennings, Sheriff of Northampton County.

"24 Aug. 1769. Memorandum. The Governor having received further Intelligence respecting the Determination of the Connecticut People to continue to keep Possession of the Wyoming Lands, thought proper to dispatch by Express the following Letter:

"As the New England Men have not thought proper to observe their agreement made at Easton . . . I must desire you to exert your Influence in raising as good a party as you can in order to assist the Sheriff of Northampton in executing the King's Writ on the New England People at Wyoming. . . ."

p. 611 At Conference held at Shamokin or Fort Augusta by Col. Francis . . . and Indians inhabiting in and near SHANANGO in order to condole with and make a Present to Seneca George and his relations on account of the Death of George's only Son who was shot some time since by an unknown Person, near the mouth of Middle Creek on Susguehanna.

"Aug. 19, 1769. A little before Noon Seneca George accompanied by the Conoy King named last night by an Onandago Chief named GENQUANT, and about 53 more Indians of different Tribes, but chiefly NANTICOKES and Conoys, landed from their Boats and sent a message to Colonel Francis to know where they might speak to him who immediately returned Answer that in the afternoon he would be glad to see his Brothers, Seneca George and the Friends and Brethern he had brought with him. . . . The Rev. Doctor Smith of Philadelphia, who happened to come to the Fort about half an Hour before the Indians, to give his assistance in taking the Minutes, etc. . ."

August 19th in the Afternoon

Seneca George speaks:

"Brother: You sent a Letter some Days since inviting me to this Place; I invited my Brother Geuquant, one of the Onondagoes, to come with me, and likewise some of my children of the Nanticokes and Conoys and I also found other young men waiting for me to come down; and now we are all here before you, as if you was the Governor, for you could not expect me to come alone.

"Brother: We have met among ourselves this Day with many tears, but now we see you, our Tears begin to dry up a little, and we are ready to hear what you have to say, and you may appoint the Time as soon as you please and when you speak all of us will consider one with another what you say to us.

"Brother: I will speak one word more, I desire you would stop all your strong drink a while, for you and I can neither speak nor smoke together rightly if our young men should get Drink at this Council-fire kindled by the Governor at Shamokin

"Col. Francis was going to make some reply. [His appropriate remarks as intended are quoted in this paragraph including this: they should hear good things from the Governor on Monday.] But Seneca George got up and desired Col. Francis would not speak then, it being better to consider what had been said to him till Monday. The Indians then went to their camp and Provisions were sent to them. This Evening Joseph Shippen, Esquire, the Provincial Secretary, arrived at the Fort.

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Sunday, August 20, 1769

"The Indians having understood that Doctor Smith was to have Divine Service to White People assembled at the Fort, <u>Seneca George</u> sent Notice that <u>his People</u> worshipped the same God with the English and would attend Divine Service, which they did accordingly, with great Decency, and Isaac Still interpreted the conclusion of the Discourse, which was particularly addressed to them."

p. 615 Aug. 23 (1769). Seneca George spoke as follows:

"Brother: We have met here on this good day and as the Governor of Philadelphia has sent you here to speak to me I shall look upon you as in the Governor's room . . . and I doubt not your young men are likewise as well pleased as our young men are with what the Governor has said.

"Brother: I let you know I am not a king, but I am a Captain of the six Nations. But here is a King (pointing to last Night, the Conoy King), you will hear him, him speak good Things. His words and mine are one

"Brother: You may see that the occasion which has called us to meet here is not from a bad Spirit on our Past, but yours. The great and good Spirit put into the Hearts of our Grandfathers and yours to lay strong Foundations for Peace with each other and we must follow what they have done, and if we hide any thing in our Hearts from one another, this great Spirit whom you call God Almighty, will know it.

"The Conoy King then speaks: (Aug. 23, 1769)

"Brother: I am really glad to see you at this Fire which the Governor has placed at Shamokin and to hear what my Brother the Governor, has said and to see all these young men that are come with you. My young men are likewise all glad on the same account. A String, 4 Rows.

"Brother: I now speak to the Governor by you, Colonel Francis. I have put it into my Heart what the Governor [John Penn] has said. My young men have done the same. We all believe what the Governor has said

to Colonel Francis has come from his Heart. I will, therefore, now open my Heart, and you shall hear very good Things. 2nd String, 4 Rows."

King Conoy continued on pages 616 and 617 an excellent speech but space will not permit including here. A few lines quoted below will give you some idea of the nature of his address:

"You know best how to manage such of our People as have been overcome by the Evil Spirit, and therefore, I leave this matter wholly to you."

"There was also another Mark in this our old Friendship, that if we had but one Loaf of Bread when we met each other in the Woods, we would cut it in two and divide it one with the other. -- Let us all then cast up our Eyes to the great good Being to bless our Endeavors to preserve this our antient Friendship. A Belt, 8 Rows.

"You know that our Grandfathers made a Road between each other, which passes by my door and reaches to Onondago. We have now kindled a Council Fire at Shamokin. Let us both then be strong, that our young men, women and children may pass and repass and always be glad as they meet one another as they hunt in the woods."

"Brother: You and I are Brothers. The Nations to which I belong, the Nanticokes and Conoys, never yet since the beginning of the World, pulled one scalp nor even one Hair from your Heads, and this I say gives us a Right to call ourselves your Brothers. Although you have done me some Hurt I have never yet cast my eye upon that, but have always looked stedfastly to our antient Friendship."

"Tomorrow I intend to leave you. I was in hopes you would have sent me <u>a Squaw</u> to keep me warm at Night. Perhaps you have one to keep you warm, but as you did not send me one, I must go home to my own as fast as I can. But you know the custom is that you must give me a little Bread to eat on the way."

p. 618 Colonel Francis then spoke as follows: "I am really rejoiced to hear all the good things you have said and to find that the Governor's message

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to you with his small Present of Goods, have wiped away all the tears from your Eyes, and confirmed in your Hearts the old Friendship and good will you have to your Brothers, the English. . . .

"As to what you say about a Squaw, I have really none here. We keep all ours in Philadelphia, and we are as desirous to get home as you are. I am sorry that we have so little Provisions here. But you shall this very evening have all that I can get for you. Ι will kill one of our best Cattle for you. I will send you all the Flour I have left to make a cake on your way and I will give some Powder and shot to your young men to kill a little Deer to eat with your Cake as you go along. I shall likewise send you a little 'Walking Stick' [the Indian phrase for Rum] and am sorry I cannot make it long enough for a setting Pole, but really our Rum Keggs begin to run very low; however, I will make the stick as long and strong as I can . . .

"Colonel Francis having finished the above, which was received with great cheerfulness and many signs of approbation by the Indians, <u>Mr. Frederick Weiser</u> desired Col. Francis that he would be pleased to deliver in his name the following short <u>speech to Seneca</u> <u>George</u>:

"BrotherSeneca George: Now the Business of the Governor is finished, <u>the Son of your Brother and</u> <u>Friend, CONRAD WEISER</u>, desires to speak a few words to you. Myself and all the children of Conrad have had great Grief and many Tears for the unhappy Death of your Son, and our Tears have run down our cheeks in greater abundance because a cousin of ours, the Sister's Son of our Father Conrad, has been suspected of doing the mischief. He is soon to be tried by the English Laws, and if he should be proved Guilty, which we hope he may not be, We are willing he should suffer the same Punishment as if he had committed the crime against a White Man.

"Brother: This matter hath grieved and surprised us greatly, for neither the man who is said to have done this, nor any of our Family, have ever had any difference with our Indian Brethern, and time will shew

whether this man is guilty or not; and as we do not wish to skreen him from Justice, we desire you will not entertain in your Hearts any ill will against any of the Family or children of your old Friend, Conrad Weiser, on account of this one man, who, if he is guilty, must have been carried away by a very evil spirit towards the Indians, and different from the spirit of all his Family. As a Mark of our love to you, <u>I</u> who am <u>the eldest Son of your old friend</u>, <u>Conrad Weiser</u>, desire you will accept this small Present from his Family, to wipe all Tears from your eyes. A present from Mr. Weiser."

<u>Seneca George</u> having sat after this speech 3 or 4 minutes in a deep silence with his eyes fixed on the ground; and Tears visibly flowing from them, got up and spoke as follows:

"Brother: I have really been pleased with what the Governor has spoken by you, Colonel Francis, for making up this sad affair. Now as to what has been said by the son of Conrad Weiser, I am glad to see one of his -sons, and to hear him mention a little of the old Friendship and Love that was between us and our Brother his Father--yes, old Conrad Weiser was indeed my Brother and Friend. He was a counciller of the Six Nations, and knew all that passed among them or was in their Hearts. I am very glad the Tears have flowed from the Eyes of his children as they have done from Mine, on account of this unhappy affair, which has certainly been a very great Grief to me--for he that is lost was a Son that lay near to my Heart. He was all the child I had; and now I am old, the loss of him hath almost entirely cut away my Heart. But I am yet pleased my Brother Weiser, the Son of my old Friend, has taken this Method to dry my Tears.

"I assure my Brother Weiser this matter shall be remembered no more against his Family to their Hurt, but I will look upon it that an Evil Spirit got into the mind of the Person who did it."

"All the while Seneca George was delivering the above, he kept advancing still nearer and nearer to the Table where Col. Francis, Mr. Weiser and the other Gentlemen sat, and his action and whole behavior were

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surprisingly great. That part especially, where he spoke of his Son, was understood even before interpreted, by the tone and manner in which it was delivered. When he came to the last part, where he declared he had no ill-will to the Family of the Weisers, he sprang forward with a noble air of Forgiveness--and shaking Mr. Weiser by the Hand, 'I have [said he] no ill-will to you Mr. Weiser. None to you Col. Francis, nor any to your Father (so he called Doctor Smith) nor any to you (meaning Mr. Stewart)' and shaking every one by the Hand, then spreading out his arms and turning quite round to all the Company, 'Nor have I any ill-will to any of you my Brethern the English.'"

p. 620 "That Manly Spirit of Forgiveness and Reconciliation which <u>Seneca George</u> on this occasion, by his Looks, Gestures and whole action, made some of those at the Table cry out as he ran up holding out his hand to them, 'This is Noble,' for here his speech stood in need of no interpretation. Here the conference ended."

After the conference, James Nanticoke, who had been obliged to return home, sent this message by James Curtis, "That he requested his Brother, the Governor of Pennsylvania, not to give any Passes to any young Nanticokes that might desire to go to see their lands in <u>Maryland</u> unless they should bring some token from him and John Curtis, for that their young men had no business in Maryland, as they had agreed to sell their Lands to the Governor."

p. 621 Sept. 29, 1769. The Governor laid before the Board several Bills from the House for concurrence including the following:

 "An Act for the relief of John Galbreath, a Languishing Prisoner in the Goal of Chester, with respect to the imprisonment of his Person."

5. "An Act for raising, by way of Lottery, the Sum of f3543, 155, Od. one moiety or half part for erecting a Bridge over Conestoga Creek, where the Road crosses the same leading from Phila. to Lancaster; and

the other Moiety for paving the Streets of Lancaster, the Distance of the first Squares from the Court House.

<u>Future Bills for Raising Money by Lottery Prohibited;</u> The Board advised the Governor to return the first four Bills including No. 1 above to the House with his assent.

The No. 5 above to be returned to the House with a verbal message refusing assent due to late "Majesty's orders by advise of the Privy Council, strictly enjoining him on no pretence whatever, to give his consent to any future act for raising any sum or sums of money by Lottery, without previously writing to know his Majesty's Pleasure therein, and fully stating the several Reasons which may appear to him to make the Act advisable."

p. 663 At Council, Phila., 4 April 1770; John Penn, Lt. Govnr.

"Mr. Tilghman communicated to the Board a Letter he had just received by Express, from Charles Stewart, Esq., dated Easton, the 2nd Instant, which informs him that on Wednesday the 28th of last month, the New England men, accompanied by a number of Germans, appeared before the Houses at Wyoming, possessed by People under the Proprietaries, whooping, yelling and swearing they would have the Prisoners which had been taken from them and after expressing much abusive Language they began to Fire upon the People in the Houses who immediately returned the Fire, by which one of the Germans was shot Dead and thereupon the New England men, etc., returned to the Fort. . . .

"The Governor was requested to write a letter to General Gage advising him of the riotous conduct of the Connecticut People at Wyoming, and to request aid of the King's Troops to support the Civil Government in the Execution of its legal authority on any future Exigency."

p. 730 At Council, Monday, 11 March 1771; John Penn, Lt. Govnr.

BEDFORD COUNTY FORMED

"A law having passed on Saturday last, for erecting

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a part of the County of Cumberland into a Separate County called Bedford County, the Governor acquainted the Board that he thought it necessary to issue Commissions without delay [etc.]"

A list of individuals authorized to serve as magistrates, Justices of the Peace, etc., for both Bedford and York Counties followed. No names of special interest to subscribers for this publication.

p. 733 At Council, Phila., 6 May 1771; James Hamilton, Pres.

"The late melancholy Death of the Honorable Richard Penn, Esq., late, one of the Proprietories of this Province, having occasioned the Hon. John Penn, Esquire, to embark for Great Britain on Saturday last, the Council in his absence met this day and Mr. Hamilton as eldest Counsellor, acquainted the Board that the exercise of the Powers of Government (Legislation excepted) by a Law of this Province passed in the 10th year of Queen Ann, entitled 'An Act for further securing the administration of Government' now develops on this Board, which law was read and Mr. Hamilton proceeded to say that he was willing to discharge the office of President. . .

"The Board agreed that Mr. Joseph Shippen, Junior, be continued Secretary and Clerk of the Council."

An appropriate Proclamation, "Given in Council under the Great Seal of the Province, at Phila., 6 May, in the year of our Lord 1771 and in the 11th year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Third, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, France and Ireland, King, Defender of the faith and so forth.

"James Hamilton, President "By order of the President and Council. "Joseph SHIPPEN, Jr., Secretary "GOD SAVE THE KING."

p. 735 "6 May 1771, John Thompson of the County of Phila., Labourer, was tried for and <u>convicted of Felony</u> <u>and Burglary</u>, committed in the dwelling House of Ludwig Kuyn in the Township of Northern Liberties in Phila.

Co., 12th of Jan. last, and has <u>received sentence of</u> Death for the same.

"And by the other of said Records, it appears that at the said Court of Oyer and Terminer and General Gaol Delivery held on the said eighth day of April, before the said Justices, Elizabeth Grant was tried and <u>convicted of Felony and Burglary</u>, committed in the dwelling House of John Plankinhorn, in theCounty of Phila. aforesaid, on the first day of March last, and hath received sentence of Death for same.

"The said records being taken into consideration, and the said Justices having recommended the said <u>Elizabeth Grant as an object of mercy</u>, the President and Council were pleased to order that <u>a Pardon should</u> <u>be made out and delivered to the said Elizabeth Grant</u> under the Great Seal of the Province and the Judges of the said Court having reported <u>no favourable circum-</u> <u>stances</u> in behalf of the above named <u>John Thompson</u>, the <u>Board directed that a Warrant be issued for his Execu-</u> <u>tion</u> on Wednesday, the twenty-second day of May, Instant."

The appeals on the two cases above were held before John Lawrence and Thomas Willing, Esquires, two of the Justices of the Supream Court and of the said Court of Over and Terminal, County of Philadelphia.

p. 746 At Council, Phila., 10 July 1771; James Hamilton, Pres.

"Mr. Tilghman laid before the Board several Letters which he had received from Northampton County, informing him that a considerable Party of <u>Connecticut People</u> to the amount of 500 men, under arms are proceeding on their way to Wyoming, with a Design to dispossess the People settled there under contracts with the Proprietaries. The said Letters were read, and the Board taking into consideration the measures proper to be taken in order to prevent the Execution of that unlawful Enterprize, agreed as the only Expedient at present in their Power, to issue a Proclamation forbidding all Persons whatsoever to settle on any Lands within this Province, without Permission from the Proprietaries, or authority from this Government and requiring the

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Magistrates, Sheriffs, and other Peace officers, to enforce a strict Execution of the Riot Act passed the last Session of Assembly."

The Proclamation recorded on pp. 747-48 was ordered printed and copies for distribution sent to the Sheriffs of Northampton, Berks and Lancaster Counties.

p. 748 At Council, Phila., 16 July 1771; James Hamilton, Pres.

"Captain Amos Ogden, who came to Town last night Express from Wyoming, appeared at the Board and acquainted them that on Tuesday, last, about seventy (70) armed MEN from Connecticut joined by Lazarus Stewart and some others of his accomplices in the murder of Nathan Ogden, had arrived at Wyoming with a design of repossessing the Lands there, and prosecuting their illegal settlement. He also represented the distressed condition of the People who are settled there under contract with the Proprietaries, that they consisted at present of about forty (40) Men (many others being absent taking care of their Harvest on Delaware), and about one hundred and fifty (150) women and children who, on the approach of the Connecticut Intruders, were obliged to take refuge for their safety and defence in a Block House where they had but a small quantity of Provisions, which could not last them longer than about ten days; That unless some Relief and Assistance was immediately sent to them, they would be obliged to abandon their Settlements, and leave the Connecticut Trespassers the Possession of their Lands and all their Fields of Wheat and Indian Corn; That they had therefor requested him to come down with all the Dispatch in his Power, and make application to the Government in their behalf to grant them such assistance and Relief as they would judge would be sufficient to enable them to stand their Grounds, and remove the Party who were come to distress them."

p. 749 The Board took the matter into consideration and ordered a force of one hundred (100) men to be assembled to accompany the Sheriff to Wyoming to remove

the Connecticut intruders and as quantity of Provisions to be immediately assembled in Town and sent up to Northampton for relief of the settlers at Wyoming, and Mr. Tilghman and Joseph Shippen [Council Members] to proceed without delay to Easton to meet the Magistrates of Northampton County and consult with them on proper steps to be taken to remove the outlaws at Wyoming.

p. 751 At Council, Phila., 3 Aug. 1771; James Hamilton, Pres.

A report from Mr. Tilghman and Mr. Joseph Shippen who had returned from Northampton a few days before was received.

An attempt to raise the 100 men to assist the Sheriff at Wyoming by the Magistrates and others in New Jersey developed only 40 men. "Whereupon it was judged most advisable to suspend the attempt till the Harvest was over when there would be a greater probability of procuring a sufficient force and in the mean time to send a Party of about twenty (20) men with a supply of <u>Flour</u> to our People in the Block House at Wyoming who by the intelligence received from thence were in great distress for want of that Article, and were invested by four different Incampments of the New Englanders and the other Rioters."

The 20 men under command of Capt. Morris and John Dick with Provisions for relief of the distressed Persons in the Block House at Weyomee were met with a Sentry and finally a force of sufficient numbers to require their retreat after considerable gun fire and seeing some of their men fall although they could not say that they were killed, "They returned to a thick wood, a mile or two from the Block House where they lay the greatest part of the day, and then made the best of their way for the Inhabitants."

"The Board thought proper to postpone the consideration of this matter till further intelligence shall be received from Wyoming respecting the Event of the Skermish mentioned in the above Deposition, and the situation of our People in the Block House at that Place."

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p. 753 At Council, Phila., 6 Aug. 1771; James Hamilton, Pres.

Laid before the Board two letters Mr. Tilghman received by Express from Easton, Pa., one letter dated Easton, 5 Aug. 1771, from Lewis Gordon quoted letter from John Dick as follows:

"Sir:

Wyoming, Aug. 1, 1771

"Last Tuesday, about Break of Day, I arrived at this place with 31 men and the Provisions, and was attacked by the Yankeys (who had information of our coming by a Letter falling into their Hands which an Indian was sent with by Capt. Ogden). We were surrounded by their fire; we lost two Loads of Flour and got in with the remainder, with 22 men; <u>nine of our men</u> <u>are missing</u>; whether they retreated or are killed, I can as yet have no information; they have kept an almost constant fire on the Block House ever since from four entrenchments; we have forty-nine men able to bear arms, besides two that is wounded, forty-eight Women and Children, and are determined to hold out to the last extremity. If the force is not sent immediately, we shall be in a bad situation.

"I am, Sir, your very humble servant, JN^O DICK

"P.S. We had information by the Indian, the other party has three killed and several wounded."

In Mr. Gordon's letter dated Easton, Pa., Aug. 5, 1771, he reports:

"The nine of the Party which Dick mentions to be missing are all returned safe.

"The Board having considered what further steps ought to be taken for the removal of the Connecticut and other Intruders from the Lands at Wyoming, agreed that Orders be immediately dispatched for raising one hundred (100) men with the utmost Expedition to accompany the Sheriff as a Posse to Wyoming in order to enforce the Riot Act, and to pursue the steps directed by this Board on the 16th Ultimo. . . ."

It was observed that the money advanced for this purpose was nearly half expended; it was conceived that the Remainder would not be sufficient for carrying this matter into Execution.

"And as it was not thought proper to apply to the Receiver General for any more money on this account, <u>the President</u> [James Hamilton] acquainted the Board that if they thought the additional sum of f300 would be sufficient for the Purpose, <u>he would chearfully</u> <u>advance so much himself</u>, and accordingly requested Mr. Tilghman would call on him for that sum whenever it should be wanted."

p. 756 At Council, Phila., 19 Aug. 1771; James Hamilton, Pres.

A letter before the Board read:

"Ten Mile Run, 4 o'clock, P.M.

"Sir: I came here about half an hour ago, where we received the disagreeable news of the Block House being obliged to surrender for want of Provisions. We sent David Ogden, and an Indian in last night, but, as they could not get in, our People could not hear of their approach, otherwise they could have held out 'till morning. We were just sending off Flour, by way of Lackawanack, and intended this night to attack their camp over the River; one of our people in the Block House was killed on Tuesday from the other side of the River. I would like to know how to proceed further.... Andrew LEDLIE"

p. 767 At Council, Phila., 17 Sept. 1771; James Hamilton, Pres.

"It having been agteed by the Board at their meeting on the 19th Ultimo, that a true State of the late Tyots and hostile proceedings of Lazarus Stewart and his adherents at Wyoming should be laid before the Assembly and that it should be recommended to them to take effectual and speedy measures for the apprehending and bringing thoseRyotters to Justice, Mr. Tilghman produced to the Board a Draught of a Messuage he had prepared for that purpose, which being read, and some alterations made to it, was approved. . . ."

A number of depositions re the Wyoming situation were recorded on pages 767, 768, 769, 770 and 771 with the following added:

"Articles of Capitulation agreed upon the 15th day

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of August 1771, betwixt Colonel Ashur Clayton, Joseph Morris, and John Dick, commandants of the Block House, in Behalf of the Honourable the Proprietaries of Pennsylvania, and the Subscribers on behalf of the colony of Connecticut, on surrender of the Fort to the latter.

"1st. That twenty-three men shall go out armed, the remainder unarmed and to go from hence to their Respective Habitations, unmolested by the Opposite Party.

"2nd. That the men who have Families is to have liberty to stay on the land two weeks and to take off their effects, which they are to do unmolested.

"3rd. The Sick and wounded is to have liberty to stay and keep such persons as they think proper for nurses, and to send for a Doctor.

"The above articles, we, the Subscribers, do bind ourselves by the Honor and Faith of Gentlemen, to abide by and perform.

"ZEBULON BUTLER, LAZARUS STEWART, JOHN SMITH."

p. 772 A message from the President and Council to the Assembly:

"Gentlemen: As by the Laws of this Province the administration of the Government, upon the Departure of our late Governor, devolved upon us, we cannot consistant with our duty, omit to lay before you a matter which appears to us a very serious nature, and nearly to concern the peace and good order of the Province... [A general recapitulation of the Riot Act, posting rewards for apprehension of Lazarus Stewart and his accomplices causing trouble in the Wyoming area without results and the forcing of our lawful owners of land into a Block House for safety for a period of 16 or 17 days, about 40 families altogether included in this letter.]

"At length, our people, reduced to the last Extremity for want of Provisions, since which it is reported that the Intruders have burnt the Block House and are fortifying themselves at a more convenient place in the neighborhood and that they have intentions of seizing on Fort Augusta and the Provincial Cannon and other warlike stores there.

"We must inform you Gentlemen, that upon the first Intimation of these last violences, the Government took every step in their power at a very great expence, to raise a sufficient Posse to enforce the Execution of the Riot Act against the Intruders, and to apprehend the offenders, and that Several of the Magistrates of Northampton County were on their way to Wyoming with a posse when they received Intelligence of the surrender of the Block House; and upon being well apprized of the insufficiency of that Force, and that it would require a much greater one to apprehend and bring the Ryotters to Justice, we ordered the Posse to be discharged, and determined to lay the case before you at your present meeting."

p. 773 "Your own understandings, Gentlemen, will point out to you the fatal consequences of suffering these lawless people to remain long in the possessions they have thus obtained, as it were by open War . . .

"The Secretary will lay before you two depositions which prove the facts above stated.

"Sept. 18, 1771 JAMES HAMILTON, Pres."

p. 778 At Council, Phila., 5 Oct. 1771; James Hamilton, Pres.

"A Transcript of the Record of the Conviction of George Spots was then laid before the Board . . .

"George Spots of Phila. Co., Labourer, was tryed and convicted of Fellony and Robbery committed by him on the Kings high way on the 2nd of April last, and that he hath received sentence of Death for the same.

"The said record being taken into consideration, and the said Justices and the Jury by whom he was convicted having recommended him as an Object of Compassion, it was agreed that he should be Reprieved, on condition that he remove from this Province, and never more return to it."

p. 779 By order of the Board a letter as follows to the Proprietaries: "Phila., 8 Oct. 1771

"May it please your Honors:

"In our Letter of the 20th of Aug. last we

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acquainted you of the unfavourable situation of your affairs at Wyoming, and that we had an intention of laying the matter before the assembly, in hopes of their assistance. We did so, and now inclose your copies of our message and their answer; by which, you will perceive the uncertainty of succeeding in our application. We have dispatched a messenger to the Governor of Connecticut to know whether that Government have given any countenance or authority to the Proceedings of their people at Wyoming. [Express recorded on page 777.] If they should deny that they act under the authority of Government (as we conceive they will) it is thought it may favor the application we intend to make to the approaching assembly. If they should avow their proceedings it may be a proper foundation for an application at home. Our intelligence from Wyoming is that their numbers have not increased as was expected: that there is a Disagreement between the New England men and Stewart's Party, and that they are not preparing for a crop of Winter Grain [wheat].

p. 780 "From a view of what it [is?] past, we think it highly probable that nothing but the Interposition of the King and Council can put an end to this troublesome and expensive Business.

"We inclose copies of a Letter and Deposition just cometo hand from the Westward, which seem strongly to point out the necessity of ascertaining that Frontier.

p. 780 At Council, Phila., 16 Oct. 1771; James Hamilton, Pres.

The President acquainted the Board that a Committee

of Assembly had waited on him yesterday and advised that a speaker had been chosen and they were ready to receive any business the Council might have to lay before them.

"But on Receiving an account this morning that Capt. Falconer's Ship was arrived in the River from London, with the Honourable Richard Penn, Esquire, our Governor, on Board, it was agreed to defer all Business with the House 'till he should come up to the City.

p. 782 At Council, Phila., 16 Oct. 1771; Hon. Richard Penn, Lt. Govnr.

"The Honourable Proprietaries, Thomas Penn and John Penn, Esquires, having been pleased to appoint Richard Penn, Esquire, to be Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Pennsylvania and Counties of New Castle, Kent and Sussex, on Delaware, he produced his Commission under the Hands and Seals of the said Proprietaries bearing date the 15th day of July, last, with their Warrant for affixing the great Seal thereto; and also a Certificate under the Seal of the Privy Council, dated the sixteenth of August, last, declaring his Majesty's approbation of Richard Penn, Esquire to be Lieutenant Governor of the said Province and Counties and his having taken the usual oaths. The Secretary was thereupon sent to the keeper of the Great Seal to get the Seal affixed to the said Commission, and the Seal was accordingly affixed thereto. Sometime after his return the Governor attended by the Council, Mayor, Aldermen and Common Council, and proceeded by the Sheriff and his officers, went to the Court House, where his Commission was published with due solemnity in the presence of a very great conncourse of People.

"The Commission and certificate were ordered to be Recorded in the Rolls Office."

The next session of the Council was held 17 Oct. 1771 where it is recorded on pp.783-4 a Proclamation by the new Lt. Govnr. wherein he refers to his appointment with all necessary powers and authority for the well Governing of the same which said appointment the King's most excellent Majesty, in a Council held at St. James' the 16th day of August last, was graciously pleased to

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allow and approve of . . . and I do hereby further command and require all Magistrates, Officers, and Commissioners whatsoever, in whom any Public Trust is Reposed in the Government of the said Province and Counties, that they diligently proceed in the perform and discharge of their respective duties therein, for the safety, peace and well-being of the same.

p. 784 "Given under my hand and the Great Seal of the Province at Phila., the 17th of October, in the 11th year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the 3rd, by Grace of God.of Great Britain, France and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, and so forth, and in the year of our Lord 1771.

"Richard Penn.

"By his Honour's Command. "Joseph Shippen, Jr., Secr'y. "GOD SAVE THE KING."

Tid-bits of Family History:

Maria Ann Ream, daughter of John Ream, g. 3, son of Tobias, Eberhard, Reamstown, Pa., while checking and counting lumber in her Brother's Lumber yard in Cass County, Ill. was approached by a young man on horseback by name of John H. Fox, later to become her husband. Apparently she informed John that her name was Maria Malone. Explaining later, she said: "I lived with the Malone family but my name was really, Maria Ream, at least, that was the way I was taught to write it, I have always lived with the Malone family both here and in Penna, and most of the time they call me Maria Malone." John said: "the Malones are French aren't they?" Maria said, "Yes, I am too, so they tell me, even though I was left in a Dutch family when my parents died. I have always admitted half each, that seems only fair under the circumstances." (Fox Family History; Ivadell Smith, Ill. Member HS 178-2.)

p. 1 At Council, 19 Oct. 1771, RICHARD PENN, Lt. Govnr.

From an address of Speaker of the House to Lt. Govnr. Richard Penn, the following:

"The Representatives of the Freemen of the Province of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, sincerely congratulate your Honour on your safe arrival and accession to this Government.

"The appointment of a Gentleman who has resided several years among us and acquired a knowledge of the circumstances of the Province is extremely agreeable to us . . . "

p. 91 At the Court at St. James, 30 June 1773.

John Penn, Esq., declared to be Deputy or Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Pennsylvania for and on behalf of Thomas Penn, Esq. . . .

"That your Petitioners being seated in consequence of regular purchases from the Proprietaries of Penna., in the said County of Northumberland . . . have nevertheless been under the necessity of combating and struggling with many difficulties and embarrassments of so alarming a nature as scarce to be parallelled in history of any civilized Country; that the Colony of Connecticut sets up a claim to the lands seated, improved and rendered valuable by your Petitioners' Labour; . . That about two years ago a number of your Petitioners were in a Hostile manner ousted of their Possession at Wyoming and Cruelly stripped and plundered of their effects; . . . a large body of Colonial Records, Vol. 10 (Cont.)

armed men from Connecticut in June last attempted to dispossess the Inhabitants of the West Branch of Susquehanna and though prevented, it was not without much fatigue, expence, and great Danger of Bloodshed; . . .

"The said Petition being taken into consideration, it was the opinion of the Board that the same should be laid before the Assembly, accompanyed by a message from the Governor to enforce it; Messrs. Chew, Tilghman, Allen and Shippen are appointed to prepare a Draught of a Proper message for that Purpose."

p. 197 July 18th 1774, JOHN PENN, Governor.

"A Committee of Assembly presented to the Governor for his concurrence two Bills, entitled 'An Act to continue an Act entitled An Act to Amend the Act entitled An Act to Prevent the Exportation of Bread and Flour not Merchantable;" and

"An Act for Lending the sum of eight hundred Pounds to the several and respective Counties of <u>Bedford</u>, <u>Northumberland</u>, and <u>Westmoreland</u> for building a Court House and Prison in each of the same counties."

EODEM DIE, at NOON

"A Committee of Assembly waited on the Governor with copy of a resolution of the House proposing that they adjourn 19th Sept. next if he had no objection to that time, and also requested to know when he would be pleased to pass the Bills which he had agreed to.

"To which The Governor replied that he had no objection to their proposed adjournment and would go immediately to the Council Chamber in order to pass the Bills."

p. 251 End of the Proprietary Government Brewing

At Council, Phila., 1 May 1775, John Penn, Govnr.

The Board approved draft of a message of the Govnr. to the Assembly including a Resolution of the House of Commons as follows:

"Gentlemen:

"I have ordered the Secretary to lay before you a <u>Resolution entered into by the British House of Com-</u><u>mons</u> the 20th of February last, relative to the unhappy differences subsisting between our <u>Mother Country</u> and

"The Governor having received Yesterday from the Assembly by two members a List of Draughts and Certificates proposed to be discharged by the Bill for the support of the Government of this Province and Payment of the Public Debts, laid the same before the Board which was read and follows in these words, viz:

They must acknowledge the Laudable Zeal with which your Committee has at all times carried into execution the recommendation of such powers as acted under the People; But particularly your ready and cheerfull obedience to the <u>Ordinance of Convention for disarming of nonassociators.</u>

"The embarrassments you Labor under is Consequence of Resolves of Congress and others, which, from the

confused state of the times, appeared somewhat contradictory, appears to us excusable . . . "

"Also the Council to consider whether they will keep the same in pay until the 15th day of Sept. next, provided the officers, or any of them, should not be sooner appointed in, or any of the men before that time enter into the Continental Battalion now to be raised in Bedford and Westmoreland Counties.

"Resolved, That the said two companies be continued in pay until the 15th Septr' next and that application be made to <u>Congress</u> to defray the expense thereof."

p. 714 In Council of Safety, Sept. 10, 1776, Thos. Wharton, Jun'r President.

"An order was drawn on Jno M. Nesbitt, Esqr., Treasurer, was directed to pay Mr. Isaac Levan f50 0 0, on acc't of the Committee of <u>Berks County</u> for supplying the Families of poor associators who are now in actual service, with necessities, to be charged to said committee.

LANCASTER COUNTY, PA., THE RICHEST AGR. CO. OF NATION This fact is reported again by John G. ZOOK in his book of Dec. 21, 1905, titled, "Historical and Pictorial LITITZ," Pa., wherein he writes: ". . . our little town so beautifully situated in the <u>richest agricul-</u> <u>tural county of the Nation</u>." p. 17 A Report from Samuel Hazard to Wm. F. Johnston, Govnr. of Penna., Dec. 31, 1851.

"Sir: Having so far completed the selection and arrangement of the unpublished papers remaining in the office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth, as to render them ready to be placed in the hands of the printers, as soon as the proposals are opened and the decision made as to the successful bidder; allow me to submit to your Excellency the following statement of the progressive steps by which this result has been obtained:

"Soon after receiving from your Excellency a Commission appointing me, under the law passed at the last session of the Legislature, to the responsible duty of selecting 'for publication such of the original documents, letters, treaties, and other papers, prior in date to the peace of 1783, now preserved in the Secretary's office,' I repaired in March last to Harrisburg where, as your Excellency well knows, I have ever since been, constantly and laboriously engaged in their arrangement.

"Exposed as these papers have been for many years, to the free examination of all persons who from curiosity, a desire of information, or in some cases, no doubt from a more improper motive, have obtained a sight of them, it is not surprising that many are not to be found at this time, nor that they should in the language of the Committee, 'be in such disorder that the endorsements serve only to mislead.'

"This very early led to the discovery of the fact that very few of the papers relating to the early period of the colony under the government of the original founder were now to be seen. . . . "

p. 19 ". . . . It is much to be regretted that some of the autographs of distinguished persons have been removed from the correspondence of this period."

First Series, Vol. 1 (Cont.)

p. 20 "The law only provides for continuing the Archives to 1783, while the Colonial Records are to be brought down to 1790. I would respectfully suggest that both terminate with 1790. The <u>number of volumes</u> of the Archives is by law limited to five while the Records are unlimited. . . The number of volumes ought, therefore, to be regulated by the materials. SAML. HAZARD"

p. 21 "On motion of Messrs. Muhlenberg and Fernon, the Senate resolved to print 2,000 copies of the Report in English and 500 in German."

*2. All Public Houses shall continue for the uses which now they are for.

"3. All people shall continue free Denizens and enjoy their lands, houses, goods, shipps, wheresoever they are within this Countrey, and dispose of them as they please.

"4. If any Inhabitants have a mind to remove himselfe, he shall have a year and six weeks from this day.

"5. If any officers of State or Publick Minister of State have a minde to go to England, they shall be transported fraight free in his Maties frigotts, when these frigotts shall return thither.

"6. It is consented to that any people may freely come from the Netherlands and plant in this Countrey.

"8. The Dutch here shall enjoy the liberty of their Consciences in divine worship and church discipline.

"9. No Dutchman here or Dutch ship here shall upon any occasion be prest to serve in warr against any Nation whatever.

"10. That the Townsmen of the Manhattoes shall not have any soldier quartered upon them without being satisfied and paid for them by their Officers. . .

"11. The Dutch here shall enjoy their own Customs concerning their inheritances.

p. 26 "14. If any Dutch living here shall at any time desire to travail or traffique into England, or any place, or Plantacon, in obedience to his Matye of England or with the Indians, he shall have (upon his request to the Governor) a certificate that he is a free Denizen of this place and liberty to do soe.

"18. If it do appear that the West India Company of Amsterdam do really ow any sumes of money to any person here, it is agreed that recognicon and other dutyes payable by ships going for the Netherlands be continued for six months longer.

. . . .

"23. If there be any soldiers that will go into Holland, and if the Company of West India in Amsterdam, or any private persons here will transport them into Holland, then they shall have a safe passport from Coll. Richard Nicolls, Deputy Governor, under his royal

"These are to Certifye all whom it may concerne y' on the 20th of July 1672 I did give and grant unto Captne Edmund Cantwell and Mr. Jo Dehaes a Tract of Upland Meadow or Marish in pporcon (lying and being on ve East side of Delaware river next adjoining to the FINNS land at Pompion-hooke) conteyning 700 acres, upon condicon yt they should purchase ye same from the Indians and setle it, which they having pformed accordingly was to have a Patent for it; But my absence being in England, and the coming of ye Dutch did hinder the Patenning of it: Notwithstanding Alteracon since by my Ld; Berkeleys disposing of his interest to ye pte of ye Countrey. Yet the sd; Cantwell and Dehaes ought to enjoy the land as being pperly their own Lott, by prmise from me and the purchassing it from the Indians, paying the L: Quitt-Rent a halfepenny per acre. Which said Tract of land is Butted and bounded as followeth. Beginning at a marked white-oake standing in a Bay by the Riverside, being a bounded tree of the Finns-land and running with the sd. L and East-North-East 320 pearches to a marked Red-Oake standing neare head of Calwells-Creeke. . . . I have hereunto set my hand and seale at Elizabeth-Towne ye 22d day of 8ber, 1675. PHILLIP CARTERETT

p. 37 "OBLIGATION OF COUNCILMEN, ELECTED 1681. "Whereas, wee whose hands and Seals are hereunto Sett are chosen by Wm. Markham (agent to Wm. Penn, Esq. "350 fathams of Wampam, 20 white blankets, 20 fathams of Strawd waters, 60 fathams of Duffields, 20 kettles, ffower whereof large, 20 Gunns, 20 Coates, fforty shirts, fforty payre of Stockings, fforty Howes, 40 axes, 2 barrels of Powder, 200 Barres of Lead, 200 knives, 200 small Glasses, 12 pavre of Shoes, 40 copper Boxes, 40 Tobacco Toungs, 2 small Barrells of Pipes, 40 payre of Sissers, 40 combes, Twenty ffower pounds of Red Lead, one Hundred Aules, 2 handfulls of fish-hooks, 2 handfulls of needles, 40 pounds of Shott, Tenne Bundles of Beads, 10 small Saws, 12 drawing knives, 4 anchers of Tobacco, 2 anchers of Rumme, 2 anchers of Syder, 2 anchers of Beere, and 300 Gilders by the said Wm. Penn, his agents or assigns, to the said Indyan Sachamakers, for the use of them and their People. . . . Whereof and wherewith they the said Sachemakers doe hereby acknowledge themselves fully satisfyed, contented and paid

". . . doe grant, bargayne and sell . . . all that or those Tract or Tracts of land lyeing and being in the Province of Pennsylvania aforesaid, beginning at a certaine white oake in the land now in the tenure of John Wood and by him called the Gray Stones over against the falls of Delaware River; and soe from thence up by the River to a corner marked Spruce Tree with the letter P at the foot of a mountayne. . . along by foot of the mountaines west northwest to a corner white oake marked with the letter P standing by the Indyn Path that Leads to an Indyan Towne called Playwickey and near the head of a creek called Towsissiuck, and from thence westward to a creek called Neshammouys Creek, and along by the said creek unto the River Dellaware, alias Makeriskhickon; and so bounded by the sayd Mayne River to the sayd first mentioned white Oake in John Woods' Land, and all these Islands called or knowne by the severall names of Mattinicunk Island, Sepassineks Island, and Orecktons Island lying or being in the sayd River Delaware. . . . [Etc.]

"My opinion is that not only Pensilvania but all ye habitable land upon the face of ye Earth, will (within ye next 1,500 years) bee as fully peopled as England is now, that is to say, that there will be a head for every Four Acres of Land, whereas in Ireland there are about 10 acres to every head, the medium whereof is 7.

"Wherefore, when God sendeth ye to Pensilvania, I advise ye to take a perfect accompt [?Count?] of every Soule within ye teritory and Jurisdiction, and then to sett out a peece of Land conteyning 7 times that number in acres, which land ought to be chosen for its situation, healthfullness, and fertility, and to bee defenceable by nature as much as may be [continued on a full page 50].

for Ever for ye consideration of so much Wampum and other things as he shall please to give unto me, hereby for me, my heires and assignes, renouncing all claims and Demands of anything in or for ye future.

p. 67 Indian Deed for Lands to Wm. Penn, 1683.

"I KEKELAPPAN, of Opasiskunk for me and my Heirs... do hereby give and grant unto Wm. Penn...that half of all my lands betwixt Susquehanna and Delaware which lyeth on ye Susquehanna side, and I do hereby further promise to sell unto him at ye next spring, at my return from hunting, ye other half of my land, at as reasonable Rates as other Indians have been used to sell in this River. My hand and seal Phila., ye 10th 7ber 1683. Kederappan.

"I MACHALOHA owner of ye Lands Delaware River, Chesapeek Bay and up to ye Falls of Susquehanna River, I do hereby Declare to have [sold] and do sell unto William Penn, Proprietary and Govnr. of ye province of Pennsylvania and ye Territories thereunto belonging part of ye pay acknowledged, remainder to be paid in the spring."

p. 88 A Rough Draft of Declaration against Lord Baltimore, 1684. Four pages of sharp criticism of Maryland's attempt to take over territory duly assigned to the Province of Penna.

p. 108 At Council Meeting, 13th Oct., 1690, THE WELCH TRACT.

"Griffith Owen, with other inhabitants of the Welch tract, came and gave in a paper to the Commissioners which follows verbatim:

"We, the Inhabitants of the Welch tract, in the Province of Penna., in America, being descended of the Antient Britains who always in the land of our Nativity,

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under the Crown of England, have enjoyed that liberty and priviledge as to have our bounds and limits by ourselves, within the which all causes, quarrels, crimes and titles were tryed and wholly determined by officers, Magistrates, Juries of our own language, which were our equals. . .

p. 109 [Continues all of the arguments for the Welch to have the 40,000 acres surveyed out to them independent of the laws and regulations of the Province.]

p. 110 [The Commissioners replied 20 Oct. 1690, advising that the 40,000 acre tract set out for the Welch would be subject to Quit rent, etc., same as all other acreages. The statement by Mr. Owen and other inhabitants of the Welch tract was in answer to conference on the subject with the Commissioners and the following was included in the Commissioner's reply:]

"Your answer, which you gave in writing, 13th inst., the which we have very deliberately considered and find the major part of the writing not cognizable by us or within our province, which is only to confirm and grant lands, etc. and settle the affairs of the Proprietors Revenue, nor indeed does any part of it answer our proposition but very obliquely and with much ambiguity, which shows more of skill and cunning than as direct and sincere answer. . .

"Whatever the Proprietor hath promised, we Question not but he will perform, and in whatever he has given us power we are Ready to doe, And when you please to demand, willing to confirm to you the said tract by Pattent, as we doe unto other purchasers according to the Warrent and surveys, the which if you Refuse and others accept, you cannot think it hard if we grant your Refusal to them who have Equal right with you by purchase to take up land. To this we desire you will be speedy and plain in your Answer, as we are with you in our proposition, for we are Resolved what in us lyes, God willing, to Remove all Rubbs and hinderances in the way to a quiet and easy settlement of the

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Proprietor's Revenue within the Province. Dated at Phila., 20 Oct. 1690.

pp. 111-115 <u>Charter Granted to the Inhabitants of</u> <u>Germantown in 1691</u>.

"I William Penn, Proprietor of the Province of Pensilvania in AMERICA under the Imperiall Crown of Great Brittain by Virtue of Letters Patents under the Great Seale of England DO grant unto ffrancis Daniel Pastorius, civilian, and Jacob Telner, merchant, Dirck Isaacs Optegraaf, linen maker, Herman Isaacs, Optegraaf, Towne President, Teunis Abraham Isaacs, Optegraaf, linen maker, Jacob Isaacs, Johanes Casselle, Heywart Hapon[?], Coender Herman Bon, Dirck Vankolk, all of German Towne, yoemen, that they shall be one Body pollitique and corporate aforesaid in name and by the name of the Bailiffe, Burgesses and Comonalty of German Towne in the County of Philadelphia, in the Province of Pensilvania...

"The Bailiffe and Comonalty were authorized to doe and act anything whatsoever for the good government of the said corporation and for managing and ordering of the Estate, Stocke and affairs of the said Corporation, same as any other Corporation within the Province, not inconsistant to the Laws of England or said Province, also to have, hold and keep one publique Markett every sixth day in the weeke in such convenient place and manner as the Provinciall Charter doeth direct.

"Given under my hand and the lesser seale of the said Province, at London, 12 Aug. 1689, and under the Great Seale of the Province of Penna, 13 March 1691. Wm. Penn [L.S.]"

pp. 172-177 <u>Report on Petition of the Swedes,1721</u>. The Petition was given to Richard Hill, Isaac Norris and James Logan by Govrnr. Wm. Keith for investigation and report.

The 5-page report indicates that the petitioners who settled when the territory was controlled by the

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the Governor of New York certainly had little if anything to complain about being located on some of the finest farm land on theDelaware and later some being given choice assignment of land west by the Proprietor of Penna. The last paragraph of the report reads:

"These men called Swedes amongst us, we are sure have never been injured by the Proprietor or any under Him; tho' they are very Ill used by those who from time to time court their hands and names to carry on Designs that require such palliating. These People, as they are descended from a Nation famed for their Loyalty and Obedience to Government, may of themselves and when not misled by others, be quiet honest Men. But how far it is consistant with the Peace, Honour, or Security of an English Government, that they who <u>by their Birth</u> <u>are really English</u>, and have had the utmost Protection, Should upon occasion be thus nationally distinguished (as the Governor has most justly observed to us) is humbly referred with what is here offered to His further consideration. We are with Sincere respect,

p. 203 "The Proprietaries to their Trustees, 1727: London, Aug. 17, 1727

"Loving Friends, Richard Will, Isaac Norris, Samuel Preston and Jamés Logan:

"Our long depending suit in the Exchequer is at last determined with respect to the Propriety of the Province, etc., the Court having established our Father's Will. . .

"We shall always be very sencible of the obligations wee lye under to you for the pains and trouble you have and will be at in managing this affair and shal be glad of any opportunity to acknowledge your ffriendship therein. We are your very much obliged Friends, JOHN PENN, THO PENN."

pp. 236-238 PROPRIETARIES TO THE TRUSTEES, 1728 A letter, London, Jan. 31, 1728-9 calls attention

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to "a letter of Nov. 11 last via New York, by the two Sisters, Capt. Lukar, under Henry Lands Cover, with which was two powers to give you entire satisfaction in taking upon you the execution of the trust reposed in you by our father's will for the sale of lands in Pennsilvania and the Jerseys for the payment of debts.

"Since which wee have the favour of yours of the 7th of October by Capt. Annis and we must acknowledge ourselves much obliged to you . . . but wee cannot but be under some concern to find that you now acquaint us, that the embarrassments of our Affairs are so very great that you can't think it proper for you to act unless J. Penn undertakes a voyage to you this Spring."

"The letter refers to difficulty in clearing a mortgage with Joseph Dickinson who has fallen into a violent illness and no possibility of getting the money for some months.

"But the principal matter is the dependence with Lord Baltimore which there is an obsolute necessity to get settled before any of us go over . . . the Lord being lately returned from beyond the Seas having been about for several months; and as soon as we can bring that to some conclusion, our Brother John designs to prepare himself to be coming over to you.

"In the meantime you are . . . to raise money by getting in debts and selling of Land as if we were all present. . .

"With kind respects to you all wee remain,

"Your very much obliged friends, JOHN PENN, THO. PENN, RICHD. PENN"

p. 295 "Sam'l Blunston to Robert Charles--Message from Indians, 1731.

"About a week agoe, when Severall of the Majestrates met at <u>Lancaster</u> to Assist at <u>Raising ve Court</u> <u>House</u>, Capt. Civility came there and by an Interpreter which he brought with him. (in behalf of ye rest of ye Indians) laying down the Inclosed String of Wampum, Desired the following Message might be therewith communicated to ye Governor, viz: That the Conestogoe Indians have always lived in Good Friendship with the

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Christian Inhabitants of Pensilvania, and have behaved themselves Agreeable to their Treatys with them. That William Penn had promised them they should not be disturbed by any Settlers on the West Side of Susquehannah but now contrary thereto, several Marylanders are settled by the River or that side, at Conejohela, and one Crissop, particularly, is abusive to them when they pass that way and has beat and woulded one of their women who went to get apples from their own trees and took away her apples. . .

"We then told him theGovnr. had wrote to the Govnr. of Maryland on that subject, and that it was contrary to his will they should be disturbed by ye Marylanders and would gladly do all that lay in his power to prevent it.

"I have further to add on ye Indian Subject, That being informed the Govnr. expected some of ye chiefs of ye 5 nations down in a little time. It might be of service to acquaint him that a few days agoe, about twenty of ye 5 Nations warriours returning this way from the S.ward, brought with them three Negros and a Mulatto. One of the Negroes being lame with Travailing, they sold to a Cannoi Indian for about f20; the Rest they took off. This being contrary to ye last Treaty at Albany, and if not discouraged, like to be of Dangerous consequence, I thought fit to communicate, and am, with my best service to ye Govnr. thy assured ffrd. S.A. BLUNSTON"

It is our further will and pleasure that you do not give your assent to or pass any act whatsoever for imposing duties on the Importation of any Felons from this Kingdom into our said Province of Pennsylvania. G.R."

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p. 309 Indians alarmed due to the French building of a Fort with Loggs at or near the River Ohio.

p. 344 Indian Deed--SASOONAN, etc. 1732

In consideration of the receipt of a long list of items the Indians released unto John Penn the said Thomas Penn and Richard Penn, Esgrs., Proprietors of the said Province, all those tracts of land or lands lying on or near the River Schuylkill in said Province, or any of the branches, streams, fountains, or springs thereof eastward or westward. . . [cont. pp. 345-6]"

p. 404 <u>Deed for settlement of Lands at Tulpehocken</u> etc., Oct. 1731

"Ind. Lease and release between John Penn, Thomas Penn and Richard Penn. . . of first part, and Charles Fell and Gulielina Maria, his wife, of the second part, and the said William Penn and Robert Wilkes of the Parish of St. Paul's, Covent Garden, in the County of Middlesex, Esq. (who is since deceased) and Mary Frances Shaw of the said Parish. . . all that Tract and ten thousand acres of land in the said Province of Pennsilvania surveyed by John Taylor for the said Gulielina Maria on or about the 2nd day of November 1727 . . . a certain tract of land, situate on the Branches of Tulpehocken Creek in the County of Chester [Lancaster Co. after 1729] . . . beginning at a corner marked Black Oak standing on [p. 405] the top of a Hill on the south side of the main branch of Tulpehocken Creek and on the East side of a Run called Hansmoor's run; . . . westerly crossing a Run called Martin Sharva's Run . . . thence South crossing the aforesaid Main branch . . . [names of marked trees eliminated] thence south 55 degrees easterly 235 perches to the place of beginning; containing ten thousand acres. . . To hold unto the said William Penn, Robert Wilkes and Mary Frances Shaw their heirs and assigns, to the use of the said Charles Fell and Gulielina Maria his wife, for and during the term of their natural lives and the life of the longest liver of them. . .

"And whereas, the said Charles Fell and Gulielina

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Maria, his wife, and her children by him are all settled and do reside altogether in the Kingdom of Great Britain, and have no intentions at present to go to or settle in the said Province of Pennsilvania. . ."

pp. 406-410 "The sale of this tract and transfer of parts to various relatives recorded.

"In witness whereof, the said Charles Fell and Gulielina Maria his wife, and William Penn, have hereunto sett their Hands and Seals, this third day of January in the seventh year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Second by the Grace of God of Great Britain, France and Ireland, King, Defender of the faith and in the year of our Lord 1733. . .

"Entered in the office for recording of Deeds for ye City and County of Philadelphia in Book D. 2, Vol. 2 page 148, etc., the 2nd day of January A.D. 1735. Witness my Hand and Seal of my office, ye day and year abov'd. D.BROCKDEN, Rec^{dr}"

p. 464 <u>Deposition of John Wright Respecting Mary-</u> landers, 1735.

"John Wright, Esq., one of the Justices of the Peace for the County of Lancaster. . . being one of the People called Quakers on his solemn affirmation according to Law, doth declare and say that he is possessed of a Tract of Land lying on the West side of Susquehannah, opposite to the Plantation whereon he now lives on the East side of the said River, about seven or eight miles northerly than the City of Philadelphia, that he this Deponent having sowed a field of the said tract of land on theWest side of the said River with wheat went with a suitable number of hands about the beginning of the last fifth month commonly called July to reap the same, and while he was thus employed with his servants, Thomas Cressap, who lives on the west side of the said River and is reputed to be a Captain of Militia in Maryland came with about 20 persons, men, women and lads armed with guns, swords, and pistols and blunderbusses and drums beating towards said field . . .

"As a Justice Jno. Wright commanded the said

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Marylander to keep his Majesty's Peace at their Peril and told them he would proceed on his lawfull business unless he should be prevented from it by down right force . . . the numbers attending Cressap then seemed unwilling to proceed to Hostilities and the Lancaster Justice proceeded to take his grain across the River."

p. 494 Indian Deed--Lands on Susquehannah

". . . and having appointed the aforenamed Sachems or Chiefs as Plenepotentiaries of all those Nations to repair to Philadelphia in order to confirm the Several Treaties of Peace which have hitherto been concluded between them and the said Province; and also, to settle and adjust all Demands and claims that have been heretofore made, or hereafter may be made, touching or concerning the aforesaid River Susquehannah, and the lands lying on both sides thereof; and the said Sachems or Chiefs of ye 5 Nations aforesaid having for themselves and on behalf of the said Nations renewed and ratified the Treaties of Friendship and Peace subsisting between them and the said Province, did afterward proceed to treat and agree with the honble the Proprietaries thereof, about the said River and Lands.

"Now know ye that in consideration of, the premises af'sd and of the several Quantities of Goods herein mentioned, viz: 500 pounds of powder, 600 pounds of lead, 45 guns, 60 strowd water, match coats; 100 blankets, 100 duffle match coats, 200 yards of half-thick, 100 shirts, 40 hatts, 40 pair of shoes and buckles, 40 pair of stockings, 100 hatchets, 500 knives, 100 houghs, 60 kettles, 100 tobacco tongs, 100 scissors, 500 awe blades, 120 combs, 2000 needles, 1000 flints, 24 looking glasses, 2 pounds of vermillion and 100 tin pots, besides 25 Gallons of Rum, 200 pounds of Tobacco, 1000 pipes and 24 dozen of Gartering by the said Proprietaries, John Penn, Thomas Penn and Richard Penn, well and truly paid and delivered unto the said Kakiskerowane . . . [and 27 other Indian names] before the sealing and delivery of these presents, the receipt whereof they, the said Sachems or chiefs do hereby acknowledge themselves to be fully satisfied contented and paid and

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thereof do acquit and forever discharge the said proprietaries, their heirs, successors and assigns by these presents . . . [all Indian names and Chief listed again -- for themselves on behalf of all of the five Nations aforesaid, and every of them, have given. granted, bargained, sold, released and confirmed and by these presents do, and every of them doth give, grant, bargain, sell, release and confirm unto the said proprietaries, John Penn, Thomas Penn and Richard Penn, their heirs, successors and assigns, all the said River Susquehannah, with the Lands lying on both sides thereof to Extend Eastward as far as the heads of the Branches or Springs which run into the said Susguehannah, and all the lands lying on the West side of the said River to the setting of the Sun and to extend from the mouth of the said River northward up the same to the Hills or mountains called in the language of the said Nations, the TYANNUNTASACTA, or endless hills, and by the Delaware Indians, the KEKKACHTANANIN Hills, together, also, with all the Islands in the said River, Ways, Waters, Watercourses, Woods . . . and all the Right, Title, Interest, property claim and demand whatsoever . . . [continued on p. 496 with signatures on p. 497 and special release by the Six Nations on p. 498 and certification before Clem Plumsted, Mayor of Phila., 19 Nov. 1736 by our CONRAD WEISER . . . who did declare:] "that he saw the several Indians within named, sign, seal, and as their voluntary act, deliver the within written Deed, for the use and purpose therein mentioned; and that he saw John Peter Reck and Leonard Feck sign their names as witness thereto, and this affiant [Conrad Weiser] further saith, that being appointed Interpreter by and between the Government of Pennsilvania and the Indians of the Six Nations, he faithfully and distinctly interpreted and explained to the Indians who signed and sealed the same, all the several parts of the said within Deed to their full satisfaction and contentment; and that upon the delivery of the said Deed, the same Indians presented a Belt of Wampum in consideration thereof."

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p. 546 Warrant to Arrest Rioters at Glouster, 1737
"Glouster, ss:

"To the Constable of New Town and to all other in the County of Gloucester:

"Whereas Joseph Mickel of New Town in the County of Gloucester hath this present day being one of the People called Quakers, made affirmation before me Jas. Hinchman, one of the Majesties Justices of the Peace for the County afores'd, that <u>Thomas Penn</u>, Roger Fraam, Robert Charles, William Attwood, Jas. Sherly, Wm. Chancellor and Tho's Sharp, all of Philadelphia, hath in a riotous manner entered in his Inclosures and did beat and maim the s'd Joseph Mickel and forceably entered his house and spoiled his goods, and he declared that he was afraid of further harm to be done by the above named persons, therefore, he prayed surety of the peace against them."

The Constable was ordered to bring the accused before the J.P. James Hickman or some other of his Majesties Justices of the Peace if they can be found in the County to find sufficient security as well for their personable appearance at the next General Quarter Sessions of the Peace to be holden for the County afores'd and if any of the above named shall refuse to do so, then they were to be conveyed to Goal.

"A warrant granted by James Hinchman, against Tho's Penn and others for beating Joseph Mickel, dated Nov. 19, 1737."

No record of outcome of the Court action against these rioters found.

p. 625 <u>Copy of a Commission to Gov. Thomas from</u> Thomas Penn, etc. 1741

"Whereas the said Thomas Penn with his Brother John and Richard Penn, are the true and absolute Proprietaries and Governors in Chief of the Province of Pennsylvania and the Counties of New Castle, Kent and Sussex on Delaware in America, and the said John and Richard Penn by their Deed, Poll or Commission, duely executed under their Hands and Seals, bearing date the Eighth day of May which was in the year of our Lord,

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one thousand seven hundred and thirty-two [8 May 1732] and reciting as therein recited did give and grant unto the said Thomas Penn, their full power and authority (inter alia) by Warrant under his hand and the greater or lesser Seals of the said Province and Counties respectively to grant and cause to be laid out to all persons duly applying for the same, all such lands and lotts of land . . . theretofore legally purchased of their late father, Wm. Penn, Esq., or any person or persons lawfully claiming under him; . . .

"And whereas, the said Thomas Penn proposes in a short time to embark on a voyage to England, and being desirous that the Business of Setling and Improving the said Provinceand Counties shall not thereby be obstructed or retarded, hath therefor determined to commissionate and invest the Honorable George Thomas, Esgr., Lieutenant Governor of the said Province and Counties with the Powers and Authorities hereinafter expressed and granted."

Continued on page 626 and 627 with detailed instructions governing the sale of land, issuing patents, handling of money, rents, etc. by the Governor for benefit of the Proprietaries.

"In Witness Whereof the said Thomas Penn, by virtue of the Powers and Authorities to him Granted by the said John and Richard Penn, and his own Right, has set his hand and caused the Great Seal of the said Province to be hereunto affixed, at Philadelphia, this Nineteenth day of August in the year of our Lord One Thousand Seven Hundred and Forty One [19 Aug. 1741] and the Fifteenth year of the Reign of King George the Second over Great Britain, etc. THOS. PENN" (continued on page 480)

Excerpts from an EBERHARD REAM deed 1734

"JOHN PENN, Thomas Penn, and Richard Penn, Esqrs., True and absolute Proprietaries and Governor in Chief of the Province of Pensilvania and the Counties of New Castle, Kent and Sussex on Delaware, To all to whom these presents shall come send Greetings.

"Whereas in and by our warrant under the lesser seal of our Province bearing date the twenty second day

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of the third month (May) we required the Surveyor General to make a return to the Secretary's Office, the survey which by consent of the Commissioners of Property was in the year 1723, made unto EBERHARD REAM of County of Lancaster on a certain tract of land situate on a branch of Conestogoe Creek called Cocalico defined as follows: [the "sual surveyors terminology used such as from a Walnut tree to a point so many degrees south of S.W. to a marked Oak, etc. Nothing that would help us locate the land today]. . .Containing 389 acres with an allowance of six acres for each 100 acres for roads and highways, in consideration seventy seven (77)pounds and sixteen (16) shillings lawful money of Pensilvania paid by Eberhard Ream. . . A quitrent of four (4) English silver Shillings to be paid yearly at the Town of Lancaster to . . . In Witness whereof Thomas Penn by virtue of the Powers and authorities to him granted by the said John and Richard Penn and of his own right hath caused the Great Seal of the Province to be hereunto affixed at Philadelphia the 28th day of the fourth month (June) in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and thirty four [28 April-June 1734] and the Eighth year of the Reign of King George the Second over Great Britain and the 16th year of our government."

The signature--THO. PENN--was surrou ded by the Blue ribbon streamers sealed in wax.

This deed written on 12" by 30" parchment paper with one inch letters across the top reading: JOHN PENN, THOMAS PENN, RICHARD PENN, followed by excellent writing in script, about 1/4" per line.

In 1719 Eberhard first chose the site for his future home in America by a spring a few rods west of the present home of Jack and Shirley Lee, 31 So. Main St., Reamstown, Pa., and he paid the Delaware Indians for the privilege of settling there. Thereafter a warrent was issued to him for 200 acres which was surveyed by John Musgrave in 1719.

A notation on the back of the Deed issued to Eberhard in 1734 was a note reading:

"The Quitrent of the within granted land is settled to the first day of next March. Signed James Sleetsum

I could get no goods in Lancaster good for anything to make a present to SHICKELIMY, have therefore sent my son to Philadelphia with an order to Mr. Shippen, herein Inclosed for your approbation, you may altered if you see Cause. I have answered the Governor's letter, but came home from Lancaster the night before last, very lame. I accidently scald my foot about 12 days ago, and I suppose I made it angry, and was obliged to apply to a Doctor. I am in hopes it will soon be better, and as soon as possible I will set out for Shamokin. As to the Virginia affair, you will see my Sentiment in the letter to the Governour. I remain with my hearty respect, Sir, Yours, CONRAD WEISER"

p. 678 <u>A Letter, Gov. Clinton [New York] to Gov.</u> Thomas [Pennna] 1746.

A call for Commissioners to represent the Province of Penna in a movement for union of the colonies "thought to be the most likely means of defeating the designs of so barbarous an enemy and advancing the common cause of his Majesty's Subjects on the Continent."

p. 764 <u>President Reading of N. J. to Pres. Palmer</u>, <u>Penna. 1747</u>.

"By the examination of some persons now in Goal in New York it appears that Henry Bosworth guilty of counterfeiting the Bills of the Province has been

lately apprehended in your Government and is now in Goal in Phila. . [Samuel Burrows was sent with a request that Bosworth be turned over to him to stand tryall in N. J.]

p. 765 <u>Pres. Palmer to Pres. Reading of N. J.,</u> 27 July 1747.

"Henry Bosworth was apprehended by a writ out of the Supreme Court and has been examined by our Chief Justice, Mr. Kinsey and by him remanded to Bucks Co. Goal and it is at his Instance that I have suspended issuing my order to the Sheriff of Bucks to deliver Bosworth to your messenger, and refer you to his Letter to Chief Justice Morris for his reasons for desiring this of me."

The President of the Board [province of Penna.] later laid before the Board a letter from John Reading, Esq., President of the Province of New Jersey and stated that,

"He would be pleased to cause to be delivered to the Bearer, the under-sheriff of Middlesex County East Jersey a certain Henry Bosworth . . . in order that he may be convicted in that Province, where the Witnesses live and where the fact was committed and on considering the same, the President is desired to inform himself of Mr. Kinsey in what manner Mr. Reading's request may be best complied with . . ."

Some Hundreds I Brought Back, not includ in the above, but will return them by first opportunity to Secretary. CONRAD WEISER, Interpreter"

p. 23 The Index reads: "Shekalamy, Death noticed, his son succeeds as Chief 23.

"Conrad Weiser to Gov. H. [Hamilton], 1749:

"Sir: By these lines I let you know that I returned from Shomokin on the 18th of this Instant. I happened to meet the Eldest and youngest Son of Shickelimy at the trading house of Thomas McKee about 20 miles this side of Shomokin, by whom I was informed that all the Indians had left Shomokin for this present time, because of want of provision, so I thought best to deliver my message there to the Sons of Shickelimy; there was three more of the Six Nation Indians, one of them was TOGANOGON, a noted man among the Cayuckers. All what I had to do was to let the children and grand children of our deceased friend, Shickelimy, know

that the Governor of Penna. and his Council condoned with them for the death of their father, which I did accordingly, and gave them a Small present in order to wipe off their tears according to the custom of the Indians; the present consisted of six Strowd Matchcoats and seven Shirts, with a string of wampum; after this was over, I gave another string of Wampum to TAGHNEGHDOARUS, Shickelimy's Eldest son, and desired him to take upon him the care of a Chief in the stead of his deceased father, and to be our true Corespondent until there should be a meeting between the Governor of Pensilvania and some of the Six Nation Chiefs, and then he should be recommended by the Governor to the Six Nation Chiefs and confirmed. If he would follow the foot steps of his deceased father. He accepted thereof, and I sent a string of Wampum by TOGANOGON (who was then seting out for CAYUCKQUE) to Onantogo, to let the Council of the Six Nations know of Shukelimy's death and my transaction by order of the Governor. There was a necessity for my so doing; the Indians are very uneasy about the white people's setling beyond the Endless Mountains of Joniady, on Sherman's Creek and Elsewhere; they tell me that above 30 familys are setled upon the Indian's land this spring and dayly more goes to setle thereon; some have setled almost to the heads of Joniady River along the path that leads to Ohio; the Indian says (and that with truth) that that country is their only Hunting ground for dears, because further to the nord there was nothing but Spruce woods and the ground covered with palm prushes, not a single dear could be found or killed there; they asked me very seriously whether their Brother Onas had given the people leave to setle there. I informed them of the contrary, and told them that I belieft some of the Indians from Ohio, that were down last Sumer, had given liberty (with what right I could not tell) to setle; I told them of what passed on the Tuscarora path last Sumer when the Sheriff and three Magistrates were sent to turn off the people there setled, and that I then perceived that the people were favoured by some of the Indians above mentioned, by which means the orders of the Governor came to no

effect; so farr they were content and said that the thing must lie as it is till the Six Nation Chiefs would be down and converse with the Governor of Pensilvania about the affair. I have nothing else to add, but remain,

p. 31 A letter of 3 July 1749 by Geo. CROGHAN to , re a settlement on Ohio.

"Sir: Last night I received yr favor by express from the Governor and after considering ye Accounts Related By ye two New England men of ye Frenche Desinge to hinder the English from makeng a setlement on Ohio, must proceed from an alarm that Mr. Cresap and Mr. Parker spread amongst ye Indians last fall that ye Virginians was going to setle a Branch of Ohio called Yougagain [possibly Youngstown, Ohio today] and that there they would suply ye Indians with goods much cheaper than they could be suplyd from Pensilvania, Butt to my certain knowledge that Report had nott its Desired affect, for Instead of gaining an Interest Amongst ye Indians itt gave them an aversion to Mr. Parker, for the Indians Dos nott Like to hear of there Lands being setled over Allegany Mountain, and in particular by ye Virginians. Butt my opinion is that they will nott come to Ohio, Butt Rather go by Lake Erie towards Wabance in order to Secure a very considerable branch of trade amongst ye Twightwees which has been out of their hands some years past and of

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considerable advantage to this Province and itt is well known ye French will spare no troble to advance their Trade, nor no people carries on ye Indians Trade in so Regular a manner as the French. I wish with all my hart ve Government of this Province would take some method to Regulate ye Indian Trade and to prevent many disorders which Arise from ye carring of sperits in ye Indian Countrys. I have this morning Dispatchd of one of my hands to ye Borders of Lake Erie to Andrew Montour, who is living there, in order that he should meet me att Ohio, for which Place I will sett out on Monday next My Self. I have Given Instructions to Andrew to find out if possible whether there be any French on Lake Erie or there Abouts and then to meet me where the body of the Indians are setled on Ohio. . . . But I am of opinion that ye Indians are so well grafted in ye English Interest that they will not be Esey Deceved by the French. . . . Be seeing you in town af-GEO. CROCHAN" ter my return.

p. 33 "INDIANS DEED FOR LAND BETWEEN DELAWARE AND SUSQUEHANNA, 1749.

"Know all men by these Presents, that we. . . [15 lines of names of Indian tribes and chiefs) for and in consideration of the sum of Five hundred Pounds of Lawfull money of Pennsylvania, by the Honourable Thomas Penn and Richard Penn, Esquires, Proprietories of the Province of Pennsylvania and well and truly paid unto the said CANASTEGO SATAGANACHLY. . . [23 other names followed] before the Sealing and Delivery of these Presents, the Receipt whereof they the said Sachems or Indian Chiefs, do hereby acknowledge themselves to be fully satisfied, contented and paid and thereof do acquit and forever discharge the said Proprietories, Thomas Penn, and Richard Penn, their Heirs. . . [etc., continued on pages 34 and 35 and on page 36 signatures of the Indian Chiefs, witnessed by members of the Executive Council and Conrad Weiser, Interpreter.]"

"To all people. . . .Know yee, That we [about 20 Indian names] being chiefs, Sachems & Heads of the Five Nations of Indians, called the Iroquois and the Native Proprietors of a large Tract of Land on, about, and adjacent to the River Susquehanna, Between the Fourty-first and Fourty-third degrees of North Latitude, and being within the Limits and Bounds of the Charter, and Grant of his late Majesty, King Charles, 2nd, To the Colony of Connecticutt. And whereas, a large number of the Leige and Good Subjects of His Royall Majesty George 2nd of Great Britain, etc., King; Inhabitants of his sd. Majesty's English have applied to us for the purchase of sd. above mentioned Tract of Land, for a Plantation to settle upon:

"Thereupon; whereas. . .and whereas. .

"Now Thereupon, for and in consideration thereof, as also for the further, full and ample consideration of the sum of Two Thousand Pounds, New York currency, To us, to our full Satisfaction, before the Ensealing Hereof, contented and paid, the receipt whereof to full content, we do hereby acknowledge and, Thereupon, do Give, Grant, Bargain, Sell, Convey and Confirm, unto: [a list of about 60 names followed].

"All Being of the Colony of Connecticut. . ." etc. Deed for land from Indians "supposed fraudulent." See p. 174.

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p. 174 In a letter of 1754 from Daniel Claus to late Gov. Hamilton on pages 174-6 is a report of the Villianous Scheme John Lidins of Albany engaged in to serve the Connecticut People in buying the Lands at Susquehanna.

p. 197 A plan for a Union of Colonies, 1754.

"A Plan for a General Union of the British Colonies of North America.

"That the Legislature of each colony appoint a Committee of Union. . . That Delegates of the Committee of each division shall have one annual stated time of Meeting. . . .

"That there shall be four Divisions of the Province, viz.:

<u>lst Division</u> Georgia So. Carolina No. Carolina <u>2nd Division</u> Virginia Maryland Pennsylvania <u>3rd Division</u> Jersey New York <u>4th Division</u> Connecticut Rhode Island Massachusetts New Hampshire."

pp. 253-258 "Thomas Penn to Govr. Morris, 1755. "With regard to the purchase and intended settlement of the people of Connecticut, I think you have taken the most propper steps to prevent their design, and have nothing to give in charge on that head, but hope if they should venture you will bring down some of their principal people to Philadelphia to answer for their unjust intrusion on our rights. We desire you will give us the most timely intelligence how they act. We have now under consideration an application to the King to desire orders to prevent a settlement 'til the Case shal be heard! . . .

"I am concerned to find Collonel Washington's conduct so imprudent, and my old Friend Captain Clark act so bad a part; the company was sold to another while he was in Virginia in pursuance of a former agreement,

so that it was not in my power to serve your nephew, which you may be sure I would gladly have done. . . "London, Feb. 26, 1755 THO. PENN"

p. 303 Gen'l Ass'y of Conn. on Petition of Susquehanna Co. 1755.

This petition requesting a colony to be settled on a large parcell of such their claim situate and lying on the waters of the Susquehanna about 70 miles north and south and from about 10 miles east of said River to be known as the Susquehanna Company, agents, George Wyllys, Daniel Edwards, Samuel Talcott, Thomas Seymour and Eliphalet Dyer. The assembly accordingly "acquiescenced therein, if it should be his Majesty's Royal Pleasure to Grant said Lands to said Petitioners, and thereupon Erect and Sttle a new Colony in such Form and under such regulations as might be consistant with his Royal Wisdom. . . ."

p. 503 "Conrad Weiser to Gov. Morris, 1755.

"On my return from Phila., I met in the Township of Amity, Berks Co., the first news of our cruel enemy having invaded the Country this side of the Blue Mountain to witt, Bethel and Tulpehocken. . . I left the Papers as they were in the Messengers Hands, and hastened to Reading where the alarm and confusion was very great, I was obliged to stay that night and part of the next day to witt, the 17th [of Nov., 1755] and sat out for Heidelberg where I arrived that evening. Soon after, my sons, Philip and Frederick, arrived from the persuit of the Indians and gave me the following relation [Heidelberg the home of Conrad Weiser and family, including son Philip, husband of our Sophia Riem. It is now Womelsdorf, Pa.]. . . . Another Party found a Woman just expired with a male child on her side, both killed and scalped. The woman lay upon her face and my son Frederick turned her about to see who she might have been and to his and his Companions' surprize they found a Babe of about 14 days old under her rapped up in a little cushion his nose quite flat, which was set right by Frederick and life was yet in it, and

recovered again Upon the whole, there is about 15 killed of our people, men, women and children, and the Enemy not beat but scared off. We are in a dismal situation, some of this murder has been committed in Tulpehocken Twp. The People left their Plantations to within 6 or 7 miles from my house. I am now Busy to put Things in order to defend my Home against another attack. Guns and Ammunition is very much wanted here; my sons have been obliged to part with most of that that was sent up for the use of the Indians Your very obedient CONRAD WEISER.

Heidelberg, in Berks Co., Nov. 19, 1755."

p. 511 Another letter of Nov. 24, 1755 to Govr. Morris, reads in part as follows:

".... Most of the People of Tulpehocken have left their Habitation; those in Heidelberg moves their effects. Bethel Twp. is entirely deserted

"3rd. The People are so incensed, not only against our cruel Enemy the Indians but also (we beg leave to inform your Honour) against the Governor and Assembly, that we are afeard they will go down in a Body to Philadelphia and comit the vilest outrages. They say they will rather be hanged than to be butchered by the Indians, as some of their neighbors have been lately and the Poverty that some are in is very great.

"4th. Yesterday, we sent out about Seventy men to the Mountains to take Possession of Several Houses to range the woods along the Mountain in Berks Co. on the West side of Schuylkill. The same number are sent to the back Parts of Lancaster County. . . .

Your very humble Servants,

CONRAD WEISER EMANUEL CARPENTER ADAM SIMON RUHM (RIEHM)

The second item in the letter above read: "There is no order among the People; one cries one Thing and another another thing. They want to force us to make a Law that they should have a Reward for every Indian which they kill. They demanded such a law of us with their Guns cocked, pointing it towards us."

A P.S. to the letter read:

"I cannot forbear to acquaint your Honour of a certain circumstance of the late unhappy Affair: One Kobel with his wife and eight children, the eldest about 14 years and the youngest 14 days was flying before the Enemy, he carving one, and his wife and a Boy another of the children, when they were fired upon by two Indians very nigh, but hit only the man upon his breast, though not dangerously. They, the Indians, then came with their Tomhocks, knocked the woman down, but not dead. They intended to kill the man but his Gun (though out of order so it could not fire) kept them off. The woman recovered so farr, and seated herself on a stump with her Babe in her arms and gave it Suck; and the Indians driving the children together and spoke to them in High Dutch, be still, we won't hurt you. Then they struck a Hatchit into the Woman's Head and she fell upon her Fence with her Babe under her, and the Indians trod on her neck and torn off the scalp. The children then run: four of them were scalped, among which was a Girl of 11 years of age who related the whole story; of the scalped, two are alive and like to do well. The rest of the children ran into the Bushes and the Indians after them but our People coming near to them, and hallowed and made noise; the Indians Ran, and the rest of the children were saved. They ran within a yard by a woman that lay behind an Old Log with two children; there was about 7 or 8 of the Enemy."

p. 525 "Gov. Morris to Gen. Shirley, 17 Nov. 1755. "Since writing the Letter herewith I have received Intelligence that the Indians have crossed the Susquehanna and fallen upon the inhabitants to the southward of the Mountains at and near a place called Tulpehocken . . . The settlement they are now destroying is one of the finest in this Province, the Lands are very rich and well improved. <u>My assembly have now been sitting ever since the 3rd instant but have done nothing for the defence of the Province nor raised any supplys.</u> . . <u>such a conduct while the country is bleeding, seems to</u>

me to merit the severest censure. Df. to Gen'l Shirley, his son William was killed in Braddocks defeat.--See Col. Records, Vol. 6, p. 489."

p. 595 "Instructions to John Ross, 8 March 1755.

"You are to take the Indians now in Town into your charge and care and conduct them to the Manor of Conestogo, the place where they have agreed to reside for the present.

"As the minds of the Inhabitants are not a little disturbed at the murders committed by the Enemy Indians and the People living on the Road and such as you may meet may not be well disposed towards them, Dr. Thompson, one of the Magistrates of the County of Lancaster, will accompany you and assist you.

"You will easily conceive that if the Indians are suffered to separate or struggle upon the Road, or to get drunk, they will be in danger of their lives. You must therefor keep them altogether and see that they are perfectly sober and of good Behavior.

"You are, as soon as may be, to go or send to Harris's Ferry [now Harrisburg, Pa., on the Susquehanna River]. . . and remove from thence the Families and goods belonging to them, taking care that they be not insulted or abused in any way. . . .

ROBERT HUNTER MORRIS, Esq., Gov.

p. 621 "<u>Col. Geo. Washington to Gov. Morris</u>, <u>April, 1756</u>.

"I had scarce reached Williamsburg [Va.] before an Express was after me with news of the French and Indians advancing within our Settlements and doing incredable mischiefs to ye Inhabitants, which obliged me to postpone my business there. . . I went to Williamsburg fully resolved to resign my commission, but was diswaded from it, at least for the time. . . GEO. WASHINGTON

"P.S. A Letter this instant arriving from Williamsburg informs that our Assembly have voted f20,000 more and that their forces sh'd be increased to 2,000 men; a laudable example this, and I hope not a singular one.

p. 414 Account of the Death of Richard Penn, Governor John Penn sailed for England, May 4, James Hamilton to Act as President til Oct. 16, 1771.

p. 521 <u>Wm. Thompson to Govnr. Penn, 1774.</u> "Cumberland County, 19 June 1774. "May it please your Honr.

"By James Caveat, Esq., who is just come down from Westmoreland, there is a certain account of a number of people being killed by the Indians on the West Side of the Monongahela River. Mr. Caveat was on his way to Phila. (believing the assembly were sitting) to lay the <u>distressed situation of the People of Westmoreland</u> before your Honr. and the Assembly and to pray the aid of Government in support of that Country, otherwise it must be entirely evacuated . . .

"Tis said the Indians have fixed a Boundary betwixt the Virginians and us, and say that they will not kill or touch a Pennsylvanian.

"But it will be best not to trust them, and I am doubtful a short time will show to the contrary, I am, [etc.] . . . WM. THOMPSON."

p. 526 Virginia Territory, now Western Penna.

A petition to Govr. Penn, dated Pittsburg, June 25, 1774, praying for relief from activities of a Doctor Connolly of Virginia, etc. was signed by 27 citizens bearing adherence to the Penna. Government.

"The Memorial of the subscribers on behalf of themselves and the remaining few Inhabitants of Pittsburgh

who have adhered to the Government of Pennsylvania, Humbly Sheweth,

"That your memorialists have suffered in an unprecedented manner by the Arbitrary proceedings of Doctor Connolly since the commencement of his Tyrannical Government at Pittsburgh; the principal facts we shall beg leave to lay before your Honor as followeth,

"Soon after the return of the Magistrates of this place from Stantown jail in Virginia, Mr. Connolly being extreamly enraged that Mr. McKay should acquaint Lord Dunmore with his Tyrannical behavior, took all opportunities to affront and use Mr. McKay ill, so that in a few days after he ordered Mr. McKay's outhouses pulled down, and the materials to be carried to his garrison; and when Mr. McKay complained of such oppressive measures, he was threatened by Doctor Connolly to be sent in irons to Williamsburgh. . . . [continued on pp. 527-29.]

p. 625 LD. DARTMOUTH to Gov. Penn, Whitehall, 22 May, 1775.

"Sir, It is with great concern I acquaint you that the Queen of Denmark, His Majesty's Sister, died at Zell on the 10th Instant, after an Illness of five days....

"Inclosed I send you a Gazette containing the orders for mourning.

"I am, sir, your most obedient, humble servant, DARTMOUTH"

TIDBITS OF FAMILY HISTORY :

ANDREW REAM, "the Drummer Boy"

Died in REAMSTOWN on Thursday, the 13th instant, March, 1845. ANDREW REAM, one of the few remaining Revolutionary soldiers at the advanced age of 85 years --Intelligencer and Journal, Lancaster, Pennsylvania, March 25, 1845. His bravery noted for his performance in the battle of Monmouth, N.J.

The DRUM that was beat by our "Drummer Boy," Andrew Ream, in the Revolution at the Battle of Monmouth, N. J., is displayed at the Andrew Carnegie Museum, Pittsburg, Pa.

"It is therefore recommended to the legislative or executive powers of these United States to set apart THURSDAY, the 18th day of December, next for solemn thanksgiving and praise. . . .

p. 768 R.D. McCalester to Pres. WHARTON:

"York Co., Hanover, Nov. 12, 1777. "Sir, Your Excelency Menchened in y'Last Letter to me that if the 4th and 5th classes didn't turn out pritey generally then the other two class should be sent forth also.

"These 2 classes have turned out Past Expectation, som parts, the class made up a Company, but for the .Gratest Part, I threw two classes together where they were like to be small Companeys, and made one large one and made the ofesers cast lots who should go.

"But in the whole I beleve about one half or som better is gon in those two classes perhaps 3 parts in 4, the Grate number of Quakers, Mananest and Dunkers in this County ocations the Companeys to be so hard to be filled up, the others in the upper end of the County which is mostly Irish People and Low Dutch goes Prettey Generall; the People Complain much of being hurryed out in such Grate numbers as they say. Inded many will not beleve it is the orders of Council but my own doings; However, I shall comply with my orders as far as Posable, I should be glad to know if the other two class is to have orders to march, which shall be don Imeditly. I have purchased all the good arms I could get since I rec'd y' orders and put them into the hands of good men, there one arms [sic] blankets appraised, etc. So many scrupolis people as we have ocation much hiring and deter the business much.

"I am, yr Excellencies most obt st RD. M'CALESTER. "Directed, to His Excelency Thomas Wharton, Esqr, President of the Exec Council, Lancaster."

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[Hanover, Pa., 17 miles Southwest of York, Pa.-site of the first Civil War Battle North of the Mason-Dixon Line, fought in 1863 (Gettysburg Battle, July 1 through 3, 1863).]

TIDBITS OF FAMILY HISTORY:

Reams in North Carolina

HISTORY OF DURHAM, N.C., by H. V. Paul, 24 May 1884. It shows 43 officers and members of the Tobacco Board of Trade, including H. A. REAMS, and I. W. REAMS. Of the three tobacco warehouses listed, one is the REAM WAREHOUSE, at Corner of Depot and Min Sts. It further records that HENRY A. REAMS was the pioneer Warehouseman of Durham. He was born in Granville County on the 13th day of March 1842, the son of John P. Reams, Esq., a manufacturer of tobacco for thirty-seven years. His Father gave him a fair English education. He commenced the manufacture of tobacco when only 18 years of age.

Pennsylvania

The word sylvia means a wood or forest. Wm. Penn thinking that SYLVIA would be a name applicable to a land covered with forest, suggested it for his territory. The Secretary who made out the patent prefixed PENN to Sylvania, in honor, as the king afterward said, of Penn's father. The motto of the State as emblazened on the Coat of Arms for the State is, VIRTUE, LIBERTY, and INDEPENDENCE.--Car Del Scribe, December, 1971. (Bk. Notes, 7/1/62 FVR.)

Maryland Germans who fought in the Civil War: Among the lower rank of officers were: Henry Kunitz, Conrad Boettger and JOHN SCHWAB. (Pub. Lib. Rdg., Pa., 5/10/69.)

Johann Eberhard RIM and John (Jost) Schwab families arrived Phila. Port in Fall of 1717. (Special report Boat Captains to Penna Province, Sept. 9, 1717, Penna. Colonial Records, Vol. 3, p. 29.) First Series, Vol. 6 (Cont.) --Council, Phila. 8-7-1778 appointed immediately to state the accounts between Congress and this state--The late fatal catastrophe which has befallen the Connecticut settlers on the River Susquehanna, deplorable as it is, recollects the disputed footing on which these sufferers stood. Compassion for them, as well as justice to this State, requires that they be reminded of the precarious nature of their tenure before they re-establish themselves.

"It will perhaps be not amiss to instruct the delegates of this State in Congress that as soon as the confederation of the United States be compleated, they take immediate steps to bring the claim of Connecticut to hand within the Northerly bounds of Penn's patent to an early hearing and adjudication. It may also be remarked that the Delegates in Congress for Virginia, were furnished, about thirteen months since, with the remarks of the late assembly and their offer to refer the dispute concerning boundaries to Congress, and that no reply has been made.

"Indorsed, To the honourable house of General Assembly."

pp. 687-688 Samuel Wallis to T. Mallock, Council Sec'y:

"Muncy Farm, August 8, 1778

"My Good Friend, I received your letter by Mr. Pennington and rejoyed to find that the Council, as well as the Board of War, are so well disposed to protect the frontiers at a time of so much calamity. Col. Hartley has arrived with the detachment of his Regt which you mention; and he has laid out a small fort accordingly. I find that from the attention payed to this County of late, particularly with the Continental Troops, that the spirit of the people seems to be returning to them; great numbers have returned, and I hope the majority of them will shortly get back to their homes. Col. Broadhead's Regt. did great service and the spirited manner in which Col. Hartley is now acting will I doubt not render essential service to the Country. I observe that the Council has been pleased to order a considerable number of militia into this County, amongst which 300 is ordered out into immediate

service of the militia of this County. . . .

"5 o'clock, afternoon--Since Wrighting the foregoing part of this letter we have been alarmed with Intelligence of a reaping party of about 14 being attacked in the field early this morning by a party of about twenty Indians--two killed and scalped--one (the son of Capt. Brady) mortally wound and scalped and one taken prisoner--the other ten made their escape. Lurking partys of Indians are constantly seen about us. Several attempts have been lately made to take off our centenals in the night; I shall be much obliged to you for a line by the return of the Express with a news paper inclosed.

"I am, sincerely, your friend, etc. SAML WALLIS"

p. 695 Appointment of Edward Burd.

"August 12, 1778--THO. M'KEAN, WILL^M ATLEE, JOHN EVANS, three Justices of the Supreme Court for the Commonwealth . . . by virtue of the power and authority vested in us by law do nominate and appoint <u>Edward Burd</u> Esq.,* attorney at law, to be prothonotary or clerk of the several courts aforesaid, to hold and exercise the said offices, and to receive all legal fees and profits to the same appertaining as long as he shall behave himself well therein. . .

p. 733 JOSEPH REED to ____

, 1778:

"Sir, Agreeable to my promise of forwarding to you any important intelligence. I beg leave to enclose you a Journal of the late expedition against Rhode Island, which has terminated with little real advantage to the Publick. It was kept by Major Gibbs, who being with Gen'l Green had an oppy of being well informed of what pass'd. I have nothing to add but that our loss by a return is in the whole, killed, wounded and missing, 211. No officer of higher rank than a captain killed. A gentleman of the name of Lovel said to be a son of the member of Congress, after behaving very gallantly and

being wounded, was murdered by a British officer. I suppose this Express will take with him to Congress, the exact Return of the Loss of our Army. There is nothing new here.

"The Barbarians had taken a number of cattle, between Wyoming and NESCOPECK but have been obliged to leave them all and have fled with the utmost precipitation--... A few Indians have appeared near Muncy and in Penns Valley. We can manage those well enough. THOS. HARTLEY"

p. 49 1 Feb. 1717 Jacob Taylor the Surveyor General was ordered to survey a tract of land lying between Susquehanna River and Conestogoe Creek from the mouth of said creek as far up the River as the lands granted to Peter Charter and then by a line running from said River to Conestogo Creek.

"The said Tract was surveyed . . . and returned unto the Secretary's office and called 16,000 acres in which is included the Tract of land called the Indian Town.

"It is suggested that the said Wm. Penn by some Instrument of writing gave permission for an old Indian named JOHASS and his Indians to live upon the said Tract of land called the Indian Town containing about 500 acres and the same was allotted to them as a place of Residence by the said Wm. Penn. In or about the year 1763, some of the descendents of the said old JOHAS then residing on the tract were there killed and the remainder (except one or two that escaped) were sent for by the Magistrate of Lancaster and put into the work house for protection and safety but were there all killed.

"Upon the decease of the above Indians the Proprietary's agents immediately took possession of the said Tract called Indian Town and his tenents have quietly occupied it and paid the rent to the proprietaries till his Grant in Sept. Last."

Our Eberhard Ream arrived in Phila. in 1717 and settled on a branch of the Conestogoe Creek 15 miles North of Lancaster, on a 200 acre tract that was surveyed for him by John Musgrave as authorized by the Surveyor General in 1719. It was all Conestogoe Twp. Chester Co. at that time. Just how far he was from the 1,600 acre tract referenced above is not known.

p. 61 On April 7, 1781, a message was forwarded by Pres. Reed of the Supreme Executive Council to F. A. Muhlenberg, Esquire, Speaker of the General Assembly.

p. 266 In a Communication to President Dickinson of the State of Pennsylvania from the Commissioners in 1784 we find the following relative to Samuel Weiser:

p. 703 A petition signed in Wyoming Feb. 20, 1785 and presented to "The Honable the Representatives of the Freemen of the Commonwealth of the State of Penna. in General Assembly."

A few excerpts below should tend to show some of the difficulties some of our early ancestors experienced during the transition period of the Wyoming region from the State of Connecticut to Penna.

"We your humble petitioners would take the earliest opportunity to lay before your Honble House the deplorable situation in which we have been enveloped since the decree of Trenton, which changed the jurisdiction in favor of Pennsylvania, from that Date we have been Denyd the due administration of the laws of Penna, or in other words Common Justice, which the greatest criminals are intitled to, according to all Statute and Common Laws of all Christianized people."

". . . to mention one instance of Lt. Col. John Armstrong and John Boyd, Esgs., who by forfeiting their word and Honors and everything that is near to Gentlemen, made us Prisoners, abus'd us, with more than savage treatment, and robed us of upwards of one hundred rifles and valuable fire arms, and many other effects, even to our smallest Pen-knives; and we may say with propriety that we have been Rob'd of upwards of two hundred Rifles and valuable fire arms by officers of Government since the first of last may, which have never been returned to this day. And although we have often Petitioned the former assembly for Justice in all the cases wherein we were injured and abused, but could obtain no redress, and we have undergone such a series of injustice, plunder, rapine and murder from those who pretended to do us justice, that we are reduced to the shades of death. . . . Therefore, we apply to your honors for a line to be drawn that we may know what course to steer.

"And in the immediate space, while we have no authority in this place, we have thought most advisable to form ourselves in some order for our mutual defence

First Series, Vol. 10 (Cont.)

and safety, and to act as near the Laws of this State as possible, until we shall have a Constitutional Establishment of the same and we most heartily pray for your Honors exertions to establish peace and good order in this distracted and infatuated place; for we think that the political salvation of this settlement depends upon your asseduity, and exertions in this respect as well as the Happiness and safety of this State which we insist on, we have already strove for since the decree at Trenton, and have endeavoured to demean ourselves in such an equitable line of conduct, that we are justly entitled to all the immunities of Freecitizens and Freeholders, which if allowed our prayer is in a great measure answered."

The petition was signed by 96 persons who apparently had the misfortune for the time being of having come into the State of Penna. from New England.

One of the signers was <u>Benjamin Bidlack</u> an important name for many Reams in the United States and one that is well documented by Mrs. A. W.--Cecile A. (Ream) DeBIRNY and cleared for one of her stripes in the D.A.R. Some of the other names familiar to the Buckeye state were John Jenkins, Nathan Wade, Obediah Camel, Jerh. White, Jacob Johnson, Phens., Dan'l and Able Pierce, Sam'l Ayres, Reubin and Nath. Cook, Samuel Hover, Conrad Lions, Zeb. Butler, Thos. Read, Steven Fuller.

By Samuel Hazard, 1855--Treaty with Prussia, 1786. p. 6 "Whereas a treaty of amity and commerce between his majesty the king of Prussia and the United States of America was concluded and signed . . . under their several signatures, which said treaty written both in the American and French language is in the American words to wit:

"His majesty the king of Prussia and the United States of America desiring to fix in a permanent and equitable manner the rules to be observed in the intercourse and commerce they desire to establish between their respective countries . . . have judged that the said end cannot be better obtained than by taking the First Series, Vol. 11 (Cont.)

most perfect equality and reciprocity for the basis of their agreement.

"With this view his majesty the king of Prussia has nominated and constituted as his plenipotentiary, the baron <u>Frederick William de Thulemien, his privy coun-</u> <u>sellor of embassy</u>, and envoy extraordinary, with their high mightinesses the <u>states general</u> of the <u>United</u> <u>Netherlands</u>, and the <u>United States</u> on their part, given full power to <u>John Adams</u>, Esq., late one of their ministers plenipotentiary of the United States with his Brittanic majesty; doctor <u>Benjamin Franklin</u>, late minister plenipotentiary at the court of Versailles, and another of their ministers plenipotentiary for negotiating a peace; and <u>Thomas Jefferson</u> heretofore a delegate in Congress from the State of Virginia and governor of said state."

The complete agreement on 10 pages is very interesting indeed and the student interested in world history and events effecting the early history of our nation would do well to read them.

Article 1 read: "There shall be a firm, invioable and universal peace and sincere friendship between his majesty the king of Prussia, his heirs, successors and subjects, on the one part, and the United States of America and their citizens on the other without exceptions of persons or places."

Article II read: "The most perfect freedom of conscience and of worship is granted to the citizens or subjects of either party, within the jurisdiction of the other without being liable to molestation in that respect for any cause other than an insult on the religion of others. Moreover, when the subjects or citizens of the one party shall die within the jurisdiction of the other their bodies shall be buried in the usual burying grounds, or other decent and suitable places and shall be protected from violation or disturbance."

p. 83 <u>Resolve of Settlers of Wyoming 1786, Luzerne</u> <u>County formed</u>. At a meeting of the settlers of Wyoming legally warned and held at Kingston Nov. 6, 1786, Col. Zebulon Butler, Chairman.

"Whereas the agents from Philadelphia Report that

the Legislature of this State by a law Enacted the 23rd of October last have erected a new County at Wyoming and parts adjacent from the Nescopeek Creek, on the South to the North line of ye State on the North extending East to the Lehi, and West to the Ridge of Land dividing the waters of the West branch from the waters of the East Branch of the Susquehannah River by the name of the county of Luzerne. . . .

"Resolved unanimously, That it is the opinion of this meeting that the law of this State erecting the Northern parts of the County of Northumberland into a New County makes no Provision whereby the Inhabitants thereof, may or can enjoy the Rights, Liberties and Priviledges that citizens of the State do, that they are not authorized or Impowered to hold any election or to elect any officers of Government or Civil officers. . . That an election held where a legal warning is not or cannot be given, and where no person is authorized or qualified as aforesaid, either as Justices, Sheriff, Constable or Judges and Inspector of Election to warn or hold such Election or to make Returns is in Violation of the Constitution and Laws of this State.

"A True Copy. John Franklin."

p. 85 <u>In a letter from John Franklin dated</u> <u>Wilksbarre Nov..7, 1786 to Doctor Joseph Hamilton</u> we note reference to some additional difficulties of our New England pioneers as follows:

"A meeting of the Inhabitants was held yesterday to hear the report of the agents from Philadelphia and for other purposes. . . I send enclosed a Resolve Respecting the Law for Erecting a New County. . . . as we had not a quorum of those appointed by the <u>Company</u> it is a matter that concerns the Settlers more immediately, we have also past a Resolve Prohibiting the Exportation of grain from this settlement.

"That old Traitor Smith made his appearance at the Meeting, I have not seen him there 4 months before--he urged a Petition to the Assembly of Pennsylvania, and would give up our Connecticut title throw ourselves

on the mercy of Pennsylvania, and pray for our improvements--however he had no influence on any of the meeting. A number urged a Petition for five miles each side of the River but nothing done on that head. . . . it is likely I shall draft the [5 mile each side of the River] petition (if one is sent). You may depend the foundation shall be laid in such a way as it will do no injury to the Company--I am sure the State cannot, nor will not grant us one foot."

The Great Flood (No Report of a Noah's Ark)

"I expect you have heard of the Deluge, the rain on the 5th October which fell in about 24 hours, raised the River about 6 foot and in the Narrow 10 feet, <u>deeper than ever known</u>, the small streams became mighty Rivers, the mills are mostly swept off, and one-half of all kind of food for man and beast is forever lost-even the roots in the Earth such as Potatoes, turnips, parsnips, etc. are mostly rotten in the Earth. . . . the Susquehannah River that was fordable at 4 of the clock afternoon was over the face of the earth from mountain to mountain at 6 o'clock the morning of the 6th you may see stones from 3 pounds to 3 tuns weight Drove to great distance and hove up in heaps, a stone judged to weigh 2 tons lies mounted on two stumps near Tobies Creek. . . John Franklin"

p. 142 Resolution of Congress April 23rd, 1787--"the privilege of sending and receiving letters and packets free of postage be extended to the members of the Convention to be held in Phila. on the second Monday in May next, in the same manner as is allowed to the members of Congress.

pp. 162 thru 168 "Ordinance for Government of Northwest Territory of the United States northwest of the River Ohio adopted 13 July 1787 and a resolution of April 23, 1784 relative to the subject of this ordinance declared null and void."

And at the end of the term, if the Proprietaries incline to sell the Lands, the settlers shall have the refusal, in case they incline to give as much as other People, and if the Proprietaries do not incline to sell but to rent, the said Settlers shall have the preference of others in case they will give as good a rent as others offer. . . . That they shall build upon and improve in the best manner they are capable, their said plantations; and at the end of the Term, shall deliver up their plantations to the said Proprietaries, their Officers or Agents, in good

As recorded in Vol. 5, page 172 and 173 of the Colonial Records, we find copy of a letter of similar nature from the Council, Phila., December 29, 1947, addressed to the Gov. Clinton of New York and Gov. Shirley of Mass. It read in part as follows:

"By the frequent informations we have had and are daily receiving of the Designs of our Enemies from English Prisoners who have been among them, there is a great reason to fear this city will be attempted in the spring; and as our assembly consist for the most part of Quakers principled against Defence, the inhabitants dispair of their doing anything for their protection, they having been very frequently applied to for that end without success. Those considerations have induced great numbers, as well in the country as in town, to enter into an association for the defence of this city and Province and several companies are already formed as a further security, the associators have continued to raise a sum of money to be laid out in building a battery or two on the river and have wrote to England to purchase cannon fit for the purpose; but as the designs of our enemies will probably be put in execution in the spring the cannon they have wrote for may possibly arrive too late; we therefore at the request of great numbers of the associators, and from our own sense of the great danger. . . . [the Governors were requested to loan to the Province of Penna a number of "battering Cannon" to be returned on demand]. Sgd: Anthony Palmer, Pres. and Eight Councilmen."

On my marching from thence with a brigade of wagons under my charge at Chambers about eleven (11) miles from Shippensburg, the men mutinied and were preparing to march, but by my reasoning with them and at the same time threatening them, the most of them consented to resume their march to Fort London, whereLieut. Scott was with eight or ten months pay. While the Army lay at Ligonier, we were attacked by a body of French and Indians, and I was wounded in the foot by a spent ball. In November of this year (Nov. 25, 1758) the Army took possession of Fort Duquesne, under the command of Gen. Forbes, a poor emaciated old man, who, for the most part of our march was obliged to be carried in a horse

litter. In the year 1759, I was stationed at Ligonier, and had 25 men picked out of the two battalions under my command, etc."

In reference to a late Resolution of the Council, that all the Prisoners of War now in this Borough should be accommodated within Picquets, the petitioners begged leave to present the following facts:

"The Barracks at this Post have been generally considered sufficiently roomy to contain nine hundred or at the most one thousand healthy men, but not a greater number without the greatest inconvenience.

"The Prisoners of War and Convention Troops amongst us at present are computed to be fourteen hundred (1400) exclusive of women and children (supposed to be near six hundred more) amongst whom a most contagious disorder has raged for some time, which notwithstanding the greatest care has proved fatal to very many of them. . . .

"The country adjacent has been exceedingly drained of Provisions for some years past, owing to the great number of soldiers and prisoners, as well as others who have lived in this Borough; of the want of flour, we complain not, but we find beef and pork very scarce articles.

"The insecurity of the town from such a Body of Prisoners being stationed in one place is too obvious to need any comments; we are sensible there are too many disaffected persons in the vicinity of this Borough who would count it meritorious to be instrumental in their escape. . .

"If the matters suggested have any weight we doubt not they will be duly attended to by his Excellency the President and the Supreme Executive Council.

Our veteran, John Frederick Ream, who served with General Washington at Valley Forge was called to Lancaster from Reamstown to help guard prisoners. He was the son of Mathias Ream, 2g., the progenitor of a large family that removed to Centre and Clearfield Counties.

"Sir: The following diary is respectfully submitted for inspection, being transacted under commission granted. . . bearing date of March 10th, 1791, accompanied with messages to the several Indian nations inhabiting the waters near Lake Erie, the Miamies and the Wabash, the same being intended to the establishment of peace and friendly intercourse between the said nations and the United States of America."

"Declaration and manifest delivered by way of a speech to the Hon. Governor and Council of the Province of Maryland, Chesapeak bay, from the Hon. Governor General and Council of the Province of New Netherland [New York (7 pages)].

"Observing, first and foremost, the original right and title the subjects of the High and Mighty and States-General of the United Provinces, under the proprietary of the Lords of the West India Company of Amsterdam, in Holland, possess to the Province of New Netherland, which stretcheth itself along the great ocean from 38 to about 42 degrees [latitude] and thence (including all rivers, islands and main continent) northerly up unto the river of Canada, having on the west side Virginia and now Maryland, upon the great Bay of Chesapeake, and on the east, New England to wit. that their right and title to that part of the newly found world of America partly come down to them first from the King of Spain, being at the time his subjects or vassals, as the first discoverer and founder of that New World, who in these days after war had been waged and peace concluded, did renounce and give over unto the United Republic of the Seven Provinces aforesaid, all his right and title in such countries and dominion as they have, in process of time, conquered and settled in Europe, America and elsewhere; wherefore the above said Province of New Netherland, the islands of Curacao and Brazil became in this regard, the true, proper inheritance of the Dutch nation in those parts. [Secondly he refers to -- "The French by one Jehan de Verazzano, a Florentine, were in the year of our Lord God A1mighty 1524, the second followers and discoverers in the Northern parts of America. . . . Then came first the English and Dutch in like manner, and took possession of the parts we are now in."]"

The original counties in Penna, were BUCKS, Chester and Philadelphia. If your ancestors settled in Lebanon County and purchased land, the deed would be recorded in Dauphin Co., 1785 to 1813. If the deed was 1729 to 1785 it would be recorded in the C.H. Lancaster, Lancaster County. If before 1729 your best bet would be the C.H. West Chester, Penna. Lebanon Co. formed from Dauphin and Lancaster in 1813. (Berks Co. formed from Bucks, Lancaster and Philadelphia Counties in 1752.)

"The battle of Long Island took place on 27th of August [1776]--[a map opposite p. 312 shows: "Red Lion, somewhere here Major Burd was taken Prisoner--a sketch of the battle by Major Ewing."]

Our men behaved as every man did, but it is surprising that with the superiority of numbers, they were not cut to pieces. They behaved gallantly, and there are but five or six hundred missing.

"It was thought advisable to retreat off Long Island and on the night of the 30th, it was done, with <u>great secrecy</u>. Very few of the officers knew it until they were on the boats, supposing that an attack was intended. A discovery of our intention to the enemy would have been fatal to us. <u>The Pennsylvania troops</u> were done great honor by being chosen the corps de reserve to cover the retreat. The regiments of Colonels Hand, Magaw, Shee and Hazlett were detailed for that purpose. We kept up fires with outposts stationed until all the rest were over, we left the lines after it was fair day and then came off."

There were five Battalions, and reports of casualties to individuals leaves no doubt that they were really on the western frontier of our country at the time. No record of our Reams or relatives are noted in the various company reports, but surely some, either soldiers or civilians, were involved. Some of the reports of injury or loss of individual soldiers or officers will give you an idea of a rough time being experienced due to activities of marauding Indians:

"Col. Wm. Crawford captured and tomahawked & burned; Major John McClelland wounded and afterwards tortured to death; Capt. John Biggs, Com. May 20, 1782, captured and burned; Lieut. Edward Stewart, captured and tomahawked." Many killed during various expeditions.

Our Philip Ream (RHIEM) did not reach Greensburg, Westmoreland County until 1797. He was the progenitor of a large family in Stark County, Ohio. Possibly of the same family, Abraham Ream is reported as a farmer in Salem Twp., Westmoreland County where Philip first met his wife Mary Aultman. When Abraham's will was probated in 1847, George, his oldest son, was living in Stark Co., Ohio.

Strictly speaking, there isn't much in this Vol. 16 pertaining to Ream History and Genealogy, however, since early land grants and deeds to our Eberhard and other early settlers were authorized and/or signed by William Penn or members of his family we set forth below some references to the Penn family and their part in efforts to preserve for us a definite understanding with the Parliament in England that would insure a stable government and a well-defined territory on this Continent that finally became our Province, and later our home State of Pennsylvania.

William Penn, b. London, England, 13 Oct. 1644, d. 29 July 1718 at Ruscombe, Berkshire, England, buried

in the village of Jordan at Friends Meeting House. He had been in ill health since 1712. He arrived in America in 1682, at New Castle, Del., Oct. 24 and at Upland, now Chester, Pa., Oct. 29. After a conference with the Governor of Maryland on Dec. 13, 1682, at Col. Thomas Tailler's place he was accompanied by Lord Baltimore to visit a quaker friend, William Richardson, near Fair Haven, Maryland, followed by a boat trip across the Chesapeake Bay to a quaker meeting on the Eastern Shore. It was reported that he could preach in Dutch (or possibly low German) language since his mother was born in Rotterdam, Holland.

The Charter of Penna. was granted by Charles II, Mar. 4, 1681.

The three lower Counties, New Castle, Kent and Sussex occupied by a Dutch Swede Colony were commissioned by King William & Mary in 1693-1694 to Benj. Fletcher, Govnr. of New York, account Penn's absence, but restored to Penn in 1694 (Penn only made 2 trips to America 1680-1703).

The above foretells a bit of the history of the land where some members of my family line fought and died in the service of the United States. I take liberty to mention a few facts about the Bidlack family not included in the historical briefs from the Penna. Archives herein.

My mother, Mary Alice Bidlack, daughter of Benjamin J. Bidlack, Oakwood, Paulding County,Ohio, never dreamed that my sister, Cecile A. (Ream) DeBirny, would ever get interested and trace the family back to Bridestow, Devon, England and obtain a copy of the Coat of Arms for our particular Bidlack line.

Christopher Bidlack (1661-1740) came to America, Ipswich, Mass., in 1685. (Family line traceable to 1300.) His only son--

Bidlack, editor and lawyer, Wilkes Barre, Penna.; State Representative 1835-36, elected to the 27th & 28th Congress of the United States March 1841-March 1845, was appointed Charge d'Affairs to Columbia, May 14, 1845; successfully negotiated a "Treaty of Peace, Amity and Navigation" with Columbia and secured for the United States the right to build a canal or railroad across the Isthmus of Panama; died in Bogota, Columbia, Feb. 6, 1849; interment in the English Cemetery.

"A proclamation concerning the caves of Philadelphia, by William Penn, Proprietary and Governor:

"Whereas I did at first, in regard of the infancy of things and specially out of tenderness to the poorer sort, permitt divers caves to be made in the Bank of Philadelphia fronting Delaware River, for a present accommodation, and perceiving they are commonly disposed of from one to another as a kind of property, and taking farther notice of the great detriment that is like to insure to the street by the continuation of them as well as the disorders that their great secresy hath given occasion to loose People to commit in them, I do hereby desire and strictly order and warne all the inhabitants of the said caves to depart the same within two months after the Publication hereof. . . . all persons concerned are to take notice and yield their due obedience as they will answer the contrary at their perill.

Reames to Colonial Virginia in early 17th Century

Before 1960 the best; known authority on the Reams and Reames family lines in Virginia was a 267 page-book filed in the Library of Congress in 1945, titled "The Reams, Reames Family and Allied Families." It was written and published by Dr. H.C.Smith, a California M.D., now deceased.

A few pertinent items from Dr. Smith's book follow:

"page iv. Preface: This compilation encompasses the present knowledge of the Reames-Reams Genealogy. It is meant to include only the English branch of the family, whose name has been spelled variously Reame, Reams, Reames and Ream.

"However, since some of the German branch of Ream, Reme, Rheam and Rheim have the name spelled Reams in public records and a few have adopted that spelling, some of that branch may be inadvertently included.

"Definately this is not a complete history of the family for various and diverse reasons, but it is the result of years of travel and research, and it is an honest effort to make it so."

"Page x. Family tradition: la. John Reames was the immigrant Ancestor; b.One descendent states he came to America about 1650... There remains the possibility that the Thomas Reames of 1638 was Thomas Reames" (Page v. tells of difficulty experienced in being able to decipher proper spellings from early long hand records)

On page vii Dr. Smith lists nine wills written in Sussex County England by REAMES 1551 to 1634. On page 1 he reports the early immigrant as follows:

"Generally accepted by various branches of the family as the immigrant ancestor, the time and means of, and his age at immigration and marriage unknown quantities to this compiler."

Since "vital statistics" were unknown to the Colonies (States) this early in our history, certainly it would be unreasonable to expect the usual confirming information about family lines as is possible at this time, and we have arranged to accept the John Reames named above as an immigrant forefather for our Association members in all cases where early records show a family line back to Virginia.

To eliminate the confusion about this early immigrant we quote below a report from George Cabell Green, Clerk, Virginia State Land Office titled "Early Virginia Immigrants 1623-1666" Call letters Lib. Cong. F-225 C81 1960,

" p.273 Reames, Thomas 1638 by Mathew Ireland Charles RiverCo.

" p.274 Reeme, Jno. 1637 by John Dennit "

Ireland and Dennit, names of the Ship Captains that brought the immigrants up the James River in Virginia.

In the absence of any other candidates for this immigrant forefather we will also <u>accept</u> this John Reames at least, until it be proven otherwise.

The Norton Family

In 1937 when the writer and family moved from Fort Wayne, Indiana to Washington, D.C., among our early acquaintances was the ALRERT G. NORTON family. At that time Washington was blessed with a fine new street car service. The cars were electrically operated from an underground third rail system. The fare was 5 cents, or \$1.00 for a weekly pass. The law required a penalty for anyone driving past a street car while discharging or loading passengers.

Albert Norton was self-employed. He and two brothers carried on a business established by their father and Uncle, which rendered scrap materials into useful products through a factory in the Washington, D.C.area. Items such as soap, fertilizers and nitroglycerine being developed from the plant. The Norton and Company plant is now located in Alexandria, Va.

Albert always displayed a great interest in our genealogical research work, and in locating Ream families in Eastern and Midwest locations it was not uncommon for me to find a Norton family there also.

The Norton and Ream families were brought closer together when our son, Paul W. Ream, a columnist for the Washington Daily News located and married Dorothy A., daughter of Albert G. and Dorothy A. Norton, in D.C. And from this union we are proud to have as members of the Board of Directors of the REAM FAMILY HISTORICAL SOCIETY, Robin Ream Walker and Stephen Norton Ream, residents of Alexandria and Fairfax, Va., respectively.

In later years we discovered that the home of Albert and and Dorothy Norton was decorated with a beautiful NORTON Coat of Arms.

Further reason for Albert's interest in our research work was noted later when it was discovered that the Nortons, as were the Reams living in the American Colonies early in the 17th Contury. As proof of this we quote below some lines from the Dec. 1975 issue of Car-Del Scribe (a Middleboro, Mass. publication for Collectors, Genealogists and Historians):

"p.18 ESSEX COUNTY, MASS. COURT RECORDS

"(63) NORTON, George, of Salem, his estate. Freegrace, John Norton, children of George, their petition concerning division of the estate. Mary Norton widow of George, Freegrace, aged 24; John, aged 22; George, aged 18; Mary, aged 16; Mahittabell, aged 14; Sarah. aged 12; Hannah aged 10; Abigail, aged 8; Elizabeth, aged 5; children and heirs of George Norton.

"(64) NORTON, George of Salem. Inventory taken Sept. 22, 1650; 1b.134,11s, 6d. John Porter, Jacob Barney, both of Salem, appraisers."

One of our members returning from Europe recently advised that the French prefer spelling our name with an (i) in it. Another story, author unknown reads:

"Some Americans wanting to prove a point, go so far as to add an (e) to their name to make it appear French. For example: (Cont. next page)

Ream changed to Reem, and later Reeme, and now we have a Ream that changed the spelling to Reemes."

It seems that "the sky is the limit" when it comes to changing the spelling of your name without Court approval. You can do it, of course, but remember, if you get in trouble in doing so, "it is your baby."

This record here includes the Census for all States, but they were made up chiefly from the film copy based on the Soundex System which included only families with a child 10 years of age or younger. Our other records for 1880 were made up from the film copy of the original Census report, but some of the film is not readable and to check questionable entries one had to check the original book record which were all returned to the States. We did check some of the original book records in Columbus, Ohio, Harrisburg, Pa. and Annapolis, Md. but now since the 1900 Census records are available, and there has been so many changes in spelling of the family name we considered time better spent in accumulating records from the 1900 Census.

HS Census Records (Cont.)

From a Genealogical view point this 1900 Census is the best one ever made. It includes every Ream child regardless of age living with some other individual.

Late Census records are not available to the public, but finally a couple of years ago Congress passed a law permitting release of the 1900 Census, and now the U.S.Archives has 80 machines set up for use of the public, and individuals are privileged to request and receive a 1900 Soundex System film, or a copy of the original Census report under a very carefully supervised distribution of the film from the locked cabinets. At times all machines are in use and sometimes a waiting list is made up for a crowd waiting in the hall.

The 1890 Census records were destroyed by a fire in the mall, D.C. in 1920.

The Musgrave Family

We grew-up in a Northwestern Ohio community. In the County seat town of PAULDING.-Dr. Charles A. Musgrave was a fine dentist and a great American. He served out Nation in three wars. When that bugle sounded "to Arms" he was ready to move forward and volunteered.

When Chas. was Captain of Company B., 2nd Regiment of the Ohio National Guard the writer served as his Musician for three years through the period of the great flood in Dayton, Ohio in 1913. (I qualified as "Marksman" only on the officers range with my Colt 38, but I did double duty at Regimental Headquarters 'cause our No. 2 Musician formerly an English Army bugler never learned to blow our calls)

His wife Nora is a sister to my deceased wife Eva Caroline Wuchter. And naturally we were fond of a good sized Musgrave family, finally located in Olmsted Falls, Ohio and various points in the United States.

It was a surprise to this researcher when in 1953 I discovered in the Library of the Penna.Historical Society in Phila. that John Musgrave surveyed the first 200 acre tract of land for our Eberhard Ream in the Conestogo Dist. of Chester County Pa. in 1719 (now Reamstown, Lancaster County, Pa.)

Records found later in a History of Penna. shows that in 1729 the Governor of the Province of Penna choose <u>six</u> men, including John Musgrave to survey the line betweenChester and the newly authorized County of Lancaster.

The historical report reads:

"The six occupied very prominent positions in the new County for many years, and they were selected for the survey on account of their intelligence and worth."












